As per our By-Law 29-a - Annual Meeting:



This upcoming week, Bay View has the distinct honor of

hosting fellow members of the **Chautauqua Trail**, an organization of about 20 Chautauqua communities across North America. Each year, the group gathers to connect, share ideas, and carry forward the vision of the Chautauqua Movement, a uniquely American tradition that began in the 1870s to offer lifelong learning, spiritual enrichment, cultural arts, and recreation in an intentional community.

This year, the Trail gathering is happening right here in Bay View. We are proud to welcome these like-minded communities to our historic campus and invite our own community members to take part. The business meetings of the Chautauqua Trail are open to all, and I encourage you to attend and learn more about the broader movement to which we belong. Meetings will be held in Evelyn Hall on Friday, August 8 from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 to 3 p.m., and Saturday, August 9 from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.

Collaboration is something I deeply value, and this year has been rich with it - from the Trail to local partnerships. This spring, Bay View also hosted the Chautauqua Learning Lab, a new initiative that brings together leadership and staff from Chautauqua communities to collaborate, share

knowledge, develop efficiencies, and build relationships. These connections help strengthen not just Bay View, but the entire movement.

Through these connections, we were introduced to **America in Bloom**, an independent nonprofit that helps communities of all sizes thrive by celebrating their strengths and identifying areas for enhancement. Bay View joins **Boulder Chautauqua** and **Lakeside Chautauqua** as early adopters of this initiative, and we are already learning a great deal.

This week, representatives from America in Bloom visited our campus. They toured our buildings, programs, and green spaces, and many Bay View residents generously offered their time and stories to help share who we are. I want to thank all who have taken part; your hospitality and your honest reflections have made a real impact.

America in Bloom will soon share a report that recognizes what we're doing well and suggests areas where we might grow even stronger. Founders of American Spoon and The Berry Center to Discuss Pressing Concerns of Small, Family Farms

According to the USDA Census of Agriculture, fewer farms exist in the US today than in 1850. Farm consolidation, mechanization, hybrid seeds, synthetic fertilizer and pesticides have enabled large-scale farming and increased yields with less labor. But have we paid too steep a price for that productivity gain?

Author Wendell Berry, an early leader in the organic-food movement, has written extensively on the subject, defending the longstanding structure of small family farms and rural communities against the invasion of "factory" farming. Berry's daughter, Mary, founded The Berry Center in New Castle, Kentucky in 2011 to help offset the pressures brought on by agricultural industrialization.

Farming is facing not just declining numbers of family farms. It's also contending with an aging population. Farmers aged 65 and older have increased 12% since 2017, while those aged 35-65 have decreased 9%. One bright spot: the number of beginning farmers and farmers under the age of 35 has increased by 11% since 2017. One million new farmers, with fewer than 10 years of experience, have entered the field in recent years.

Those new farmers, along with the established farming population, need resources and support. That is where the Berry Center comes

in. Mary Berry founded the center in 2011 "for the purpose of bringing focus, knowledge and cohesiveness to the work of changing our ruinous industrial agriculture system into a system and culture that use nature as the standard, accept no permanent damage to the ecosphere, and take into consideration human health in local communities."

American Spoon founder Justin Rashid knows a thing or two about building a business, and about maintaining a healthy ecosystem of independent food producers in a tight-knit community.

"[American Spoon was] a farm-to-table market," he says, "before farm-to-table was a thing." The legendary company he founded in 1982, a "purveyor of spoonable preserves" and so much more—has grown to include five retail stores, partnerships with companies like Zingerman's in Ann Arbor, and an online business that distributes catalogs to millions of fans around the world.

On Tuesday, August 5th at 4:30 p.m. in Voorhies Auditorium,

Justin Rashid and Mary Berry will share their insights into what it takes to maintain and grow a sustainable mid-level economy with, and for, independent food producers. They'll be joined by Rashid's son Noah Marshall-Rashid, who now runs the company his father founded, and Berry Center board member Maggie Keith, fourth-generation steward of the biodynamic beef producer Foxhollow Farm in Kentucky.

The night before, Maggie Keith will give a brief introduction to biodynamic farming at the 7:30 p.m. Monday Night Movie, *The Biggest Little Farm*, a

heartwarming and award-winning documentary about a 200-acre

biodynamic farm near Los
Angeles. Please join us Monday
and Tuesday for what are bound to
be eye-opening and
enlightening presentations about
the current state of farming in the
US, and what we can all do to
support our treasured local
growers.

Ann Voskamp is the wife of a farmer, mama to seven, and the author of the New York Times bestsellers *The Broken Way, The Greatest Gift, Unwrapping the Greatest Gift,* and the sixty-week New York Times bestseller *One Thousand Gifts: A Dare to Live Fully Right Where You Are*, which has sold more than 1.5 million copies and has been translated into more than twenty languages and her latest book is *Waymaker: Finding the Way to the Life You've Always Dreamed of.*

Named by Christianity Today as one of fifty women most shaping culture and the church today, Ann is a passionate advocate for the marginalized and oppressed around the globe, partnering with Mercy House Global, Compassion International, and artisans around the world through her fair-trade community, Grace Crafted Home. She and her husband took a leap of faith to restore a 125-year-old stone church into The Village Table, a place where everyone has a seat and belongs. She is the author of The Serviceberry: Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World, Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge and the Teachings of Plants, which has earned Kimmerer wide acclaim. Her first book, Gathering Moss: A Natural and Cultural History of Mosses, was awarded the John Burroughs Medal for outstanding nature writing, and her other work has appeared in Orion, Whole Terrain, and numerous scientific journals. In 2022, Braiding Sweetgrass was adapted for young adults by Monique Gray Smith. This new edition reinforces

how wider ecological understanding stems from listening to the earth's oldest teachers: the plants around us.
