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

TIDBITS® VIEWS SOME FAVORITE CHRISTMAS MOVIES

'Tis the season to remember some of our favorite Christmas movies! Tidbits walks down memory lane this week with these facts.

• It was a typical morning in the life of writer Philip Van Doren in 1938, when he had an idea for a story while he was shaving. His brainstorm was the tale of a man considering suicide who is visited by his guardian angel who shows the man the worth of his life. Van Doren worked on the story over the next five years, and in 1943, he mailed it out to friends as his annual Christmas card, using the title "The Greatest Gift." A copy of the story found its way to an agent at RKO Pictures, and Van Doren was paid \$10,000 for the film rights. The title was changed to 'It's a Wonderful Life," and it was released in 1946 with Jimmy Stewart in the role of George Bailey, a banker in the small town of Bedford Falls facing a breakdown. The entire plot takes place on Christmas Eve with Clarence the angel saving Bailey in order to earn his wings. The movie was filmed at RKO's movie ranch near Encino, California, where four acres was transformed into the small town. Being filmed during the middle of a scorching heat wave necessitated the invention of a new type of fake snow composed of soap flakes and fire extinguisher foam. In previous films, painted corn flakes were used for winter scenes, but the crunching sound resulted in multiple scenes having to be redone. "It's A Wonderful Life" has become one of the world's most beloved Christmas movies, but although it was nominated for five Academy

Awards, it didn't win a single one. It was considered a failure at the box office and recorded a loss of \$525,000.

- The movie was called "National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation," but there are no scenes that take place on Christmas Day. The movie ends with the celebration of Christmas Eve with the whole Griswold family participating, including Mrs. Griswold's cousin Catherine and her socially-awkward husband Cousin Eddie, who has been out of work for seven years. Clark Griswold, played by Chevy Chase, longs for the perfect Christmas, and adorns his house with 25,000 lights, which cause a temporary citywide power shortage when lit. During the filming, as Aunt Bethany and Uncle Lewis arrived, there was an earthquake as the scene was being shot, and if you look closely, you can see that the camera shook as they walked in the door.
- The 2004 movie "The Polar Express" was originally intended by director Robert Zemeckis to be a live-action film, but when he learned that costs of live-action would creep close to \$1 billion instead of the budgeted \$160 million, he opted for motion-capture footage that was turned into animation. Actors performed in a black box theater, with the footage converted to digital. The story of children riding a magical train to the North Pole on Christmas Eve was written by Chris Van Allsburg, the same author who penned "Jumanji." Besides his main role as the train's conductor, actor Tom Hanks played five other roles in the film. Lead singer of Aerosmith, Steven Tyler played two characters in "The Polar Express."
- Although the famous song "White Christmas" is featured in the 1954 movie of the same name, the tune sung by crooner Bing Crosby actually had its debut in the 1942 film "Holiday Inn," winning the Oscar for Best Original Song that year. There was a new version of the song for 1954's "White Christmas," the highest-grossing film of the year. It still ranks among the top 100 popular movies of all time.
- All 17 songs in the movie "White Christmas" were written by Russian-born composer Irving Berlin, who wrote an estimated 1,500 songs before his death in 1989 at age 101. Rosemary Clooney, aunt of actor George Clooney, starred opposite Bing Crosby.
- Charles Dickens' masterpiece, "A Christmas Carol," has been adapted into film well over 100 times, both in animated and live-action form. The first to tell the story of the miserable miser Ebenezer Scrooge was a British short silent film in 1901, footage that has been preserved nearly 125 years. The 1935 film "Scrooge" starred a British actor, Seymour Hicks, in the title role. In 1951, Scottish actor Alastair Sim took on the role of the stingy businessman visited by three spirits. Oscar-winning actor George C. Scott's 1984 portrayal of Scrooge is one of the favorite representations of the story. Kelsey Grammer and Patrick Stewart have also tackled the famous role. There have been numerous animated versions of "A Christmas Carol," including the 1999 computer-animated film with Jim Carrey voicing Scrooge. Favorite cartoon character adaptations have included Mickey Mouse, Bugs Bunny, Mr. Magoo, Yosemite Sam, and the Flintstones.
- "The Muppet Christmas Carol," produced in 1992, was the directorial debut of Brian Henson, son of Muppets creator Jim Henson. It was the first major Muppet project following Jim's death in 1990. Actor Michael Caine claims that the role of Scrooge was one his favorite parts of his entire career. Kermit the Frog played Scrooge's clerk Bob Cratchit, and Miss Piggy, of course, was featured as Mrs. Cratchit. After Jim Henson's death, Kermit's role was handed to Steve Whitmire, who was exceptionally nervous about taking over fulfilling the hole left by Henson. The day before Whitmire was to step in, he had a dream of meeting Henson and relaying how nervous he was. In his dream, Whitmire was assured by Henson that all would go well, giving the new Kermit the confidence to continue.
- 1988's "Die Hard" is considered one of the greatest action films of all times, but is it really a Christmas movie? Fans of the film say absolutely, since it takes place on the evening of the office Christmas party of the hero's exwife. The film is perhaps Bruce Willis' most famous role, in which he portrays New York cop John McClane, who gets mixed up in the terrorist takeover of a Los Angeles skyscraper, while there in an attempt to win back his wife. Although we can't imagine anyone other than Willis in the role, it was offered to several other box office stars first, including Sylvester Stallone, Richard Gere, Clint Eastwood, Harrison Ford, Mel Gibson, Don Johnson, and Al Pacino. Willis received \$5 million for the role. When filming began, the ending had not even been finalized and was only determined in the last 10 days of filming.

