

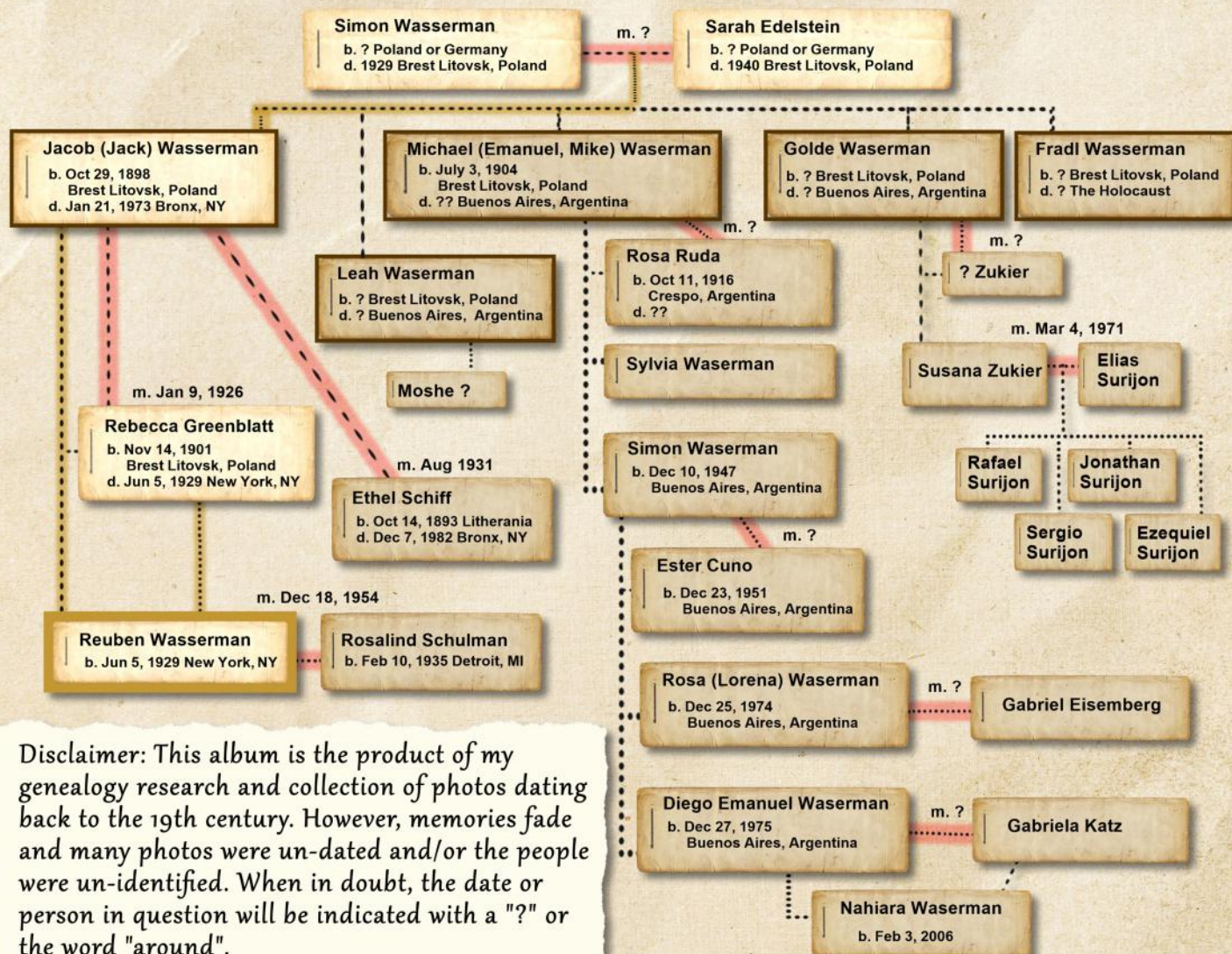

In addition, some data collected from family sources and public records were contradictory. This is my best representation of mine and my wife's family stories.

