
The Turning of the Tide







In 1942, at the pinnacle of his success, Glenn made the selfless decision to disband his beloved orchestra and enlist in the Army, where he went on to form the celebrated Glenn Miller Army Air Forces Band. This extraordinary ensemble spread joy and camaraderie among servicemen across Europe, delivering exhilarating live shows and engaging radio performances that uplifted spirits during tumultuous times.

A typical program includes all of Glenn Miller's biggest hits as well as many of his lesser-known songs. The library features contributions from the best composers and arrangers of the era, including Jerry Gray, Bill Finegan, Billy May, and Glenn Miller himself. Erik's musical journey began at the illustrious Eastman School of Music in Rochester, where his talents flourished not only on the tenor sax but also through mastering the delicate tones of the flute and clarinet. After completing his studies, he pursued a master's degree in Audio Arts from Syracuse University, deepening his understanding of music's technical and artistic dimensions.



In 2017, Erik joined the prestigious Glenn Miller Orchestra, and as the ensemble regrouped in the wake of the pandemic, he was appointed director in 2021. His leadership has infused the group with renewed energy and innovative vision. 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"Getting past Wynton and Branford Marsalis, Herbie Hancock, Diana Krall and Samara Joy and outside of major markets like New York City, the overwhelming majority of self proclaimed jazz appreciators struggle with living jazz artists familiarity. There are many other marquee stars such as Gregory Porter, Diane Reeves or Joshua Redman but again, away from NYC and a few other major markets even they aren't as identifiable. This is particularly problematic for live jazz performances. Probably 90% of those in Hampton Roads that go to see Wynton Marsalis for example, won't attend another jazz event the rest of the year but yet proclaim to be jazz lovers. Simply look at numbers as I do all the time. It's interesting, in my personal experience of being involved in this industry on many fronts for decades, one of the very few jazz artists I knew personally that consistently made presenters money was the great Charlie Byrd. Why? Charlie never overcharged. He mastered the art of getting good wages knowing what he could realistically sell and always left room for presenters to profit. You don't have to be over paid to be paid well. Presenters always MADE money on Charlie and wanted him back over and over. That's the idea. Artists today demand large sums of money they can't recoup for the presenter but yet many presenters still pay but the artists aren't brought back. Success is based on how little you lose but if they lose too much the narrative becomes jazz doesn't make money. Balance is key and trust me, it's not just jazz.

Festivals are interesting. Most, not all, but most, aren't as dependent on butts in seats because they get so much underwriting and sponsorship support that doesn't have to be returned or recouped. You'll have artists asking for and getting say...\$20K... but only sell 200 tickets. Most ticket prices, not including Ticketmaster fees, generally run between \$25-\$50. Do the math.

It's insane really. Funny too with jazz because the bigger you get with the event the further away from jazz you get. That's why so many uh, jazz festivals, feature non jazz. Payouts ain't equaling returns. They want to go big. Jazz doesn't work too well big if you leave it as jazz or if you have tons of loot to spend and you're not worried about returns. Jazz today doesn't have the marquee strength for big. Have to bring in R&B or rock or whatever at big but still they want the sophistication of the jazz name.

What's the remedy? It's simple but yet not so simple. Keep it smaller and even then it's a challenge but your risks are lower. Folks have to take a chance and go see an artist they've never heard of or aren't that familiar with in sound. Take familiarity off the table. Learn to trust certain presenters that bring JAZZ to the area. After all, jazz today is mostly loaded with talent unfamiliar with most jazz appreciators. Those are the odds you'll more than likely be confronted with in wanting to enjoy live jazz performances."


Sounds of the 757: Hampton Roads' Rich Musical Legacy

When you think of American music royalty, you might envision New York jazz clubs or West Coast hip-hop. But tucked between the Atlantic Ocean and Chesapeake Bay lies Hampton Roads, Virginia—a region whose rhythmic heartbeat has quietly powered the soundtrack of American culture for generations.

This coastal enclave—home to cities like Norfolk, Portsmouth, Hampton, Newport News, and Virginia Beach—has birthed a striking range of musical legends, from jazz and blues pioneers to hip-hop architects.

VOICES OF LEGACY







Ruth Brown – "Miss Rhythm," R&B trailblazer from Portsmouth



Robert Cray – Grammy-winning blues revivalist, raised in Newport News

It all began with the voice of a generation: Ella Fitzgerald, the "First Lady of Song," born in Newport News in 1917. With her unmatched vocal agility and pure tone, she redefined jazz and became one of the most influential singers in American history.

Just across the water in Portsmouth, Ruth Brown—often called "Miss Rhythm"—helped lay the foundation for R&B and rock 'n' roll, influencing generations with her soulful blues and becoming a key voice in Atlantic Records' rise.

As the decades turned, Hampton Roads' sound evolved. Grammy-winning bluesman Robert Cray, raised in Newport News, brought blues back to the mainstream in the 1980s with his smooth guitar work and emotive storytelling. And then came the hip-hop era.

Few cities in America have shaped modern hip-hop and pop culture like Virginia Beach and Portsmouth. Missy Elliott, a force of creative genius, emerged from Portsmouth in the '90s and changed the game with genre-bending beats, futuristic visuals, and a bold voice for women in rap. Pharrell Williams, also from Virginia Beach, turned his hometown into a global creative hub, co-founding.

The Neptunes and N.E.R.D.—the sound architects behind hits for artists like Britney Spears, Jay-Z, and Justin Timberlake. Pusha T, another Virginia Beach native and half of the duo Clipse, brought gritty, lyrical storytelling to center stage, helping define the East Coast hip-hop aesthetic in the 2000s and beyond

Today, Hampton Roads continues to echo with creativity—from school band rooms and gospel choirs to the Something in the Water Festival, Pharrell's annual celebration of culture and unity in Virginia Beach. The region is more than a coastal escape; it's a living mixtape, with every city, bridge, and tide carrying the sounds of resilience, innovation, and soul.

Hampton Roads doesn't just produce stars—it produces visionaries. And if history is any guide, the next genredefining artist might already be writing lyrics in a bedroom studio somewhere off I-64.

Yes, absolutely — Hampton Roads, VA has produced a wide array of musical talent across genres and generations. Beyond legends like Ella Fitzgerald, Missy Elliott, Pharrell Williams, and Pusha T, there's a deep bench of influential artists who also hail from the region:

A globally recognized producer, Timbaland helped shape the sound of late-'90s and 2000s pop and hiphop. He launched careers and produced hits for Missy Elliott, Aaliyah, Justin Timberlake, Jay-Z, and many more.

Chris Richardson - Chesapeake

An American Idol finalist (Season 6), Chris gained national attention and has since collaborated with artists in pop and R&B circles.

Clipse (Gene & Terrence Thornton — No Malice & Pusha T) - Virginia Beach

Known for sharp lyricism and gritty storytelling, Clipse were pivotal in East Coast hip-hop. Produced by The Neptunes, their music helped define early 2000s rap.

An up-and-coming voice in Southern hiphop, Young Crazy is gaining momentum as part of the new wave of talent representing Norfolk and the 757.

