From the Principal

Celebrating 25 Years

Throughout 2025, our School community has gathered for a series of events to mark our 25th Anniversary. These celebrations have provided an opportunity to honour our history, recognise the people who have shaped our journey and look ahead to the future with optimism and ambition. Whether through assemblies, commemorative projects, performances, or special student activities, our anniversary year has highlighted the strength of connection and shared purpose that continues to define Peter Moyes Anglican Community School.



A particular highlight this year was Peter Moyes Day with a special service led by the CEO of AngliSchools, the Reverend Peter Laurence OAM, with several VIPs in attendance, including the School's Foundation Principal Mr Allan Shaw. This was followed by a Guinness World Record attempt for the greatest number of individuals wearing party hats at the same time. While we have yet to receive official confirmation, we comfortably passed the previous record of 1161 set by a school in the United Kingdom. The event was also captured on Channel Nine News, with former Head Girl Holly Edwards-Smith (Class of 2016) reporting.

Art Exhibition and Twilight Markets

One of the year's standout occasions was the Art Exhibition and Twilight Markets, held on Friday 21 November. Blessed with perfect weather and a festive atmosphere, guests enjoyed live music and dance performances alongside a captivating display of visual art. Market stalls hosted by alumni, staff, parents, and members of our wider community brought added colour and energy to the evening.

It was our largest event to date - both in scale and attendance - and we look forward to building upon what is quickly becoming our signature celebration. As always, the Twilight Markets highlighted what truly sets PMACS apart: a genuine sense of belonging and community spirit. My heartfelt thanks go to everyone who helped make the event such an outstanding success.

Introducing Cowan House

Peter Moyes Anglican Community School has seen remarkable growth over the past few years, with enrolments steadily increasing. To accommodate this growth, and to coincide with our 25th Anniversary celebrations, we were thrilled to announce the addition of a sixth House in time for the commencement of the 2026 school year. Following an extensive process, it was determined that our new House would be named in honour of Edith Cowan, a pioneering Western Australian leader. Cowan House reflects values of service, integrity and courage, values that align closely with the existing houses, namely Cuthbert, Durack, Florey, Hollows, and Lingiari. Final arrangements are being put in place for Cowan House to operate across Kindergarten to Year 9 in 2026, growing to Year 12 by the commencement of the 2029 academic year.

As you explore the following pages, I trust you will enjoy reading about the events, achievements and opportunities that have shaped this milestone year. I hope that the stories shared provide a sense of pride in our students, appreciation for our staff and gratitude for the families who support and strengthen our community. As always, I extend my sincere thanks to our Marketing Manager, Lauren Knapp, and her team for the wonderful work they do in bringing The Crest to life.

25 Dears of Service

In Conversation with Larry Parkes

As our 25th anniversary year comes to a close, we spoke with foundation staff member, Larry Parkes, to reflect on his time at Peter Moyes Anglican Community School since the day we first opened our doors.

Larry, you've been with Peter Moyes Anglican Community School since its inception. What drew you to the school in the first place?

I was part of the inaugural staff, and that in itself was incredibly special. Being part of something brand new, helping to shape the culture and traditions of the school, felt like, and was, a real privilege. I aligned strongly with the vision of our founding Principal, Allan Shaw, and Head of Primary, Michelle Ellis. It was a chance to build something meaningful from the ground up.

Your career path wasn't always in education. Can you tell us about your journey into teaching?

My first degree was in Commerce, majoring in Accounting & Finance. I started out in accountancy, but it didn't take long to realise something was missing. I found my passion in aquatics, working as a pool supervisor at the Terry Tyzack Aquatic Centre, and eventually launched my own swimming and lifesaving business. Teaching young athletes gave me a sense of purpose. I loved helping them grow in skill and mindset. That's what drove me into education.

What was your first role at PMACS?

I started teaching Year 2, some of the youngest learners in the school. It was a formative time - not just for the students, but for the school itself. Later, I moved to Year 6, teaching in an open-plan space with 64 students across two classes. It was a dynamic environment that required a lot of teamwork and creativity.



You've held a wide range of roles over the years. What are some of the highlights?