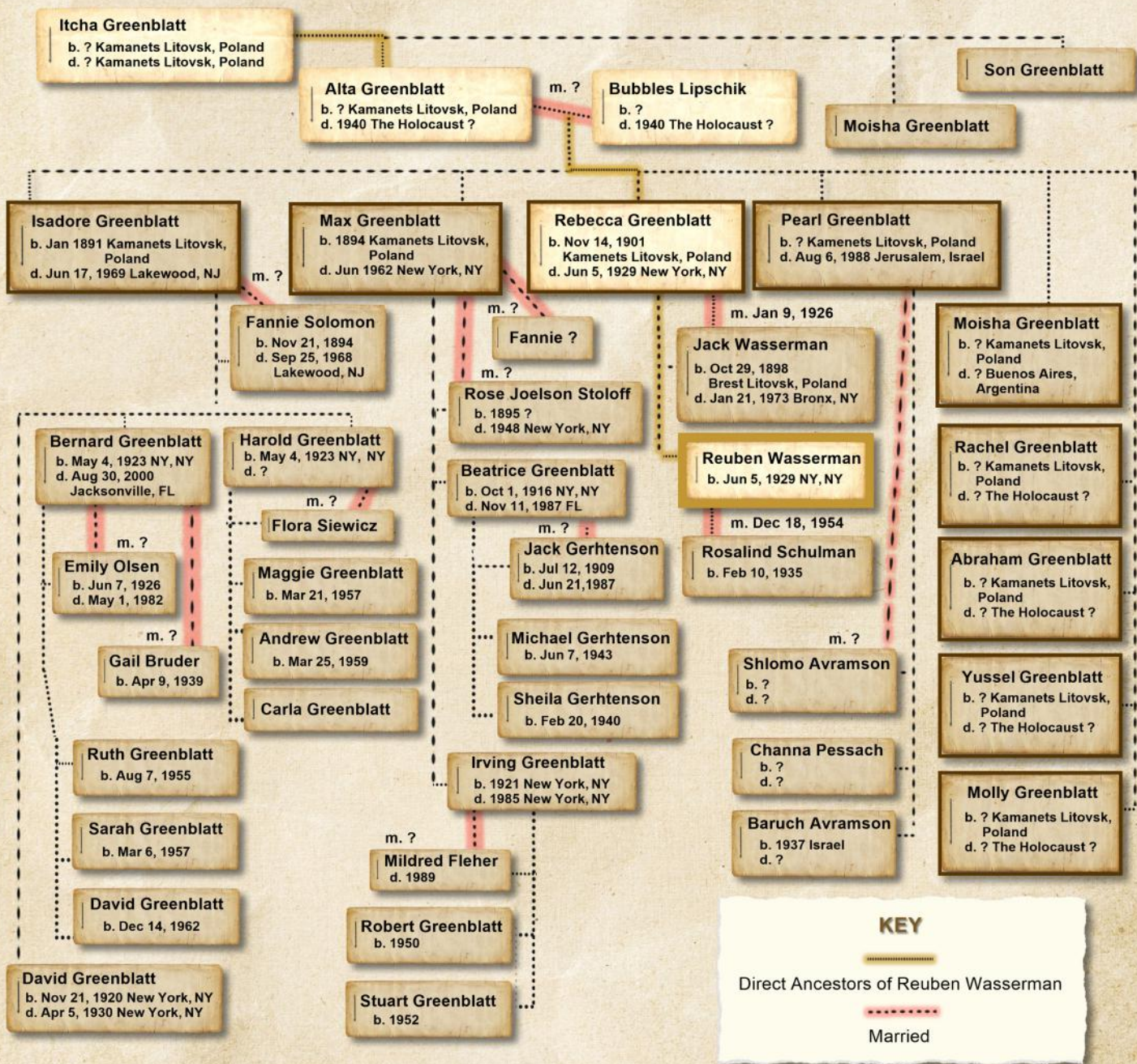

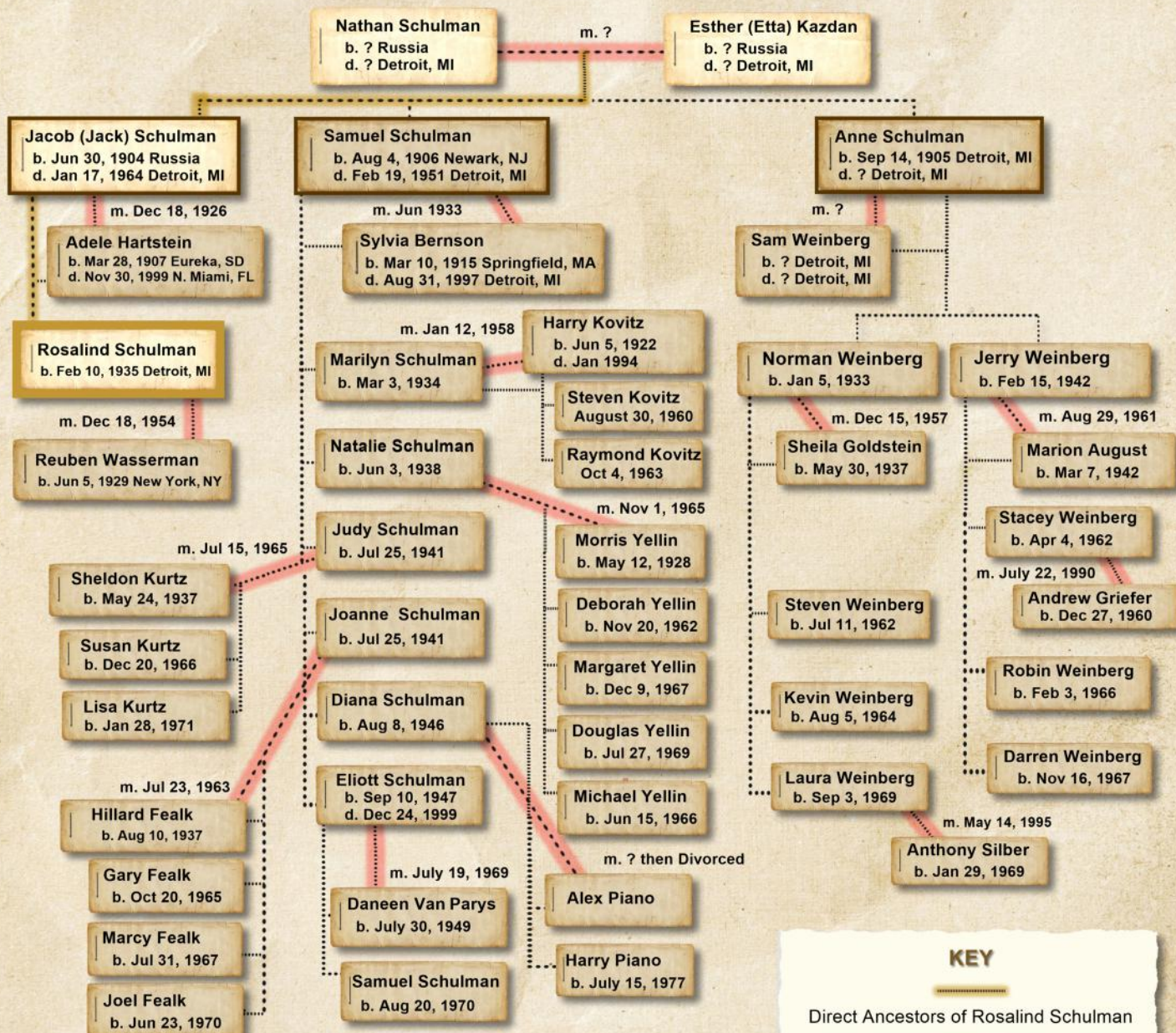

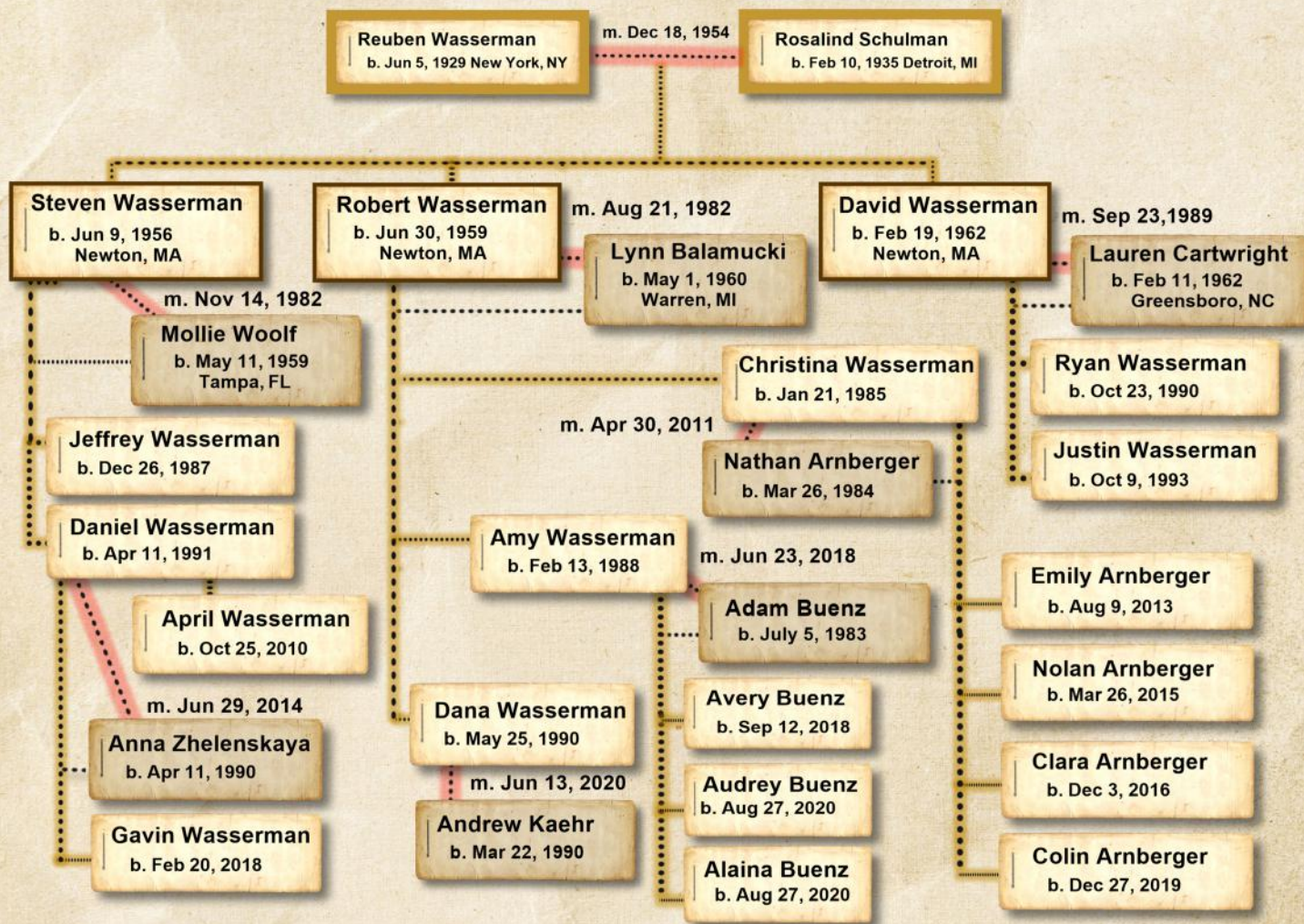

First, some history and geography of the area of all four branches of our ancestors.

Poland was a country that during many time periods in history was occupied by both Germany and Russia. Poland borders on the Baltic Sea and Russia in the North, Russia in the east, Germany in the West, and the Czech Republic