

Summer Exams Not to be Graded?

Though the headline may seem a little sensationalist yet this story was first covered in the Christmas edition of An Focal. The basic background to this story is that in June 2000 the Governing Body of the University of Limerick agreed to a system of promotion with the staff union, MSF. This made provision that only 20% of promotions to the position of Senior Lecturer would be filled by external applicants.

According to a press release from the academic section AMICUS (formerly MSF) the agreement meant that there would be 52 internal promotions since the June 2000 meeting. Instead of this there have been just five. Clearly unhappy with this, MSF intended taking industrial action at the beginning of the year. However the Labour Relations

Commission intervened and asked Governing authority to make a written proposal by March 7th. The proposal submitted made provision for 10 promotional posts in each of the Academic years 2002 and 2003. In further meetings with the University management it was revealed that there would be four positions advertised externally over the same period of time. This then meant that there would be only 16 internal promotions during these years.

AMICUS claim that accepting this would mean that 47 internal promotional opportunities would be lost (for more details of this see the AMICUS press release on page 6). In the December issue of An Focal Kevin Ryan VPA claimed that some of the positions that AMICUS refer to were allocated previous to

O' Broin Elected President of ULSU

With anticipation high over the outcome of this years' ULSU Alumni elections the prominent Environmental Society member, Éoin O' Broin emerged triumphant last Wednesday in a landslide victory as the next President of the Students Union. His campaign, both flamboyant and confident, scooped a massive 1302 votes out of a total valid poll of just 1807. The turnout for the election, though down on last year, indicated a concentrated interest on the presidential vote with a slight but significant minority choosing to use only one vote, the vote for president, out of a potential four.

The position of Deputy President and Welfare Officer saw a tightly-ran race between Grainne Heffron and Gemma

O2, the mobile phone company, sponsored the night and they were constantly being plugged throughout the night. Vicar St was filled to capacity on the night in question, with representatives from all colleges nominated, namely UCD, TCD, University of Ulster, Ballyfermot College, NUIG, GMIT, UCC NUI Maynooth, and of course UL. The host for the evening was Brendan O'Connor, formerly of Don't Feed The Gondolas and presently writing in the Sunday Independent. Brendan played up to his public role on the night, entertaining the crowd with his wit and smart-ass jokes. There were fourteen judges in total, each having ample experience in media activity. All were well-known and included Colin Murphy of RTE's Blizzard of Odd, Myles Dungan and Rachel English of RTE Radio, Michael Ross, editor of The Sunday Times and Gerry Mc Govern, author and internet consultant.

An Focal was also short-listed for Most Improved Publication or Production. Since Patrick Kennedy undertook the challenge of CCO 2001/2002, there has been a major improvement in the quality of the newspaper and this was recognised by the judges. Despite entries flooding in from just about every college in the country, An Focal was one of four nominees short-listed for this award. UCD's College Tribune and two of the Trinity publications, The University Record and Icarus, were the other nominees. It was an achievement to just be placed in the same category as them. It was an indication of the positive improvements made, and these were all well received by the judging panel.

After last year's dominance by Trinity College, this year it was UCD's turn. Their two publications, University Observer and the College Tribune, were nominated for no less than twenty awards, often in the same category. The two most prestigious awards of the night, Best Newspaper and Best Media College, were both one by UCD. The O2 Award, an award for outstanding achievement in student media, went to Icarus of Trinity College. Ballyfermot College won Best Film Script for their creation, "Billy Baker and the Tooth Fairy" and Cork Campus Radio won Best Radio Production for "Get That Monster Off The Stage". Best Editor went to Daniel Mc Connell and Best News Reporter went to Enda Curran, both from UCD's University Observer.

UCD's Editor of the University newspaper, Daniel McConnell highlighted an impor-

Communication Officer. With a clearance of almost a thousand votes Patrick Buckley will succeed the current CCO Patrick Kennedy in the position and also as editor of An Focal. In a week of unprecedented achievement Buckley also collected a prestigious Oxygen Media Award, at a ceremony in Dublin, for his involvement in the ULSU website.

