

103nd Annual Fair

The Barber County Fair Association took great care in planning the Fair.

We wish to express our appreciation to the people in Barber County and the public in general for the dedication to the County Fair since 1919.

The first Fair Association was formed in 1919, and Jacob Achenbach donated the land to build a racetrack and fair buildings. June 10-12, 1920 was the 1st Barber County Fair in Hardtner. Many community fairs were held prior to and following this date.

In 1928, a disastrous storm damaged the Hardtner area including the fairgrounds. This led to the stockholders deciding not to host a fair that year.

In 1935, 4-H Clubs formed in Barber County. That year due to the “drought and weather conditions” the Barber County Fair was postponed. However, the Medicine Lodge Community Fair Association invited all including 4-H members to participate in their community fair.

In 1936, new exhibit halls were built and the dedication of 20 acres set aside for the Fairgrounds use. Fairs have been held on this site continuously until 2020. Due to public health concerns, the Fair Board hosted only a 4-H & FFA Showcase in 2020 and postponed the full Barber County 100th Fair to 2021.

All these county fairs were only possible with the support of the business community and many volunteers.

We hope you will join the legacy of exhibitors and volunteers that have built the Barber County Fair in Hardtner on the land donated by Jacob Achenbach.

Our thanks and congratulations go to the FFA and 4-H Clubs of Barber County, who have played a large part in making this one of the best fairs.

GENERAL FAIR RULES

1. The Executive Committee shall make final decisions regarding all questions or matters that arise during the fair.
2. All bills against the Association shall be made in detail and bills contracted during the fair, or in preparation thereof, must be certified by the officer on whose order the service and material was furnished and must be signed and approved by the president and secretary before an order shall be drawn for the same.
3. The president, secretary, treasurer, and all superintendents shall have charge of the fairgrounds during the week of the fair and will assign to all departments their places, have control of the stalls, and collect all fees.
4. No immoral or indecent exhibitions will be permitted in or upon the grounds. Nor should any person within the Association grounds be allowed to set up any institution, devices, or things for gambling purposes. Any person found violating the rules shall forfeit his, her, or their right to continue such business and shall be liable to immediate expulsion with his, her, or their effects belonging to such business from the Association grounds.
5. Complaints: Any complaint regarding eligibility or adherence to the rules must be made in writing. \$100 cash or a certified check must accompany a written protest form. The fee will be forfeited if the Fair Board Executive Committee cannot substantiate the complaint, and half will go to the Fair Board, and half will be awarded to the person(s) that were the subject(s) of the complaint.
6. In case of inclement weather, any portion of the program may be postponed or omitted, and the fair continued at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

OPEN CLASS ENTRY RULES

1. Competition is open to the world. All classes are open to all ages unless otherwise stated in specific division rules. 4-H members will not be allowed to exhibit open class entries in the same division they are exhibiting in 4-H. If eligible, members must exhibit in the 4-H division.
2. All exhibitors must get an exhibitor number from the Extension Office (620) 886-3971 or at the fair office on July 25, 2024. Entry tags are available at the Extension Office for those wishing to start paperwork ahead of time.
3. All animals and articles exhibited for premiums must be entered in their proper departments, with

exhibitor and class numbers on the tags, by entry time.

4. Entry Time:

a. By 9:00 A.M. all open class livestock, rabbits & poultry must be in place. Livestock entries must be completed by noon on Friday. Entries not completed by noon will not be allowed to exhibit.

b. By 11:30 A.M. all other open class entries must be in place.

5. Entries will be released at 4:00 p.m., the last day of the fair.

6. All entries **must remain on display until designated release time or premium will be forfeited.** On Sunday, no vehicles are allowed on the grounds before 4:30 P.M. and **all entries must be removed from the buildings by 5:00 P.M.**

7. List age division on Entry Tag

8. **Open Class Age Division; Age on January 1st Juniors or Youth - up to 16 years**

Adult - 17 thru 64

Senior Citizen - 65 & older

9. **Everyone may not enter more than one entry per class unless otherwise stated.**

10. Premium will be paid, and ribbons awarded only for the top three entries.

11. Each division will be awarded a champion and reserve champion ribbon. Each department will be awarded a grand and reserve grand champion ribbon. No extra premiums will be paid for these ribbons.