in the south. Formerly larger than it is today, Poland was the dominant power in eastern Europe from the 14th to the 17th century.

In the 18th century it was divided up by its neighbors and ceased to exist until resurrected in 1921. Poland again was partitioned by Germany and the USSR, and at the beginning of WWII, it was established as a Soviet satellite state in 1945, and remained a Communist-dominated "peoples republic" until 1989.

Poland, with Warsaw as it's capital, is now a democracy with a market economy, albeit with ongoing totalitarian pressure from Russia. Brest Utovsk and Kamenets Litovsk are now both part of Belarus, and respectfully called Brest and Kamjanec (Kamenets).



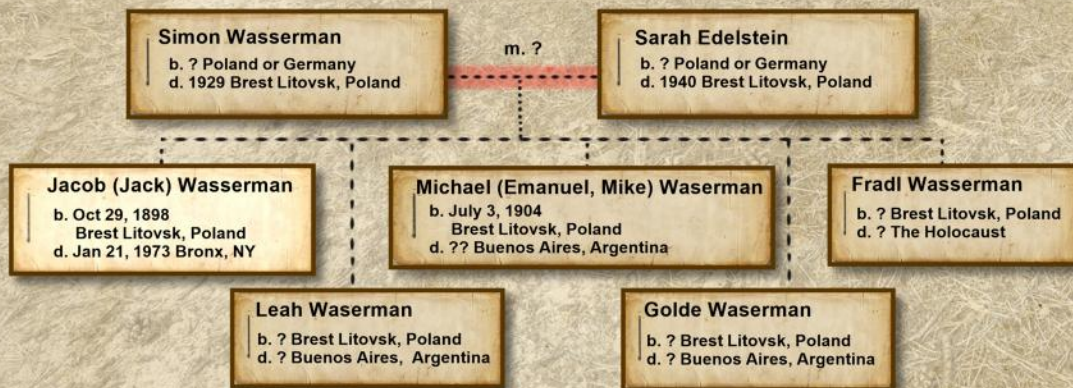
THE WASSERMAN STORY

1890-1926

I believe the Wasserman family roots originate in Germany, and its English translation is Waterman.