Poor turnout resulted in a separate referendum vote, cast on the same day as the Alumni elections being disallowed. The referendum proposed that changes to the ULSU constitution should only be made by referendum. However it is necessary for 20% of the student body to vote in a referendum if the result is to be upheld. As there was a turnout of less than 2000 students on this occasion, it therefore rendered the outcome invalid.

tant point when he accepted his award: "Every student newspaper or publication

today is under-funded", he said. Receiving cheers of agreement from those assembled, he proclaimed, "Give us the power, give us the investment. Give us the money now!" Everyone appeared to agree and it was noted by many as one of the most important statements of the night, especially considering representatives of the sponsors were present.

Speaking later both Brendan O'Connor and Colin Murphy paid tribute to UL and the Student's Union for putting in an extra effort this year. Both hoped it would encourage more UL students to get involved in writing for the college newspaper and they are hoping for even better results next year. Brendan also spoke of the importance of UL winning. Being from Cork himself he said "it's great to see someone from outside Dublin getting something".

Considering UL was the only college outside of Dublin to receive an award besides Cork Campus Radio, it was a real achievement for both UL and for the Student's Union to gain recontition in a ceremony shadowed over by Dublin colleges. The future editor of An Focal, Paddy Buckley, confidently spoke of his hopes for next year's ceremony when he proclaimed, "we're going to be even better!"

President Downer congratulated UL sportspeople for their many successes across the board, in hurling, camogie, men and women's soccer. indoor and outdoor athletic champions and also mentioned the success of UL Bohs Rugby, who were promoted to the AIL First Division. He further expressed the hope that the arena would aid these and other sports clubs and persons to excel and succeed.

The Arena cost 28 million Euro in total, with 7.6 million coming from Government grant assistance, philanthropic gifts by donors to the tune of 6.9 million Euro, 4 million Euro from Students of the University and significant commercial fund-

To mark the official opening of the University Arena, the special 4 x 50 metre relay swimming races were held. Irish Olympic swimmer Chantelle Gibney took part in the event and former Olympic swimmer Gary O'Toole was running the show.

An enjoyable day was had by all and even the threat of rain didn't hamper the buoyant mood as all those who had worked so hard in bringing the University Arena to reality got their day in the sun. For those who are more academically or socially minded than sporty its worth checking out the outstanding facilities of the Arena, its numerous classes, extensive gymnasium, 50metre pool, wood sprung floor courts and much, much more. You never know, it could be just the incentive you need!

UL Students Demand Weekend Vote

University of Limerick students appealed to Taoiseach Bertie Ahern for a weekend vote in the forthcoming General Election as he attended the campus for the official opening of the University Arena on the 11th of April.

Students sought assurances from Ahern that another mid-week vote would be avoided so that thousands of students across the country would be able to travel home and vote. "I think we should choose a day when everybody can vote," said Ahern.

When asked by Bernadette Sexton, one of the protest organisers what exactly he planned to do, Ahern said he was still looking into the issue. He did, however, state that Sundays were out due to possible protests by religious groups and Saturdays wouldn't work for those in the cities. He said he is now strongly considering a Friday.

Students held up banners reading slogans such as, 'no voice, no choice,' and, 'peace prosperity, hypocrisy'. Some went so far as to tape their mouths in protest at their frustration over the inability to express their opinions at the ballot box due to timing of elections and referenda. President of the University, Roger Downer supported the students in their appeal for weekend voting, and thought they came across very well. "I don't think anyone can object if you make a point in a dignified manner and withdraw," said Downer.

Author Frank Mc Court, who attended the opening,

said of the protest, "there's a time for the University and a time for politics,". He did, however agree with the point students were trying to highlight and said, "I think they should make it as easy as possible for everybody to vote."