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


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K.T. Oslin



Kay Toinette Oslin was never meant to glide quietly through the world. Born on May 15, 1942, in Crossett, Arkansas, she grew up with an early and instinctive pull toward performance—a pull that eventually lifted her far beyond the expectations of her small-town childhood. Her path, however, was anything but typical for a future country music star.

Oslin spent her early adulthood not on southern stages but in New York City's bustling theater scene. After studying drama at Lamar University in Texas, she headed to Manhattan, where she performed in Broadway and off-Broadway productions throughout the 1960s and 70s, including Promises, Promises and Hello, Dolly! Like many performers in the city, she supplemented her theater work with commercial jingles, unknowingly laying the foundations for the vocal precision that would later define her recording career.

While she was honing her acting and singing craft, Oslin was also writing-quietly, privately, with a voice that was unconventional for the male-dominated country music industry of the time. Her lyrics were unapologetically adult, unapologetically female, and unapologetically honest. She wrote about desire, frustration, reinvention, and the inner worlds of women who were rarely centered in mainstream country songwriting. Her breakthrough arrived shockingly late by industry standards: she was in her mid-40s when the world finally caught up to her. After signing with RCA Records, Oslin released 80's Ladies in 1987, an album that distilled her humor, insight, and emotional directness into a sound that felt both familiar and daringly original. The title track became an anthem, celebrating the resilience and complexity of a generation of women who had lived, loved, and battled their way through a rapidly changing world. The song earned her a Grammy and opened the floodgates for a wave of success that would redefine country music's understanding of who could be a star-and when. The next few years were a creative blaze. Hits like "Hold Me," "Do Ya'," and "Come Next Monday" showcased her storytelling depth and her ability to craft songs that were as catchy as they were nuanced. Oslin's voice-a warm, worldly alto-carried a kind of lived-in wisdom that stood apart from her contemporaries. She was not portraying life's complications; she was reporting from inside them.

Oslin's success was historic. In 1988, she became the first woman to win the CMA Award for Song of the Year for "80's Ladies," and her influence soon extended beyond the charts. Her late-in-life breakthrough gave hope to a generation of artists who didn't fit the industry's youthful mold, proving that artistry matures, deepens, and even flourishes with age.

