We breathe in what trees breathe out.

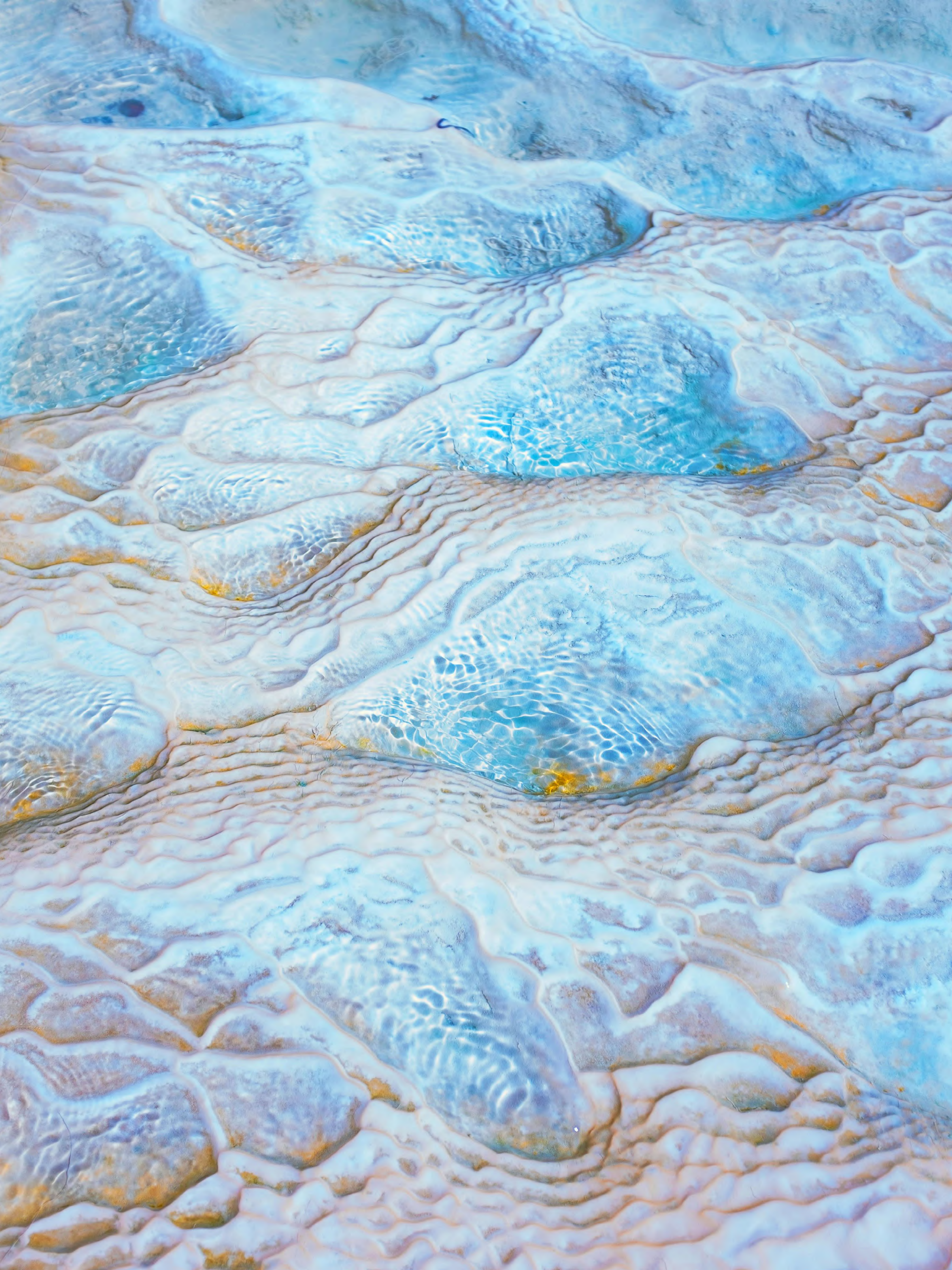

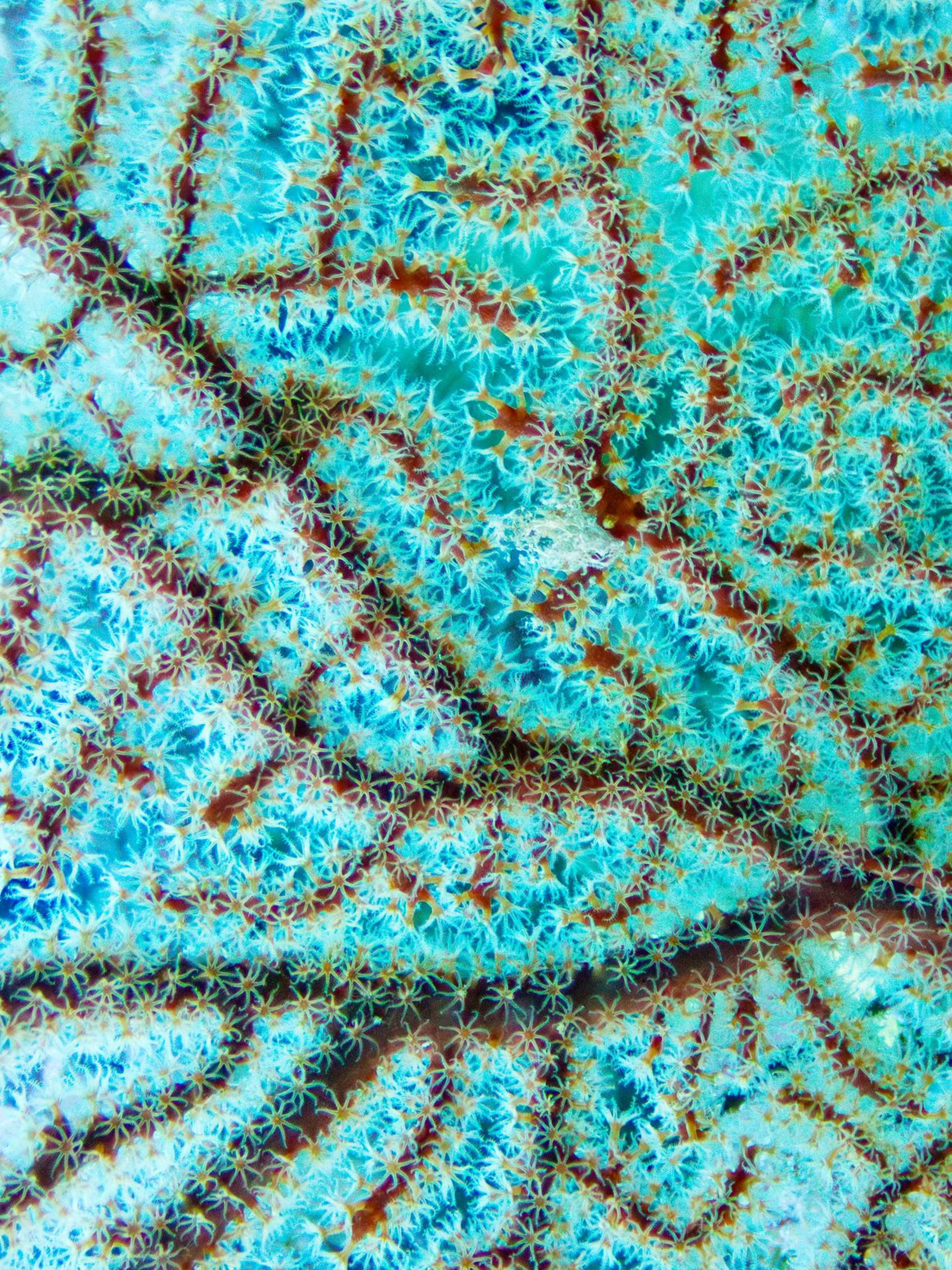














