We recognize diverse learning styles, ethno-racial backgrounds, sexual orientations, gender expressions, and religious/spiritual faiths in both the classroom and administration. When these differences generate tension, we will employ restorative dialogue to facilitate understanding and build respect for diverse identities and cultural practices.

We value the process of recognizing our biases so as not to impose them on our school community. We respect the many differences we each bring with us. We actively promote social justice in our learning and work environments. When there is conflict in our community, we engage in relational practices to reach resolution.

We value social, physical, and emotional learning that recognizes each student. We work for equity and inclusion throughout this education by providing: clear classroom agreements that are equitably applied; spaces to learn and work that are safe and calming for all, especially those who have survived trauma; personalized educational support that attends to neurodiversity; and close family involvement throughout our community.

### LETTER FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Within the Eugene Waldorf School, it is the role of the board to ensure the financial wellness and legal compliance of the school. We work to support funding and monitor the school's programs and services. As we prioritize our work, we collaborate with the other bodies of our school such as the College of Teachers and Parent Collective.

Last spring, the board was facing a cash flow challenge, due to a delay in receiving pandemic-related federal funding. Board members showed their resourcefulness with creative suggestions that were implemented successfully. This included the option for additional discounts for tuition prepayments which allowed the school to navigate this challenging time. The majority of incoming federal funding has been received which has been helpful for the school's post-pandemic recovery.


In 2024, we reflect on many celebrations including the growth of our board which is comprised of many new parents. We celebrated the highest annual giving since the 2019-2020 school year and graciously received a donation from anonymous donors working through Waldorf Teacher Education Eugene (WTEE) that assisted our school in paying off our mortgage. We prioritized hiring a Funds Development Support person to assist the school in diversifying sources of income while strengthening events and gatherings that embrace a culture of giving.

Moving forward, the EWS school board will prioritize conversations around reestablishing key faculty positions such as a eurythmy teacher, sustainable wages for staff, accessible education through indexed tuition, site updates, and more. We acknowledge and are committed to our responsibilities to ensure the long-term fiscal, legal, and structural health of the school.

Above all, we move in gratitude toward a human- centered education that supports creativity, knowing oneself, and collective care. We look forward to the continued opportunities that allow us to celebrate, learn, and grow within this community.

### LETTER FROM THE COLLEGE OF TEACHERS

Together with our colleagues, we are grateful to offer our reflections and look toward the future in this Annual Report. We are excited to work alongside the Board on the important ended the school year knowing we wouldn't work of decision making for EWS; reenlivening committee work; long-term planning and embarking on the AWSNA self-study.

As the fiscal year for 2023/24 began in August, the College made the complex decision to postpone moving forward with our second accreditation as a full member school of AWSNA. This decision hinged on two factors—avoiding the financial risk associated with the cost of the accreditation process and lessening the burden on faculty and staff after the difficult Covid years. By utilizing creative solutions, we maintained a full faculty despite low enrollment. EWS is excited to now work on a partial self study as an associate member of AWSNA.

As the school year came to a close, we said a fond farewell to Nadja Kranites, Faculty Chair and Erika Finstad, long time teacher. We also be able to offer an eighth grade class for the 2024/25 school year.

We are thrilled this year to have opened the doors to eighteen first grade children and their families and new students in many of the Grades classes. Ben Mew, last year's seventh grade teacher, was hired as our first grade teacher. Our early Childhood classes continue to be robust including our family-child classes.

Teachers have been working steadily to bring study in Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Belonging (EDIB) work to inspire curriculum revisions for all ages and grade levels. Together with Alma Partners (EDIB consultants), the College wrote a mandate for an EDIB Committee and this group is now comprised of parents, teachers and administrative staff.

The College also began an in-depth study on collaborative leadership in Waldorf schools based on the vision of Rudolf Steiner for the role of education in a process of social renewal. Our study led us to picture the strong involvement of active teachers, not only in the classroom, but also in the school governance, and how that is paramount in teaching social values.

The Leadership Response Team was created at the beginning of the 24-25 school year to support the college with administrative tasks and help the process of collaborative leadership at EWS work more smoothly.

In closing, we want to thank you for supporting our efforts to serve children today and into the future as we ensure and share the gifts of Waldorf education.

The College of Teachers is the pedagogical leadership body at our school. In 2023-24, it was composed of a group of nine faculty members, the Faculty chair, and two members of the administrative team. This group meets weekly and makes all decisions in the pedagogical realm.