12. When there is no competition, items will be awarded 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or no premium according to merit of the article. No premium will be awarded when the item is unworthy.

DEPARTMENT A - LIVESTOCK

See page 40 for Livestock Health Requirements

1. To be eligible to compete for prizes, every animal in breeding class must be recorded or accepted for record in its respective breed herd book. All livestock shall be subject to veterinary inspection.

2. If required, exhibitors must furnish satisfactory evidence that breeding stock is what the term implies.

3. Every animal competing for prizes must be owned by the exhibitor and entered accordingly.

4. The herd book, name and number of each animal entered for premium must be stated on application.

5. Application for entry of herds must state name and number of animals comprising such herd. No substitutes can be made without notice of and consent of the superintendent.

6. No animal shall be allowed to run at large upon the grounds.
7. All care will be taken of stock or articles for exhibition or otherwise brought upon the grounds, but the Association will not be responsible for loss or damage.
8. Each livestock superintendent will supervise the stock exhibiting at the proper time.
9. Exhibitors of stock will be required to keep their stalls open from 9:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. during the exhibition.
10. The Fair Board reserves the right to remove any exhibitor or animal in case of abuse or neglect of livestock.
11. Awards will be given by a qualified judge. The judging in this department will be based upon the merits of the exhibits, whether it be one or more entries.
12. Pee wee Division livestock is for non-4-H youth who were not yet 7 as of January 1st of the current year. Pee wee classes will not receive premium money. They will receive ribbons only.

- D. The bucket calf will be judged by conference method, based on:
 - 1. What the individual learned about caring for and raising the calf.
 - 2. Showing according to either beef or dairy guidelines, with emphasis on how much the individual learned and can do without help. However, parental guidance is encouraged.
 - 3. The general health of calf and knowledge of individual in health-related areas.
 - 4. Dairy or beef quality of calf should not be considered since purchase is not made on that basis.

Jellies are made from the juice of the fruit.

4-H & FFA GENERAL RULES

(Read Carefully)

- 1. A sign-up sheet with Pre-entries for all 4-H Building exhibits at the fair will be due on July 9, 2024. This sheet will be mailed to all 4-H and FFA members. Pre-entries for all livestock will be due in the Extension Office by July 9, 2024, with entry cards filled out. Entry cards may not be changed for any reason at the fair (i.e., ownership). Non-Livestock entry labels and cards will be given when pre-entries are dropped off and need to come to the fair with the exhibits or will be mailed by request.**
- 2. All entries must be in place by 10:00 A.M. on Friday of the fair and will be released at 4:00 P.M. on Sunday. No vehicles will be allowed on the grounds before 4:30 P.M. Removal of an entry prior to the official release time on the final day of the Fair will result in that exhibitor forfeiting all placings, prizes, money, and awards for all their entries and the right to participate in any other Fair contests or events. Exemptions for special circumstances will be considered with a petition to the Fair Board Executive Committee *prior to removal*.**

3. **All entries need to be removed from the 4-H Building by 5:00 P.M. Clean-up of all areas will begin at 5:00 P.M.**
4. All exhibits of outstanding quality, except in the Livestock Division, will be designated by a State Fair sticker as eligible to be entered in the Kansas State Fair. Members must be 9 years of age, as of January 1 of the current year, or older to exhibit at the State Fair. **State Fair pre-entries are due by August 12th and can be made at the fair office.**
5. Exhibits may be made only in project areas in which members are enrolled. If a member is exhibiting in a project for 4-H, they may not enter that department in Open Class.
6. 4-H club members will exhibit only those products made or produced by them in the current year, except livestock exhibits where ages and dates are given in the class rules.
7. Prize ribbons and prize money will be awarded according to merit when only one entry is made per class. A purple ribbon will not be awarded to a red ribbon exhibit just because it is the only entry in a class.
8. **Complaints: Any complaint regarding eligibility or adherence to the rules must be made in writing. \$100 cash or a certified check must accompany a written protest form. The fee will be forfeited if the Fair Board Executive Committee cannot substantiate the complaint, and half will go to the Fair Board, and half will be awarded to the person(s) that were the subject(s) of the complaint.**