In Milan, even meals feel couture. At Langosteria, recommended by one of Chau's Milanese contacts, we dressed up for an evening of fresh seafood and craft cocktails that danced on the palate. The gothic marvel of the Duomo di Milano stole our breath. Six centuries in the making, this marble masterpiece is pure magic, especially early morning or at sunset. Afterward, we treated ourselves to cocktails and dessert at the chic Armani Café because in Milan, fashion and flavor are never far apart.

When city energy meets lakeside serenity, you get Lake Como. Just a quick train ride from Milan, yet it feels like stepping into a postcard. Famous for its dramatic alpine backdrop, charming pastel villages, and elegant villas that spill right down to the water's edge, Lake Como has inspired writers, artists, and dreamers for centuries. We booked a private boat with Como Blue Lake, timing it to catch the sunset, a must if you go. As we glided over the deep, mirrorlike waters, the shoreline revealed grand estates framed by cypress trees and gardens in full bloom. Among the highlights was spotting George and Amal Clooney's villa, and the breathtaking Villa del Balbianello, known worldwide as a wedding venue and a filming location for movies like Star Wars and Casino Royale. We stopped to explore the storybook towns of Bellagio, known as the "Pearl of the Lake," and Varenna, with its romantic lakeside promenade and colorful houses climbing the hillside. Between local artisan shops, creamy gelato, and espresso, every corner felt like it belonged on a vintage postcard.

We capped off the evening at Enocentrico, a cozy cocktail and wine bar where the drinks are just as creative as the company. 








A Toast in Clianti


Where Stillness Meets the Soul

Right next door, rows of Sagrantino vines grown by the neighboring winemaker Giorgio Iannoni Sebastianini roll across the hills like quiet poetry. One afternoon, Iris and I wandered over for a closer look, drawn by the beauty of the vineyard and the promise of something special. Giorgio, warm and welcoming, introduced himself right there among the vines and invited us to taste his wines. Each glass felt like a love letter to Umbria, earthy, bold, and brimming with story.

That night at the estate, Laura welcomed us into the kitchen with the warmth of someone who has been feeding souls her whole life. Dinner was a beautiful expression of the land itself, fresh black truffle pasta rolled by hand, tender parmesan crusted pork, and smoky slices of grilled eggplant, each dish a quiet triumph. The truffles, unearthed earlier by the family's clever hunting dogs, added a touch of wild earthiness that made the meal unforgettable. The Spirit Within the Walls



Montefalco is often called the Balcony of Umbria, and while its sweeping views stretch across valleys and vineyards, the town's true magic is something you feel rather than see. Just beyond the edge of town stands the Church of Santa Chiara, where history, devotion, and mystery seem to breathe through the stone walls. It is here that Saint Clare of Montefalco, a 13th century mystic, continues to move hearts with her presence. Clare was known for her visions and unwavering spiritual depth, eventually becoming abbess of the Convent of the Holy Cross. When she passed in 1308, the nuns claimed to find symbols of Christ's Passion etched into her heart, a crucifix, scourge, and crown of thorns, as though her body had become a vessel for divine experience. Today, her heart rests in a silver religuary behind glass, and nearby, her incorrupt body, dressed in her Augustinian habit, lies in a glass enclosed tomb within the chapel. Visitors step softly through the space, visibly touched by the reverence and quiet power that fills the room. The moment you enter, a hush settles over you like soft velvet. The scent of aged wood, incense, and centuries of candle smoke lingers in the air, wrapping around you like a whispered prayer. Light streams through stained glass in warm hues of gold and rose, painting the silence with a kind of holiness that feels just beyond reach. Whether or not one believes in miracles, the energy in this space feels undeniably otherworldly. They say the church holds more than relics. It holds the soul of Montefalco. Though Saint Clare is not the only nun whose incorrupt body is displayed to the world, the presence of both her preserved form and her heart marked with the Passion makes this shrine unlike any other. Few places in the world offer such a potent convergence of mysticism, history, and faith in one sacred space.





A Taste of Home, Italian Style

On our final evening together, Iris suggested we cook, just like we used to whenever she visited her dad, my former partner, and me in the United States. Her favorite meal has always been my steak wraps with sticky rice and a spicy cilantro lime herb dipping sauce. So, there we were, in a tiny town in the heart of Italy, on a mission to recreate a dish that depended on ingredients we knew would be hard to find. Sticky rice and fish sauce are not exactly staples in rural Umbria. We took a little trip to Perugia, where the markets are slightly bigger, though still small by American standards. No fish sauce in sight, but I managed to find a bottle of Kikkoman soy sauce and a tube of anchovy paste. It became my makeshift version, and honestly, it did the trick. For heat, we picked up some local Italian peppers. They were surprisingly spicy, not quite Thai chili level, but enough to make it work. Iris and I had the best time cooking together again, falling into that familiar rhythm, laughing at our improvisations and celebrating small wins with every sizzling pan. We could possibly make it on the show Survivor with these smart hacks.

That night, the entire family gathered at the table, including Katia's dear friend who joined us for the meal. We toasted with wine, shared stories across generations, and passed around plates until they were clean. We used plain white rice in the end, but no one noticed. They loved the flavors so much they all asked for the recipe. I still need to send them real fish sauce, or maybe I will just bring it with me next time and stay a little longer, just like they asked.

A Walk Through the Heart of Us



After dinner, Katia, her friend, Iris, and I drove into the town center, parked near the piazza, and set out for a stroll to walk off our meal. Montefalco at night is something special. The streets glow softly under old lanterns, and everything feels suspended in a kind of hush. We wandered slowly, letting the rhythm of the evening guide us, and eventually met up with some American friends who were staying in town. One round of cocktails later, and the night had folded into a perfect memory. What stayed with me most though was not the wine or the walk, but the presence of this blended family around me. So often, families fractured by time or circumstance carry tension and disconnection. I am endlessly grateful that has never been the case between Katia and me. I have always loved Iris as my own daughter, since she was just six years old. Now at twenty five, she remains one of the brightest parts of my life. I am incredibly proud of the woman she has become. From barely speaking any English as a little girl to graduating from the University of Washington, she has grown into someone strong, brilliant, and full of grace.

While we were in Montefalco, Iris was also my translator and guide, helping bridge conversations with ease and laughter. She made everything feel effortless. Though I did get to practice my Italian each morning on my solo café runs, ordering coffee and pastries from the bar with a smile and my best accent. Those quiet mornings and shared evenings reminded me that family is not defined by blood or borders. It is built in love, choice, and showing up again and again for each other.

A Farewell Etched in Olive Leaves and Laughter

As my time in Montefalco came to a close, I found myself lingering in the stillness between moments, trying to hold onto the feeling that had quietly taken root during my stay. There is something timeless about this place, yes, but even more unforgettable was the love and generosity of the Broccatelli family. Their warmth wrapped around me like a well-worn quilt familiar, comforting, and deeply sincere. I am so grateful for every moment shared with them. For the meals prepared with heart, the laughter over wine, the long conversations that needed no perfect translation. For little Maya, who spoke to me with such sweet conviction in Italian, completely unbothered by the fact that I didn't understand her. In her world, there was no language barrier, only connection. And in her way, she nudged me to try a little harder, speak a little more, and listen with more than just words.

