## Schools Programme

The Bradford Literature Festival Schools Programme runs alongside the public programme, offering you the chance to bring your pupils face-to-face with authors, writers, speakers and thinkers. Our Schools programme mirrors our distinct and diverse Public programme with its focus on insightful talks for young people, to challenge their world view, encourage them to engage with current affairs and help them to develop a deeper understanding of the different communities they live amongst. Events take many forms ranging from storytelling to film screenings, from motivational talks to creative workshops, with something for both primary and secondary school groups.

This year we are looking at the 2nd World War from two very different and fascinating angles. We have a book and film event about Noor Inayat Khan, a Muslim woman who became a secret agent in the Second World War and won the George Cross for her bravery as well as an irresistible documentary and book about Wojtek, a bear cub adopted by the Polish army who travelled the world with them.

In our current affairs strand, we have a number of talks on the hot topics of the day with an in-depth look at the Middle East,

Jihad and a Q&A session on Islam. We also have a focus on fitness and wellbeing with a Sports Taster Day at Woodhouse Grove School as well as a motivation and meditation session, geared at improving performance in school, with poet John Siddique.

You can enthuse the love of reading among students with Nick Toczek's legendary Million-Miles-An-Hour show or Richard O'Neill's lively Roma storytelling, both offering a brilliant dose of laughter and learning. We have a Talent Showcase for budding writers, poets and performers to display their skills, as well as a session on the grammar rules of the English language with The Times journalist Oliver Kamm.

## We Love Death as You Love Life:

#### Britain's Suburban Terrorists

Islamist radicalisation and the causes of this alienation from western society is one of the most hotly debated topics of today.

Rafaello Pantucci, Director of International Security Studies at the Royal United Services Institute (RUSI), talks to Dr. Afshin Shahi, Director of the Centre for the Study of Political Islam about his new book, *We Love Death as you Love Life: Britain's Suburban Terrorists.* Looking at the attack in London on 7 July 2005, he places the actions of its perpetrators, as well as the hundreds of young British Muslims who have been drawn by jihadist ideas, within a larger context. This book offers the first comprehensive history of jihadist ideas and violence in the United Kingdom.

Raffaello Pantucci has worked on questions around terrorism and radicalisation in London and Washington. He has been published widely in both the media and the academic and specialist press.

## Freedom of Speech

The recent Charlie Hebdo tragedy, and prosecutions of twitter users, has put a sharp focus on freedom of speech. The word freedom implies no boundaries and yet even without formal boundaries. the implicit ones of culture and context remain, and it is these that shape acceptability.

Panellists Boyd Tonkin, senior journalist at The Independent, Abdel Bari Atwan, Editor-in-Chief of Rai al-Youm, the Arab world's first Huffington Post-style digital news and opinion website, and journalist Sunny Hundal

examine the concept of freedom of speech in its historical context, as well as the current terminology that shapes the discourse around it.

What are the implications and dangers in our global village of often conflicting and contradictory demands on freedom of speech? Do we really have freedom of speech, or is it a delusion of 'liberal' societies? What is the definition of this freedom and where do we draw the line?







# The Song of the Shirt: The High Price of Cheap Garments, from Blackburn to Bangladesh

Jeremy Seabrook has established himself as one of Britain's finest anatomist of class, deindustrialisation and migration. His latest book The Song of the Shirt, which depicts the plight of Dhaka's near-sweatshop workers as "industrial terrorism", has been described as his masterpiece.

The 2013 collapse of Dhaka's Rana Plaza killed over 1,000 low paid textile workers and revealed a stark tragedy: women and children toiling to earn a pittance in fragile, flammable buildings to provide the world with limitless cheap garments.

Seabrook traces the intertwined histories of workers in, what is now, Bangladesh and Lancashire. Two hundred years ago, the former were dispossessed of ancient skills while their Lancashire counterparts were forced into labour settlements. In a ghostly replay of traffic in the other direction, the decline of Britain's textile industry coincided with Bangladesh becoming one of the world's major clothing exporters.

How long before global business relocates mass textile manufacture to an even cheaper labour source, with all too predictable consequences for those involved.

Following A Month by the Sea, her acclaimed exploration of life in Gaza, Dervla Murphy describes with passionate honesty the experience of living with and among Jewish Israelis and Palestinians in both Israel and Palestine. In cramped Haifa high-rises, in homes in the settlements and in a refugee camp on the West Bank, she talks with whomever she meets, trying to understand them and their attitudes with her customary curiosity, her acute ear and mind, her empathy, her openness to the experience and her moral seriousness.

**Dervla Murphy's** first book, *Full Tilt: From Ireland to India with a Bicycle*, was published in 1965. Over twenty other titles have followed, winning Dervla worldwide praise and awards for her writing. Now in her early-eighties, she continues to travel around the world, happily setting off to trek in remote mountains, and remains passionate about politics, conservation, bicycling and beer.

# Humbert Wolfe on Bradford



Your heart's light's light is the light of God It's pure and far from mental, sensual light

So says the Mathnawi of Jalal al-Din Rumi, the great poetic and spiritual genius of Islam, who wrote in Persian and died in 1273 and yet continues to inspire millions of readers throughout the world. Rumi has been the best-selling poet in the United States for several decades and The Mevlevi, a Sufi order founded by Rumi's eldest son to preserve and transmit his teachings, has been known for centuries in the West as the Whirling Dervishes.

Join Leonard Lewisohn, editor of the Mawlana Rumi Review, as he discusses the meaning and structure of Rumi's celebrated spiritual epic, the Mathnawi, as well as the life and times of the great mystical poet. 

## The Sultan's Sex Potions

Arabic erotic literature, which dates back to the ninth century has a rich history and has received considerable attention from scholars. Newman's translation of The Sultan's Sex Potions was originally penned by NaSīr al-Dīn al-Tūsī (1201–1274), one of the leading scientists of his age. Sober in tone, the treatise was intended as a manual and guide, to be used by those afflicted with various sexual ailments, especially impotence, for self-healing, without resorting to a physician. It was composed at the request of the ruler and so its potions, electuaries, syrups and enemas enjoyed a 'royal warrant of appointment'.

Daniel L. Newman is Head of the Arabic Studies Department, Professor of Arabic and Course Director of the MA in Arabic-English Translation and Interpreting at the University of Durham.
