



HEADMASTER'S COMMENT

Our society has changed; it continues to change; society will always change. The turbulence we are experiencing can be viewed with anxiety or as a life force representing opportunity. I am inclined towards the opportunity viewpoint, particularly as far as education and Bryanston High are concerned.

The path of transition from privilege to equity for all South Africans has allowed a movement away from prescription and division towards of decision and association. freedom Educationally this represents a valuable opportunity to adjust to a new social order and a technological age. It should not be forgotten that ninety-eight percent of our community voted in favour of opening the school to all races under Model B in 1991. A similar majority accepted Model C in 1992, not for the exclusionist motive of some communities who discredited the system, but with the desire for greater flexibility of community choice and the improvement. maintenance. if not standards. I suggest that the community has reason to be proud of it active response to change and of the enhancement of the quality of relevant education our pupils experience.

Today Bryanston High has a deserved status as a centre of educational excellence. The pupils acquire knowledge and interact within a multi-cultural ethos based on merit not tokenism. 939 individuals, representative of the rainbow nation within the Bryanston community, attend school every day. They avail themselves of the superb facilities and additional staff to excel academically and extra-murally as the pages of this magazine proclaim so clearly. The school has a vibrancy and enthusiasm that draws applications from far afield. There is a strength of purpose and a willingness to accept challenges within the pupils and staff that has a durability to confront change. The Parents have a long tradition of support for the school and a conviction about the paramount importance of education. The elements which brought Bryanston through 27 years are in place to



greet the future calmly and purposefully. The school will remain a centre of excellence within the context of education in South Africa. This is my conviction and my commitment.



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ENGLISH OLYMPIAD

Staff responsible: Mrs M. Schumann and Mrs H. Middleton Forty pupils from Standard Eight to Standard Ten wrote the three hour open book exam on 7 March 1995.

This year the candidates were presented with a formidable task in dealing with a topic as broad and as controversial as "Propaganda".

While the two books by George Orwell: "Animal Farm" and "1984" could be used as base texts, the candidates were expected to investigate all forms and uses of propaganda ranging from political cartoons, political speeches and party manifestos to their commercial counterparts in advertising. The recent political and economic changes in South Africa, the 1994 elections and subsequent government re-organisation provided pertinent topics for discussions.

The candidates were introduced to Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs and the Value System Taxonomy devised by Dr Clare Grave in order to understand certain aspects of the human psyche and the different ways that people may be manipulated. This information was then related to the methods employed by the propagandists in the two World Wars, especially that of Dr The tutorials culminated in a visit to the Johannesburg War Memorial Museum where the candidates attended a slide show and talk based on the topic "Propaganda".

The candidates' hard work served them well as twenty four pupils achieved Merit passes and twelve pupils achieved Honours rating. Two pupils received Highest Honours: Cindy Ives was placed in the top 100 candidates and Louise Nicholson achieved sixteenth position which earned her a prize from the organisers and recognition at Bryanston High School when she was awarded a white blazer.

He did exceptionally well to be invited to take part in the final round of 100 participants. Unfortunately, final results were not yet available at the time of writing this article. Because of the type of challenge inherent in such a competition, all pupils are to be commended for entering.

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
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CHEERLEADERS

There can be no stars without dedicated supporters, so it is always gratifying to see our pupils united and motivated by their enthusiastic peers.



We nevertheless managed to hold a few functions this year from March 1994 to June 1995 and handed over R 40 000 to various charities at the end of that time.

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



Later in the year we won the Inter-House Badminton and were placed third in the Inter-House Athletics.







CRICKET TOUR TO MARGATE



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
MIDMAR MILE



Formula Vees celebrate their 30th year of competition in 1995. The Formula was started by Ferry Porsche in 1965 in Germany, with the cars competing with power from VW Beetle engines. The modern cars have evolved greatly and now boast twin carburettors, a racing cam shaft and a lightweight aluminium and fibreglass chassis, powered by a 1300cc VW Golf engine, producing speeds of up to 220-230km/h. This is the largest formula of single-seater cars in the country, with fields of up to 40 cars per race event. It is used by young drivers as a stepping stone to higher Formulas such as Formula GTI and the European Formula 3.


We have just completed a chocolate raffle and we hope to give the proceeds to Bertrams and other charities.





The J.S.E. Game is run by the Johannesburg Stock Exchange in order to provide a simulated environment, wherein the pupils can learn, under a controlled situation, the dynamics of the Stock Exchange. Each team is given R 100 000 to start and is required to make as much money, by trading shares on the Stock Market, over an eight month period.

With the aid of a Beltel line and the Compu-share computer programme, our team members are able to access information daily before it becomes available in the newspapers. As a result of this advantage Bryanton was placed 21st out of a total of 254 schools. This position places us in the top 8% of participating schools in South Africa. Of the initial R 100 000 invested we made R 56 000, or produced an average increase of 56% in the worth of our portfolio - a grand achievement for our enterprising pupils!

I have realised more and more how invaluable this course is and how important its purpose is in making new drivers aware of the necessity to drive with care and consideration and not to treat it as a casual activity requiring little skill, effort or concentration.

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
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
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HEAD BOYS' ADDRESS














ENGLISH CREATIVE WRITING COMPETITION

And being less fussy and not so short-sighted, she kissed the green frog, who was immediately knighted.


In a puff of smoke, to Faye it grew clear, she'd missed out on love for many a year.

The prince and princess In happiness stayed and alas for poor Paye, she remained an old maid.




So much for the times when I used to be in control and had the opportunity to say yes or no or plan things around myself.


These days I'm yet an image in her life, sometimes a bother, other times a best friend but most of the times a bank.