These memories are now part of me. This family, this home, this hillside soaked in sun and stories. I carry them with me, not just as cherished moments, but as familia. And I know this is not goodbye, only arrivederci, until we meet again. With my heart full and my Italian slightly improved, I packed my bags and turned toward my next destination on the list. Rome was calling, with its ancient stones, espresso-soaked mornings, and endless treasures waiting to be discovered. A new chapter was about to begin, but Montefalco would remain nestled in my soul, a quiet reminder of the beauty of connection and the magic

After the sacred stillness of the Holy Door, I was ready to soak in the vibrancy of Rome in full color. The city greeted me like an old friend, grandeur and grit wrapped together in centuries of stone and soul. I wandered through St. Peter's Square, letting the open arms of the colonnades embrace me. The fountains danced in the light, and the energy buzzed with reverence and wonder. Even among the crowds, there was something deeply grounding about standing there, in a space where millions have passed through with hopes and prayers of their own.

From there, I dove into all the quintessential Roman experiences. I made my wish at the Trevi Fountain, where the marble shimmered under the sun like something out of myth. I climbed the Spanish Steps, pausing midway to take in the hum of the city below and the laughter of travelers spilling gelato on their fingers. Every street corner revealed another treasure whether it was the rich scent of espresso wafting from a tucked-away café, the glint of gold leaf on an aging church ceiling, or the sudden burst of live music echoing through the cobblestones.





One of my favorite memories was an evening golf cart tour around the city. There were seven of us and our wonderful guide, Daniel, who was equal parts historian, comedian, and storyteller. Sandi Harris and her husband from Alabama were celebrating their fortieth wedding anniversary. Brooke Dannenfeldt and her father Steve had come from lowa to honor her graduation from Drake University. Rachel Bozek and her mother Judy Hanzes from Pennsylvania were on a motherdaughter adventure through Italy. As we zipped through the streets together, past the Colosseum glowing against the night sky and the Pantheon standing quiet in its ancient grace, I felt that beautiful thing that happens when strangers become companions, even just for an evening.

The food, of course, was its own love story. Cacio e pepe that melted on the tongue. Suppli that cracked open to reveal molten mozzarella. Flaky pastries filled with pistachio cream and espresso that tasted like fuel for the gods. And the people, gracious, expressive, effortlessly stylish, and always ready to share a smile or a story.

Rome is a city that does not rush. It invites you to linger, to look up, to get lost and find yourself again. In every echoing piazza and candlelit trattoria, there was a sense of timelessness that reminded me to be fully present. I came to walk through the Holy Door during Jubilee (*The Holy Doors at opens every 25 years during a Jubilee, or Holy Year*), but Rome opened many more doors than I expected. And each one led me deeper into a city that continues to unfold like poetry under the moonlight.

With the Roman sun lingering in the mideighties during my stay, I found myself leaning into lighter meals and late-night dinners. My first meal was sushi, yes, sushi in the heart of Rome. Nakai was just around the corner from my hotel, a sleek and modern spot with garden vibes and beautifully crafted dishes. The miso soup was comforting, the sushi fresh and balanced, but it was the wagyu dumplings and a chilled glass of nigori sake that stole the show. Light, flavorful, and just right for a summer day in the city.

Another evening took me to Cresci, also nearby. I love discovering neighborhood gems, and this one delivered. I started with their beef tartare salad, which was both elegant and satisfying, followed by a pasta with baby octopus and asparagus that still lingers in my thoughts. I find myself craving it even as I write this.

One of my favorite moments was sitting just outside the Piazza del Popolo at Angolo degli Artisti. I ordered a limoncello spritz, perfectly bright and refreshing for the warm evening air, and paired it with a delicate clam pasta that made me close my eyes for just a moment in pure contentment.

My mornings were simple. When I travel solo, I usually start the day with a strong coffee and maybe a pastry, enjoyed quietly while the city wakes around me. In the summer heat, I often skip lunch and save my appetite for dinner, letting the day carry me lightly from one experience to the next.

Rome fed me in every sense, body, soul, and curiosity. From the unexpected to the traditional, every bite was a reminder that joy can be found in the simplest pleasures.

Reflections Under Roman Skies

Rome left its mark on me, not with grand gestures, but with quiet power. It is a city of contrasts, ancient and modern, chaotic and graceful, overflowing with history yet always unfolding in the now. My days moved slowly and intentionally, guided not by a strict itinerary but by intuition. One moment I was walking through Vatican courtyards steeped in centuries of devotion, and the next I was laughing with strangers on a golf cart, weaving through cobblestone alleys under the soft glow of evening lights. But Rome was just one chapter in a story much larger.

This journey began in Milan, where I stepped into the pulse of Italian fashion and elegance. I found there during Fashion Week, surrounded by creativity and couture. Milan was sleek and energizing, filled with refined beauty and bold ideas. Then came Firenze, where every street felt like a living gallery. 


The Takeaway

A Few Intuitive Travel Tips from the Heart

- · Let your mornings breathe. Do not rush out the door.
- · Sit with your coffee. Watch the city wake.
 - You will notice more magic in five minutes of quiet than in an hour of chasing monuments.
- Learn just a few meaningful phrases in the local language.
 - Not just hello and thank you, but things like: this is beautiful or I understand a little. It opens hearts and doors in unexpected ways.
- Travel light, emotionally as well. Leave space in your days. Let detours happen.
- Say yes to unplanned invitations. Some of my favorite memories were never on the itinerary. Ask locals what they eat, not just where they eat. It is "the what" that tells you how they live, celebrate, and take care of themselves.
- Bring a small offering for hosts, even if it is just a heartfelt note. Kindness lingers longer than souvenirs.
- Put a tracking device in every checked bag. I used an AirTag and it gave me complete peace of mind. If your luggage goes on a solo adventure, you will know exactly where it is, and that kind of calm is priceless when you are halfway across the world.



On Tuesday Jan 7th I drove over to work in No Ho -North Hollywood- to do a pick up and drop off and then started driving back home to the Pali- Pacific Palisades
This was about 10:30 am.

The sky was ominous that morning and driving up the 405 and the 101 was insane - dust storms, flying debris, wind literally moving your car as you drove. I thought for myself I shouldn't have gone out on the roads today. I'm getting out of here as soon as possible. So I took Ventura Blvd to get to the Sepulveda Pass As I'm driving across the Valley most traffic lights are out swinging back and forth. It was a 4 way stop calamity.

At 10:30 I got the first Watch Duty App alert there was a fire .8 miles from my place on Lachman . 10 Acres burned. Within 3-5 minutes I got the next alert - 200 Acres burned I started to race back home.