Bishop Michael Mayes agreed that the general election should be held on a weekend. "A lot of countries have voting on Sundays. This is a good idea as it enables people to go home and vote." The Bishop had no personal objection to an election being held on a Sunday.

The protest was organized by The Irish Peace Society, Members of Young Fine Gael and Labour Youth with over a hundred students attended.

Third Year, David Garrahy explained, "we're not being facilitated to make our point in the ballot box so we have to do it this way." Another concerned student, Cal Barrett explained, "we're protesting because it's not right that 40 to 50 thousand students didn't get a chance to vote in the abortion referendum and we're facing into a general election that may be a weekday again."

Guard, Mic Kilroy said that he had had no problems with the protestors and found them very co-operative.

> "They had a point to make and they made it and that's all," said Kilroy.

> One of the organisers, Elaine Byrne was pleased with how the protest had gone although she said, "Friday is still a weekday, its not good enough." Eoin O' Broin said he was pleased that; "students were taking action on student issues and thanked those that supported the appeal."

> The protest, however failed to get nationwide publicity and one of Ahern's aides asked RTE not to get footage of the protest. The nation

al newspapers also declined to pick up the story. Inside the pressroom, Ahern seemed ambiguous on the issue of a Friday vote when he said most students probably wouldn't turn up on a Friday anyway. Katherine Harford, a member of UL's Labour Youth was sceptical at the reality of a Friday vote, saying,

"Ahern gives people answers they want to hear. He'll go back behind closed doors and nothing will come of it, because it's not in Fianna Fail's interests to give students a franchise, as there would be a totally different outcome."

Those protesting clearly expressed their desire to vote and some were visibly annoyed. "I think it's a disgrace that Bertie Ahern is coming here to a student campus, yet the government of the day continues to disregard through their most basic right and that is voting," said Harford. These strong feelings follow on from the 5,000 student postcards from Trinity College and DCU that were put through the letterbox of Government Buildings in the past two weeks calling on Ahern to hold an election on a weekend.

Student demonstrations against a midweek general election and letters to the government appealing for a weekend vote seem to contradict the recently published National Youth Council poll which showed only 50 percent of Irish 19-24 year olds intend to vote in the next election. With the level of student interest at present the statistics for actual student voting should be far higher. That is, if the students are able to get to the polls.



Provisional Exam Timetables.

Exam time is coming up and the pressure is mounting. Well to let you know if you don't already, the provisional timetable is up. You can check it out on the notice boards to the left of the service desk in the Student Services area or on the web at http://sras.ul.ie

Make sure that none of your exams are clashing. Go to your Class Rep if you have a problem with the times and he or she will see what can be done. Be aware though that you are only entitled to get the times changed if you have three on the same day.

Any other change is an accomidation. Student Services will do what they can to give you the best possible solution to a situation but there are many factors involved in the scheduling process so be patient. If you have issues raise them now because it may be too late after.

Studying

Many students do well cramming in the final few days prior to the actual exams, I've done it myself once or twice, however, there is a better way. Systematic study will nearly always beat it. Plan your study. Work to a programme. Allow time for rest, breaks and a bit of non-related actavity. Go for a walk, kick a ball or go for a swim. Do something which will stimulate the body, it will make study that bit easier. Get some fresh air and a bit of sun; if there is any about, normally around exam time there is loads of it. Remember, if you get down to it now it willsave panic later.

Weekend voting not impossible!

Dear Editor,

As one of the organisers of the 'Umbrella Group against Weekday Voting' I would like to thank the Peace Society, Young Fine Gael, Labour Youth, the members of the Environmental Society and the many UL students who swelled the ranks of the protesters to over 200 on Thursday Week 9 when the Taoiseach opened the University of Limerick Arena complex.

The protest was successful in that it peacefully and respectfully got across the point that students will no longer accept the blatant efforts by the current government to deliberately exclude young people from the democratic process by favoring weekday voting. In the last five years, there have been six By-Elections, two Referendums, Local and European Elections. On only one occasion was the opportunity to vote given on a weekend. (Tipperary South By-Election 2001) This has left thousands upon thousands of students disenfranchised, as it is impractical for students to return home to vote.