4-H AND FFA LIVESTOCK

- A. Dress Code will be mandatory for all livestock shows (this includes Poultry and Rabbits) and Round Robin: Collared Shirt, Pants, and Closed-toe Shoes or Boots. Any exhibitor that fails to meet the dress code will be dismissed from their class without receiving a placing. Exceptions can be granted in advance by contacting the County Extension Office. Junior Superintendents handing out ribbons in the show ring need to follow dress code.
- B. Exhibitors must complete their class and receive a placing to be eligible for the Premium Sale. If an entry is dismissed for any reason prior to the completion of the class and receiving a placing, that entry will not be eligible for the Premium Sale.
- C. Members exhibiting livestock shall accompany their exhibits and care for them. Failure without just cause on the part of the exhibitor to show their own animal ***in all classes (including showmanship)*** will bar them from participation in any award. The

exhibitor may have another member assist them provided it meets with the approval of the Fair Board.

D. In Beef, Swine and Sheep projects, ***only two entries may be made in any one class.*** Two market animals per breed may be entered by one exhibitor. **Because there are no breed classes, meat goat exhibitors may enter up to 4 head in the market goat division.** In the Bucket Calf project, only one calf per 4-H'er. All livestock, except horses, dogs and hand pets, must be at the Barber County Fair for the fair's duration.

E. If a livestock exhibitor has more than one entry in a class, the other animal may only be shown by another Barber County 4-H or FFA member.

F. All livestock may be inspected by a veterinarian at weigh in and all animals showing symptoms of disease will be promptly excluded.

G. **All 4-H and FFA members with livestock are required to keep their stalls open from 9:00 am to 7:00 pm. For stalling livestock other than cattle, there is a maximum of two head per pen. Cattle will not be allowed to leave the barn for tie-outs before 7:00 pm each night of the Fair. Any exhibitor found to have violated this rule and removed cattle from their stalls before 7:00 pm will forfeit their prize money and be deemed ineligible to participate in the Premium Sale.**

H. Exhibitors are required to clean out their stalls. Each club is required to have their stalls inspected by a fair board member on Sunday evening. If the stalls are not cleaned (hay, feed, manure, trash, etc.) and deemed acceptable by a member of the fair board, the individual(s) will have their premium check(s) withheld by the fair board until the stall areas are cleaned.

I. **Market and breeding beef, swine, sheep, and goats must receive a county ear tag, scrapie tag or have a permanent tattoo at, or before, spring tag-in to be eligible to show at the Barber County Fair. Registration tattoo verification is for breeding beef, swine, and goats only. Livestock identified with registration tattoos must have registration papers available for inspection.**

J. All market lambs showing at the county fair must be slick shorn within a week of the county fair.

K. Swine and Sheep entries will be subject to breed classification standards by the specie Superintendents and County Agent prior to classes being formed and posted. Breed standards are posted on the KSU Animal Sciences & Industry Youth Programs web page: www.youthlivestock.ksu.edu.

- L. No paints, dyes, powders, adhesives, or glues are allowed on beef, sheep, swine, or goats. Each exhibitor must groom his or her own animal and may use only the assistance of an immediate family member (mother, father, legal guardian, brother, or sister) or of another 4-H or FFA member who is an exhibitor at the Barber County Fair. This rule will be strictly enforced and any exhibitor violating it will have their animal in question eliminated from competition.
- M. To exhibit 4-H and FFA market livestock at the State Fair, the member must have participated in county competition within the same project. A different animal may be shown.
- N. In market classes, Champion and Reserve Champion shall be selected from blue ribbon animals from each breed. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion animals will be selected from the Champions and Reserve Champions in each breed. For market livestock classes, a minimum of 5 head per breed will be required for classes to be divided by weight. If fewer than 5 head are entered, all animals in that breed will be shown as one class.
- O. Livestock may be brought to the fairgrounds on Thursday before the Fair.
- P. The tie-outs will be the designated unloading area for all cattle. All cattle must be unloaded into the tie-outs and not on the main fairgrounds (inside the pipe rails) for safety reasons.
- Q. Horse projects - see Division G or fair representative.
- R. Champion and Reserve Champion winners in the Carcass Contest will be awarded the 3rd and 4th spots in the Premium Sale. To compete in the Carcass Contest, animals must fall within the designated weight ranges to be selected as grand or reserve grand champion. Ultrasound services are being donated by Redland Veterinary Hospital.
- S. Manure must be deposited in the designated area. This area is across the road north of the show arena and east of the wash racks. Please do not dispose of manure in trash cans.
- T. Animals DO NOT have to meet sale weight requirements to be used in showmanship.
- U. The Fair Board reserves the right to remove any exhibitor or animal in the case of abuse or neglect of livestock.
- V. No fans will be allowed in the aisle of the beef barn.
- W. Three or more head of the same breed in AOB shall constitute forming a breed class.