It's been a full and varied career. I've taught Humanities, Drama, PE, and Health Studies. I've served as Head of Hollows House for nearly a decade, Head of Year 12, Head of Health and PE, Acting Head of Technologies, and now Careers and Pathways Advisor, together with teaching Accounting and Finance and a Certificate II in Workplace Skills. Each role has offered new challenges and opportunities to grow.

You even spent a year away in Melbourne. What brought you back?

In 2021, I worked at Auburn High in Hawthorn East. It was a great experience, but PMACS has always felt like home. I returned the following year to take on the Careers and Pathways role, which has been incredibly rewarding - guiding students through subject selection, helping them explore apprenticeships, trades, university pathways, even international admissions.

Do you have a favourite memory from the early days of the school?

The commissioning day stands out. It was supposed to be picture-perfect - parents, students, and staff gathered under a the blue sky. But then a coastal dust storm rolled in. Sand whipped through the event, we could barely see! It was chaotic, but unforgettable. I still joke that Mindarie should be called 'Windarie'!

What's kept you inspired over 25 years at the same school?

Reinvention. PMACS is a place where growth and change are embraced. There aren't many organisations where you can evolve and be so well supported. Being given a new challenge isn't just an opportunity—it's a testament to the trust and belief others have in you.

Outside of work, how do you recharge?

I'm always on the move - swimming, running, playing golf, spending time with family and friends in Dunsborough, or taking the 4x4 off-road.

After 25 years, what does PMACS mean to you now?

It's more than just a workplace. It's a community, a place of purpose, and a platform for growth. Teaching here has never been static—it's been a journey of guiding others while continuing to move forward myself.




Our students and staff then worked throughout Term 4 to create contents for the 2025 time capsule to be buried for the next generation to discover in 2050.



Caring for Young Brains Over the Summer: A Message to Our Primary Families

As we approach the long summer holiday, many of us, children and adults alike, begin to feel the weight of a busy year. The human brain, weighing just 1.4 kilograms, is the most powerful and complex organ we possess. It drives our empathy, creativity, curiosity, and every small and large decision we make. Yet for something relatively small, it can feel extraordinarily heavy at the end of the school year. We are all feeling it, students, staff and parents too!

In schools, we see this often. A child who could solve problems quickly in March might hesitate a little more in November. Teachers who began the year full of energy may feel their minds buffering like a computer with too many tabs open. And as parents, you may notice your children becoming tired, a little foggy, or simply ready for a break. This is not a sign of weakness or lack of motivation. It is biology.

When the brain becomes overloaded, when learning, friendships, routines, growth, emotions and expectations all stack up, our minds begin to 'buffer.' We know what we want to do, but everything feels slower or out of reach. The brain is still willing; it's simply telling us it needs rest, care, and recalibration.

As we head into the summer holidays, this understanding becomes incredibly important. Your child's brain has worked hard this year. Growth has been constant, even when it was not visible. And just like us as adults, children need time to reset so they can return refreshed, curious, and ready for the year ahead.

So what can families do over the break to support healthy brain development and emotional wellbeing, without turning the holiday into more schoolwork?

1. Protect their sleep.

The number one ingredient for a healthy brain is rest. Young minds need consistent sleep routines even during holidays. Eight to ten hours of restorative sleep helps memory consolidation, emotional regulation, and growth. While late nights will inevitably happen, maintaining a predictable rhythm helps children feel settled and secure.

2. Keep them moving.

Movement is brain fuel. Summer offers endless opportunities: swimming, bike riding, climbing playgrounds, walking the dog, or simply running through the sprinklers. Physical activity boosts clarity, improves mood, and strengthens neural pathways. The more children move, the better they think.

3. Nourish their bodies.

Hydration and nutrition deeply influence learning and behaviour. Encourage children to drink water, enjoy fresh summer fruits, and participate in preparing simple meals. Healthy eating doesn't have to be complicated; it just needs to be consistent.

4. Give their minds space.

Just like a computer that freezes when too many tabs are open, children need to 'close tabs' too. Holidays are a perfect time for unstructured play, daydreaming, boredom, and slow mornings. These moments are not wasted time; they are when creativity, resilience, and imagination grow.

