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Alumna Credits **Alumni Relations** and **ICT Alumni Chapter** for Career Breakthrough

Tshwane University of Technology (TUT) alumna Angelina Dyani, who recently graduated with a Diploma in Informatics, has credited the Alumni Relations Office (ARO) and the Faculty of Information and Communication Technology (FoICT) Alumni Chapter for playing a pivotal role in her academic and professional success.

Dyani shared that during her search for a Work Integrated Learning (WIL) placement in 2024, she faced significant challenges due to the limited job opportunities in South Africa.

"After completing my first semester, I needed a WIL placement to fulfil my qualification requirements. The search was stressful and discouraging because opportunities were scarce," she recalled.

Her breakthrough came after reaching out to a friend who referred her to the TUT ARO. Through the support of Keabetswe Ramantshane, Chairperson of the FoICT Alumni Chapter, and the ARO team, Dyani was placed at Rocvest, a Bryanston-based company, where she completed her WIL and gained valuable industry experience.

"Their team went above and beyond, contacting companies on my behalf and securing a placement in less than a month. I was overjoyed. Not only did they help me get in, but they also followed up to ensure I was doing well and being supported at the company. I'm incredibly grateful for their care and commitment," said Dyani.

The experience enabled her to complete her qualification on record time, and on 7 October 2025, she proudly walked the graduation stage at the TUT Soshanguve Campus a moment she describes as one of the highlights of her life.

"This milestone wouldn't have been possible without the support I received from the FoICT Alumni Chapter and Alumni Relations Office," she added.

Her story took an even more inspiring turn when Rocvest offered her permanent employment after completing her WIL.

"The individuals who helped me continue to stay in touch and track my progress, which makes me feel truly valued and supported. It's been a journey of unexpected turns, growth, and blessings and I wouldn't change a thing."

Ramantshane commended Dyani's resilience and success, noting that while the achievement is worth celebrating, more work remains to be done to ensure similar success stories for other students still seeking WIL opportunities. 🎓

Chancellor's Awards celebrate TUT's magnificent seven students

Excellence took centre stage at the annual Chancellor's Awards ceremony honouring the University's top students – the Magnificent Seven – who achieved the highest academic distinctions in each of the University's seven faculties.

The ceremony, held on 8 November 2025, also marked the fifth anniversary of the Chancellor's Awards, an initiative conceptualised during the 2020/2021 Covid-19 restrictions when physical graduations were suspended. The awards – held at The Blades, north-east of Pretoria – were created to honour the University's top academic achievers alongside their families and academic leaders.

Zilke Heyns, Rose Matole, Mpho Masindi Mudau, Andile Wiseman Nkalanga, Reakantse Shila and Mpho Ndou were present to receive their accolades, while Asiphile Mabeka joined the celebrations in spirit due to prior commitments.

In her opening and welcome, Acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor for Digital Transformation Dr Emily Mabote highlighted that the awards not only recognise individual brilliance, but also underscore the collective impact of the TUT community in advancing education, research and societal development.

"The event encourages awardees to give back to the University and society through mentorship, sharing their expertise, or contributing to institutional growth, reinforcing TUT's commitment to nurturing

excellence, fostering innovation and inspiring meaningful change," she said.

TUT Vice-Chancellor and Principal Prof Tinyiko Maluleke delivered a keynote address that was as poetic as it was profound. Drawing from an age-old parable of a blind, wise woman and the fragile bird placed in her hands, he reminded the audience that the future rests with all of us.

Whether that bird symbolises education, opportunity or the aspirations carried by young people from Bethlehem to Mbuzini, Thohoyandou, Johannesburg, Pretoria and Ga-Sekororo, the message rang clear: we dare not let it die.

From this powerful metaphor, Prof Maluleke celebrated the journeys of the Magnificent Seven, whose achievements embody what becomes possible when talent, resilience and opportunity intersect. Their stories, he noted, prove that not only can the bird live it can soar.

