A Message from the Principal

A LORETO EDUCATION

It is that time of the year where we begin to welcome new students to Loreto Kirribilli as part of their orientation program before they commence the following year. At the same time, Year 12 girls are finishing their exams and coming to an end of their formal school journey. Regardless of which end of the journey our girls and their parents are on, the journey does not finish at the end of the Loreto Kirribilli schooling experience (which for a newly starting Kindergarten student is 2037!).

We are instead welcoming our new parents and their daughters into a life-long association with the school. Currently, in relation to all Loreto schools within Australia and abroad, there are over 1.5 million Loreto alumnae in the world. That is an incredible representation of strong, capable, faith-filled women contributing to a better society across every continent. The contribution and therefore impact that Loreto women are making to the world never ceases to amaze me.

This contribution was clearly on display at Loreto Federation which took place at Loreto Manderville Hall Toorak, in Melbourne in October this year. Loreto Federation is the biennial gathering of ex-students from Loreto schools across Australia with the purpose for exploring social issues through the work of Loreto alumnae. The theme of this year's Federation was 'Environmental Justice: People, Places and Our Shared

Future'. The speakers were outstanding, and it is through these events that you gain a full insight into the long-lasting impact of a Loreto education.

The idea to 'federate' came from the foundress of Loreto Schools in Australia, Mother Gonzaga Barry, who wrote the following in 1897 to her students:

'Your dictionary will tell you that Federation means a league, a compact or the act of uniting in a league. Now would it not be a good thing for all Loreto Girls to Federate in a great league for a noble end, viz.: to work out patiently, steadily, faithfully, high and holy aims in the daily routine of life's duties. Federate Sydney with Perth, Melbourne with Ballarat, with Randwick near the blue waters of Botany Bay, with Portland facing the Great Southern Ocean.'

EUCALYPTUS BLOSSOMS, 8 DECEMBER 1897, P5

It took some time for the idea to take hold, however, in 1955 the first Federation took place, and apart from the interruption caused by Covid, Federation has been regularly occurring across Australia ever since.

We are excited to announce that Loreto Kirribilli will host the next Federation in 2026. We hope to see as many Loreto ex-students and friends of Loreto (who are all welcome) as possible.



















2024 Awards Ceremony Address

In the seven years I've been Chair of the School Board, I've spoken to this and other School gatherings many times.

Often, a theme of my talks has been how we, as a School community, have been dealing with the great changes we're facing, some chosen by us, but many the result of forces beyond our control.

An obvious example of the latter is the continuing funding pressure we're under, as Governments reduce financial support for independent schools, and what that has meant for our parents and grandparents, as our Principal and staff strive for further improvements in what our school offers to our students. Another very topical issue is social media and its positive and negative impact on young lives.

However, today, instead of change, I want to briefly focus on its opposite, and that is: what must stay the same, if our School is to continue to engage in partnership with our families to nurture and work closely with our girls to prepare them for the many challenges and opportunities in life after leaving school.

Top of mind here are, of course, the values of Mary Ward and her companions, which, unaltered, have guided our staff and students for the more than 100 years we have been at Kirribilli.

As all of you here know, 2024 is the year of **Sincerity** and focuses on our personal honesty, and the way in which we hold ourselves in our communications and relationships.

The ideal of Mary Ward and her companions was that we examine our interior lives. Lots of work has been done this year to explore this theme with the girls, and how it applies in our day-to-day lives, and not just at school, but as an ongoing part of our lives.

The girls know these Mary Ward values off by heart, and so of course do many of you parents here today, but just to remind ourselves, the others are **Freedom**, **Justice**, **Verity** and **Felicity**.

I'm very confident that when today's students are parents, aunts, or even grandparents and are sitting in a room like this, listening to a person like me speaking

to them, they are likely to hear a similar commitment to these values. After all, living these values, is what makes our School special and different, as other aspects of School life wax and wane and as education evolves.

I want to finish today by mentioning two long term supporters of our Mary Ward values who strongly exemplify Mother Gonzaga Barry's saying "leave after you something on which others may build".

Two of our Board members, Yvonne Le Bas and Louisa Geddes are retiring from our Board this year. Yvonne has been on the Board for nine years and the Finance Committee for 11 years. Yvonne's daughter, Niamh Hremiako, who graduated from Kirribilli in 2017, has just completed her medical degree at Sydney University. And today Niamh is being awarded a top Women's Health Award at her graduation ceremony at Sydney University. A great Loreto Kirribilli story.

Apart from her focus on our finances, Yvonne has brought a very important strategic mind-set to Board discussions about the sort of School we are and want to be, and our educational offerings. She leaves us with a strong platform to continue to enhance and evolve our educational offerings.

Louisa, a Kirribilli ex- student and aunt of one of our ex- students, is retiring from the School Board after six years, (but I think for her, it feels like many more than those six years! Maybe 12?). Louisa led the Board involvement in the Spiritus planning and building and has continued with parent and new Board member Anthony Elias to position us very well, literally, to continue to develop our School to respond to our evolving educational and pastoral needs.

Thanks so very much to Yvonne and Louisa for their massive contribution. Thanks to our community here today for all that you do for our School. I wish you all the very best for a happy and safe Christmas and holiday season.







Mary Ward Justice Forum

Inspired by Mary Ward to be 'seekers of truth and doers of justice', we seek the truth by enriching our knowledge and understanding around social justice issues and galvanizing those around us to take action. Pope Francis reminds us to set aside time for dialogue with God, and with each other, to make a difference and advocate for the marginalised in our world.

The Mary Ward Justice Forum is an event held annually and hosted alternately between Loreto Kirribilli and Loreto Normanhurst. The forum has been running for the past 13 years and is a significant opportunity to bring the Kirribilli and Normanhurst communities together and share in Mary Ward's vision of continuing God's work.

