

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Reflecting on the year-to-date for Shadow Lake, Silver Lake, and the Gull River system, the diversity of waterfront is recognized to provide distinct beauty and experiences. This year has been a reminder that the natural beauty that we enjoy is unforgiving and challenging; emergency preparedness is an important element in our environment. Winter 2025 produced an awe-inspiring amount of snowfall. The January accumulated snowfall was over 110 cm, which is three times typical. Historical weather records collected in various weather stations that were operational in the area between 1950 and 1980 identify between 40 and 80 cm per month, a station in Gooderham reported 100 cm of snowfall in January 1960. More snowstorms came in February and weeks of cloud cover preserved the snowpack. Many used snow rakes to remove rooftop snow. We were fortunate that the accumulated snow gently melted away without being drenched by an abnormal winter rain event. The good fortune ended in the once in a generation ice storm event that started on March 28 and continued through the weekend. Trees and tree limbs broke under the weight of the ice coating. Blocked roads and power outages took days and weeks to resolve. Presently, our roads remain lined with fallen tree branches and storm related brush piles awaiting City of Kawartha Lakes removal services. The spring freshet brought high water levels, an unwelcome additional test of resilience. The shoreline may have changed somewhat with downed trees and branches. This year has already created several challenges with neighbours helping each other and with our community working together to support recovery.

As we emerge from Spring, our thoughts turn to summer recreation activities, family and community events, and hosting friends. Our community-based organization's original mandate was marking hazards in the Shadow Lakes waterways. Our lake markers have been installed in the week before Victoria Day. We also have a valuable relationship with the Parks Canada to advocate for water level control.

Shadow Lakes Association has advocated for our membership with Kawartha Conservation, and the City of Kawartha Lakes. As a member of FOCA, our advocacy is extended with that of other associations on topics like Capital Gains Tax policy. FOCA also provides seminars on topics of relevance to our membership, like succession planning. All SLA members have access to FOCA materials via website.

This year's Annual General Meeting will be held Saturday, July 5 9:00 AM at Ward's Park. Please see articles within this newsletter for additional details.

The Summit Wellness Centre in Coboconk project broke ground in July 2023. The Shadow Lakes Association has been a supporter of this endeavour to provide health services within our area. Jennifer Wilson, Operations Director or the Wellness Centre. provides an update in this newsletter.

Your volunteer Directors, Road Monitors, and many others continue to be dedicated to the goals of our non-profit organization. Our aim is to protect and preserve our land, lakes, and rivers for the experience of future generations. Our members have a common interest in land, waterfront, and lake activities in the Gull River, Shadow Lake, and Silver Lake system. We advocate for our members and foster community through events. We are grateful for the contributions of our volunteers. We also depend on the annual dues of our paying membership. Our volunteers work diligently to deliver value for members and we ask that you support the organization with your \$30 annual dues payment. 

It shows red and green navigation markers, yellow hazard buoys, points of interest, and caution zones.



It has been operational since the association's founding and is its largest annual expense, provided gratuitously without any warranty or representation as to the accuracy of marker location, completeness of marker coverage, or suitability of channel depth.

All missing or shifted markers should be reported as soon as possible. Email our Marker Maintenance Team directly, please include the coordinates of the missing/shifted market. Alternatively you can provide the what3words location using the what3words app.

BOATER'S Respectful boating guidelines from Safe Quiet Lakes


- 1. I will never operate my boat beyond the level of my skills.
- I will be aware of and obey all laws and regulations governing operation of my boat.
- I will operate my boat with caution and courtesy to others at all times.
- I will minimize my wake impact on shorelines, docks, structures and people.
- I will always steer well dear of other boats, swimmers and wildlife.
- I will set a speed and heading that is safe and comfortable for my passengers and others on the water.
- I will provide safety instructions and offer appropriate life jackets or PFDs to everyone who travels in my boat.
- I will carry all equipment necessary to operate my boat safely and within the law.
- I will not consume drugs and alcohol in my boat or allow my boat to be operated by anyone who is impaired.
- 10. I understand that boating is a shared experience and I will not create excessive noise or operate my boat in a manner that disrupts the peaceful enjoyment of the lake by others.



SHADOW LAKES SYSTEM WATER LEVEL UPDATE: MAY 31 2025

When we provide water level updates/alerts to our members, our communication statements are based on the information from our discussions with the Trent-Severn Waterways Management (TSW) Team and our own recommendations and experiences. It is important to understand that these updates/alerts are predictions and there can be variations to actual flow rates and water levels. The TSW works with multiple datasets where some of the data is predictable (i.e., water level readings), and some that is less predictable (i.e., Environment Canada's weather forecasts). Based on these factors, we take a more cautionary approach to our water level updates/alerts to you as the safety of people and property are of paramount importance to us.