X. The Barber County Fair Board provides a futurity contest for 4-H and FFA Market Beef and Breeding Beef (heifers & cows) born and raised in Barber County. This contest is separate from all other classes.

KANSAS LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS—All animals are subject to examination by the exhibition staff or their representatives and shall be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease. Animals determined by exhibition staff to have not met listed requirements will not be permitted to exhibit. All livestock

SWINE

A. All out-of-county swine must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days of exhibit. Swine originating from other states must have official ID and ID must be individually listed on the CVI and/or must obtain an import permit number prior to movement into Kansas.

SHEEP

A. All sheep, including Wethers, shall have an official USDA premise ID tag. Sheep originating from other states must have official ID and ID must be individually listed on the accompanying CVI

B. Be free of any signs of “sore mouth.”

C. Be free of signs of active fungal (ringworm) infection, including club lamb fungus.

GOATS

A. All goats, including Wethers, must be identified with a legible registered tattoo or an official USDA premise ID tag. For registered tattoos, goats must have registration papers ready for inspection.

B. Goats determined by exhibition staff to have sore mouth, lesions of ringworm, warts or infested with mange will not be permitted to exhibit.

CATTLE

A. All cattle and bison must meet the General Requirements.

B. The Kansas Department of Agriculture, Division of Animal Health (KDAH) requires no test on cattle and bison of Kansas origin.

C. Cattle determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts, or infested with mange will not be permitted to exhibit.

HORSES

A. All horses must meet the General Requirements.

B. A negative Coggins test within 12 months for equine infectious anemia is required.

POULTRY

All poultry, except waterfowl, must show proof that they are pullorum-typhoid clean by one of the following methods:

- A. Originate from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean flock as evidenced by an official VS Form 9-2.
- B. Present an official VS 9-2 Form, signed by an official testing agent, showing the entries have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within the preceding 90 days.
- C. **If any birds in an entry test positive for Pullorum-Typhoid, the entire entry and all other birds from the same premises will be refused.**
- D. No birds will be allowed in the barn without having proof of a negative test.

HERDSMANSHIP CONTEST RULES

- A. Each club or chapter is automatically entered in the Herdsmanship contest. All 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters will be required to participate in the Herdsmanship Contest.
- B. The winner will be determined by calculating an average score for the barns in which each club or chapter has entries.
- C. The Herdsmanship award will go to the club or chapter that keeps stalls and pens clean, orderly, and attractive as well as keeping the animals well-groomed and cared for.
- D. First place club/chapter will win a cash award. Sponsored by Corona Hoch, Farm Bureau Financial Services.

Scoring:

1. Cleanliness of alleys, stalls, and pens 50 points

Bedding adequate, bright, clean and in place. Animals tied or penned. Manure hauled and deposited in the proper place. Alleys kept clean of dust and bedding.

2. Appearance of Animals 20 points

Animals clean and brushed.

3. Arrangement of the Exhibit 15 points

Exhibits lined up in an attractive manner. Hay and bedding neat and orderly. Feed, show boxes, and other gear stored neatly.

4. Stall Cards 15 points

Able to read from the alley, clean and neatly arranged.

A. All market animals will be weighed starting at 7:00 A.M. on Friday, the first day of the fair, by the Sale Committee. The weigh order will be **beef, sheep, meat goats and swine.**

B. The sale order for the Premium Sale will be, Sheep, Meat Goats, Swine, Foods, and Beef.

C. Each 4-H or FFA member can sell either one animal or one food item at the Live Premium Sale.

D. Market or breeding entries for each species may be sold in the premium sale. Entries sold may continue to be shown. Breeding entries may only sell once.

E. Market animals, within the allowed weight range, can be sold at floor. Floor bids will be secured by the Premium Sale Committee and will be posted by Saturday in the Fair Office and each livestock barn.