Throughout the 1990s and 2000s, Oslin continued to write, record, and act, though health challenges—including a diagnosis of Parkinson's disease—eventually slowed her public output. Still, she remained a revered figure in Nashville, celebrated for her sharp wit, intelligence, and fiercely independent creative spirit. Her 2015 album, Simply, offered pared-down reinterpretations of her classic songs, revealing just how powerfully her writing could stand on its own.

K.T. Oslin died on December 21, 2020, but her legacy resonates in every songwriter who risks honesty over polish, every performer who blooms later than expected, and every woman who has ever heard one of her songs and thought, She's singing my life. She left behind a catalog of stories that expanded the emotional vocabulary of country music—and a reminder that artistic arrival has no expiration date.

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Jimmy Stewart enlisted in the Army Air Corps as soon as the United States entered World War II, flying 20 combat missions over Europe. "It's a Wonderful Life" was his first role after his return from his duties. He remained active in the military until 1968, attaining the rank of brigadier general.

Have you ever had this candy? It goes by lots of names. Growing up in Oregon, we'd visit a candy shop in Cannon Beach that called it "seafoam." My British mother called it "cinder toffee." I've heard sponge toffee, golden crunchers, hokey pokey, fairy food, but "honeycomb candy" seems to be the most official moniker.

If you've ever watched honeycomb bubble up like a magic trick and thought, "Oh no, that looks dangerous, I'll need adult supervision," you're not alone. This humble confection has a reputation for being fussy, fiery and fit only for professional chocolatiers wearing Kevlar gloves.

But here's the truth: Honeycomb is gloriously simple, ridiculously inexpensive and one of the most impressive homemade holiday gifts you can whip up with nothing more than sugar, baking soda and 10 brave minutes.

Let's walk through it together so you can make a batch with confidence, and maybe show off a little.

What Is Honeycomb, Exactly?

Honeycomb candy is a sweet, light-as-air caramel that expands dramatically when baking soda hits molten sugar. It tastes like caramel clouds with a satisfying shatter, and once you dip it in chocolate, you've created the world's cheapest fancy-pants gourmet gift.

Why This Candy Scares People (and Why It Shouldn't)

The fear comes from two things: Sugar gets very hot (300 F -- the "hard crack" stage). And the moment you add baking soda, it erupts like a volcano. Cool, right?

But with the right setup and a little focus, everything stays controlled and delightful. Honeycomb is one of those recipes where organization matters more than skill. If you can make toast without burning the house down, you can make this.

Have these things ready to go before you begin.

- * Baking soda, measured and ready
- * A large pot (the mixture will triple in size)
- * A parchment-lined pan
- * A heatproof spatula

* A candy thermometer

Once the syrup hits 300 F, it keeps climbing -- so you'll be moving quickly.

HOMEMADE HONEYCOMB CANDY

Yield: 1 (8x8) pan

Total Time: 20 minutes

1/3 cup water

1 cup sugar

1/3 cup light corn syrup (or honey or maple syrup)

2 1/2 teaspoons baking soda

1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

Chocolate for dipping (optional but encouraged)

Line an 8-by-8-inch pan with parchment paper. Pre-measure your baking soda mixed with cream of tartar, and keep them nearby.

Combine water, sugar and corn syrup in a medium saucepan over medium heat, stirring just until combined. Once it bubbles, stop stirring. Attach a candy thermometer and let it boil, undisturbed, to 300 F.

Remove from heat and quickly stir in baking soda, it will foam dramatically. Stir just until incorporated, then immediately pour into your prepared pan.

Let cool completely (about an hour). Break into pieces. Optional: dip or drizzle with melted chocolate. The recipe can be doubled to yield a 9-by-13-inch pan.

Tips for Success. Don't refrigerate; it gets sticky. Store airtight to keep it crisp. Chocolate coating helps it last longer. And, of course: Don't touch hot sugar.



* On Dec. 15, 1945, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, in his capacity as Supreme Commander of Allied Powers in the Pacific, ended the role of Shintoism as Japan's established religion. Shintoism included the belief that the emperor was divine.