From Student to Scholar:

Dr Lebogang Matholwane Mathole's Journey of Transformation

At the intersection of research, teaching, and community service stands Dr Lebogang Mathole, a scholar whose story embodies transformation.

Her journey with the institution is a story of passion, curiosity, transformation, and growth, one that began in 2008 when she first enrolled as a student and has since evolved into a career dedicated to teaching, research, and empowering others.

From the beginning, TUT became more than just a university for Dr Mathole; it was her second home. As a student, she quickly distinguished herself, not only academically but also through her leadership and sense of responsibility. She served as a class representative, tutored her peers, and by 2011, before even completing her second qualification (B-Tech), she was offered an opportunity to lecture part-time in entrepreneurship. That early recognition of her talent and impact sparked a lifelong commitment to academia.

Dr Mathole describes her diverse academic success as natural and purposeful. She was drawn to the structured, orderly environment of the university, often spending her free time in the library or secluded corners of campus, immersing herself in books. That love for learning and her ability to inspire others made her a natural fit for the lecture hall, where she has now been teaching and mentoring students for over a decade.

Her time at TUT has not only shaped her professionally but has also empowered her personally. While some may hold misconceptions about the institution, she sees herself as living proof of the strength of its brand commitment to empowering lives. "Everywhere I go, I carry TUT with me," she says, "and I am proud to represent a university that has given me so much opportunity to actualise myself."

Driven by curiosity and a desire to give back, Dr Mathole has pursued postgraduate studies, contributed to research, and authored chapters in academic books. For her, writing is not only about scholarship but also about creating pathways for others, ensuring that future students can open a book and find names that reflect their own identities and aspirations.

Earlier this year, Dr Mathole made history as the first recipient of a PhD in Economics with a specialisation in Local Economic Development (LED) at the University of Johannesburg (UJ). Her ground-breaking doctoral research explored entrepreneurial strategies to promote locally produced luxury goods, drawing on interdisciplinary insights from consumer psychology, entrepreneurship, and LED.

Her teaching experience has taken her from the vibrant, fast-paced atmosphere of Pretoria Campus to the calmer, community-centred environment of Mbombela Campus. Each space has shaped her differently, but both have reaffirmed her commitment to quality education and holistic student development. "The environment influences the kind of student we encounter," she explains, "but ultimately, both campuses offer the same quality of education that transforms lives."

Her presence at TUT Mbombela serves as a beacon for students who might doubt their potential. She reminds them that humility, service, and resilience are as important as ambition in building a meaningful career.

Though she has already achieved significant milestones, Dr Mathole believes her academic expedition is far from over. Her vision is to continue growing as a researcher, mentor, and thought leader, expanding her influence beyond the university while remaining rooted in service." she concludes with a smile of enthusiasm. 🌱

Every so often, we encounter an artist whose sound feels like a conversation soulful, layered and deeply personal. **MODIKA.**, formerly known as Phonikz, is such an artist. His journey from the heart of Limpopo to international playlists has been nothing short of remarkable.

A multi-instrumentalist, producer, and creative visionary, **MODIKA.** aka Thado Modika's musical journey began at only 10 years old, based on a deep passion for house music.

Over the years, his sound has evolved, blending house with elements of neo-soul, jazz, gospel and hip-hop, creating a signature style that resonates across genres.

This passion, paired with resilience, has driven him to explore every facet of the music industry not only as a performer but also as a thinker and innovator.

Despite his early dedication to music, **MODIKA.** chose to broaden his horizons academically, enrolling for a Diploma in Visual Communication: Film and Television Production at the Tshwane University of Technology's (TUT) Faculty of Arts and Design. His decision to study outside of music was intentional.

"The idea was to expand. I had been doing music for so long. Not to say I knew everything, but I was at a place where my skill was good enough to present and I wanted to develop an additional one," he said.

During his time at TUT, **MODIKA.** remained closely connected to the music department and took full advantage of resources like the library's extensive music collection. He credits TUT for giving him lifelong friendships and professional collaboration that continue to shape his career.