F. Each exhibitor must take their own item through the sale ring.

G. Exhibitors with an animal or item in the Premium Sale must be at their pen/stall when their name is called to line up in the sale order. Sale personnel will not leave the barn to look for exhibitors. Names will be called three times and if the exhibitor is not at their assigned pen/stall and ready to line up for the sale, the sale personnel will simply move on to the next name on the sale order list and the absent exhibitor will forfeit their spot and right to be in the Premium Sale. Exhibitors will not be added back into the sale order later in the sale.

H. The following weights will be provided a floor bid and be eligible for the grand drive:

Beef - 1000# -- minimum weight

Swine - 220# -- minimum weight

Sheep - 90# -- minimum weight

Meat Goats - 60# -- minimum weight

“Animals above and below these weights will show in under- and over-weight class but are not eligible to be grand or reserve grand champion. Under-weight animals are not eligible for the Premium Sale but animals in the over-weight class are eligible for the Premium Sale.”

I. A market animal sold through the premium sale will be allowed to go home.

J. Animals sold in the Premium Sale must be animals shown in their respective division at the Barber County Fair.

K. Youth or parent must be present at the time his or her animal is being weighed. For market animals, a re-weigh of under or over-weight animals will be allowed only if the animals are within 10 pounds for

beef and 5 pounds for all other market animal species of the premium sale minimum and maximum weights. If a re-weigh is needed, one re-weigh will be allowed within thirty minutes after the completion of weighing of all animals.

L. All male animals must be castrated and healed; except male calves born after January 1 of the current year.

M. Extra market animals exhibited at the county fair, beyond the one going through the Premium Sale, may be sold to the packers at the floor price if the youth desires to do so, without receiving extra premium money. The same rules apply for selling weight of these animals. These animals should be weighed at the time other animals are weighed.

N. **PREMIUM SALE**-All animals entered and shown will need to have signed weight slips on file in the Fair office to be eligible for the premium sale or to sell the animals at floor price.

O. Weight slips for animals and champion and reserve champion foods must be signed in the Fair Office by 6:00 PM on Saturday. If weight slips are not signed by 6:00 PM on Saturday, exhibitors forfeit the right to participate in the premium sale and/or market their animals at the floor price. ***All weight slips must be signed by the exhibitor or their parent. No phone-ins accepted.***

P. Two dollars (**\$2.00**) will be charged for each item sold in the Live and Silent Premium Sale. Two dollars (**\$2.00**) will also be charged for each animal that sells at floor price. (This fee will be used to advertise to the buyers and for upkeep of livestock facilities.)

Q. No added money will be accepted ringside at the Premium Sale. Added money must be given by using the available envelopes and forms.

R. 4-H or FFA members NOT participating in the Live Premium Sale may enter 1 item in the Silent Premium Sale. Entries can be from the Foods, Visual Arts, Photography, Fiber Arts, Sewing & Textiles or Woodworking projects. Ownership of these projects transfers to the buyer. Fresh foods shall be made and delivered to the buyer.

S. **Entries for the Silent Premium Sale must be declared by 6:00 P.M. on Friday.**

T. **Bidding will be from Noon on Saturday to 1:45 pm on Sunday.**

D. Each exhibit needs to be clearly marked with the exhibitor's name and club.

E. A Champion and Reserve Champion shall be selected from each age group. From the Champions and Reserve Champions, 1 Grand Champion and 1 Reserve Grand Champion will be selected.

F. The Kansas 4-H Department allows only 1 entry per class from each County. After Grand Champions are selected, judges will select the top in each class for the State Fair with 3 alternates per class. The State Fair has additional rules that entries must meet.

G. Classes were changed to match the Kansas State Fair. The descriptions follow:

H. Fine Arts: Oil, chalk, charcoal, dyes, pastels, pencil, ink, acrylic, or watercolor on canvas, canvas board, paper, wood, metal, or textiles, framed as a picture, prepared for hanging. Stretched canvas art on

a wooden frame is considered prepared for hanging if frame has a hanger.

J. Leather and Jewelry: Any leather stamping, carving, tooling, lacing, or stitching piece or any jewelry piece made from any medium are acceptable exhibits.