My pet sitter, and friend, Sandra - my Hero- called me and said she was coming from her client on Lachman and to get back as fast as I can and she on her way to my place to grab Shillelagh. As I'm driving up the pass I see a huge plume of fire but as I get to the top its coming from WeHo - West Holywood. I get up to Sunset Blvd to turn on to it and then I see the much larger plumes of smoke coming from the Palisades.

Now I start to panic and then I start to cry because I have to get home! As we are all driving on Sunset we pulled over numerous times for all the Fire trucks and LAFD related vehicles.

As I get to town Sandra calls to let me know she has Shillelagh, his backpack, and heart medication and got out of there. It took 1/2 hr to go a mile just to get him.







We meet in the Gelsons parking lot to do the Pet exchange because she has to get to PCH to get out and get to Mothers home as the fire is the fastest we have ever seen .

I get Shillelagh situated in a grocery cart and start to go into Gelson to get Pet food and they are locking the doors to evacuate. I see a group of people standing across the parking lot on the Sunset side and go over to see whats up. Its then that I see the fire already burning the hillside across the street. This nice woman next to me and points over there and turns to me and says that's my house.

It was then I knew I couldn't risk our lives to try to make it back to my place. We left Gelsons, stopped the empty car wash togetbgas as they were evacuating Ralphs and started trying to get out the back way on Entrada but had to cut back around and to get to Sunset. It took 3 hours to go a few miles but we made it out.

All throughout this process getting fired Aerts non stop. My neighbors and other friends texting each other to make sure we were getting out safe.

So goodbye Sunset Gardens. A cool vintage California Bldg where all my nice neighbors became good friends.



Startup World Cup Returns to Virginia Beach This August

A MOVEMENT ON THE RISE

In August 2024, a powerful signal was sent from the shores of Virginia
Beach: the Commonwealth is not just a player in the innovation economy—
it's a contender on the global stage.
The Startup World Cup Virginia
Regional Finals, hosted by Innovate
Hampton Roads, brought together the brightest minds, boldest startups, and most forward-thinking investors for a night that felt less like a pitch competition and more like a movement.

Held at the Zeiders American Dream Theater, the energy was palpable. Guests lined up early. Founders finetuned their slides. Judges whispered predictions. With every pitch, the room surged with anticipation—because everyone knew: one team would walk away with a shot at \$1 million and a place on the world stage in San Francisco.

That team? ivWatch, a Hampton Roads-based company reinventing how the world monitors IVs in hospitals.



2024'S TRIUMPH: IVWATCH MAKES WAVES ON THE GLOBAL STAGE

Founded in Newport News, ivWatch has long been known in medtech circles for its commitment to patient safety. Their flagship technology—a sensor that detects IV infiltration in real-time—had already earned FDA clearance. But their win at the Startup World Cup launched them into a new league.

They didn't just attend the Grand Finale in San Francisco—they placed third in the world.

It was a jaw-dropping achievement for a company that got its start right here in Virginia, and a moment of pride for everyone in the state's startup ecosystem.

This isn't ivWatch's first rodeo. Since its founding in 2010, the company has racked up 69 patents, earned FDA clearance for its SmartTouch Sensor in 2024, and even pivoted to produce NIOSH-approved N95 respirators during the pandemic. Recognized by Fast Company, Inc., and Modern Healthcare in 2024, ivWatch also clinched Virginia's "Coolest Thing Made" award.



Backed by 757 Angels, ivWatch employs hundreds locally, fueling our region's economy.
In June 2025, the company announced market authorization under the EU MDR CE Mark for their SmartTouch Sensor, unlocking access to hospitals across the UK, Ireland, and the European Union.

BUT IVWATCH WASN'T ALONE

The 2024 finals featured a diverse lineup of startups across sectors like AI, AgriTech, CleanTech, and EdTech. From early-stage founders to well-funded startups, the stage was packed with visionaries ready to scale.

Agricision

Led by Ken and Diana Warren, has evolved significantly since last year's Startup World Cup. While maintaining its focus on pest detection for row crops, the team recently pivoted to better meet customer needs and will debut the BUBBA-70L —a 70-liter agricultural spray drone—at Penn State's Ag Progress Days this August. This next-generation drone is purpose-built for modern farming, offering real-time, targeted solutions to support a more sustainable agricultural future.





Agricision's scout and sprayer drones will be manufactured in Virginia, fully NDAA-compliant, and engineered with secure data handling as a core feature. The company recently won the BullPen Challenge at the Virginia Farm Bureau and is now raising \$500,000 to scale manufacturing and meet increasing demand.

ops, the team recently pivoted to better meet customer needs and will debut the BUBBA-70L—a 70-liter agricultural spray drone—at Penn State's Ag Progress Days this August. As farmers themselves, the Warrens as well as the entire Agricision team understand that timing is everything in agriculture, and they've built a tool designed to deliver with that urgency in mind.



CXperks

Founder Scott Janney took the pain out of hospital waiting rooms with CXperks, a no-app-needed platform that turns idle time into interactive time. By scanning a QR code, visitors get access to games, trivia, and entertainment. Now active in 13 Sentara hospitals and with \$3.1 million in funding, CXperks is proving that a better customer experience is good medicine.

Gabb VR

Founder Malcom Lee is changing how students learn languages. Gabb VR uses virtual reality to immerse learners in lifelike environments—engaging their brains more deeply than flashcards or classroom drills ever could. Now in 73 schools, the platform has increased student engagement by 25% and is raising \$1.1 million to expand.

M-Con Innovations

Tech meets user-first design with MCON's sleek, adaptable phone game controller. After raising \$1.7 million, they're bringing to market a device that's compatible with almost any phone and case—designed with precision to adapt to all camera bumps and sizes.

And that's just scratching the surface.

Other standouts included:

- DroneUp, a logistics disruptor delivering goods via autonomous drones.
- Psionic, develops next generation GPS-denied navigation systems for land, air, space
- Amruta, delivers secure, explainable AI that empowers organizations to make better decisions without exposing data—keeping it safely within your own systems while meeting the demands of today's fast, complex environments.
- Complify, simplifying compliance for scaling businesses.
- VerbaAI, Stay informed with real-time, by-the-minute global reporting—delivering critical insights and analysis in seconds, all from one centralized platform.

Each company brought something unique. Each pitch added fuel to the fire that is Virginia's growing innovation economy.

Innovate Hampton Roads

A Beacon of Regional



Nestled along one of the world's richest harbors, Innovate Hampton Roads (IHR) stands as a remarkable testament to the power of collective vision. From its humble origins to its status as the unifying voice of innovation in southeastern Virginia, Innovate Hampton Roads' journey mirrors the region's evolution —resilient, collaborative, and forward-thinking.

THE ORIGINS - UNITING DISPARATE FORCES

While Hampton Roads has long been renowned for its deep-water ports, military installations, and shipbuilding prowess, its entrepreneurial ecosystem only started to take shape in earnest in the 1990s. Several parallel efforts emerged:

- Hampton Roads Technology Council (HRTC) was formed in the late '90s as a non-profit 501(c)(6), dedicating itself to elevating tech businesses through startup incubators and member networking.
- In 2016, HRTC rebranded as the Hampton Roads Innovation Collaborative (HRIC), expanding its programming to include a conceptto-commercialization track, mentoring schemes, and export acceleration.
- Separately, StartWheel, a startup support initiative, and the Norfolk State University Innovation Center fostered social entrepreneurship and support for underrepresented innovators.