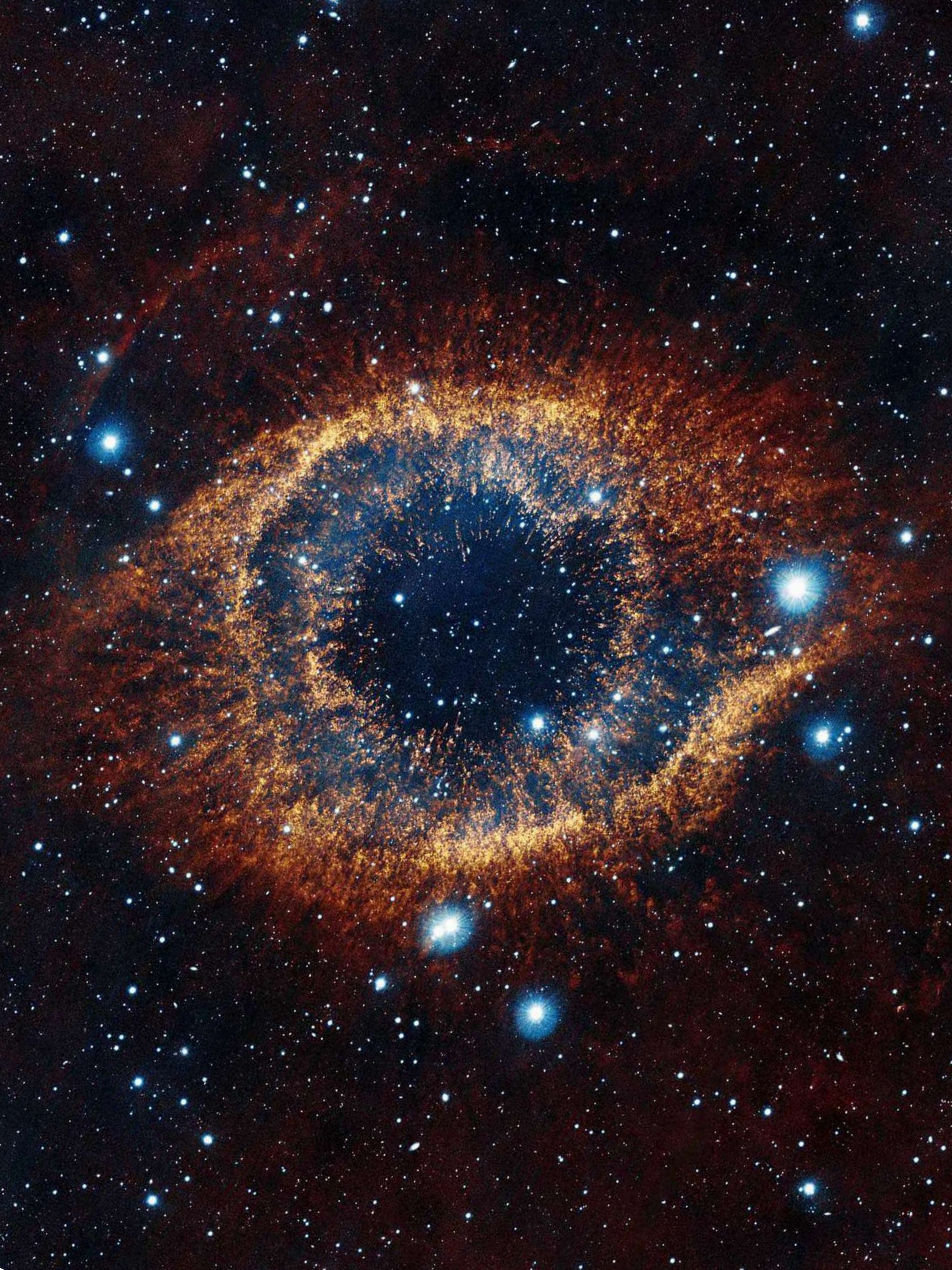