K. Three-Dimensional: The piece must be observable on at least three sides and should be either free-standing or prepared to be hung. Craft and pre-formed or assembled projects are not acceptable.

L. General Crafts: This category incorporates miscellaneous pieces that do not correspond to the four above-mentioned categories.

G. All entries will have a cost per wear form with the item. Forms at the Extension Office.

H. Members receiving grand champion and reserve grand champion who are Intermediates or Seniors will be eligible to participate in the fashion revue at the state fair.

CLOTHING CONSTRUCTION

- A. Exhibitors may enter more than one exhibit per class.
- B. All exhibits must be products of the current club year.
- C. All clothing must have a label attached invisibly to the neck facing of the dress or the center back of the belt or skirt. This may be paper or cloth.
- D. Pre-cut kits are acceptable for all classes.
- E. Garments should be carefully laundered or cleaned before exhibiting.
- F. Each garment should be placed on a hanger. Attach skirts to hangers with large safety pins.
- G. If made of delicate fabric, the garment must be protected by placing it in a clear plastic bag.
- H. An individual receiving State Fair blue on clothing garments at the county fair may make only 1 entry in the 4-H Clothing Division at the State Fair.
- I. Clothing Construction will be judged by consultation at the fair on Friday morning.
- J. A champion and reserve champion will be selected from each age group. A grand champion and reserve grand champion overall will be selected from the champions.
- K. Recycled Clothing - An item made of at least 50% recycled material (recycled means reusing an existing item in a new way). Could be remaking/redesigning a garment, re-purposing a clothing item for a new use, etc. Must include sewing of some kind. A 3"x5" index card **MUST** accompany entry describing the recycled materials and how they were used in the item.

B. A member may enter more than one exhibit in each class.

C. When articles which are normally worn as a pair are exhibited, both articles must be shown together. Fasten articles together securely with yarn.

D. Special consideration will be given to articles which are of original design. Such articles should have a note attached explaining the original design.

E. Exhibitors are expected to be enrolled in the Fiber Art project in which they are entered. When the exhibit is a sewed garment that also includes one or more Fiber Art techniques (i.e., knitting, crochet, needle arts, or patchwork and quilting), the determination of what division (Clothing or Fiber Arts) and class in which to enter will be left with the 4-H participant.

F. All exhibits which need to be hung **MUST** have the appropriate hanger, rod, wire, or other mechanism attached to be properly displayed.

G. There are no age-specific classes in fiber arts. The Exhibitor's age and years in the project will be considered by judges.

ENTOMOLOGY

A. All entries should be submitted in an 18x24x3.5-inch wooden box with a clear plastic top. No glass allowed.

- B. Identification should follow the taxonomy as printed on the “Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy” which follows www.bugguide.net
- C. Each exhibitor must identify each box with two ID labels bearing exhibitor’s name, county, class, and statement of taxonomy used: Insects in Kansas or Insects in Kansas Book: 2016. One label is on the inside of the box in the upper left corner and on the outside of the box in the lower right corner. Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise.
- D. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on the exhibitor’s box ID label. Only adult specimens can be used; however, one female and one male of a species correctly identified can be displayed.
- E. Arrange specimens in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box. Arrange by order then family where required.
- F. Two labels will be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First is the common name and the second should include date/locality, full county name, state abbreviation and collector name.
- G. Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.
- H. **Points will be deducted from collections & notebooks if:**
- a. **Non-insects and out-of-state specimens are not in designated “display only” area.**
 - b. **Any specimens are immature.**
- I. More detailed rules of each class are at the Extension Office and will be provided at request.
- J. Entomology Collection Notebooks will follow Kansas State Fair rules which are available upon request.

A. Perishable Foods judging will be held Friday, July 19, 2024, 2:00 P.M., at the Community Bible Fellowship Church, 2853 NE Curry Lane, Medicine Lodge.

B. This event will be judged, and awards presented as other fair entries. There will be a champion and reserve champion in each class.

C. Hot foods must be presented to the judge at 140 degrees or above and cold foods must be presented at 40 degrees or below. **For food safety purposes items that do not meet temperature requirements will not be judged.**

D. Members can also compete in a place-setting contest. Only one place setting is needed for this contest. A menu for a meal of choice should be provided on a 4" x 6" notecard. Each exhibitor must supply their own card table.