There was momentum, but these efforts

—while impactful—remained siloed.

The year 2023 marked a significant turning point. In December, HRIC and StartWheel officially merged under a single umbrella—Innovate Hampton Roads—aligning their strengths in storytelling, programming, and ecosystem coordination. The merger aimed to expand their reach and influence. By the end of that year, Innovate Hampton Roads had reached major milestones:

- Published over 200 news stories

 (a 20% increase from the previous year)
- Promoted nearly 800 events, representing a 54% growth in community engagement

A DEFINED MISSION: WEAVING THE INNOVATION FABRIC

At its core, IHR is driven by three foundational pillars:

A central hub – Acting as a "one-stop conduit" connecting entrepreneurs with resources, funding, mentorship, programs, and community networks.

Narrative leadership - Capturing and amplifying stories that highlight Hampton Roads as an innovation destination and advocate for ecosystem investment.

Programmatic breadth - Powering initiatives like the Fervent Four Show podcast, REaKTOR innovation center, Start Peninsula pitch challenges, and the Virginia Beach-hosted regional Startup World Cup finals.



Under the leadership of Executive Director Tim Ryan and Associate Director James Doe, and guided by a board of entrepreneurs, corporate leaders, academics, and civic leaders, IHR leverages collective expertise and energy.

A SURGE OF SUPPORT: VIPC GRANT, 2025

In mid-2025, Innovate Hampton
Roads received a critical boost. The
Virginia Innovation Partnership
Corporation (VIPC) awarded a
prestigious Regional Innovation
Fund grant to fuel ecosystem
growth. This grant will enhance
program delivery, storytelling
capacity, equity-focused support,
and capital attraction to earlystage enterprises.

As Tim Ryan noted, the investment will:

"Help us enhance our slate of programs that provide support and encouragement beginning at the earliest ideation stages and that tell the story of innovation and entrepreneurship in Hampton Roads and across Virginia."



This year, the ViBe Creative District celebrates 10 years of as the creative heartbeat of Virginia Beach, a place where hundreds of local artists are showcased, and dozens of diverse events take place each year. Since 2015, the ViBe Creative District has been adding hundreds of works of public art to Virginia Beach's bustling resort. Additionally, ViBe has fostered a growing neighborhood of small, locally owned creative businesses that make a notable mark in Virginia Beach's economy.

Created in partnership with the City of Virginia Beach, the ViBe Creative District intended to spur economic development, attract residents and visitors to the once dormant neighborhood and to create a unique sense of place at the resort. This central beach corridor provides an important cultural connection from the oceanfront beach on the east to the VB Convention Center and Sport Center to the west. The future continues to look bright as Atlantic Park, neighboring the ViBe Creative District, will also open in 2025. This landmark development, featuring an entertainment venue and world-class surf lagoon, will further grow the economic impact of the arts and culture in Virginia Beach.

In the words of Laura Wood, co-founder of ViBe and current chair of the nonprofit – "VIVA LA VIBE!"

Creative Capital has a strong return on investment

After a decade of impact, the metrics are clear. The arts mean business in the ViBe Creative District. More than 68 small businesses have moved into the arts district in the last ten years, generating an increase of \$33.9 Million gross sales annually and a net increase of over \$916,000 in yearly taxes in 2024 over 2015 baseline figures from the Commissioner of the Revenue. Outdoor markets and private redevelopment have spurred businesses licenses located in the district. Additionally, the 15-block area has seen real estate values increase by \$56 Million in the last decade, providing a significant return on investment to the City of Virginia Beach.

Creative Capital has a strong return on investment

Two of the greatest small business incubators are the Old Beach Farmers Market and Old Beach Art and Eco Market which have operated in the neighborhood for 16 years and 12 years respectively. The markets generate large crowds and interest in shopping local throughout the ViBe Creative District while fostering growth for the vendors. Old Beach Farmers Market vendors Three Ships Coffee and The Stockpot both started to grow their customer base at the Old Beach Farmers Market, opened flagship store fronts in the ViBe District and now have grown to 3 bricks and mortars stores each. Crafters like Jars of Dust and North End Bag Co each grew out of the Old Beach Art & Eco Market to retail spaces at WRV's The Alley on 19th Street and have a broad national customer base. Additionally, The VB Flea and the annual Small Business Saturday market, both 9 years old, round out opportunities for non-food or art-based businesses to participate.

Growth of these small businesses and others blossomed from a small business matching grant program piloted in the ViBe Creative District in 2017. After researching similar programs in 15 other cities through the country, the ViBe nonprofit requested that \$75,000 of their City grant allocation be transferred to the City of Virginia Beach Economic Development for grant disbursements of up to \$10,000 each to small businesses operating in ViBe. The program ran two years and assisted 12 small businesses in the district, bosting a return on investment to the City of Virginia Beach at nearly 5 to 1. The program was so successful it was modified only slightly to become a City-wide endeavor in 2021, helping more than 50 local businesses to date via the Virginia Beach Development Authority which continues to see private investment matching the City's at a 5 to 1 return on investment.

Creative Capital uncovered with CreativeMornings VB and arts programming

Locally, the ViBe nonprofit contracts an average of 100 artists a year and has dedicated over \$600,000 to artists stipends in recent years. Artists are an integral part of the creative economy in Virginia Beach, so much so that the City of Virginia Beach adopted dedicated funding sources to offer individual artists grants for the first time in 2025. This landmark funding speaks to a growing culture in VB.

Internationally, ViBe has partnered with the global creative speakers' network, CreativeMornings to feature individuals working here in Coastal Virginia. Hosted monthly The Garage CreativeMornings Virginia Beach highlights diverse, creative entrepreneurs' stories as a means to formally document the creative capital found here. But CreativeMornings speakers participate for free exchange for the professional develop opportunity to be photographed and filmed for global sharing These creatives often find additional work with ViBe's small business community and larger programming partners, from Something in the Water to Busch Gardens. But CreativeMornings speakers participate for free in exchange for the develop opportunity photographed and filmed for global sharing.

The program began in November 2023 and has dancers, painters, featured entrepreneurs, photographers, bakers, arts advocates, creative professionals, sculptures, an aura reader, writers, tastemakers, and community-builders from the region. The monthly events nurture an growing audience of 50-80 individuals who gather for hugs, high-fives and valuable networking time with other creatives every Third Friday morning in ViBe. ViBe draws speakers for CreativeMornings Virginia Beach from their of community partners network collaborators that has developed over the last decade.

Community partnerships are a key component to ViBe's success. Partnering with more than 30 nonprofit organizations, the ViBe Creative District's impact extends beyond the beach to schools, libraries, recreation centers, parks and more. From in-school murals at 18 Title I hundreds schools. to of Season Nonviolence poetry and poster submissions by students City-wide, or student painted skate decks and murals the boardwalk for Jackalope, ViBe partners closely with VB Schools on multiple projects each year. In 2025, VBSchools students and teachers will help repaint 35 parking space murals for Paint the Parking Lot, a project first implemented in 2020.

