

LEARNING BY DOING

Over the course of several months, fifth graders designed and built a ride through the digestive system for PK4 students. Both groups of students studied the human body in their science classes early in the year, and the fifth grade students came up with the idea of creating the ride to bring what they learned to life. Divided into teams for the mouth, esophagus, stomach, small intestine and large intestine, the older students developed visual and tactile elements and scripts for the different sections of the tour. They worked with science teacher Beverly Burgin, art teacher Claire Caffery, and Idea Lab Coordinator Ashleigh D'Aunoy to make sure the ride was academically accurate and used the vocabulary that the younger students learned in their studies. The tour began in the mouth, continued down the esophagus with a ride in the elevator, and moved on to the stomach and intestines. The two-story ride captivated both students and adults.

READY TO SERVE

First grade students in Mrs. Joanne Broussard's class discussed poverty as part of their focus on cultural anthropology this spring. The students brainstormed about how to help those less fortunate, and decided to hold a lemonade sale to raise funds to send much-needed socks to children in an orphanage in Ghana. The students took the proceeds from their sale to Walmart and purchased 440 pairs of socks!

ESA families contributed posters and cards to a service project led by sophomores Ali Munshi, Anil Cacodcar, and Madeline Breaux. To thank essential hospital workers, including maintenance, cleaning, and cafeteria staff, Ali (top) delivered the posters to local hospitals.

ESA's Environmental Club (center) led an Earth Week celebration that encouraged families to hold an eco-conscious movie night, and play Earth Week bingo by completing earth-friendly activities such as picking up litter and starting a compost pile.

Members of Students to End Prejudice, also known as STEP Club, surveyed Cade Campus students and shared the information they gathered about diversity at ESA. Some of the members spoke in chapel (bottom) about their experiences as people of color at ESA and in the world.

The Community Service Club extended their annual Adopt-a-Grand program to reach out to elderly community members during the pandemic. Each winter, the club hosts a Christmas party for residents of the Schooldays apartments in New Iberia. Advisories adopt the elderly residents and provide them with needed items and treats. In March, the Community Service Club asked students to reach out to the residents with notes and cards since many of them live alone and were isolated due to COVID-19.

CONNECTING ACROSS THE CURRICULUM



Exploring the stories of two African children, told in *A Long Walk to Water* by Linda Sue Park, launched ESA seventh graders into an adventure in geography, history, and science.

The cross-curricular project based on the book gave seventh graders the opportunity to explore east-central Africa and to examine the issue of water scarcity from several different angles. Teachers Christina Hidalgo (life science), Susan Doré (English and cultural geography), and Missy Gates (cultural geography) helped the students forge connections through reading, writing, hands-on experiments, research, presentations, artwork, and discussions.

As one of the book's characters journeyed through Africa, the students traced the geography of his path and studied the biome challenges of the different terrains he encountered. As they dove into the issue of water scarcity, they deepened their explorations by investigating the organizations that drill wells and work to provide water in the areas with the least access. With online resources, they examined their own water usage as they learned about how difficult accessing clean water was for the book's characters.

In life science, hands-on experiments introduced the students to the difficulties of carrying water over long distances and purifiying the water they managed to bring to their destination.

Discussing metabolic needs for water, as well as the role of water in disease prevention, agriculture, and industry introduced the seventh graders to challenges they've never imagined. Along with gaining new knowledge and skills, reading about children near to their own age experiencing the hardships of scarcity gave students the opportunity to develop empathy.