"These are my best friends, working partners and lifelong connections," he added.

Though seemingly unrelated to music, his studies were a strategic step, equipping him with additional skills that complement and elevate his artistry. This combination of academic insight and raw talent has become one of his greatest strengths.

A completely self-taught musician, **MODIKA.** prides himself on his instinctive and original approach to music, believing there is no single formula for creativity - what works for one artist may not work for another.

Today, he is proficient in bass, drums, piano, violin and guitar, demonstrating a level of discipline and artistic intuition rarely seen in the industry. His music is the product of passion, years of practice and relentless learning.

His efforts have not gone unnoticed. He has collaborated with some of South Africa's most celebrated artists, including Amanda Black, Samthing Soweto, Azana, and Manana, while he also counts working with Grammy-winning artist Cynthia Erivo among his proudest achievements.

Like any journey, his path has had its share of obstacles, yet he approaches every challenge with a positive mindset and an unshakable belief that "things will always happen."

More than fame, **MODIKA.** hopes to be remembered for the influence and inspiration he offers to others, just as he was inspired by those who came before him.

"That influence shaped the person I am now. I would like to keep that going for others as well."

Through passion and persistence, he has conquered his childhood dreams. 🌹

In May 2025, Dr Lametse Nono Letsebe achieved a remarkable academic milestone, earning her Doctorate in Management Sciences with a specialization in Organizational Leadership from the Tshwane University of Technology (TUT). Her scholarly journey reflects not only academic excellence but also a profound commitment to bridging the worlds of academia, enterprise, and social impact.

Born and based in Botswana, Dr Letsebe's research and professional passions lie at the intersection of strategic management, entrepreneurship, and innovation. She believes in the power of higher education to shape real-world enterprise solutions and currently brings this vision to life through her work at a University of Botswana Enterprise company an initiative inspired by and rooted in her doctoral thesis recommendations.

and perseverance. "PhD is not difficult. It just needs dedication and perseverance because there are processes beyond your control, like waiting for approvals before conducting interviews. You must be patient," she advises aspiring scholars.

Her academic impact is not confined to paper. Dr Letsebe has presented at several international conferences, using global platforms to promote collaboration between government, private sector, academia, and communities particularly in the pursuit of social-impact ventures.

One of her proudest achievements has been facilitating a strategic partnership between the University of Botswana and Tshwane University of Technology, aimed at advancing knowledge and technology transfer, entrepreneurship development, innovation, and research commercialization.

Her global outlook was further enriched by her thesis defence in Spain, where she encountered potential international students with an interest in South African education. "I would like to promote TUT and ask those in Spain to sponsor their students to come here. Dr Tlou Cholo Legacy

Lecture Marks 100 Years of a Freedom Fighter's Enduring Lessons

The South African State Theatre was the stage for a profound evening of reflection and inspiration as leaders, scholars, alumni, and students gathered for the 4th Annual Dr Tlou Cholo Legacy Lecture and the musical performance of *The Fatherland*.

Held under the theme "*Lessons of the Tlou Cholo Generation: Have They Been Betrayed?*", the event marked the centenary of Dr Tlou Theophilus "TT" Cholo, a towering freedom fighter whose courage, intellect, and unwavering dedication to justice helped shape South Africa's liberation struggle.

Delivering the keynote address, Buti Manamela, Minister of Higher Education, Science and Innovation, who also serves as a member of the ANC National Executive Committee and the SACP Central Committee, reflected on Dr Cholo's enduring impact on South Africa's political and moral landscape.

He noted that Dr Cholo's generation fought not only for political freedom but for social and economic justice. "They believed in unity, discipline, and a vision of a non-racial, non-sexist, democratic society. Our duty is to ensure that the National Democratic Revolution they began is completed," said Manamela.