* On Dec. 16, 1998, President Bill Clinton announced his order of air strikes against Iraq, due to the country's refusal to cooperate with U.N. weapons inspectors. Key members of Congress did not support the decision, accusing Clinton of using the strikes to direct attention away from his impeachment proceedings.

* On Dec. 17, 2003, "The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King," the final film in the trilogy based on J.R.R. Tolkien's beloved fantasy novels, debuted in theaters. A tremendous hit, it won 11 Academy Awards, and the trilogy became one of the highest-grossing franchises in cinema history.

* On Dec. 18, 1961, the Tokens' version of "The Lion Sleeps Tonight" became not just a No. 1 song, but a classic -- one of the most covered and most successful pop songs ever recorded. Sadly, a sequence of business arrangements that made millions of dollars for a handful of prominent U.S. music publishers yielded just a \$1,000 personal check from folksinger Pete Seeger to Solomon Linda, a South African performer who composed the

UGLY CHRISTMAS SWEATERS



It's that time of year again, when we don our Christmas sweaters in the midst of holiday festivities. December 20 is officially National Ugly Christmas Sweater Day, the perfect time to dig out those unfashionable garments and celebrate!

- Christmas sweaters haven't always been the tacky, goofy garments we associate with ugly sweaters of today, adorned with pom-poms, lights, bells, reindeer, and even hanging ornaments. In the 1950s, they were pullovers produced with the name "Jingle Bell Sweaters," and often featuring traditional Nordic and Fair Isle designs, cable-knit, snowflakes, and angels. There were patterns for crafters to create their own hand-knit woolens. Crooner Andy Williams sported a Christmas sweater on his variety show as he sang carols to his audience.
- During the 1960s and 1970s, bold psychedelic designs took over, with sunglass-wearing Santas, and brilliant dazzling colors. In the big-hair days of the '80s, glitter, sequins, pom-poms, and disco themes prevailed. The sweaters' status was boosted by the 1989 film "National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation," which featured Chevy Chase wearing a festive eyesore. Ugly Christmas sweaters were a regular fixture at office parties.
- The 1990s brought a downslide in the popularity of ugly sweaters, something that only grandmas wore, and they disappeared from the fashion world. But in 2001, the movie "Bridget Jones' Diary" brought about a revival of the sweater when actor Colin Firth in the role of Mr. Darcy wears a hideous Christmas sweater featuring a giant red-nosed reindeer. Bridget herself was horrified, but the sweater launched the ugly ones back into vogue.
- In 2002, a Canadian retirement home employee noticed residents wearing Christmas sweaters during the holidays, and as he was complimenting them on their apparel, he was really thinking of tracking down vintage sweaters and inviting friends to join in the fun. That year, Chris Boyd and his friend Justin Birch hosted the first known ugly Christmas sweater party, urging others to attend "the most cheesy, most feel-good party imaginable," wearing the ugliest sweater they could find. That initial gathering of 30 guests grew in four years to a size that required renting a venue at the local university, and by the fifth year grew to the venue of a massive Vancouver ballroom with 1,200 people in attendance. Boyd and Birch even published a book on the subject, "Ugly Christmas Sweater Party Book: The Definitive Guide to Getting Your Ugly On."
- Even the top fashion giants have gotten into the act, pairing cashmere with beading and gaudy designs. The shelves of high-end stores like Nordstrom fill their



shelves with designer alpine sweaters from Dolce and Gabanna, Ralph Lauren, and Stella McCartney.

- Every year since 2009, talk show host Jimmy Fallon has held the "12 Days of Christmas Sweaters" giveaway, with an audience member selected at random to receive an ingenious creation of his program's costume department over the span of 12 nights. The imaginative garments have included such features as an iPad centerpiece highlighting a roaring fireplace video, and a giant snow globe that actually blew fake snow.
- Social media has boosted the appeal of ugly sweaters as users post their ugliest sweaters on Instagram, Facebook, and Twitter (X). There are ugly sweater 5K runs, bar crawls, parties, and contests. A winning sweater might include LED lights, tinsel, hanging ornaments, jewels, 3-D elements, pom-poms, or a sweater with a 1950s vintage design.