Many of the protesters wore black masking tape over their mouths to symbolize that we have no voice if voting takes place on a weekday. Placards were held high while swaying to the jazz music stating 'Bertie Mugabe' 'No Voice No Choice' 'Weekend Voting Now' and my favorite, 'Peace, Prosperity, Hypocrisy.' A thousand leaflets were disturbed to the crowd asking the Taoiseach to make an immediate commitment to weekend voting and if not why not?

In answering this question to the protesters, the Taoiseach stated that Saturdays were inappropriate because of concerns by the business community and Sundays were unsuitable because of religious sensitivities. He said that Friday was a possible alternative. Although some of the protesters felt that Friday was better than nothing, others felt that this is not good enough. Unless the government has introduced legislation in recent days to enshrine a three-day weekend, Friday is still a weekday no matter how the Taoiseach looks at it. Friday is unacceptable to many students living away from home unless polling stations remain open for longer periods to allow students to return home.

A report issued last week by the National Youth Council of Ireland, referred to 100,000 young people between 18-25 who have declared that they will not be voting. The reasons stated were due to a number of factors, chiefly inaccessibility to polling stations and inappropriate voting arrangements. In the Week 6 edition of An Focal, Michael Noonan, Leader of Fine Gael, wrote a letter to the editor stating his views on weekend voting. Why can't the other political parties do the same? What is the Taoiseach afraid of?

AMICUS (MSF), Academic Section, University of Limerick

Statement re: University's breaches of Academic Promotion policy

-On June 27th, 2000, following lengthy negotiations between the University and MSF (now AMICUS), the Governing Authority approved the document Policy and Procedures for the Promotion of Faculty, thus concluding a process of seeking an internal promotion mechanism, which had begun some six years previously.

-The Agreement states that No fewer than 80% of posts at Senior Lecturer level will be retained for the internal promotion mechanism.

-The University now admits that, since the start of the Agreement, there have been five internal promotions to senior lecturer and 13 externally advertised senior lectureships. In order to comply with the Agreement, there should have been 52 internal promotions, and not just five.

-It is clear that the management had been acting in a manner contrary to the intention of the Governing Authority and the Governing Authority instructed the management to negotiate with MSF on resolving the dispute. The management and MSF met but there was no proposal from the management side for any redress.

-The issue was finally referred to a conciliation meeting of the Labour Relations Commission in February. The LRC asked the management to send AMICUS a written proposal by March 7th. The offer was for 10 promotional posts in each year 2002 and 2003.

-Following a further meeting with senior management in early April a second letter was sent stating that there will be "in the region of four positions" externally advertised in 2002 and 2003. The bare minimum of internal promotions over the two-year period per the Agreement should then be 16, in order to be in compliance with the Agreement (and not allowing for any redress for what happened the previous two

years)

-Using the figures provided by the University, 47 internal promotional opportunities have been lost (because of the 52 minus 5 that have been lost by the breach of the policy in its first 18 months). The actual substance of the offer, to redress this loss, is a mere 4 additional promotional posts, above and beyond what is required by the policy in any event, i.e. two each year for the next two years.

-Given the obvious breach of the Agreement and the failure to offer meaningful redress for the loss of promotional opportunities suffered by many faculty members, it is not surprising that the University's proposal was rejected in a ballot held last Wednesday by 85%.

- An AMICUS UL Branch EGM was held today, following on the rejection of the proposal. In accordance with the decision of the Branch EGM of last December, the Branch Executive has now mandated the Academic Section to ballot its members on industrial action. There will be thus a secret ballot held next week on the motion:

"The Academic Section members will withhold the grades for assessment for all modules for Semester 2, AY2001/2002 until the issue of the breaches of the promotion policy is resolved to the satisfaction of the membership."