According to family in Argentina, my grandparents, Simon Wasserman and Sarah Edelstein, moved from Germany to Brest Litousk, Poland. I have not been able to determine why they moved to Poland.

Simon and Sarah had five children:
my father Jacob (Jack), Leah, Michael (Emanuel, Mike), Golde, and Fradl.



My father, Jack Wasserman, was the first to leave his country and come to the United States in November 1925 under the belief that there was gold on the streets of New York.

I was told that my father sensed trouble in Europe in the early 1930's and supposedly went back to Poland to get his family to come to the United States.

Unfortunately, quotas were established by the US, and my Aunt Leah, Aunt Golde, and Uncle Mike migrated to Buenos Aires, Argentina, changing the spelling of their name to Wasserman (with one "n"). My Aunt Fradl remained in Poland and it's believed that she and her husband died in the Holocaust.

My grandfather died in 1929 and my grandmother in 1940 of natural causes.

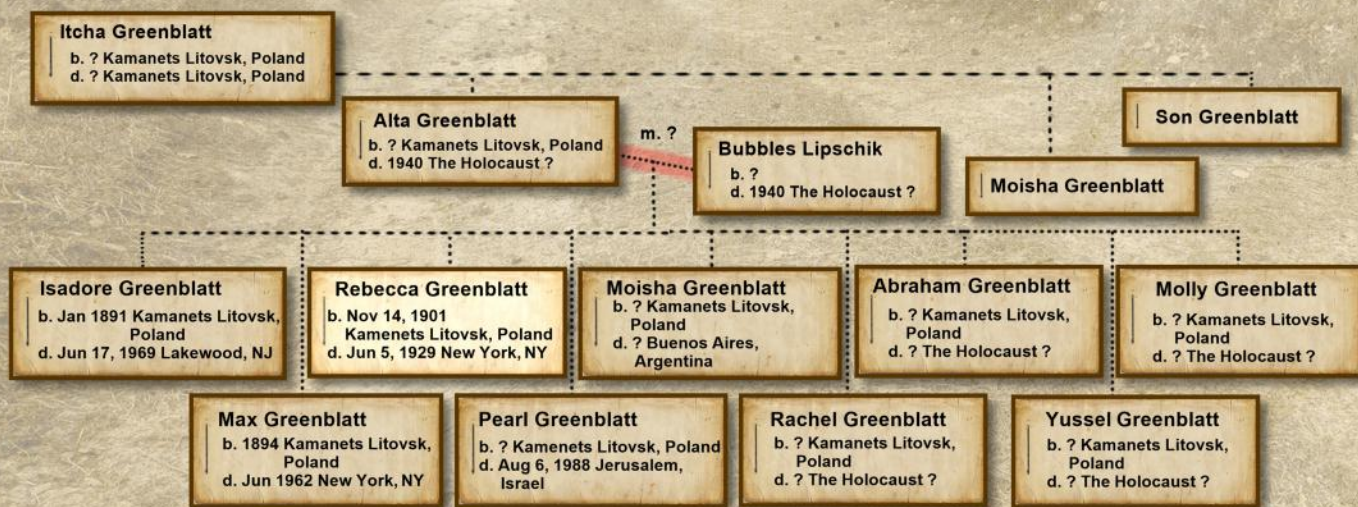

THE GREENBLATT STORY

1890 – 1929

My great-grandfather, Itcha Greenblatt, had three sons. One of those sons, my grandfather Alta, married my grandmother, Bubbles Lipschik, and they had nine children.



My Uncle Isadore (Itcha). Uncle Max, and my mother, Rebecca Greenblatt, emigrated to the United States. My Aunt Pearl moved to Israel, Uncle Moisha moved to Argentina, and we believe that the remaining children, along with my grandparents, died in the Holocaust.

Once in the United States, my Uncles Itcha and Max opened a confectionery candy store, which I gather did quite well and they lived a reasonably comfortable life through the 1920's and the early stages of the great depression.