SPORTS STORIES FIGURE SKATING




Strap on your skates and follow along as Tidbits presents these facts on the sport of figure skating.

- Skates were first used in the Scandinavian countries centuries ago as a means of transportation, with skaters strapping the leg bones of large animals to their feet. The bones were sharpened and shaped so that people could glide across ice, cutting the time required to travel around a body of water. Metal skates were introduced during the 13th century.
- In the 18th and 19th centuries, skating evolved into a sport, with competitors required to trace elaborate geometric patterns and designs, or "figures," on the ice. Circles, loops, and figure eights were carved with the blades' edges, leading to the name figure skating. These exercises became known as "compulsory figures" in competitions. The sport progressed into jumps, spins, and choreography, and in the early 1990s, the compulsories were removed from competitions.
- During the mid-1800s, American ballet dancer and figure skater Jackson Haines blended the artistry of dance with the athleticism of skating, capturing the first U.S. National Figure Skating Championship title. Haines is considered the father of modern figure skating.
- · Beginning in 1880, skaters invented several complicated jumps which were subsequently named after them. Norwegian skater Axel Paulsen devised the sport's oldest and most difficult jump, one with a forward takeoff, requiring the skater to land backward on the outside edge of the skate, appropriately named the Axel.
- In 1909, Swedish skater Ulrich Salchow invented a jump in which the skater takes off from the back inside edge of one foot and lands on the back outside edge of the opposite foot. The Lutz, invented in 1913 by Alois Lutz of Austria, is a jump with the entrance from the skate's back outside edge and a landing on the back outside edge of the opposite foot. It's considered figure skating's second-most difficult jump.
- There are three spin positions in figure skating the upright spin, the sit spin (invented by Jackson Haines), and the camel spin. All can be either forward or backward. A flying spin combines a jump and a spin. The speed at which figure skaters spin is mind-boggling. They can reach six revolutions per second, which is more than 300 per minute! The record for the fastest spin was set in 2015 by a Polish-Canadian skater, Olivia Oliver, who achieved 342 revolutions per minute.
- Figure skating competitions were initially just for men. It wasn't until 1902 at the World Championships that fe-


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

male British skater Madge Syers joined the competition, nabbing second place behind Ulrich Salchow. Although the formal Winter Olympic Games as we know them started in 1924 in Chamonix, France, Olympic Games were held in London in 1908, with figure skating featured for the first time. Oddly enough, the competition was held during the summer games inside an ice rink.

- That area where skaters sit and wait for their marks from the judges has an official term - the "kiss and cry area." It can be the place for either celebrating success or lamenting over a poor performance.
- You might have noticed that skaters avoid fringe and feathers on their costumes. Any type of wardrobe malfunction, including glitter floating to the ice's surface, a broken strap, or loss of a feather or any trim results in a

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

Baby New Year




Baby New Year can grow up fast! The baby pictured here is already shaving. Well, it's probably not supposed to be Baby New Year, but being surrounded by a calendar, it's an easy association to make. This baby was the mascot for Gillette's safety razors, perhaps suggesting that they were both safe enough and easy enough for a baby to use, with the promise of baby-smooth skin, too.

Inventor King C. Gillette was not the first to create a safety razor, but he came up with the disposable blade, and his company popularized them in the early 1900s. Note that the calendar is for 1909 -- a bit outdated for today's use, but very appealing to a collector of antique advertising. It sold for \$295 at Morford's Antique Advertising Auctions.

Oh, and it's not just a calendar; it's a pocket mirror, too. They were a popular form of advertising in the early 20th century. These mirrors, like the Gillette one here, often had celluloid backs printed with the company's name, logo or slogan. But despite the product it advertises, a mirror like this one, at 2 1/2 inches in diameter, probably wouldn't be the best for shaving.