-The Academic Section is acutely aware that if the motion is carried it could be very disruptive to individual students. We have not taken this decision to ballot lightly and regret having to take this course of action but, under the circumstances, we are left with no other choice.

The Academic section claim that they are aware of the disruption that this will cause to the lives of most students, but feel that they are left with no other choice than to take this course of action.

The implications for the students of UL are many. Those graduating in September will be first to suffer as they will have to put applications for jobs and further

courses of study on hold until they are sure of their qualifying grades, not to mention the uncertainty as to when the conferring ceremonies will actually be held. Anyone travelling to abroad with a possible repeat looming over them will also be unsure of what Autumn holds for them if they are waiting to see if their Summer grades bring them up to a 2.0 QCA.

For updates as to the result of this ballot keep an eye on the notice boards around the University and you the Inbox of your student e-mail account. ULSU will be keeping you informed of what the outcome is and may also be hold an Emergency General Meeting in Week 12 that it will be in the interests of all to attend.



STUDENTS DAY IN LIBRARY "COMPLETE **WASTE OF TIME" ***

Third year student Fionnuala Sweeney got hardly any work done on Friday despite spending almost 8 hours in the library, informants close to the Engineering student told 'An Focal'. South America during Co-op which appealed to many students of Spanish who have the opportunity to go an alternative route for Co-op.



Perpetual World Peace by Raymond McInerney

It's a concept that seems born in fable, not in fact, an idea conjured in fantasy, not formulated in reality, a plan more mystical than rational, more curious than conceivable. What is it? 


You too could be lucky enough to find your dream job and end up on the picket line!

REVENGE SWEET REVENGE! The Count of Monte Cristo

The Count of Monte Cristo is a modern adaptation of Alexandre Dumas' classic tale of betrayal, lost love and yup, you may have guessed from the byline revenge thrown in to lighten the mood.

This offering stars as its two principles Guy Pearce, last seen, by me anyway in the brilliant Mementos and Jim Caviezel, star of the Jennifer Lopez vehicle Angel Eyes who also put in a stunning performance in the Thin Red The film opens with Edmund Dantes and Fernand Mondego (Caviezel and Pearce) swashing their buckles while on Elba, in the company of Napoleon and the action never stops from there. Mondego, a languid, lazy layabout second son of a prominent noble man is painfully jealous of Dantes, the innocent, gullible peasants son. Mondego's words at the beginning of the film "it wont always be like this" do not bode well for our two dashing young swashbucklers. And then ah yes, we learn the real reason for Mondegos jeal-

ousy, the girl, Dantes' girl, its always something isn't it???

So yes as you may have guessed Dantes and Mercedes get married while Mondego becomes bitter and cynical, and writes a best selling book about his experiences. Actually no I lie, that's not what happens at all, the first chance Mondego gets he betrays his very bestest friend who spends the

next nine years of his life in a dark, dank jail on an island with a cruel sadistic jailer. However, to make things better he meets a priest (played by Richard Harris) who teaches him how to read,



write and think philosophically about his life I guess they didn't have satellite tv in those days!! So anyway to make a long story short Dantes escapes and having found loads and loadsa money on a deserted island proceeds to wreak revenge on those who have done him wrong, awwww shucks isn't he sweet.

The films style is rather reminiscent of an old Errol

Flynn spectacular, albeit with much less tights and more special effects. The director Kevin Reynolds, finally making a film without Kevin Costner (a cause for joy all by its ownyo) is eager

to make up for previous disasters and it shows in his efforts to make the film black and white with no shades of grey. This is quite obvious in his differentiation between Mondego and Dantes in the latter part of the film, Dantes having spent 9 years in the Chateau d'If prison in the dark, on one meal a day comes out looking remarkably well fed and tanned while Mondego having spent the time living in the lap of luxury in gay Pareee is a mess of broken veins, grey hair and absolutely awful oral hygiene. There are also a number of cross overs from Reynolds previous adaptation of a Dumas novel the Man in the Iron Mask, namely Dantes mode of escape from prison, and his casting of Michael Wincott (previ-

ously the baddie muskateer) as the cruel and sadistic and sarcastic prison warden.

