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New University Governing Authority Elected

Uls first Governing Authority (GA) has finished its term of office and a new GA is about to fill its shoes. The term lasted five years and its inception coincided with the universities act of 1997 which ushered in a new era of democracy within the power structures of Universities. Democracy as no one interest group could have a majority on the authority. The GA meets monthly and has 34 members broken down as: 2 undergrad reps (Eoin & Gráinne), 1 postgrad rep(Jarlath), 3 ministers appointees, 3 reps of UL Foundation, 3 professors, academic staff, 3 non academic staff, the presidents of UL & Mary I, the financial controller & registrars of UL, the cathaoirleach of Limerick county council, the cathaoirleach of Limerick city council, the mayor of Limerick, 3 local industry reps, 2 local arts & culture reps, 2 reps of graduates of UL & of course the chancellor of the University (Dr. Miriam Hederman O'Brien).

The GA is the supreme statutory body governing Universitiy affairs on all non academic issues. Academic issues are dealt with by Academic Council(AC - more about that later). The chancellor chairs proceedings which are usually deliberations over reports & recommendations from sub committees of the authority which

cover campus devolopment, finance, library, IT & Human Resources, nominating sub committee(they vet nominations for Chancillor & UL honorary doctorates). It is quite difficult to bring up a new item as i fit is contenetious it will be deferred to the relevent committee. Having siad that the student reps seem to be given some liberties in the GA ethicatte because of who they represent.

Most questions & comments are dirested at management who are the president Rogger Downer, the financial controller John O' Conner & the registrar Kevin Ryan. The scud missiles could be coming from all

The chancellor as chair is the arbtrator and usually makes the proposals. The makeup is changing now and with this will bring the problems of the GA getting to know one another again.

Some controversy arose during the recent elections for graduates to the new GA. A student who graduated from ul in 1977 (then NIHE) with a diploma wanted to run but was told he wasn't eligible as only degree



I don't really understand why I am writing this. Maybe it's out of boredom, maybe I've too much time on my hands or maybe I just want to acknowledge to myself and admit to others something about myself.

I'm a 4th year female student. I've always tried to be chirpy and giddy to those around me but inside I wanted to die.

I read an article in 'An Focal - Week 6' recently about depression. It was weird to see it in print. Also it was kind of comforting.

After a few troublesome years something snapped in me and I went to get help 4 months ago. I've since been on antidepressants. I'm still rater ashamed of that but I can honestly say hinhs have changed for me. For the first month I didn't really notice a change. I guess I expected my whole world to change and I'd just be happy inside to meet my outside persona. That didn't happen, but something better happened instead. Over the weeks, I began to emerge with a more balanced outlook. My issues were still there but I was somehow able to stand back and not want to hurt myself because of it. I still worry, cry and get stressed but not to the extreme

I feel kind of normal, whatever that is!

But I've still loads of obstacles to climb yet. I've never told my family and only recently told a friend of mine. What hurt an awful lot was

I just want to say that although talking to someone about a problem will be weird, uncomfortable and difficult, please do. But turning a blind eye doesn't help either.

councilor I am dealing with my issues and in a while I'll stop taking my medication (under supervision) and I look forward to that. The thing is, there is help out there. The road is a difficult one and the 1st step the hardest. But honestly it's worth a try.

Dear Editor Further to your article in AN Focal on the schedule for the nursing programmes, the schedule for the 4 Nursing year BSc (General, Intellectual Disability & Mental Health) is currently being reviewed to enable the programmes to meet the minimum clinical placement hours recommended by An Bord Altranais (2646 hours) as part of fullfillment for registration. The programmes meet with the EU minimum requirements (2300 hours).

voters could stand or vote ion the election. Global Young Leaders Summit - Australia June 2003

The Global Young Leaders Summit is a two week international leadership training programme for university students from around the world organised by the Congressional Youth Leadership Council of the US House of Congress. Next June students from all over the world (including me hopefully!!) will be having the travel experience of a lifetime while having the opportunity to distinguish themselves while grappling with the difficult issues confronting world leaders in the 21st century with both international experts and their peers.

The Summit will have two venues, Canberra and Sydney. In Canberra delegates will visit various national embassies and the Parliament House where they will meet with members of parliament to discuss the social, economic and political affairs of Australia and the world. There will also be an emphasis on cultural differences in leadership, as seen by exploring Tjapukai Aboriginal Cultural Park.

