



#### Every Young Person Deserves The Opportunity To Thrive



- United Way Supports

  Quality childcare and early childhood education
- **Essential literacy skills**
- After school and summer enrichment opportunities
- College and career readiness
- Family engagement and support
- Central Boys and Girls Club offers after school mentoring, homework assistance, tutoring, and technology assistance for more than 200 students, ages 6-18.
- This year, 775 students depended on CIS BackPack Pals for food over the weekend. Another 509 received valuable encouragement and support from caring mentors.
- In county-wide 4-H Science and Agriculture programs, 9,514 students learned to put their **STÉM** skills to practical use.
- Boy Scouts helped 209 local boys learn valuable life skills, leadership, environmental stewardship, and self-reliance.
- The Partnership for Children served 376 children, from birth through age 5, with quality child care, school readiness, and early literacy programs.

Mentor/Mentee relationships can be powerful.

It had been a tough year for this 8<sup>th</sup> grader. She had recently been removed from the home by DSS, and was transferred from an Asheboro City School to a school in Randolph County. She had been working with the same Communities In Schools mentor since the 4<sup>th</sup> grade.

When she was asked how she felt about the move, her first question was whether her mentor could continue working with her in her new school. When she found out that yes, that would happen, she said "then I am okay with the move."

#### **United Way Helps People Gain**

- Knowledge and skills to manage income and savings
- Skills and education for good-paying jobs that can sustain a family
- Security through home-ownership
- Christians United Outreach Center Crisis Intervention Services offered
  14,805 people short-term assistance with food, clothing, and safe shelter, and
  helped with rent, transportation, and utility payments. CUOC also offered
  financial literacy classes to help clients learn to budget and manage their
  money.
- Guidance and help from The Salvation Army Financial Crisis Program
  helped 20,496 people avoid eviction, or avoid losing their water or electrical
  services.

When her work hours were temporarily cut, she could only make partial payments on her electric bill. She set up a payment plan, but missed a payment and received a disconnect notice.

In desperation, she reached out to NC 211 and was referred to CUOC and approved for short-term assistance. Her hours are back to normal now, and she is able to meet her financial needs on her own.

**CUOC** gave her the help she needed to get back on her feet and sustain her household without additional assistance.

#### **United Way Improves Access To**

- Healthy foods
- Safe opportunities for physical and social activity
- Quality health care
- Services helping the elderly remain active, independent, and safe
- In-home care and minor home-repair services from Regional Consolidated Services enabled 117 clients to continue living safely and independently in their own homes.
- Thanks to YMCA scholarships, 21 children experienced the joy of summer camp, and 298 people gained access to fitness activities and classes to improve their health.
- Meals, transportation, Medicare Options information and counseling, and respite Adult Day Care services at Randolph Senior Adults Association offered a better quality of life to 5,539 people and their families last year.

After receiving "Meals on Wheels" at home for two years, she transitioned to the congregate lunch program at the **Senior Adults Center**.



#### Communities That Are Prepared for Emergencies Can Build a Secure Future



#### **United Way Services Step in With**

- Help and hope
- Crisis hotlines and support
- Disaster relief and recovery
- The American Red Cross Disaster Team stepped in to provide disaster victims with emergency food, shelter, clothing, and medicines, and guide them through the months-long recovery process.
- As well as medical emergency and automobile accident responses, Ash-Rand Rescue & EMS personnel are certified in wilderness, swift-water, industrial, and high or low-angle rescue. Their response teams impacted 1,948 people this year.
- NC211 Crisis Hotline offers free and confidential local information on emergency counselings, disaster assistance, food health care, insurance, stable housing, employment services, veterans services, and family services.

When a tanker truck overturned, Ash-Rand Rescue & EMS was on site within 3 minutes, quickly assessing the scene and calling in the Asheboro and Seagrove Fire Departments for assistance.

After reassuring the driver, the three agencies organized a plan to first stabilize the truck, and then remove the driver from the tangled wreckage.

It took 2 ½ hours, but using struts, hydrolics, and hand tools, they were able to safely remove the driver and turn him over to Randolph EMS for further care.