My Uncle Itcha married Fannie Solomon and they had three children: David, born in 1920, and twins Bernard (Bernie) and Harold born in 1923. David died young in 1930, but cousins Bernie and Harold were a large presence in my life. My Uncle Max married Rose Joelson and they had two children, Beatrice and Irving. After Aunt Rose's death in 1948, he remarried a woman also named Fanny.

Best remembered that Rebecca Wasserman, then residing at number 84 Vernon Ave., City of Long Island City, New York, who previous to her naturalization was a subject of Russia and Poland, having applied to be admitted as a citizen of the United States of America pursuant to law, and also Special term of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, held at Long Island City on the 4th day of March in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and 27, the court having found that the petitioner entitled to reside permanently in the United States, and that she had in all respects complied with the Naturalization laws of the United States, and that she was entitled to be so admitted, it was thereupon ordered by the said court that she be admitted as a citizen of the United States of America.

In testimony whereof, the seal of said court is hereunto affixed on the 4th day of March in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and 27, and of our Independence the one hundred and 51st.

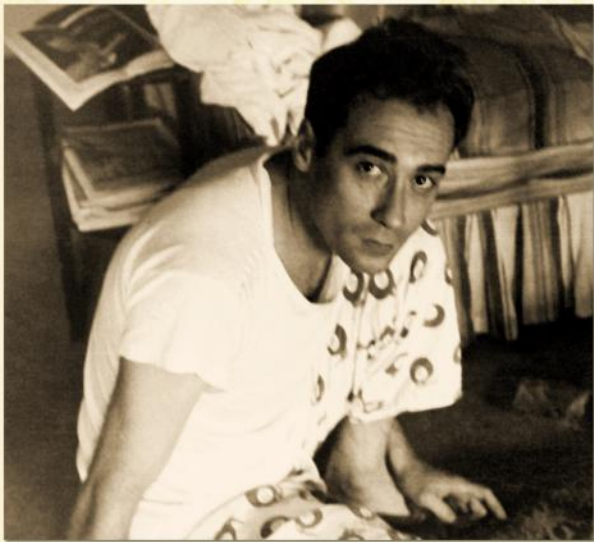

It was during my years at the University of Michigan that I met my future wife, Rosalind (Roz) Schulman in early 1954.





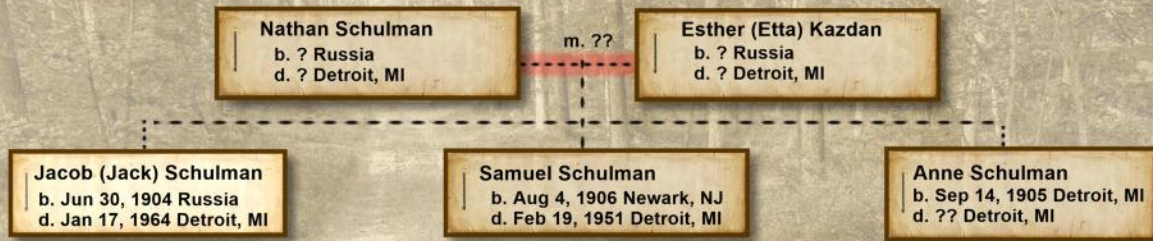

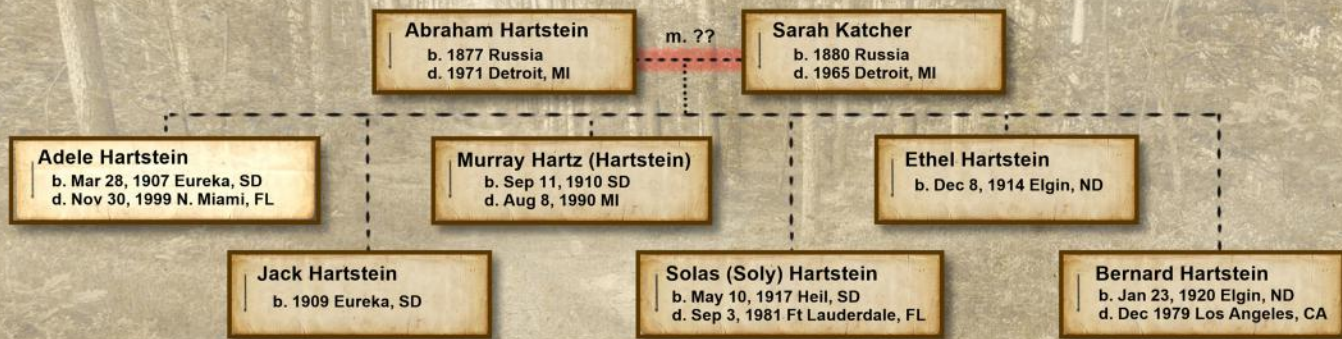

The Hartstein's are Roz's maternal line.