However the film, whatever its faults is an enjoyable 2 hours and 11 minutes, especially with the twist in the end, and Dantes' entrance as the Count of Monte Cristo, which is almost worth the entry fee to see just by itself.

Bend it like Beckham C'MON REF, OFFSIDE!

Following in the tradition of East is East comes a film about an Asian family in England, but one with a difference. This time it's about a girl, Jess (Parminder Nagra) who can in the immortal words of the films title, Bend it Like Beckham. However, that's no good to her if she cant make chapattis, as far as her family is


concerned. This all changes however when Jess meets Jules (Keira Knightley, previously in The Hole), an English girl who plays for a womens side the Harriers. However Nagra and Knightley are actually quite convincing in their roles and manage to bring the right measure of emotion and comedy to their characters. Juliet Stevenson

(Jules' mother) provides some of the film's best laughs. The film also features guest performances by Alan Hansen, John Barnes and Gary Lineker, Shaznay Lewis also puts in an appearance as the captain of the team and Posh and Becks even do a token "look at us being followed by photographers and screaming fans" turn

fessionally. While maybe not living up to other British comedies namely East is East and Bridget Jones Diary the film still manages to sprinkle some good one-liners along the way, unintentional as some of them may be and it is a credit to the director Gurinder Chadhas talent that she manages to make two subjects with no apparent similarities soccer and the life of Indian families living in England and intertwine them in an enjoyable manner.


Music from the Motion Picture

We can't go wrong with the likes of New Order, Happy Mondays, Joy Division, The Clash, Buzzcocks. So it makes for one of the most superb soundtracks I've heard in a long time.

For those of you who were mere babes in the time of the unforgettable 70s/80s genre, this is an excellent introduction to some of the genius of that time. To be honest where else can the likes of scoundrel Shaun Ryder get such exposure? Happy Mondays feature three times including the kicking title track. Joy Division grace us with four tracks, including "Transmission," "Atmosphere" and "She's Lost Control." New Order offer their new single "Here To Stay," along with the interesting collaboration with Moby on "New Dawn Fades" and two other fantastic tunes "Blue Monday" and the legendary "Temptation," the latter being a great personal memory of great times. Featured previously on the Trainspotting Soundtrack, it's an excellent addition to an already excellent collection.

The eighteen-track store of musical history undoubted-

Its enormous intensity lends itself to the overall quality of the album and is the best option with which to end. Wednesday the 17th of April saw the University Concert Hall host the National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland conducted by the illustrious Russian conductor Alexander Anissimov as part of their Spring programme. The programme consisted of Tchaikovsky's

Francesca Rimini; Bruch's Violin Concerto No. 1; and Shostakovich's Symphony No 5 in D minor, Op 47. The symphonic poem Francesca da Rimini immortalised Dante's Divine Comedy tells the story of the 13th century

Italian beauty married to the hunchbacked lord of Rimini, Gianciotto while in love with his handsome brother Paolo. On discovering the infidelity Gianciotto had them both murdered. Throughout the piece Anissimov's vivacious command of the orchestra was instantaneously perceptible. The orchestral resonance was enthused by the exceptional persona of their instructor. The orchestra appeared to detonate with vitality under his command. Anissimov brought lucidity and uniformity to the work leading the instrumentalists through inspiration.

The French Soloist Olivier Charlier performed Bruch's Violin Concerto No 1. His elucidation was so naturally paced and so unambiguous in its animated intentions that it incorporated in enthusiastic fashion the persistent patina and

> exciting commitment of the orchestra. The final performance of the evening was of Shostakovich's Symphony No 5 in D minor, which once again demonstrated the amazing talent of the conductor in inspiring his orchestra to travel to profound depths, exhibiting abundant warmth and elegance. evening confirmed

the talent that our National Symphony Orchestra possesses. Unfortunately however, the Orchestra will not be returning to Limerick until August for the highly anticipated Wagner Ring. In the meantime for those connoisseurs of Ballet, the Tchaikovsky full-length classic Sleeping Beauty will be presented by Ballet Ireland on Tuesday April 23rd.


