#### We're Here For You!

ometimes school can be really challenging, but don't let that get you down. Whether you don't know where to start for a creative writing piece, are having trouble with Algebra, or need help studying for a Spanish quiz, you can succeed. Austin Prep's peer tutoring program covers a wide range of subjects. We offer tutoring for writing, math, Spanish, French, Mandarin, and Latin. If you're struggling in a class, or just need some help understanding something, the tutors are always willing to help.

#### **Writing Tutoring**

Run by Mrs. Putney, the writing tutors aid students in a number of ways. They can look over essays or creative writing and offer critiques and advice. Writing tutors can also serve as editors who can look for grammar mistakes. To meet with a writing tutor, visit the lower library on Days 2 or 4 during Cougar Block. If you have a study hall, tell or email your study hall teacher so they know where you are and don't mark you as absent. Just go up to one of the tutors who

are available, tell them what you need help with, and start working.

#### **Math Tutoring**

Run by Mrs. Pliskaner, the math tutors can help on any type of math up to calculus. To meet with a math tutor, visit the lower library on Days 2, 5 or 7 during Cougar Block. If you have a study hall or a club, email the teacher who runs it so they know where you are. After you sit down with a math tutor, tell them what math class you are in and what you need help with. If you need help with a specific assignment, the tutor will walk you through it, see what parts you don't understand, and explain the topic step by step. Math tutors can be very helpful because they can offer one on one teaching and strengthen your understanding of what you learned in class.

#### **Language Tutoring**

To meet with a language tutor, email Mrs. Sherry and whoever teaches your world language class about needing a tutor. Your teachers will reach out to one of the language tutors and look for a classroom to meet in



and a Cougar block where both you and the tutor are available. You can either meet them every cycle, or just when you need help. Just email your tutor so they know how often you want to meet. Language tutors will aid you with grammar, vocabulary, studying, or anything else that you might need. The language tutoring program is run by Mrs. Sherry.

#### **Cougar Academic Training**

Cougar Academic Training, or CAT, is a program that helps students in grades 6 through 9 with skills like studying, time management, and organization. It is run by Mrs Choate. It meets on Days 1 and

5 in the lower library during Cougar Block.

#### **Come Join Us!**

To become a math, writing, or world language tutor, email the head of the program and tell them that you are interested. Remember to say which days you are available to tutor. For Cougar Academic Training, teachers and advisors recommend Juniors and Seniors to become tutors, They receive their applications in September of every year. Tutoring is such a valuable tool for students to use, and genuinely helps students improve. If you want to sign up, there is no better time than now!

# Race Amity Trip

or the first time, the National Center for Race Amity held a nationwide conference in Atlanta. The conference consisted of a dinner Thursday night, speakers and breakout rooms throughout Friday, and a tour of the MLK monuments in downtown Atlanta on Saturday. Six Austin Prep students were chosen to attend the trip: Jack Sweenev '24, Jav Voica '24, Amelia Amadin '26, Grace Ditchfield '26, George Mamakos '26, and Aidan O'Neill '26. The group was led by Dr. William Driscoll, the Dean of Faculty and graduate of Austin's class of '89. In his words, "The students for this trip were selected because they were active in providing service for the community and were nominated by faculty members."

One of the key moments of the trip was the award ceremony dinner, held on the opening night at a 1900's tea house in downtown Atlanta. The awards were created by the National Center for Race

Amity in 2013 to recognize and honor individuals who have demonstrated an exceptional commitment to advancing access and equity in society through interracial partnerships. The Medal of Honor recipients included: Kentucky basketball coach and college legend, John Calipari; founder of Wayfarer foundation and renowned billionaire, Steve Sarowitz: Fortune 500 and management consultant and long time social activist, Robert C. Henderson; and bestselling author and renowned social activist, Debby Irving. Austin students were able to meet all the recipients and network with them as well. The award winners provided the students with valuable information and insight as they make their way through life and continue to college.

Though the group participated in a lot of fun events, attendee Grace remembers, "My favorite part of this trip was going around Atlanta and getting to see all the history there.













We got to visit Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s house and learn about his family life while he was younger. We also went into the Martin Luther King Museum and not only learned about King, but also people such as Rosa Parks and Gandhi." The students not only saw MLK's house and surroundings, but learned about his teachings and the movements he started. As well as learning about Dr. King, the students learned the true meaning of race amity and how to apply it to both their community as well as school life. Dr. Driscoll recounts his most memorable part of the experience as follows; "The most memorable event for me was observing the artifacts in the King Center, especially the Nobel Peace Prize; specifically, I was impressed with how students responded to that, and seeing students soak up all that the King Center had to offer."

There are plenty of ways to continue the legacy set

forth by these leaders. Dr. Driscoll encourages students; "My advice for interested students is to participate in active service opportunities that make a difference in the community." Beyond Austin, Dr. Driscoll urges students to go further in their quest to make a difference. He states, "The best step forward is to pay attention to the Race Amity Summer Arts Festival, which is a much larger opportunity for students to engage. It's located in Boston so it's easier to send a larger delegation from Austin and involve more students. They can also visit the website and see additional ways to get involved there." Finally, Grace encourages, "I would definitely recommend this trip to kids next year. It was a very fun experience, but also a learning experience. I hope that this trip continues so other students get to have the chance to have the fun that I did, and to learn more about Race Amity and the community."



Hopefully, you have gotten to know Mr. Iapicca a bit better by reading this spotlight. If you see him in the hallway today, stop and say hello!







Overall, this activity was very successful and it was a great representation of Unitas and Caritas, as the students got to engage with others' projects and have curated discussions.

#### Freshmen "Gross Me Out!"

very year, the freshman class looks forward to the annual "Gross Me Out!!" contest, run by the Austin Authors club. This club usually submits articles and creative writing pieces on Austin Prep's news site, "The Legend". The contest was started around 5 years ago, and then evolved into a schoolwide contest for the freshman. The freshmen were tasked to write a horror short story, which included gruesome details and the abundance of adjectives. Mrs. Putney described the project as, "not

just a fun Halloween activity, but also a chance for students to practice using sensory details and figurative language in their writing." Some previous winners have even had leadership positions in the school's writing club because of the contest. The finalists

and winners of the contest are published in the school's literary magazine, Tolle Lege. All in all, this contest is an excellent example of Unitas, as it brings the freshman class together over their short stories.

### **Honors Trigonometry/Geometry Robots**

he Trigonometry/ Geometry Honors math class participated in an engaging and unique project that let students showcase their knowledge on the material: The "Robot Project." Students were tasked to create a robot made from various rectangular prisms, a cone, and a sphere made of things ranging from

toilet paper or paper towel rolls to styrofoam balls and cones. First finding the surface area of each body part, then assembling the robot with duct tape. The trick was, once you added the areas together, that number would be the amount of aluminum foil you needed to cover your tin man. However, the students had to use the foil

without running out or having any left over. Math teacher Ms. Brewer remarked, "I really enjoy the Robot Project because it takes what we are learning in class, and lets students express their creativity, while showing their mastery of area and surface area." After building the robot, there were reflection questions that varied based

on the results of the project. Some questions included, "What was the hardest shape to form, and why?" and "Did you have enough foil to cover your tin man? Why or why not?" Ultimately, this project helped students improve at calculating area and surface area while also strengthening their partner communication skills.

I wonder what happened to them?