Cultural entities like Virginia Beach Art Center, Virginia Museum of Contemporary Art and the Virginia African American Cultural Center are natural collaborative partners. Working with VAACC and the Virginia Tourism Corporation, ViBe has added large outdoor murals through a statewide effort to Franklin and Williamsburg, with additional murals planned for Chesapeake and Suffolk in the next two years.



Signature Events Catch National Attention

ViBe's largest signature events – ViBe Mural Festival started in 2018 and the VB Street Art Festival started in 2024 – generate the largest support from corporate sponsors. Companies like The Runnymede Corporation, LISC Hampton Roads, Norfolk Southern, TowneBank and Dominion Energy have supported the district in recent years. Likewise, dozens of individual donors contribute annually to support the ViBe Creative District. "The ViBe has been an amazing, transformational organization for this entire neighborhood, and we are so proud to be a part of it," said Garrett Berger of The Runnymede Corporation, a corporate sponsor of ViBe.

ViBe Mural Festival evolved from a goal to connect local artists with business owners to create unique site-specific mural art as a reflection of the community and people who live here. The ViBe board came up with the idea of "10 Murals in 10 Days" which seemed like a sweet spot between novice artists and professionals and also allowed the public to visit one weekend to see it all start and come back the following weekend to see the finished work. Over 70 murals have been created since then, with no loss of momentum or public interest. ViBe Mural Festival is one of the few notable mural festivals which accepts and encourages first time mural artists to participate. In 2023, Virginia Beach artist Tessa Hall Duquette painted her first mural along 17th Street with the help of neighbors and friends.

By the end of the festival, she had offers to paint 3 additional murals at local businesses outside of ViBe. A year later, she opened her own creative business called The Garage VB and has over two dozen murals completed to date. The Garage VB is welcoming artist studio for all people and routinely attracts hundreds of attendees for events like the "Mighty Minis" exhibition.

Unconventionally, road construction projects outlined in a ViBe Connectively Plan for 19th Street, 18th Street and 17th Street, designed and funded by the City of Virginia Beach, provided a new platform for VB Street Art Festival. Custom Vsculptures shaped triangular Neighborhood Identifiers by urban designers—are located at street corners on every street and are an aluminum surface intended 100% as an artist painting canvas. First installed in 2020 on 19th St, Neighborhood Identifiers grew from 8 sculptures to 15 with the completion of 18th Street road project in 2025. Construction on 17th Street begins in Fall 2025 and will bring the collective total up to 24 paintable neighborhood identifiers. For this year's VB Street Art Festival, 95 artists applied from 11 different states and 3 countries and were reviewed by the City of Virginia Beach Public Art Committee which narrowed it down to the top 15 designs. The roads themselves created a canvas for artist-designed brick intersection art and thermos-plastic artworks in the crosswalks. Four new artist crosswalks will be unveiling in late 2025.

People outside of Virginia Beach who are unable to travel to see the street art, murals and district can enjoy online photo albums via Facebook, artist feature videos via YouTube for each mural and an online ViBe Google Mural Map that has reached more than 730,000+ views globally since it was create in 2017. ViBe's significant online content drew attention from national and international professional conference planners the ViBe nonprofit presented nationally at the ASLA Conference in Nashville and virtually via the International Conference on Creative Territories for Sustainable Development in Brazil -both in 2021. Within the Commonwealth of Virginia, ViBe has presented multiple times for the Virginia Commission for the Arts and other professional and alumna associations. Virginia Beach's creative community has created waves.



Positive Press for Virginia Beach lets locals feel the LOVE

ViBe is a destination that stands for Virginia Beach—named by Friends of the Creative District business association founder Charles Powell. ViBe is also an authentic reflection of our creative community. Last year, AAA's national Traveler Magazine named Virginia Beach's ViBe District as one of the "7 US Cities with the Best Street Art and Murals." The streets, sidewalks, roads, fences and exterior walls are adorned with vibrant works of public art. Residents and visitors alike are welcome to enjoy the open-air museum for free, 365 days a year, 24 hours a day. In recognition of this revitalization effort, ViBe has been featured in over 1,000 earned media articles, TV segments, videos interviews, blogs and conferences.

Back in 2019, a surprise appearance on a Jeopardy clue generated positive vibes locally and nationally. When the \$1600 clue "Adjacent to Norfolk, this city boasts about 30-miles of oceanfront and a creative district called ViBe" popped up on prime-time, contestant Becky responded "What is Virginia Beach!" Back in Virginia Beach, locals cheered at the TV screens.

And yet, one of the simplest words—LOVE— which was turned into graphic art representation of Virginia Beach and greater Virginia, then a large sculpture, then a sticker, may have the most impact in the ViBe Creative District. ViBe's LOVEwork is the most-sought selfie in the arts district and LOVE stickers have been one of the most requested items from ViBe in the last ten years. Nearly 100,000 LOVE stickers have been printed to date and shared City-wide with residents and tourists alike. It is not unusual for the nonprofit to receive requests from out-oftowners even to mail a love sticker out of state. The City of Virginia Beach convention and visitor's bureau has customized hats for conventions and promotional gigs and fostered interest in the creative community of our coastal city. Joint tourism efforts in recent years spawned two forward-thinking tourism campaigns in 2024— "Virginia Beach VIBE" and "Virginia Beach Artisans" both of which include artists, creative entrepreneurs and small businesses who are the authentic representation of our community and Virginia Beach locals. It seems, Virginia is for ART Lovers.

What started as means to improve a blighted neighborhood has grown into a city-wide anthem – Virginia Beach, it's a VIBE!



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Offshore Deep Dropping

Offshore deep dropping action has been outstanding with so many anglers scoring huge on giant black seabass, flounder, triggerfish, tautog, black belly rose fish, blue line, and golden tilefish, bluefish, amberjack along with snowy grouper on the edge of the continental shelf as well as wrecks 30–50 miles out.

Finding wreckage that has not been fished out is the key to loading your fish box. Once you have located the fish, a variety of bait offerings should get you bit. Multi-hook rigs with cut bait—including squid, shrimp, clam, cut blue crab, fiddler crabs, or small, freshly caught menhaden—all should serve you well. If you prefer artificials, large bucktails and jigs topped with long Gulp tails have been the ticket for success.

The wreck fishing "flounder pounders" have been spanking big flatties and this will continue into the winter. Swordfish are also on the radar for heavy gear deep droppers, and this will only improve as the waters begin to cool as fall approaches. Spadefish, sheepshead, cobia, king and Spanish mackerel, flounder and seabass are available on towers and wrecks inside 20 miles of the beach as well as along the CBBT inside the bay.

Anchor your boat up to the current of the wreck or structure. Use a chum bag of clam to bring the spadefish up to your boat so you can drift your baits back to the fish. Use small red hooks for best results. Chart numbers for popular fishing locations are available to the public on several free websites online. Explore the internet for information and then go treasure hunting for trophy fish!!!

