ACTIVITY 1

Title: Demonstration of Hair Coloring

Directions: Prepare your client and get ready to apply the knowledge you gained in basic hair coloring. Always remember that your performance will be rated using the performance scoring rubric.

Follow the guidelines below:

A) Hair Coloring for Virgin Application: Going Lighter

The initial application of hair coloring given to a client's hair that has never been colored or lightened is called *virgin* application.

Virgin application-going lighter method is used when color is one or more levels lighter than your client's natural hair color.

Procedure in the Initial Application of Hair Colorants –Going Lighter Implements Needed in the Application of Hair Color

- Hair coloring product
- Developer
- Color swatches and color charts
- Water proof client cape
- Comb
- Dark towels
- Gloves
- Hair clips
- Measuring container

- Timer
- Shampoo and condioner
- Ear cap
- Applicator bottle
- Color brush and bowl

Preliminary Activities:

- 1. Introduce yourself and welcome the clients to the salon.
- 2. Establish your relationship with your client.
- 3. Always be polite to clients.
- 4. Request your client to fill out an information card.
- 5. Ask relevant questions like hair history, kind of color service. Listen carefully so you can make the appropriate hair color recommendations.
- 6. Pay attention to the client's skin and eye color.
- 7. Prior to the hair coloring service, the following should be done:
 - Give preliminary patch test 24 hours before the hair color service.
 - Look for the client's patch test result for confirmation that all is well and there are no positive results from the hair coloring product.
 - Analyze the client's hair to determine the condition, texture, length and amount of gray hair. Record your findings onto the client's record book.

Preparation

- 1. Consult your client of the desired service in hair coloring. Ask her if she wants a temporary color change or a permanent color change. Or if she wants an over-all color or highlights.
- 2. Show your sample color swatches and color charts for her reference.
- 3. After reaching an understanding of what the client wants, discuss with her what processes need to be done to achieve it.





4. Ask your client to remove all jewelry. Metal materials are subject to damage when coming in contact with hair coloring products.

- 5. Drape the client. Place one towel underneath the cape.
- 6. Make a color strand test. Record the results onto the client's record card.
- 7. Comb the hair to remove tangles to ensure even coverage of colorants.
- 8. Coloring works best when the hair is dry and not freshly washed. However, if the hair needs to be shampooed because it is dirty or extremely conditioned, the hair must be thoroughly dried. In shampooing, slight massage is needed to avoid scalp irritations while giving a tint.

Note: It is not advisable to shampoo the hair immediately before coloring because this will remove the natural oil that protects the scalp of your client during the coloring process.

- 9. As part of your PPE, wear your protective gloves and mask.
- 10. Prepare your hair coloring product and developer following the manufacturer's direction.



Product Application:

- 1. Divide the hair into four quadrants. Separate and secure with plastic clips.
- 2. With the use of a spatula, remove protective cream from the jar and apply cream to the facial hairline.
- 3. Begin by outlining the quadrants. Apply the product from the scalp with approximately one centimeter out.








- 4. Select the area of the head where gray hair is dominant. If there is no gray hair, start at the crown area.
- 5. With the use of the rat tail of the applicator brush, part the hair into ¼ inch subsection.

6. Hold the pick up strands away from the head and apply a sufficient amount of hair color to completely saturate the midstrands of hair, staying 1 inch away from the scalp. Application is made one (1) inch away from the scalp because the hair away from the root area receives less natural body heat and will take a little longer to develop.

Color may be applied with a nozzle applicator or an applicator brush.

- An applicator bottle should be large enough for color and developer with enough space for mixing.
- Mixing bowl should not be non-metallic





- 7. Use timer to determine the duration of development time in accordance to the preliminary strand test results. (Normal processing is approximately 30 minutes, but for maximum lightening and gray coverage, a complete development time is 45 minutes).
- 8. Take a strand test to check color development. Re-apply hair colorants to the hair strands after it was tested.
- 9. Prepare a fresh hair color formula and apply to the root area. Leave color on the hair until color is uniform from roots to ends.
- 10. When the desired color has developed, spray a little amount of water and work into a lather.
- 11. Rinse thoroughly.
- 12. Remove stains from around the hairline, ears and neck.
- 13. Put a mild shampoo.
- 14. Condition and rinse again.
- 15. Towel dry.
- 16. Style hair.
- 17. Fill out the record card and file.
