PORTRAIT OF A GENERAL: COLLABORATION & COMMUNICATION MAKING THE MOST OF CONFERENCES

Conducting effective parent-teacher conferences can help promote positive outcomes for you, your students and you school. The November 6th and 7th conferences are a great time to:

- share academic progress and growth based on classroom observations, testing data, assessments, and examples of student work
- learn from parents/guardians to be better informed of their child's strengths, needs, behaviors and learning style
- discuss enrichment or intervention strategies to support student learning
- talk about issues that may be interfering with the student's learning and growth



As you prepare for conferences, consider the following checklist:

[] Prepare your materials, including any documentation of any issues you plan to discuss
[] Create a welcome environment by tidying up your room, displaying students' work, having paper and pens available for note taking, etc.
[] Remind parents the intent of conferences is to discuss student progress
[] Lead with the positives, but share a honest assessment of progress and growth
[] Limit or explain acronyms and avoid teacher jargon
[] Ask questions and listen to the parent's perspective
1 Wrap up with an offer to answer any questions they think of later



TECHNOLOGY TIPS

KEEP YOUR COMPUTER SAFE & WORKING WELL

The AW Tech Team has seen an increase in reports of damage to staff computers, and has the following reminders to help keep your District-issued laptop in good working order.

- W.
- When moving your laptop, always first disconnect the power adapter and any additional cables and/or USB devices.
- Do not store, drink, or place liquids close to your computer.
- To clean the screen and keyboard, lightly dampen a soft cotton, or microfiber cloth with distilled or bottled water.
- Never put anything between the screen and keyboard -- not even paper.
- Do not put anything heavy on top of your laptop.
- When placing your laptop into a bag, do not store anything in the same slot, or compartment as your laptop, especially if it will press against the screen.
- Copy older files that you do not use to Google Drive, and delete them from your computer to save space.



NATIONAL GRATITUDE MONTH

THE GRATITUDE AND HOPE CONNECTION

The Thanksgiving holiday reminds us to maintain an attitude of gratitude, and <u>studies show that this thankfulness can make us happier</u>. It also turns out that gratitude and hope go together like mashed potatoes and gravy!

In the study: <u>Gratitude predicts hope and happiness: A two-study assessment of traits and states</u>, researchers discovered that grateful remembering is a practice that can bolster present happiness and hope for the future.

We have also learned that hope = goals + pathways + agency. Being grateful for progress we have made toward our goals, practicing gratitude for the doors that have opened along the way and honoring the challenges that have made us stronger can have a huge impact on hope levels.
