

And Big Goal Accelerator Project UPDATE

The UpliftHER initiative has been giving clubs a boost to get towards the BIG GOAL. Thank you to the clubs that have participated by either sharing SIA's social media posts, or holding your own project and posting about it, while incorporating the hashtag **#SoroptimistUpliftHER**. and submitting the project as a Big Goal Accelerator Project.

There are two months left, March and May for you to participate. The March initiative will be *Single Mothers* and May will be *Period Poverty*.

The suggested projects for *Single Mothers* include providing financial assistance for childcare for single moms enrolled in an education program. Unfortunately, quality childcare can be extremely expensive. Consider offering support for a single mom who wasn't selected to receive your Live Your Dream Award, but who you know would benefit from this support. Alternatively, if you live in an area where childcare options are free or low cost, you could provide a grant for another purpose for single moms. Perhaps an education award or scholarship or paying exam fees on her behalf. And be sure to complete a Big Goal Accelerator Report if you do participate along with sharing about your project with hashtag #SoroptimistUpliftHER.

If your club already has a project that is related to one of these obstacles but is not focused on access to education or economic empowerment, you are welcome to share about it during the appropriate month and quarter using the **#SoroptimistUpliftHER** hashtag but just don't report it as a Big Goal Accelerator Project.

Projects are eligible if they:

	EITHER	
Support the Dream Programs (Live Your Dream Awards or Dream It, Be It)	or	Support Big Goal Accelerator Projects (support access to education with the goal of economic empowerment and focus on our target population of women and girls who face obstacles such as poverty, violence, or teen pregnancy)
	AND	

Are a fully managed Soroptimist project (partnerships are permitted but must be delivered primarily as a Soroptimist project).

LIVE YOUR DREAM

Hello and Happy New Year to all!

All clubs in our region, please give yourselves a huge round of applause for your Live Your Dream campaign results. Not only did we have 100% club participation AGAIN, we blew away our goal of 199 awards (which was a 10% increase over last year) and gave away a total of 214 awards this year! That represents a whopping 18% increase year over year.

I'd like to give a shout out to just a few of our biggest contributors that got us to that goal:

SI Whitefish, MT: 20 awards SI McMinnville, OR: 11 awards SI Coeur d'Alene, ID: 10 awards

This secures our ability to give out all the SIA-funded awards in our region. Six at the \$3,000 level and one for \$5,000. This is in addition to 10 awards funded by our Northwestern region at the \$1,500 level. The region judging is currently in progress, and I will be in touch with all winning club chairs in early March to invite your applicants to attend the region conference luncheon on Saturday, April 26th. DREAM IT, BE IT

"Be the Person You Needed When You Were Younger"

I attended my neighbor's funeral this week. We live in a small, tight-knit community and we knew when we moved in that our neighbors were "those people" – super engaged in their community and known by all. They operated the family's funeral home business for 39 years (just imagine the lives they've touched), the husband was a past fire chief (a position he passed to his son-in-law), and their adult children work ski patrol in the winter. It wasn't until Peg passed, however, that I realized HER indelible impact on our small community – she was instrumental in starting our annual 4th of July "Pignic" roast, the annual Christmas stroll, and our first food bank, in addition to countless years volunteering at our annual community celebration – the Creamery Picnic. In 1980, the local newspaper ran an article on her, which started with the quote: "This woman has made her corner of the world brighter by lighting not one, but many 'little candles.'"

Dream It Be It is our opportunity to light "many little candles" in our communities. Whether conducting one workshop on a weekend, or a series of workshops, DiBi allows us to reach young women at a very impressionable age – the age when they start to lose interest in math and science (15); the age when girls start experiencing cyberbullying and may begin to self-harm (10-14); the age when girls are twice as likely as boys to become depressed (13). This is also the age they start thinking about their future, considering who they want to be as an adult, and making decisions that will put them on their future path.

DiBi isn't just another SIA program. It isn't just another metric for us to hit each club year. It isn't just "one more thing" we have to think about and do. It's our opportunity to be the person that many of us needed when we were young. It's our opportunity to light many little candles. And the added bonus – we don't have to recreate the wheel or do it by ourselves. SIA gives us the tools and we get to work with our Soroptimist friends!

Please join us at Valley River Inn in Eugene, OR April 24- 27, 2025. Your NWR DiBI Committee will be presenting a special workshop to support our clubs in successfully completing their DiBi program. Come to learn, share, and have some fun!

Are we, as members, exhibiting Gracious Space...a reminder

At District Meetings we learned that Gracious Space is a spirit and setting where we invite differences and learn in public. It was very well received, and I am happy to see we will have part 2 at Region Conference.

For our new members, or those who were not able to attend the district meeting in October, Gracious Space was customized by The Ritz Bits specifically for our needs. In case you didn't know, The Ritz Bits are the region's "rules committee" and are made up of past region governors.

Gracious Space creates a foundation for building a space of belonging for a diverse group of people to engage in deep listening and shared learning in a time of complexity and change. Think of Gracious Space as a "container" that holds a club or a team with diverse ideas, perspectives, experiences, and people. This club/team is connected to you as a member, and your role within the space is to be inclusive and proactive and to use tools and methods to create better outcomes for your and others' member 'experiences: engagement, learning, innovation, decision making and retention.

There are four elements of creating Gracious Space: Spirit, Setting, Inviting Differences and Learning in Public. Ask yourself if you embrace the following:

Spirit:

 How do you show up? Gracious Space has many elements that we embody, such as welcoming, compassion, curiosity and humor.

Setting:

- What makes a welcoming space?
 - There is physical space. For example: what does the room look like? Is there natural light, etc.
- What makes you feel comfortable in a group setting?
 - The approach equals the goal. Ask yourself what the setting conveys to the group.