Offshore Sportfishing Action

Offshore sportfishing action has been phenomenal with both private vessels and charter boats reporting lots of tuna and billfish action with mahi, bonita and Spanish mackerel readily available. Blue marlin, white marlin, yellowfin, bluefin, blackfin and big eye tuna, along with false albacore, and wahoo numbers have been incredible, with mahi as close inshore as the nearest windmills off the coast of Virginia Beach. Trolling baits such as ballyhoo, Spanish mackerel, mullet or whole squid rigged natural or on

multicolored sea witches on wire or mono leaders can be just what the doctor ordered for incredible offshore sport fishing during this time of year. Ballyhoo come in various size options with large "horse ballyhoo" typically being the preferred size for blue marlin and big eye, and the smaller ones appealing to most other pelagic species. Don't be afraid to pull straight artificial lures as well. The beauty of offshore trolling is that you don't have to be perfect in your lure selection to be successful and it's okay to experiment. But I will say, "meat" is hard to beat. I once heard about some guys who caught a carp in a freshwater pond and they rigged it for trolling. The next day they caught a blue marlin on it out of Rudee Inlet.

Inshore and Bay Action

Bull red drum and cobia are available right now and can be caught by sight casting live eels, spot and croaker or bucktails to surface fish or by anchoring on shoals or near channel edges, or around the rocks of the CBBT islands. Use cut bait or live bait near the bottom on fish finder rigs to hook up with fish feeding in the area. Soaking a chum bucket can greatly increase your chances of drawing cobia to your location, but it also attracts sharks, skates and stingrays so keep that in mind.

Be sure to know your shark regulations if you decide to keep one for dinner. Black drum are also available and can be caught sight casting jigs or bucktails, or by anchoring using clam on the bottom. Anchoring and soaking bait works for tarpon on Virginia's Eastern Shore as well, but make sure you know where the channels are and that you have enough water under your boat to avoid underwater obstacles.

Many kayakers and fly fishermen have unlocked the code for tarpon and are seeing success along the barrier islands on the seaside of Eastern Shore. Tarpon will be here until near October when they will make the trip southward to Florida. Bad September storms can send them away even sooner.

Sheepshead and black drum can be found around bridge pilings throughout the bay using blue or fiddler crabs, shrimp or clams on tog head jigs fished close to the structure. Fish the down-current side to keep your bait in the strike zone longer.

Inshore fishing for bottom fish such as spot, croaker, pan trout, flounder, pufferfish, porgy, pompano, sea bass and sea mullet or roundhead is in full swing. Use high/low bottom rigs with strips of squid, bloodworm, fish bites, chunks of shrimp or mussels to catch a wide variety of these species.

As fall approaches, migratory species of bottom fish will head out and large schools of speckled trout, puppy drum, bluefish and striped bass will move down, joining resident fish already here. Gloucester has produced several "gator-sized" speckled trout in the 25" to 30" range on topwater lures and wake baits.

Freshwater Frenzy

Freshwater action has been amazing for anglers pursuing shell crackers, bluegill and other members of the sunfish family using worms, cut bait, wax worms, bread or crickets under bobbers. Beetle spins or small jigs with curly tails are excellent search baits.


Crappie, largemouth, smallmouth and spotted bass have been biting in low light. Topwater bites have been red-hot with Pop-R's, Devils Horses, Zara Spooks, and Whopper Ploppers. Try frogs or mouse baits in thick grass.

Rainy, overcast days = bonus bites! Tree tops and deep structure with plastic worms are key midday. The upper James and Chickahominy Rivers, Lake Smith and Lake Whitehurst are top destinations.

Striped bass, musky, gar, big catfish and pike hang around channels with shad. Carp can be targeted in spillways and shaded coves with corn, red wigglers or dough baits. For light gear, small streams offer great action on trout and smallmouth—try spinnerbaits, marshmallows or salmon egg powerbait.

(a) Featured Fish: Kingfish

Known by many names-roundhead, sea mullet, whiting, king whiting, king croaker-kingfish are a summer staple in Virginia and Carolina waters. Found from Florida to Maine, they spawn April-October and prefer shallow, sandy bottoms with current.

Use high/low rigs with squid, shrimp, fish bites or sand fleas. Surf anglers: let your bait drift until you locate fish, then switch to sinkers. Most kingfish are under 2 lbs but can reach 3 lbs and 23 inches.

Try this recipe:

Soak cleaned fish in saltwater (iodized) for 2 hours. In peanut oil heated to 375°F, fry until golden. Flip, repeat, and serve with your favorite sides. You can eat it like a croaker—right off the bone!

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The Norfolk State Spartans football program was established in 1938, although it did not consistently field a team until the mid-1950s. Initially an independent team, NSU joined its first conference, the Eastern Intercollegiate Conference, in 1953. Under the early coaching of Joe Echols, they won conference titles in 1957 and 1959.

The program's golden era occurred in the mid-1970s under the leadership of head coach Dick Price. A Norfolk native and NSU's track coach turned football expert, Price led the Spartans to an impressive three consecutive CIAA championships from 1974 to 1976. During his tenure, the team achieved a record of 62 wins, 41 losses, and 4 ties, earning him back-to-back CIAA Coach of the Year honors. Price's contributions to the program are commemorated by having the football stadium at NSU named in his honor.

From Division II to Division I: A Steady Ascent

After the CIAA years, Norfolk State's football program began to undergo significant evolution. From 1974 to 1996, they were a strong contender in NCAA Division II. In 1997, NSU moved up to Division I-AA (now known as FCS), starting as an independent team before joining the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) in 1999. This transition to the MEAC was a significant milestone but also presented challenges. Although there were moments of success, such as winning the MEAC championship in 2011 and making their first (and only) FCS playoff appearance that same year, the program struggled with consistency. Notably, NCAA sanctions resulted in the stripping of NSU's victories from 2009 to 2011, including the 2011 MEAC title.


Rivalries, Records, and Rebuilding

One of Norfolk State University's longeststanding rivalries is the "Battle of the Bay" against Hampton University. Since their first matchup in 1963, the series has been closely contested, with Norfolk State leading the series 30–28–1 as of 2024.

On the field, the late 2000s saw sporadic success, highlighted by an impressive 8–3 season in 2007. However, this was followed by years of inconsistency. From 2009 to 2019, the Spartans cycled through several coaches, struggled in the MEAC, and experienced more losing seasons than winning ones. The period from 2014 to 2022 under head coach



Dawson Odums brought some hope, but it was marked by middling performances, culminating in a disappointing 4–8 finish in 2024, which ultimately led to a change in leadership.











A New Era: Michael Vick Takes the Helm

A Homecoming for Hampton Roads On December 20, 2024, Norfolk State made headlines in the collegiate football world by naming NFL legend Michael Vick as its 19th head coach. The NSU Board's unanimous approval, followed by an official press conference on December 23, marked a significant turning point for the program.