The Lodge re-opens as Residents Objections are Withdrawn

Chief among the recent activities have been the trip to the annual European Universities Debating Championship held this year in Haifa, Israel in March 21-27, where UL Deb U did very well indeed. Having successfully lied to their parents that Israel was completely safe, that all those stories of suicide bombings were totally blown out of proportion (?) and that they'd be far away from any trouble spots, two teams (Tadgh O'Shea and Julian Moore, Gavin Ward and Eoin O'Culain) set off for Israel, first to Gatwick, then on to the middle East.

Having successfully gotten through customs in Tel Aviv airport after a barrage of questions, we then got a taxi up to our hotel in Haifa. Having had quite enough of the naff seventies décor inside, we went out to seek out a nearby pub, and found one, conveniently situated across the road. We then found out another thing, Israelis don't drink, for as we huddled in the corner quietly imbibing away, every time we walk to the toilet you would be lucky to see a solitary bottle of lager among a table of twelve people. The following day was much better as all the other debaters began to arrive along with the organisers. We had a look around Haifa, a very picturesque, mountainous city on the North West coast of Israel.

Having spent just five days there however, you realise how paranoid about security this country is.

Given the suicide bombings and terrorists attacks it has endured in recent months, armed security guards stand at nearly every door of every mall, shop, government building and university, customarily searching all your bags and checking you with metal detector devices. Quite a culture shock indeed and you only hope it ends soon.

Yet even with all this, you wouldn't have known that there was

(what now looks like) a war going on. In spite all of this, the organisers treated us with great hospitality and warmth, and put on an exhaustively well-organised tournament. We had to rise at 7am each morning, which was torture, but the Israelis made clear that no time would, or could be wasted. We had to debate in six different rounds with different motions. They ranged from equal rights for women in the military to banning bloodsports to whether liver transplants should go to alcoholics, luckily for us, the topic of the Middle east was studiously avoided. Some of the interpretations of different motions proved hilarious, like the Turkish team who insisted that women 'can't fly fighter plane' because the G-forces would cause them to orgasm in mid-flight (!?) or the Yugoslavian team who decided to define Cloning Britney Spears as, "that this House would give tax free status to teen-magazines, like Sugar, Mizz and J-17." I'll let you think about that for yourselves...

In the end, both teams did brilliantly, with Julian Moore and Tadgh O'Shea reaching the Semi-finals, and Gavin Ward and Eoin O'Culain reaching the Quarter-Finals. friendly and enthusiastic about showing us around there if we ever came back. All in all, it was a great tournament, great weather, a very interesting country and an excellent experience. In other news, at the end of March, four First-Years, Eoin Gubbins, Shane Moloney, Donal McCarthy and Martin O'Brien watched over by Grace Lord went to the Engineering College of Paris for a week to give debating tutorials to debaters there, to give them coaching and advice in British style debating. It was a great experience, taking part in mock debates with the Parisian students there, and no doubt seeing all the sights of Paris along the way. They must have done a good job as the university now intends to send many more teams to our intervarsity next year.

Also worth mentioning is Paddy Buckley's and Eamonn O'Flynn's success in reaching the final of the NUIG Lit. & Deb. Intervarsity final. Three teams in all from UL took part in this IV at the end of March, with all doing very well, maintaining the high standard of debating for which UL Deb U is known.

Limerick City triumphant in the League Cup

In an era where the bigger clubs are getting richer, while many smaller, less fashionable clubs are desperately struggling to survive, one can take great heart from Limerick City's recent triumph over Derry City in the League Cup Final.