E. Each perishable food item must have a poster made up for the fair. Photos will be provided by the Extension office from the judging day.

F. If members take 2 perishable food items, they will have 2 separate posters.

G. The size should be 14" x 22" which is half of a regular posterboard. It should include a picture of the item, recipe, and a brief story about the item.

H. Table settings will be brought to the fair and put in the glass showcase. You do not need to bring the card table.

I. Posters will be displayed with the foods exhibits, they will not be judged. However, posters must fill

requirements for members to receive premium money for perishable foods.

BAKED FOODS

B. There is no limit to the number of entries per class.

C. All baked products must be placed on white or tin foil covered cardboard cut to fit the size of the product, except pies and coffee cakes **which must be in a DISPOSABLE CONTAINER** and enclosed in a plastic bag.

D. All unfrosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with top crust showing. Except those with special designs, such as a Bundt cake.

E. Any frosting, glaze or filling must include the Frosting/Filling Worksheet available at the Extension Office.

F. Each member needs to exhibit **three (3)** of the following: cookies, bars, muffins. A loaf of bread, cake, pie, or coffee will be exhibited uncut. Cookies and rolls must be the same size and shape and be from the same recipe.

G. **NO COMMERCIAL MIXES ACCEPTED ABOVE LEVEL I. Recipes** in the food project books are only guidelines.

H. **RECIPES MUST ACCOMPANY THE EXHIBIT.**

I. Educational exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook, or display. A poster may be no larger than 22" x 28". If the exhibit is a display the maximum size is 3'x 4' tri-fold display board. Exhibit should describe something learned, a project activity done, a food nutrition community service program, etc.

J. Exhibits not meeting the above guidelines will be dropped one ribbon placing.

K. A champion and reserve champion will be selected from each level. There will be one grand champion and one reserve grand champion overall foods. **These foods will have the option of being sold at the Live Premium Sale. 4-H members or a parent must sign a sale ticket in the fair office by Saturday at 6:00 p.m. to participate. No phone-ins will be accepted.**

L. There will be no Bake Sale on Friday. First, superintendents will select for display. Second, items may be picked up by exhibitor if only a sample is displayed. Third, any items remaining at 6:00 P.M. on Friday will be donated to the Fair Kitchen for Sale. M. Conference judging will begin at 9:00 am Friday. A sheet will be available at check in to sign up for the conference judging. If a 4-Her is not present when their name is called, the name will be moved to the bottom of the list. If 4-Hers are not present before the end of consultation judging their items will be judged without consultation.

N. For decorated cakes - a cake form may be used. If a real cake is used, it will also be judged on quality.

This class is not eligible for the Kansas State Fair.

O. For gift packages - **No alcoholic beverages will be accepted.** A food gift package must contain at least three different food items, prepared by the 4-Her, in a suitable container no larger than 18"x18"x18". Prepared food items must have recipes attached with the entry. Additional homemade food items beyond the 3 minimum or purchased items also may be included in the gift basket. On the back of the entry card, answer these questions: a) What is the intended use? b) What food safety precautions were taken during and after preparations? This entry will count as a non-perishable food product.

FOOD PRESERVATION

A. Read General Rules.

B. Exhibits must have been preserved since the previous fair.

C. Exhibits must be sealed in clean standard jars, half-pint, pint, etc., with two-piece lids.

D. Each jar exhibited must be labeled with uniform **label** placed one inch from the base of jar. Label must not cover brand name of jar. Labels are available at Extension Office.

E. Label must contain name of product, date preserved, the canning method (water bath, weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure method), process time, and amount of pressure (psi) when pressure canning method is used. Examples available from Extension Office.

F. All containers of pickles, jelly, and other sweet spreads may be opened and examined for quality by a judge. Jars must be sealed when entered.

G. There will not be a limit on entries.

H. All Food Preservation classes are eligible for the State Fair.

I. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions attached with the entry card. Recipes must be from tested sources. The Extension Office has a list of sources and copies for check out.

Processing methods that will be disqualified include open kettle canning, over canning, and sun canning.

Homemade recipes or other untested recipes will be disqualified for safety reasons. Tested recipe sources available from the Extension Office.

