

Equestrian Star: II's Journey

In the illustrious equestrian tapestry of the United States, Jessica Jo Tate, affectionately known as "JJ" to those fortunate enough to witness her artistry, emerges as a luminous star, her journey commencing with a flourish that bespoke the destined trajectory she was to embark upon. Like the first delicate strokes of a masterful painter's brush, her debut onto the FEI stage at the tender age of sixteen reverberated with the promise of a blossoming virtuoso.

Do You Feel Like a Centaur When You Ride?

For me, one of the things that I have struggled with the most in my riding is with getting my body (seat, legs, arms, etc.) moving with the horse. It's amazing to watch a really good rider and how they look like a centaur. Everything from the waist down is just a part of the horse.

The tricky thing is that while it may appear that a rider is sitting still, they are actually moving a lot -- they are moving with the horses' motion and taking up the movement of the horse like a shock absorber. Your hips and back have to move up and down and left and right to stay with the horse. Your thighs and legs help support and stabilize the motion of your seat, and your arms and elbows move with the nodding motion of the horse. The trick is that in order to give the impression that you are "one" with the horse, you can't move too much or too little and you have to move exactly in sync with the horse!

This takes a LOT of practice and a LOT of fitness! Riding dressage and having a good seat requires a huge amount of core and leg strength. Your abdominal muscles, low back muscles, inner thighs, and hamstrings must be incredibly strong to sit a bouncy trot! It is essential to work out, exercise, and stretch if you want to ride well. All my top students (and myself included) go the gym regularly and we also work with a physical therapist to address asymmetries in our bodies!

I will link a couple of videos below that I made on how to move with your horse and sit the trot!

Preparing for Competition: My Horse, My Partner

I was fortunate to represent Region 3 as a Junior at the 2023 North American Youth Championships in Dressage. I live in Atlanta and am 15 years old and am riding with a new partner named Mollegardens Sans-Souci. Souci is a 9-year-old Danish Warmblood mare. In February of this year, I was lucky to find Souci – and we began training together as partners. Having a new horse who is young makes me reflect on the importance of preparation.

One thing I have learned and will carry with me throughout my career is the extreme importance of mentally preparing yourself for competition. Even more so than any other sport you will compete in, managing your own mind as an equestrian is vital. Our emotions and feelings translate to our horses every moment we are around or are on them.

As riders, we must take care of ourselves to allow for our horses to also see with a clear head. This preparation is not limited to getting focused or engaged but should also be applied to anxiety and stress. As competitors and athletes, it is natural and good to feel a level of adrenaline and nerves. However, when those thoughts become destructive, they can not only hinder our own performance but can also cause wavering trust from our horses. It is crucial to understand that dressage is a partnership unlike anything else. Our horses put their trust in us every time they face something they are scared of or anytime they respond to our aids. Horses are extremely perceptive animals so if a rider is not confident in their abilities, neither will their horse be confident.

Throughout my riding career, I have learned how to manage my anxieties through understanding how to ground myself. I use breathing techniques, visualization, and most important, I find comfort in my horse. Establishing a relationship and connection with your horse will allow you to find confidence within them. No matter the situation, show, or environment, knowing you can rely on your horse helps relieve a significant

amount of stress. Figuring out as an individual how you can better clear your head is vital to managing competition-induced stress.

When we master this skill, we will be able to master harmony. You may have seen that as a collective mark on our tests. Even judges are searching for and scoring harmony between the horse and rider.

Being confident that we know the tests by heart is important to keep our cool in the ring. Every rider and their minds work differently, so finding out how you best learn your tests may take time. From my experience, I try reading them to myself and I also have someone else read them to me. What I find most useful for me is to visualize them and draw them. Before I ride a test, I always walk my test on foot whether it be in the aisle or in my tack room.

As riders, we are taught to strive for a 10, the perfect movement. But we must also teach ourselves that perfection is not always attainable. We are only human, and our horses are our partners. Doing the best we can for our horse is what we should strive for every time we go down the center line.

My First USEA American Eventing Championships

The American Evening Championships in Kentucky this year was an exciting, nerve-racking, and memorable experience for me. This was the first year that I qualified with my horse Cooper. We started horse trials at the beginning of the year and worked hard to qualify for the AECs. My trainer, Alison Cochran, and I set up a training schedule after I qualified to prepare me for competing with the amazing riders I would meet at the AECs. Dressage training was the main focus as that has always been the hardest event for Cooper and me. Put a complicated stadium course or a challenging crosscountry run in front of Cooper and me and we'll love every second of it. But dressage? Something about trotting down centerline makes my brain shut down. So for me, dressage training leading up to the AECs was both technically and mentally challenging. I am so grateful to have had the opportunity to get instruction from amazing trainers leading up to dressage show day. I don't know if anyone ever feels 'ready' when they arrive at the AECs, but the work that Cooper and I put in beforehand helped me—I'm sure Cooper was just tired of so many circles.



This was my first visit to the Kentucky Horse Park, and it did not disappoint. The first day I went to see Rolex Stadium with Alison was something I'll never forget. It's awe-inspiring standing there knowing that you will get to ride in that arena in a few days. But first...dressage. You can't help but have show nerves on the first day of the first event. I felt weirdly relaxed, which should have been my first warning sign, but it wasn't until I was waiting to go in the arena next and reciting my test that I realized I was combining two different tests into one in my head! Thankfully Alison was able to do what she always does and make everything better so that Cooper and I were able to complete our test (correctly!) and come away with a respectable 33.8%. Not the lowest score, but I was so happy that at the biggest show of my life Cooper and I had completed our dressage test – and

in 16th place in the large Beginner Novice Junior 14 and Under division. I knew that the next two events would be important if we wanted to move up on the scoreboard. That was okay—Cooper and I had been in that position before and I knew Cooper would give it his



all for me because he is the best partner.

We ran double clear in cross country on Saturday – moving us up to 13th place. Then came the final day and the final event. I don't think I can accurately describe what it is like riding through the tunnel to the start gate in Rolex Stadium. The arena is massive, and here I am with Cooper waiting for our turn in the last event that would decide our placement. Whether we went up or down, at that moment I was so happy that I got to be there with my parents, grandparents, trainers, and friends. All that hard work that Cooper and I went through to



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get to that moment was worth it to ride in that arena. The buzzer rang and sixty-eight seconds later we were double clear. Honestly, for me it was just a blur of stride counts and trying to remember to breathe! We moved up to 11th place in the biggest competition of mine and Cooper's partnership, and we got to do the victory gallop with a beautiful ribbon as a reward. My first American Evening Championships was an amazing experience that I will never forget.