Despite finishing bottom of the pile in the First Division, Noel O'Connor's side have managed to defy all the odds, defeating no less than four premiership teams on route to winning the competition. Two narrow away wins against Galway Utd and Cork City respectively saw Limerick face Shamrock Rovers in the semi-final. On a miserable February afternoon, Limerick gave a performance that would be permanently etched on the minds of the large faithful at Jackman Park. Taking the game to the hoops from the start, Limerick deservedly took the honours with a beautifully struck volley from Brian Donnellan on 75 minutes, and it could have been more, with Shane O'Donoghue and Brendan Hughes coming agonisingly close to increasing the lead towards the end.

Saturday, 6th April saw the first leg of the final against

Derry City. On a scorching day, a huge crowd (that included a small but colourful group of Derry supporters) converged on the sun-baked Jackman Park in the hope that the fairytale would continue. Derry threatened to put a spanner in the works when, against the run of play, Kevin Deery struck first blood after 41 minutes. Any fears that Limerick would capitulate were turned on their head when Ciaran Foley lofted the ball over Derry keeper, Russell Payne just before half time to level the match. Unfortunately, Foley had to be taken off immediately after concussing himself in the challenge with Payne.

The second half was as spirited and keenly contested as the first, yet approaching the end, there was a distinct feeling that the game was going to finish level, with neither side prepared to take big risks. That was until Limerick were awarded a penalty in the 84th minute, coolly slotted home by John Whyte, sending the crowd into delirious celebrations. Derry exploded into action, launching an all-out assault on the Limerick goal in the last five minutes, only to find Owen Poill, Pat Purcell and UL student Conor Molan equal to the task of defending these vigorous attacks. When the final whis-

tle blew, the home crowd let free their emotions after years of disappointment.

The following Thursday, Noel O'Connor and his charges made the long trip North, followed by a small group of dedicated supporters, while the rest of us into Live 95FM (albeit with a few technical hitches throughout the match!). Limerick gave a pure blood and guts performance that saw them weather incessant Derry pressure throughout the 120 minutes of football played. Jimmy Fyffe in goals was the hero for the blues, constantly thwarting the Derry forwards, until finally being beaten by a Liam Coyle penalty, controversially awarded in the 71st minute. After some confusion, the tie was declared level at 2-2 aggregate, and the game went into extra time. Fyffe would again come to the rescue, making a stunning save from Jamie Hughes. The penalty shoot out that ensued would set in stone Fyffe's legendary status on Shannonside. Two inspirational saves helped Limerick to a 3-2 win, followed by chaotic celebrations as captain Brendan Hughes lifted the cup.

A victory for Limerick, a victory for football, and a victory for the enduring magic of the cup.

The Mountain

The 2003 expedition is to Mt. AconcaguA, in Argentina, South America. It is the highest mountain in the world, outside of the Himalayas, standing at a colossal height of 6962m. At these altitudes climbers find the simplest of tasks physically debilitating. A tremendous amount of training and

preparation has to be undertaken to ensure personal safety, while climbing at these extreme altitudes. The team is planning to ascend the "Polish Glacier"; a more technical and physically demanding route than the "Normal" route.

The Team & Equipment

To meet these demanding conditions the twelve-team members have already begun training. The team is made up of members of the UNIVERSITY of LIMERICK Outdoor Pursuits Club. The rigours of this expedition will require specialist high altitude equipment, such as storm tents, kerosene cookers and down filled clothing. The cost of this expedition equipment alone will be €10,000. All training, which consists of a season in the Alps and several mountain skills courses, and personal climbing equipment has to be self funded by the individual team members.



The total cost of this expedition is €40,000, while this is an appreciable amount of money, we feel it is a worthwhile investment in the future of Irish mountaineering. This is the first time that any Irish college club has undertaken such a venture.



The Future

It is now planned to organise such an expedition within the UNIVERSITY of LIMERICK Pursuits Club every two years. This will be made possible by the experience and equipment gained for the club, from the Mt. AconcaguA 2003 expedition.