The Minister described Dr Cholo as "a worker, a soldier, and a teacher," whose life was a lesson in humility and service. Born in Ga-Matlala in the mid-1920s, Dr Cholo joined the African National Congress during the Defiance Campaign, co-founded the South African Congress of Trade Unions (SACTU), and was one of the earliest members of Umkhonto we Sizwe (MK), serving 16 years on Robben Island. For his lifelong service, he was decorated with the Order of Luthuli in Silver and the ANC's highest honour, Isithwalandwe/Seaparankwe.

In his opening remarks, Professor Tinyiko Maluleke, Vice-Chancellor and

Principal of the Tshwane University of Technology (TUT), set the tone for the evening with a moving reflection on the intersection of art, history, and memory.

He acknowledged Aubrey Sekhabi, who directed *The Fatherland* musical, alongside the cast and production team, including Siyabonga Gaza, Boitumelo Muchiwa, Malebu Kekana, Ontlametsi Masilo (Assistant Director), Princess Sechele (Producer), and Lesego Moripe (Arts and Costume Administrator).

Professor Maluleke described the musical as more than a stage performance but a living archive of memory. "It's a virtual reality on stage that transports us from Ha-Matlala via Makala to the GP hostel, to the kitchens and gardens of Germiston where Dr Cholo once worked," he said.

He lauded the production for capturing the spirit of a generation that believed in the power of service and collective struggle, reminding the audience that history is not just to be remembered, but to be relived.

Taking to the podium, Dr Gwen Ramokgopa delivered a heartfelt reflection that centred on the moral vision and selflessness of Dr Cholo's generation. "We gather today to honour a generation of selflessness the generation of Dr Cholo and his comrades who contributed immensely to the attainment of our democracy and freedom," she said.

Dr Ramokgopa noted that this generation's ideals are enshrined in the Freedom Charter and the Constitution, which call for participatory democracy and mandate us to "improve the quality of life of all citizens and free the potential of each person." She reminded the audience that these founding values also charge us to "establish a society based on democratic values, social justice, and fundamental human rights."

Adding his reflections, Professor Mashupye Herbert Maserumule, Executive Dean of the Faculty of Humanities, described the Dr Tlou Cholo Legacy Lecture as an opportunity to learn what it means to be human and how to relate to each other as a nation.

"Let's thank Dr Cholo and his family for giving us this moment of historical consciousness and the joy of learning from the horse's mouth," said Prof Maserumule.

"Cholo and his generation believed in the beauty of a dream for us and for future generations to live in a society free of racial and gender discrimination. They embraced this vision on our behalf."

Speaking on behalf of the TUT's Faculty of Humanities Alumni Chapter, Chairperson Khoisan Sonti echoed the Minister's message, urging alumni and youth to uphold the values that Dr Cholo's life exemplified.

"Education without justice is incomplete, and freedom without purpose is hollow," Sonti remarked. "As beneficiaries of the sacrifices made by the Tlou Cholo generation, we must ask ourselves whether we have honoured their values of sacrifice, integrity, and service."

Sonti highlighted the Chapter's efforts to preserve institutional and national memory, paying tribute to alumni such as Malesela Maubane and Shalate Davhana, who have contributed to documenting Dr Cholo's legacy through thought leadership and media commentary.

He announced key initiatives, including the upcoming Hendrik Matikweni Nkuna Lecture in 2025, dedicated to student activism and leadership, and the soon-to-be-launched TUT Alumni Fund, aimed at supporting financially needy students, mentoring programmes, and alumni engagement through the Alumni Space App.

"The Faculty of Humanities is home to over 73,000 alumni a powerful network of educators, artists, journalists, activists, and public servants," Sonti said. "Our mission is to mobilise this network not for recognition, but for meaningful, lasting impact. Every alumni contribution, no matter how small, honours the sacrifices of the generation that came before us."

The event underscored the enduring relevance of Dr Tlou Cholo's teachings and the urgent need to restore the moral and revolutionary integrity of South Africa's democratic project. 🌱