This year, at Loreto Kirribilli, the conversation focused on truth-telling, embracing the opportunity to be open and honest about a way forward, and committing to ongoing dialogue, respect, and collaboration between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians. Our panellists included Fr Frank Brennan SJ AO; Roslyn Thomas, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education Consultant for the Association of Independent Schools of NSW; and Lucy Howard-Shibuya ('85), a teacher at Goodooga Central School. Our Director of Teaching and Learning, Mathew Clausen, moderated the panel discussion, posing questions such as Are Australians generally de-sensitised to uncomfortable truths? What are the hard lessons after the referendum? What do we take forward from the outcome of the referendum? and What is the role of education in moving forward?

The forum was an opportunity to engage in meaningful and deep discussions around truth-telling and hope as we move forward 12 months on from the Voice referendum. Attendees, especially students, asked profound questions and expressed their thoughts on reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians. The speakers concurred that to move forward and for reconciliation to be effective, it must involve truth-telling which actively addresses issues of inequality, systemic racism and situations where the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are ignored, denied or reduced.











I came away last night, not only enriched by all of you, but also encouraged that the many nations that encompass this land have a generation of strong, informed, and courageous allies on the way. The young people in the room were amazing and deeply reflective of where our nation is heading.

PARENT INFORMATION NIGHTS

During Term 3 we invited parents to hear from expert speakers about some of the issues facing our young people: social media and body image; consent; and transitioning to high school.



Associate Professor Griffiths leads a team at the University of Melbourne that is undertaking significant research with the TikTok 'algorithm'. He spoke with students and parents about *The Online World of TikTok and Social Media*, revealing the power of TikTok and other social media algorithms that direct

content to users of these platforms.

Dr Griffiths highlighted that TikTok is the dominant media vehicle for youth culture, and more time is spent on this form of social media than any other streaming platform.

Dr Griffiths' harm-minimisation approach provided practical ways for our students to take control of their own social media to ensure they can make active decisions on what is being delivered to them.



DR GRIFFITHS' ACTIVE STRATEGIES TO MAKE TIKTOK MORE POSITIVE

Use the 'refresh' setting - it temporarily relaxes the algorithm to bring you a wider variety of content.

Actively search for content you know makes you happy or interests you.

Use the 'Not interested' button - this will force the algorithm to listen.

Do not use TikTok to find out if something is wrong with you.

Set a daily screen time limit - try 1 hour to start with!

CHILD PSYCHOLOGIST

Jane McGowen ('86) is a consent education specialist who has been working in partnership with the school since 2019. Together we have developed an emotional literacy program tailored to meet the needs of our students in Years 7-12.

Jane began her presentation to parents with the latest statistics from the *Growing Up in Australia* report. She shared what her own experience with young men and women has taught her, and then outlined the approach she takes with her age-appropriate consent education sessions. She also shared her tips for parents in navigating this sometimes-difficult topic of discussion.

Dr Judith Locke is a clinical psychologist specialising in modern parenting, family wellbeing, and academic environments. She is also a former teacher and school counsellor. Dr Locke gave parents some practical and proven strategies to support students as they enter their teenage years and transition to high school. Navigating friendships and growing up can be difficult, and her advice and suggestions were warmly welcomed by all.

We will continue to work in partnership with parents to address common issues that arise for our teenagers, and provide strategies they may like to explore with their daughters.

Working in teams, the young changemakers dreamed up ideas for apps to solve all sorts of local



issues and help people in areas such as environment, education, health, and equality. There were apps to improve disabled access, to protect our oceans, to assist teachers share resources, identify fish species, and even prevent bullying.

During her speech to welcome parents to the Changemakers@LK event, student Eva told the crowd, "In less than ten years we will be available for employment, and you won't be disappointed!" As parents took in the impressive displays and listened to the students' confident presentations, many were inclined to agree.







This year we launched SEED, a collaborative learning project, in partnership with the Taronga Conservation Society and Future Anything. Years 8 and 9 students from Loreto Kirribilli, Redlands School, and Our Lady of Mercy College, Parramatta, have conducted research, applied critical thinking, and used creative problem-solving to develop innovative solutions to critical sustainability and conservation issues.

We are thrilled to share that this exciting journey has been a remarkable success, filled with unique learning experiences, industry engagement, and inspiring student progress.

Over the past months, students from Loreto Kirribilli, Redlands, and OLMC have immersed themselves in a dynamic, hands-on program focused on sustainability, entrepreneurship, and environmental science. From an energetic launch day at Taronga to mentorship sessions with industry experts, scientists, and zoo keepers, SEED has provided students with unparalleled insights and practical skills essential for tackling real-world conservation challenges. At the SEED program's Twilight Finale Event at Taronga in November, the students showcased their




inspiring projects and celebrated their hard work and dedication to environmental problem-solving. The evening was a showcase of youth-led innovation and commitment to sustainability.








HOUSE DEBATING

And with so many women of authority around I reverted to being a bit giggly at times too.

The second thing about Federation is the intellectual curiosity. The theme of the weekend was caring for the environment, and we heard from a diverse group of speakers including an ex-Loreto Melbourne documentary filmmaker Liz Courtney. From Toorak's auditorium we were enthralled by her film about melting ice in Antarctica which was beautifully shot and crafted. My commitment, curiosity and cerebral cup were filled.

Finally, we've come away with a sense of female empowerment. We may not be fist-pumping, but there is feminism in the air at Federation. It's such a privilege to be with a group of women, the Sisters, women of all ages including those in their teens and 20s, and sensing that we are the future of Catholicism and the future of society.