A native of Newport News, Vick is returning to his roots as a Hampton Roads standout, now ready to revitalize his hometown team's fortunes. His hiring reflects a growing trend of elite NFL players taking on leadership roles in HBCU football, following in the footsteps of figures like Deion Sanders and Eddie George. At the press conference, Athletic Director Melody Webb highlighted Vick's ability to combine his star power with mentorship, describing him as an inspiration to student-athletes. Vick, visibly emotional, shared how "football has always been that safe place" for him and expressed his commitment to restoring Spartan pride.

While Vick has no previous experience as a collegiate head coach, he brings a wealth of life experiences as a Hall of Fame-bound Virginia Tech star, the No. 1 pick in the 2001 NFL draft, and a four-time Pro Bowl quarterback. His career has seen both incredible highs and serious lows, including a public legal battle and a stint in prison. He emerged from those challenges, later earning the title of NFL Comeback Player of the Year and returning to elite form on the field.



As Vick prepares to lead the Spartans into the 2025 season, expectations are high. The 2025 roster is undergoing changes, with a large class of incoming transfers and impressive recruits from National Signing Day. The MEAC schedule promises exciting matchups, including a highprofile game on October 30, 2025, against HBCU counterpart Delaware State, featuring DeSean Jackson, at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia.





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It's Been 25 Years Since Norfolk Adopted Mermaids,

and One of the Original Local Artists is Still Cranking Them Out

Norfolk native Georgia Mason didn't construct the city's first official mermaid.

"That was sculptor Kevin Gallup, hired by Norfolk in 2000 to fashion a female creature with a fin to represent itself to the world," says Mason, whose late sister bought one of the first Gallup mermaids. "She knew the Deckers."

Oh, the Deckers—Hampton Roads's first family of flair. Attorney Pete and wife Bess had visited Chicago and saw Cows on Parade, returning home with a plan to encourage home and business owners to place Gallup mermaids on their front lawns or sidewalks for all the world to see.

In November 1999, the Deckers staged a huge breakfast meeting at Nauticus, attended by 300 business and civic leaders, to announce the campaign. Using Gallup's and the city's design, Georgia, who had dabbled in ceramics, became one of the initial artists and has never stopped.

"Back then Norfolk wanted the mermaids to have a blank face and flat chest," she says. "But the public wanted more features, so if you go around town today, you see newer mermaids that look like women."

In fact, Georgia—whose studio is the one-car garage of her home on the Lafayette River in Norfolk's Roland Park neighborhood—has her mermaids all over the world.

"There are hundreds in Norfolk as well as Virginia Beach and other localities here, but also in Europe and the Far East." Every Norfolk Sister City, for instance, has one.

Georgia's signature design, which she makes today, has a Pocahontas-type face with long hair.

"One of my mermaids is actually in Kent, England, where Pocahontas is buried."

Why Mermaids?

According to Mermaids on Parade, a 2000 book on the project, they reflected "nautical and Norfolk themes, civic pride, and the diversity of the region." Indeed, no two are alike.

There's:


- Bay Mechanical's Maid of Lobster

- Willcox and Savage's Gliding Through the Bay

"I talk to the buyer, and we decide on themes and colors," says Georgia, who has epoxied suns, moons, butterflies, and other attachments to her ladies. Now in her 70s, Mason long ago stopped the messy work of casting the plexiglass molds.

"I have a boat builder friend in Norfolk who does that." And she doesn't deliver either.

The three in the garage this day awaited pickup by a tour boat operator in Florida.

"I take orders through my website, georgiamasonstudio.com."









A New Campaign?

What she would love to do, though, is repair ones she sees around Norfolk.

"Some are damaged or could use some fresh paint. The owners should call me."

Georgia recalls a few years ago, Norfolk considered moving on from mermaids to another symbol, but the marketing company they consulted wisely, she heard, said no.

"That would have been a terrible idea."

Now a quarter-century since Pete (who passed away in 2012) and Bess (still with us) convinced the city fathers and mothers to make mermaids Norfolk's calling card, a better idea might be to rev up a new campaign with a fresh look to represent a more modern time.

"Some people call Norfolk the Mermaid City," says Georgia, who says she still has the stamina to keep cranking out the 4-, 6-, or 10-foot-long fishy females from her cluttered but productive space.

"The public loves them."

Just as Uncle Pete predicted.





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Cocktail menu

01. Gordon's Cup

The Gordon's Cup is the nested Russian dolls of sour-style drinks. It's like if you put a <u>Gimlet</u> through the movie Inception. It takes the primary tension of its family of <u>cocktails</u>, and cubes it. Layered. Deeper. More.

02. Red Raider

Meet the Red Raider. The Red Raider cocktail is <u>bourbon</u>, lemon, pomegranate, and orange liqueur, and comes to us from an old printing of the Mr. Boston Official Bartender's Guide, where it's reportedly been since at least 1974.

03. Gold Rush

The Gold Rush is a classic, but its standard form can feel flat. A grapefruit peel—known as a "regal shake"—adds brightness and depth. It's an easy upgrade that transforms the drink.

04. Benton's Old Fashioned

Bacon-infused bourbon, this modern classic kicked off the fat-washed cocktail trend—rich, smoky, bold, and unforgettable.

05. Boulevardier

The Negroni's bolder cousin—bourbon, Campari, and sweet vermouth. Rich, bittersweet, and smooth. Hints of vanilla and citrus. A classic for any season.

rordon & Cmp

2 oz. gin

0.75 oz. lime juice

0.75 oz. simple syrup

3-4 cucumber slices

1-2 coin of lime skin, sliced thinly off the fruit

Salt

Pepper

Combine gin, lime, simple syrup, and cucumber slices, and lime coins in a cocktail shaker with ice. Shake hard for six to eight seconds and fine strain into a rocks glass over fresh ice. Add lime wedges and/or cucumber slices to the glass, sprinkle a pinch or two of salt and pepper on top, stir briefly to combine, and enjoy.

Red Raider

1.75 oz. bourbon
0.75 oz. lemon juice
0.5 oz. Cointreau
0.5 oz grenadine

Add all ingredients to a cocktail shaker and shake good and hard for six to eight seconds. Strain over ice into a rocks glass and garnish with an orange peel if you've got one, a lemon peel or wheel if you don't, or maybe just nothing at all.



Gold Rush

2 oz. bourbon
0.75 oz. lemon juice
0.75 oz. honey syrup
1 grapefruit peel, maybe 1" x 2",
taking care to get as little of the
white pith as possible

Add all ingredients, including grapefruit peel, to a cocktail shaker with ice. Shake hard over ice for 8 to 10 seconds, and strain into rocks glass over fresh ice.

Benton's Old Fashioned 2 oz. bacon-infused bourbon' 0.25 oz. maple syrup 2-3 dashes Angostura Bitters Add a large piece of ice to a rocks glass, add liquids, and stir for about 10 seconds. Express the oils of an orange peel over the top and place the peel in the drink as a garnish. e sec, cranberry, and lime





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


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


Chasing Charmon the Eastern Shore