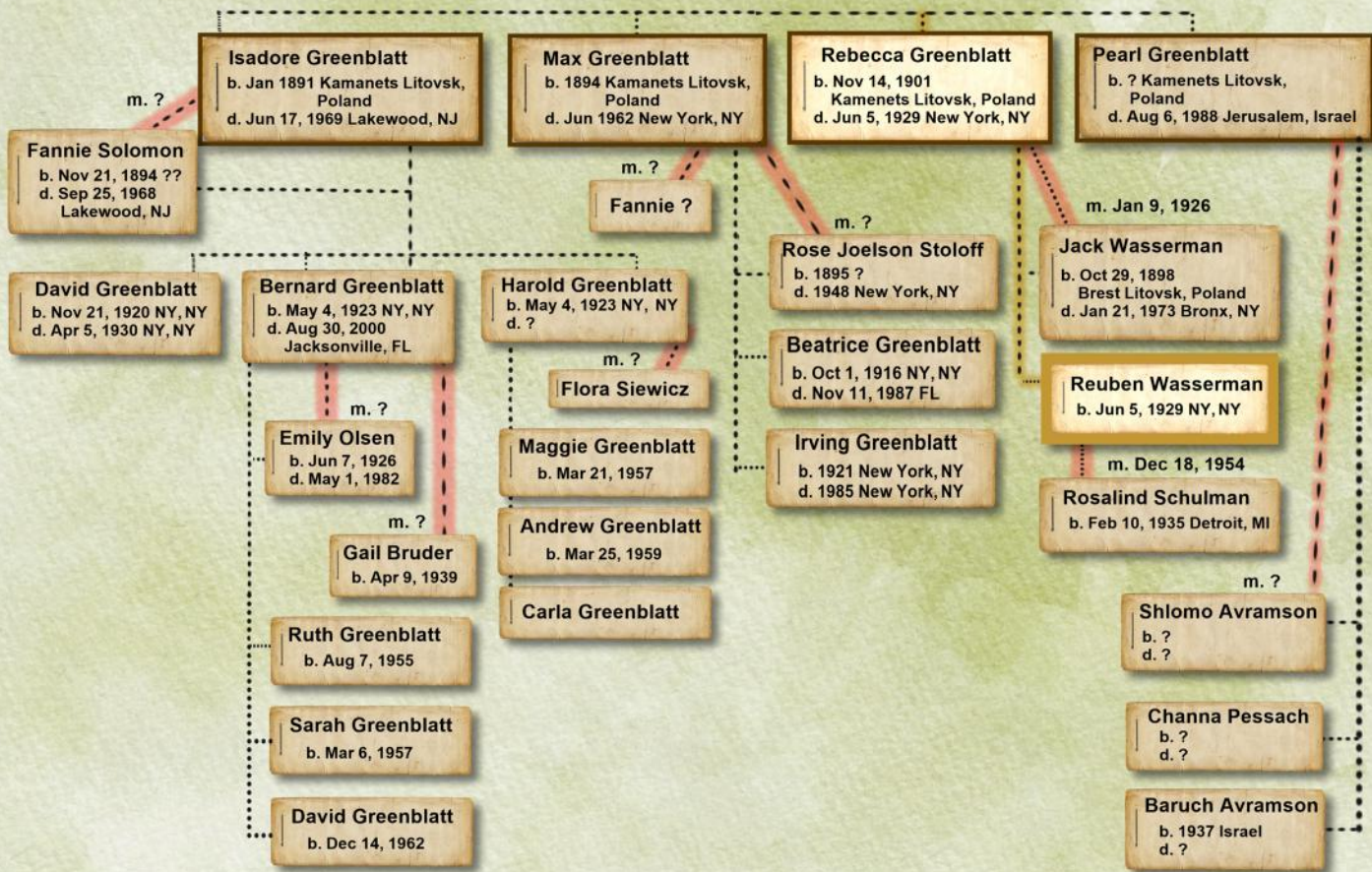