5. Build connection.

Time with family and friends, laughing, talking, and exploring, reduces stress hormones and strengthens mental health. Whether it's a board game, an afternoon at the beach, or cooking together, connection is one of the most powerful things you can offer your child.

6. Keep learning light and joyful.

A healthy brain thrives on curiosity. Reading together, visiting the library, exploring nature trails, playing strategy games, or letting your child help plan activities are all ways to keep their minds active without feeling like school.

7. Model balance.

Children learn from what they see. When they watch adults rest, prioritise wellbeing, enjoy hobbies, and take breaks, they learn that caring for themselves is important too.

As we head into the summer, I encourage all families to embrace balance, rest, play, connection, and gentle stretches of curiosity. A healthy brain is not achieved by doing more, but by caring for the extraordinary kilograms that make learning, relationships, and joy possible.

I wish you all a restorative, laughter filled, and memorable holiday ahead.

The Primary School Playbook

Introducing the Primary School Playbook

After two years of thoughtful work, reflection, and collaboration, Team Primary are delighted to share our new Primary School Playbook with you. This document captures our shared vision for wellbeing, belonging, teaching, and learning at our school, and outlines the approaches we believe will best support every child to thrive. The purpose of the Playbook is simple: to create clarity around how we teach and how students learn best, in a way that reflects our school's unique context and the individual needs of our students. It provides a transparent guide for staff, students, and families so that we are all working together toward the same goals, ensuring every child feels safe, connected, challenged, and supported in their learning.

Why a Playbook?

Throughout the development process, we revisited the purpose of schooling in the 21st Century, examined our core beliefs and practices, and ensured that the pedagogies we use are evidence based, innovative, and future focussed. We were guided by the reminder that "Schools, at their essence, are not mere institutions for delivering knowledge; they are crucibles of experiences, emotions, and stories that shape the lives of children. It is about forging connections, igniting curiosity, and nurturing the inherent goodness in each student." Understanding this helped us clarify the deep connection between wellbeing, belonging, teaching, and learning.

Wellbeing and Belonging

A strong sense of wellbeing and belonging sits at the heart of everything we do. When children feel safe, valued, and connected, they are ready to learn and able to thrive socially, emotionally, and academically. Prioritising relationships and connection is not optional, it is essential. When students know they are supported and understood, they develop confidence, resilience, and a genuine love of learning. This foundation ensures the conditions for achievement are firmly in place.

Teaching and Learning

Our approach to teaching and learning is grounded in the belief that students learn best when they feel connected, have a sense of belonging, and are active participants in their learning. Education today is not just about remembering facts. It is about developing the skills and dispositions young people need to navigate an ever changing world. This includes critical thinking, creativity, problem solving, collaboration, and emotional intelligence. To support this vision, learning experiences at our school are:

- intentional
- connected
- meaningful
- designed to support agency and ownership.

The three evidence based pedagogical approaches that are the backbone of our teaching practice include:

- 1. Play Based Learning and Intentionality
- 2. Explicit Teaching
- 3. Inquiry Pedagogies

These approaches allow us to meet curriculum requirements while creating engaging, purposeful learning opportunities that prepare students for their future.

Our Nine Belief Statements

Through a process of reflection and refinement, we identified nine belief statements that align closely with our School Strategic Plan, Learner Profiles, and the AngliSchools Vision for Learning. Our student needs and these beliefs guide every decision we make.

1. Self-Reflection and Continuous Growth - "Lifelong learning"

Self-reflection and continuous improvement are essential for fostering self-awareness, wellbeing, and a lifelong love of learning, which will ultimately assist in enhancing student outcomes.

2. Connection and Wellbeing - "Happy Kids Learn"

A learning environment built on kindness, compassion, and positive relationships, impacts confidence and wellbeing, focusing on prioritising that all students feel safe, supported, trusted and valued.

3. Student Agency - "Voice, Choice, Belonging"

Developing and maintaining student agency over their learning improves their sense of belonging and identity, and strengthens engagement and participation.

4. Positive Behaviour Support - "Kids do well if they can"

A whole school, evidence based positive behaviour approach, consistently applied, will enable all students to learn and thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.