We met with the TSW Management Team on May 26th 2025. For May, we have experienced high water levels due to approximately 120 mm of rain occurring predominantly in three short time periods of May 1st, May 17th /18th, and May 23rd.

When this much precipitation occurs in short time periods, the TSW needs to be more forceful in pushing this water through the system as there is no place to store the water given that the Haliburton Reservoir Lakes are approximately 95 percent full. From the chart, you can see the impact of all this short- term precipitation is having on our water levels.

We should expect that water levels will remain high for the next two weeks as the weather forecast is predicting more significant rainfall events for the beginning of June. We should then see a substantial drop in water levels as they look to bring the Norland Dam flow rate back to the seasonal 20m³/s. The normal drawdown of the reservoir lakes is currently planned for the end of June/beginning of July; ideally keeping the flow rate at 20 m³/sec.

We have put together a Trent Severn Waterways Overview informational document, that speaks to the full year management of the TSW. This document defines the priorities and major impacts/considerations for managing the flow rates/water levels, what it means for Shadow Lake being a "flow-through" lake, definition of reservoir lakes, and what causes flooding on the Trent-Severn waterway. 














PRIVATE ROAD LIABILITY: FOCA

To reach the cottage, we utilize provincial highways or municipally-owned roads, often accessing our properties via private roads. FOCA is a valuable resource for information on private road access, managing road associations, and the advantages of liability insurance.

The quality of your private road can affect both your access to and enjoyment of the property and its overall value.

Local committees, associations, or road groups are an important piece of the puzzle when it comes to private roads. Residents using these non-municipal routes to access their properties have a common interest in, and a shared commitment to, the road's condition and safety. Ensuring uninterrupted access, fair use, and sharing of the costs of these important community assets means planning ahead and ensuring everyone is included in the decision making.

The evolution of a road group takes time, and may happen in several stages. You might be starting at the very beginning, or you might already have some pieces in place, but lack the support of a written set of bylaws, peer mentors, or benchmark statistics. Some groups begin as a "hand-shake" agreement between neighbours but evolve over time into more standardized organizations.

COTTAGE SAFETY REFRESHER: FIRES, BOATS & FIRST AID

Summer is the ideal season for a gentle reminder to keep our cottage community safe and joyful.

Fire & Open-Air Burning: Kawartha Lakes Rules

Campfires no permit required, if they: Are ≤60 cm (2 ft) across, in an approved pit Are ≥15 m from buildings/structures and ≥5 m from fences, trees, brush, property lines

- Use only clean, dry wood—no garbage, painted or treated materials
- Are supervised by an adult and fully extinguished afterward
- For larger brush burns or debris piles, a permit is required—apply through the city's online Public Access Portal or in person

Transport Canada Boating Safety

- Operators of motorized vessels need a Pleasure Craft Operator Card (PCOC); fines start at \$200.
- · Lifejackets are mandatory for everyone onboard
- Max 10 km/h within 30 m of shore, and avoid creating wakes that disturb swimmers, docks, or wildlife.
- Always yield to paddle and sailing craft, and be courteous to local wildlife, especially loon habitats.

First-Aid & Emergency Prep

Keep a fully stocked first-aid kit at the ready: bandages, antiseptics, tweezers, allergy and burn care, plus water, flashlight, extra batteries, and some cash.

Equip your cottage with ABC-rated fire extinguishers, check them annually, and have an evacuation plan ready near each exit.

COKL SHORT TERM RENTALS

As of October 2024, approximately 422 licenses were issued, with 278 locations under investigation for non-compliance. The program addresses noise, safety, and other issues through a robust complaint system (916 total complaints in 2024), demerit points, and legal actions. The program's goal is to operate self-sufficiently while aligning with strategic municipal priorities for governance and environmental health.

Staff are tracking approximately 278 Short Term Rental business locations that are un-licensed due to one or more of the following:

- by-law non-conformity, license application denial
- building and septic, lack of building permit, capacity limits
- fire safety concerns
- being unlicensed (no application received)
- suspension or revocation due to accumulation of demerit points

Since my last update to Council (December 2024) the number of short-term rentals (STRs) in our municipality has remained relatively stable, with no significant changes. However, I'm pleased to share that, through a federal grant specifically targeting short-term rental enforcement, the municipality will be adding two additional enforcement officers.

This is a positive step forward and a welcome development, particularly given the historically slow response from higher levels of government to STR-related issues.