- 420. **AC Electric Projects.** Electric projects with a 110 or 120 V alternating current (AC) power source, no 240 V exhibits are allowed.
- 421. **DC Electric Projects.** Electric projects with a battery or direct current power source. All DC electric projects must work with batteries supplied by the 4-H'er.
- 422. **Electronics Projects.** Electronic projects with a battery or direct current power source. This class includes kits. Include instruction/assembly manual if from a kit or plans if an original project.
- 423. **Educational Displays and Exhibits**

SMALL ENGINES

- A. All exhibits should involve engines smaller than 20 horsepower.
- B. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws are permitted for display.
- C. The maximum tri-fold size for displays is 3'x4'.

CLASSES:

- 425. **Display** - select one of the following options: 1) identify different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or show the function of the engine or lawn and garden equipment parts; OR 2) identify and explain the function(s) of different special tools needed for small engine work; OR

3) illustrate and provide the results of any experiment in the NCS project books.

426. **Maintenance** - Exhibit a display that illustrates either 1) Routine maintenance procedures OR 2) Diagnosing and troubleshooting specific problems in an engine.

427. **Operation** - Exhibit an operable small engine overhauled or rebuilt. Include maintenance schedule for the engine and a brief description of steps taken by the member overhauling or rebuilding the engine.

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY

A. Displays limited to tri-fold boards 3'x4' and/or be free standing.

CLASSES:

428. **Educational Display** – Inform and Create awareness about power generated from a renewable energy source, i.e., wind, sun, geothermal, tides or waves.

429. **Experiment** – Display an experiment addressing a problem or question related to power generated from a renewable source. Include hypothesis, background, research, variables, control, data, findings, conclusions, and recommendations for future study.

WOODWORKING

A. **THE PLAN FROM WHICH IT WAS CONSTRUCTED MUST BE WITH THE ARTICLE EXHIBITED.** The plan may be a photocopy, the actual pattern, or a scale drawing. It must be complete and accurate to the extent that a duplicate article could be built using the plan as a guide. Include a list of the cost of materials and amount of time spent constructing article.

B. Class 434 is not eligible for the State Fair unless enrolled in the Home Environment project.

C. Articles made in shop classes in school and receiving a grade are eligible to exhibit.

D. Projects made from pre-cut kits are not allowed.

CLASSES:

430. Articles for farm or shop use

431. Lawn furniture or lawn articles

432. Household furniture and household articles

433. Other woodworking articles not listed above

434. Piece of repaired and refinished furniture with a brief explanation of the work completed with the exhibit.

Building Block Engineering

A. Total exhibit dimensions may not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep.

B. All exhibits should be placed in a sturdy see-through enclosure with a top, bottom, and 4 sides. A clear tub turned upside down with the exhibit placed on the lid would be an acceptable enclosure. The outer dimensions of the enclosure are part of the total exhibit dimensions.

C. All components used in construction should be dust free, clean, free of chips, scuffs, or cracks

D. The primary building component should be interlocking blocks, commonly referred to by the brand name of Lego®

E. Other components can be integrated into dioramas to illustrate architectural aspects that may be difficult to convey with traditional interlocking blocks, for example marbles for small round objects.

F. Class 436, 438, and 440 and the use of “store bought” sets for major elements are not eligible for the state fair.

G. The design should have a central theme, for example a garage, a house, a shop, this theme should be discussed in the conference judging, this can link back to architectural elements in the display, for example: toilets, chairs, sofas, plants, pianos, cars, garage doors, spaceships, animals, food, etc. (architectural elements, components, and features can be thought of as nouns)

H. Displays must have significant architectural components. Examples of architectural components include walls, windows, doors, roofs, canopies, flying buttresses, etc.

I. Landscapes are strongly discouraged, however buildings could have a reasonable exterior landscape if it clearly linked to the architecture, for example a bike rack next to a street outside of a bicycle shop.

E. Only Home Environment, Forestry, Wildlife, and Shooting Sports posters are eligible for the state fair.

B. **EXHIBITORS MUST COMPLY WITH STATE AND FEDERAL LAWS.** It is illegal to possess threatened or endangered wildlife, or the feathers, nests, or eggs of non-game birds. Game birds and game animals taken legally during an open season may be used. The use of live wild animals in educational exhibits is prohibited.
