LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

This month for the newsletter, I will start by sharing with you the brief remarks I made Erev Rosh Hashanah.

Judaism provides both opportunities and challenges. We have an opportunity to help build a better world based on our Jewish values of justice, fairness, equality, and righteousness. At the same time, we enrich our own lives by trying to live our Jewish ideals and drawing upon the abundance of Jewish wisdom, knowledge, and spiritual practice. The challenge is that we live in an imperfect world. We live a life with many competing interests, and we live in a world where some hate and attack us just because we are Jews.

Building a Jewish community together also presents many opportunities and challenges. History, traditions, size, membership, differing opinions – all these and other aspects of synagogue life provide both opportunities and challenges. We have confronted those challenges in forming our Unified Congregation. In the early 20th century, Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook was the first chief rabbi of Palestine and the future the State of Israel. He was the first influential religious Zionist and worked with Jews across the religious spectrum to establish the new State. In ancient teachings about storing and using old grain, Rav Kook found a powerful message of renewing modern spiritual life. The Rav offered the insight that "the old shall be made new, and the new shall be made holy." Old ideas and practices can be renewed. We can renew ancient spiritual practices and make them alive in our hearts and souls, sometimes in new and meaningful ways. We can turn to that old grain and find sustenance in it!

And sometimes we have to move the old ideas and teachings and practices to the side in order to make way for the new. Just as our priestly ancestors once moved the ashes off the altar so the eternal flame could continue burning, sometimes we need to let go of old interpretations, traditions or practices in order to make space for new ones that now resonate with us. We can sanctify new ideas and practices. We can make the new not only meaningful but holy. That's the work we must do as a community-turning to the "old grain" that's already in our granaries, while also trusting that the "new grain," the new ideas and teachings flowing now, are also a source of spiritual nourishment.

We are members of the Unified Jewish Congregation of Baton Rouge. We unified to honor our rich diversity, our cherished backgrounds and traditions, and our histories in order to create a new and vibrant future for Judaism in Baton Rouge. "The old shall be made new, and the new shall be made holy."

How do we accomplish this awesome goal? I will repeat my mantra:

Volunteer - we need you, we need your skills, your knowledge, your help

Spread the word - celebrate the success we are having, bring friends, advocate for us

Donate – operating the congregation costs as it does for any organization. We have a voluntary dues structure and dues do no cover all our expenses. We depend on other contributions particularly at this time of year our High Holiday appeal. Help us reach our goal.

Let's together take advantage of the opportunity we have to build the Jewish community of our present and future.

The old shall be renewed and the new shall be made holy.

Shanah tova, A Happy and sweet New Year.



Mikvah Grand Opening



Sept 1, 2023

It was a night filled with sacred and heartfelt beauty.

In Isaiah 66, there is a verse that reminds us that G-d will not take anything away without allowing something new to bloom. And in my personal life, I have relied on that promise more times than I can count. As a community, this promise was fulfilled once again during the celebratory Mikvah opening.

On August 31, 2005, Hurricane Katrina flooded our once usable mikvah at Beth Israel in New Orleans. Many of us remember coming together as a larger community to support and assist our Jewish brothers and sisters from the New Orleans area as they were forced to leave their homes and not sure what, if anything, they would return to. I, myself, remember the pictures of rabbis in waist deep water wading into Beth Israel to recover Torah's from the Ark, to keep what is precious to all of us, as safe as possible.

Eighteen years after the beginning of an unknown future, on August 31, 2023, the Louisiana Community Mikvah officially opened its doors. I counted and estimated over 100 in attendance at the reception held at Shir Chadash in Metairie. It was not lost on us, it had taken 18 years, and how valuable that one number is in our day-to-day Jewish celebrations, good fortunes, toasts, and with this opening.

While listening to the numerous speakers, rabbis, beloved executive director, and committee chairs, I became aware that all of us, no matter how large or small, contributed to this moment. There was representation from all Jewish movements. We, as one Jewish family, with various backgrounds from Conservative to Chasidic, all came together to celebrate and mark this occasion. How incredibly beautiful this night was! We put our theological differences to the side and worked together to unite as one community and to focus on what truly mattered to us: building a space which would be open and accessible to all Jewish people, no matter the "hat" or label worn.

I had not visited the building before last night, but when I walked into the actual mikvah with its tasteful and modern décor, I began to feel a welcoming warmth. Walking further into the immersion room there is a most definite sacred energy which emerges. Even without an immersion last night, I among others, could feel the presence of divine energy, a welcoming and loving environment ready to engulf you in peace, in warmth, and in sacred being.