5. Evidence based Teaching Pedagogies - "Engage, Explore, Apply"

Effective teaching engages and supports learners by integrating content, skills, and dispositions. Using a balanced and adaptable approach, including explicit instruction, play based learning and intentionality, and inquiry practices, students are provided with meaningful opportunities to deepen their understanding and apply their learning in authentic ways.

6. Partnerships - "It takes a village to raise a child"

Open and transparent communication, along with collaborative partnerships with parents, families and external stakeholders, enables us to work towards shared goals and supports students' educational journeys.

7. Technology and Learning - "Click with care, learn with purpose"

Technology enhances student learning when balanced with evidence based teaching practices, to complement, not replace, high quality teaching, and when used in a safe, responsible and ethical manner.

8. Data informed Teaching, Learning and Assessment - "Assessment with purpose, learning with power"

Using a range of formal and informal assessments, authentic data is gathered to inform differentiated teaching and learning, meeting the unique needs of each student. Providing timely, constructive feedback empowers students to understand their own learning journey, take ownership of their progress, and achieve their full potential.

9. Global Citizens - "Think big. Care deeply. Act wisely"


Nurturing students to become active, informed, and compassionate global citizens enables our learners to lead with empathy, take purposeful action, and contribute to a more equitable and sustainable future for all.

A Shared Vision Moving Forward

These belief statements have enabled us to develop a clear, shared vision and align our practices across the Primary School. Through deep collaboration and reflection, we have embedded the TROPIC learner attributes, Thinker, Resilient, Open, Prepared, Interdependent, and Communicator, into our daily practice.

The Primary Playbook is more than a document; it is a commitment to excellence. It ensures consistency, clarity, and shared purpose across all classrooms. It promotes a growth mindset and empowers our staff to work together as a unified team. Most importantly, it ensures that every decision we make continues to support our students' wellbeing, belonging, and learning. A recent meta-analysis published in Educational Psychology (2024) examined 47 longitudinal studies and found that student motivation and engagement are deeply reciprocal with academic achievement. In other words, when students feel motivated, their learning outcomes improve, and when they experience success, their motivation grows stronger. This finding aligns with the principles of Visible Learning and the broader body of high-impact teaching strategies which underpin all that we do. Excellence is not the result of chance, but of deliberate practices that nurture motivation, confidence, and clarity in learning. At PMACS, we focus on cultivating a culture where students are motivated to learn and empowered to believe in their capacity to succeed.

As reports are released, this is also a time to celebrate the successes of your children, both big and small. Acknowledging effort and progress helps students along their learning journey. Discuss what went well, and, when there has been some time to reset, set goals for the future. Express pride in perseverance.

Strong family connections and simple routines are proven drivers of excellence every day. The Christmas break offers many natural opportunities for these connections and routines. Reading together, taking a walk in nature, cooking a family recipe, playing board games, and sharing stories, whether remembered or imagined, are all simple ways to spend time together. These activities, or whatever activities your family is most comfortable doing, create space for conversation and curiosity, encouraging us to notice, wonder, and explore the world in ways that feel natural and enjoyable. The simple fact is that when young people feel engaged and inspired by their experiences, their sense of motivation grows. Just last week in a Year 8 English class, my students were deeply invested in a discussion about whether it is ever ethically acceptable to steal. Their curiosity and willingness to wrestle with complex ideas (in the second last full week of term, just quietly) remind us that young people crave meaningful dialogue; they want to be heard and to express ideas about the world around them.

We extend our warmest wishes to all parents and students. May this Christmas break be a blessed one and may it be filled with laughter, shared stories, and the simple joy of being together. Whether you're exploring the outdoors, playing games, or enjoying a quiet moment with a good book, we hope this season brings rest, renewal, and plenty of memorable conversations, the kind that spark curiosity and strengthen bonds. We look forward to welcoming everyone back in the new year, refreshed, recharged, and ready to continue the journey of learning together.




































Design & Technologies




cup prototype Shows the inside of the cup and where the seeds would go

We thank everyone who attended and contributed to making the evening such a memorable success. We look forward to welcoming you back next year!

























This year, Winter has also been training with the West Australian Ballet in Maylands, having successfully auditioned for their Junior Masterclass Training Program.



She placed 2nd on floor, 3rd on beam , 4th on bars and came 4th overall WA state champion in her age division.