• Invite Difference:

 Seek and be open to the "other" because we can't know everything, and people are different. And it's good to remember that we are each the "other" to someone else.

Learn in Public:

- Be open to possibilities. Creating a space that encourages learning and growth is critical.
- Listening more, judging less.
- Ask questions.
- Be open to possibilities.
- Create a space that encourages
- Take risks
- Admit and learn from mistakes.
- Share learning.
- Receive and give feedback.
- Apologize and repair.
- Be (a bit) vulnerable.
- Don't be so hard on yourself.
- Choose to be open-minded and welcome diverse opinions.
- This behavior grows within us and can be nurtured through practice.

And the answer is?

While we exhibit some of these elements, we can do better. Let's all work to increase our awareness of what we say, react to and how we interact with each other.

Remember, even when a disparaging comment is whispered, or eyes rolled, others hear it and see it and how disappointing it is to witness, and that truly is not who we are, or who we want to be.

What Makes a Good Photo?

We're looking for high-quality photos that effectively capture the impact of Soroptimist's programs. Here are some tips to help your submissions stand out:

- High Resolution: Please submit clear, high-resolution images. These will be
 used for print and online publications, so quality is key! Tip: High-resolution
 images are typically larger than 2 MB and the best quality images are 300 DPI
 (dots per inch). Check the properties of your image file.
- Good Lighting: Ensure your subjects are well-lit—natural lighting works best.
 Avoid overly dark or bright photos that hide important details.
- Capture Positive Moments in Action: Show the impact of Soroptimist's work
 with dynamic photos that highlight real moments of empowerment and joy.
 Focus on the women and girls we serve, not just club members, and capture
 how our programs make a difference.
- Diversity: We encourage you to feature the diverse women and girls we serve in your photos.

One of my first meetings as a Soroptimist included a presentation by a woman who was a survivor of domestic violence and shared her story. I will never forget the picture painted by her words ..." after he had beaten me and thrown me across the room by my hair, I felt my scalp slide down towards my eyes. My scalp had become loosened from my skull."

Imagine if we never had to hear this story. Imagine if there was a way we could contribute to prevent this from happening again. Imagine if there was life without violence.

Now let's stop imagining and start doing. You **know** there are ways that your club alone or in partnership can create or contribute to a project that addresses this important crisis.

We have LOTS of grant money to provide. Just make a call, we'll walk you through the process, fill out and submit your grant application before the deadline of November 15, 2025...easy. This money should not be sitting in a bank account...it should be used to help women survivors so we can actually Imagine a Life Without Violence. Feel free to reach out to me or committee representatives Sharron King (District 1), or Victoria Gabaldon (District 4) for assistance.

Applications are available on the NWR website, or I can send one. In closing, I will now overwhelm you with resources to explore. Looking forward to seeing you at the next meeting or talking you through your project.


Thank you again for using ZEFFY for your new member registrations! Remember, as of July 1, 2025, all dues payments and new member registrations should be made through Zeffy.



County to install anti-human trafficking signs

Plans to challenge other jurisdictions to follow suit

PORT ANGELES — Clallam County will be installing human trafficking prevention signs in an effort to make an impact on the

The poster-sized signs will include nine different languages and be placed inside the county's 79 bathroom stalls, according to a county commissioners' agenda item. The signs also address forced labor.

The languages were chosen because there is reason to believe they align with individuals who are most at risk of being trafficked, county Prosecuting Attorney Mark Nichols told the commissioners during the Jan. 13 work session.

The signs were co-developed by three anti-trafficking organizations and have been used by other governmental organizations, Nichols said.

"They cherry picked those foreign languages translations that they thought would be best to include based on upon the data," he added.

Washington state is a hotbed for the recruiting, transportation and sale of people for labor, according to the state Office of the Attorney General (OAG).

According to the National Human Trafficking Hotline, 367 people were involved in human trafficking in Washington state in 2023

Some of the factors that contribute include the state's international border with Canada, abundance of ports, vast rural areas and dependency on agricultural workers, attorney general's office said.

Clallam County's includes many of those features, indicating human trafficking is likely a problem "probably at an unknown level," Nichols said.

"This would be something the organization can do tangibly to help combat human trafficking, which is a crime that is believed by many to be much more prevalent than we know and understand," he said.

The idea originated after Nichols gave a human trafficking presentation to the Soroptimist International of Port Angeles Jet Set club in November.

"One of our initiatives is to bring awareness to human trafficking," club member Deb West said.

During the question-andanswer period, former Clallam County auditor and soroptimist member Patty Rosand asked about the possibility of getting anti-trafficking signs installed in the county, specifically near the auditor's office where people apply for marriage licenses.

"For Mark, it was like a light bulb went on," West said.

Soon after, Nichols brought the idea to the commissioners and the process was set in motion.

Nichols said the hope is that the signs will trigger more reports about human trafficking.

If even one person takes advantage of this resource, "then the entire campaign would have been worthwhile," Nichols said during a November work session.

The signs will cost the county just less than \$5,000.

In addition, Nichols said he plans to investigate the possibility of installing Braille signs, based on suggestions by Commissioner Mark Ozias, and panic buttons. He also plans to reach out to other local governments to challenge them to do something similar, in recognition of January's status as National Human Trafficking Prevention Month.

West said the soroptimists would be happy to lend support to that cause as well.

For those who are interested in learning more about human trafficking and how it affects the Peninsula, Nichols will give a free public presentation at 12:35 p.m. Jan. 30 at the

Peninsula College Little Theatre, 1502 E. Lauridsen Blvd. The presentation also can be viewed on Zoom.
