This is Anna's story.

When Anna is nineteen years old, she meets Peter in a nightclub. The novel traces their developing bond, their marriage, their growing difficulties and the impact on Anna when their relationship breaks down.

She studies the Qur'an, reading it line by line, sura after sura. Her first novel, Academy Street (2014), won the Irish Novel of the Year Award at the Irish Book Awards and was named overall Irish Book of the Year. The River Capture, her second novel, was shortlisted for Novel of the Year at the Irish Book Awards. Her second short story collection, Barcelona, was an instant Irish Times bestseller.


Someone has attempted to blow up one of the great buildings of London, St Paul's Cathedral. A schoolteacher, Mr Burman, is asked by the police to travel to the capital from his home in the north of England to meet the man who pleaded guilty to the crime. The accused is Raf, a former student of Burman's, and an ex-boyfriend of his daughter Leila.

Still grieving over the death of his wife Ada in a car accident, struggling to cope with Leila's silence and hostility, Mr Burman makes the journey south into a sinister justice system, towards the mystery of Raf's motives – and into the nature of his own family.

Compelling and compassionate, this novel explores what it means to have and lose love. It paints an unsparing portrait of modern families and of the contradictions embedded in the consumerist way of life. A master of the written word draws on his skills in fiction and non-fiction to examine our emotional relationship with material things, and the stress fractures between the old and the new.

James Meek is the author of seven novels including The People's Act of Love which was longlisted for the Man Booker Prize and won both the Royal Society of Literature Ondaatje Prize and the Scottish Arts Council Award. It has been published in more than thirty countries. Meek has also written two collections of short stories and two books of non-fiction, including Private Island which won the 2015 Orwell Prize. He is a Contributing Editor to the London Review of Books and writes regularly for the Guardian and New York Times. He lives in London. In 2020, To Calais, In Ordinary Time was shortlisted for the Walter Scott Prize for Historical Fiction and longlisted for the Orwell Prize for Political Fiction.



But, despite her skill and growing experience, half of Mairéad remains in her windy, hedge-filled home in Ireland, and the life she abandoned there. In noughties London, she has the potential to be somebody completely new – why, then, does she feel so stuck? Between the bustling side streets of Soho, and the wet grass of Leitrim and Donegal, Mairéad is caught, running from the girl she was but unable to reveal the woman she'd hoped to become.

Told with rare honesty and equal measures of warmth and bite, The Wardrobe Department is a story about reckoning with the past, finding the courage to change the present – and asking what comes next.

Elaine Garvey is from Co. Sligo, Ireland. She completed an M.Phil. in Creative Writing in Trinity College, Dublin in 2000. She has worked as editorial and programme co-ordinator at the Stinging Fly, was awarded an agility grant for her writing and has recently been selected as a participant on a basic income scheme for artists by the Irish Department of Arts. In Consolations II, anxiety might be more mercifully understood as the preparation for being hurt, fixed beliefs are recognised as the very places where we do not wish to understand, guilt is a friend compassionately waiting for us to catch up and routine becomes a form of ritual and worship. Each piece in this life-affirming book is an invitation to slow down, shift our perspective and find comfort. In these pages, Whyte explores the full constellation of human experience.

David Whyte is an Anglo-Irish poet and philosopher. He has said that all of his poetry and philosophy are based on 'the conversational nature of reality'. Whyte grew up with a strong imaginative influence from his Irish mother, among the hills and valleys of his father's Yorkshire. He now makes his home in the Pacific Northwest of the United States. The internationally acclaimed author of twelve books of poetry and four books of prose, David Whyte holds a degree in Marine Zoology and has worked as a naturalist guide in the Galapagos Islands, Andes, Amazon and Himalayas. He is the recipient of two honorary degrees.