An important theme that will be raised in the Summit is how to balance economic development and the environment, and no better places to do that than the Great Barrier Reef and the tropical rainforest of the Kuranda Range, both of which delegates to GYLS will have the opportunity of visiting.

All the sights and delights of Sydney will be done, Sydney Harbour bridge, Bondi Beach etc. Issues of globalisation and migration will also be discussed during the fortnight.

And why have you just read all this???? Because YOU might be in with a chance of attending GYLS

2003!!!

In the summer of 2000 I attended a conference of a similar nature organised by the same people in the United States. GYLC 2000 was for students in second level education. During that trip we visited Washington DC, New York and a short time in Philadelphia in between (check out the Philly cheese steaks if your ever in that part of the world!). We visited and heard speakers from the International Monetary Fund, the US State Department, the United Nations and the World Trade Centre. We also checked out all the places of interest in Washington DC and New York, the White House, Houses of Congress, all the famous memorials, the Holocaust Museum, Ellis Island, NASDAQ stock exchange etc. Students were also split up into groups of about twenty and were given a country to represent in various simulations of international organisations such as the UN security council, World Trade Organisation and the UN general assembly (which took place in the UN

building in New York). I had the pleasure of representing Rwanda - by the end of the two weeks we had gotten nukes off the Russians, were planning world domination and would forever be known as the Rowdy Rwandans. I've just scratched the surface of what GYLC 2000 was all about, and GYLS 2003 in Australia is guaranteed to be even better!!

As an alumni of these conferences I have the opportunity of nominating one other student from my university to have the chance of attending GYLS 2003. The cost of the trip is pretty significant, but not surprising when what is being offered is taken into account. The cost of everything inside Australia including travel, food, hotel accommodation, tuition fees and all that stuff is US\$4289 (which conveniently is €4289 today also!). Flights to and from Australia from Ireland will be about €1200 - €1300, so the total cost will be (rounded to the nearest thousand - just to make it sound good) €6000 per person. Hefty, eh? I have been making enquiries as how to get some funding from the university and there are other avenues to be checked out as regards fund

Labour Youth on Registration Fees

To all those who are calling for the reintroduction of third level fees including Sarah McDevitt Of UL Ogra Fianna Fail, the Current Minister for Education Noel Dempsey and An Taoiseach Bertie Ahern I would urge them to read the recent report by Clancy and Wall and its findings on participation rates in higher education. This report indicates why it was justified for the Labour Party Minister for Education to abolish college fees in 1996.

It states that between 1980 and 1992, before fees were abolished. the national participation rate increased from 20% to 36%. That the participation rate of the higher professional group increased from 59% to 85%, and that of the lowest socio-economic group from 3% to 12%. It clearly shows that the participation rates of two other groups, salaried employees and lower professional declined during the same period. For the salaried employees, PAYE taxpayers like workers and sales representatives, their participation rate actually fell from 59% to 48%: While for the lower professional group, in other words teachers, nurses, journalists and public service workers, their participation rate fell from 47% to 44% in 1992.

These figures show that under the old system, the children of higher professional group i.e. farmer and business owning parents, were doing very well, while children from poorest groups were improving, but the children of two groups of parents,

often referred as the 'backbone of the country', nurses, teachers, ordinary PAYE employees, were making no progress. These parents were paying their taxes, could not exploit like the professional and employer groups, and unlike the farmer group could not qualify for grants. One of the main reasons for abolishing fees was to redress the discrimination against these groups. There is clear evidence from Clancy and Wall's report that the abolition of fees is beginning to redress the relative disadvantage of the professional and salaried employee groups. As both these groups have increased their participation rates between 1992 and 1998.

It is obvious from this that the reintroduction of fees would definitely

worsen the opportunities of the children of nurses, teachers, office workers and all other low to middle income PAYE taxpayers.

Those calling for re-imposing of fees have claimed that their abolition has damaged the opportunities of disadvantaged groups. This claim has been rubbished by this report, which shows that between 1992 and 1998, two years after their abolition, the national participation rate increased from 36% to 46%, by about a quarter and the participation rate of the lowest socio-economic group almost doubled from 12% to 22%.

So those who claim that a free fees system damages disadvantaged groups, are not just ignoring the facts. The facts tell exactly the opposite. Furthermore there is no evidence whatsoever that the reintroduction of fees will improve equality of participation, as you can clearly see there is overwhelming evidence that it would have the opposite effect.

Claims by Sarah McDevitt that sections of the education budget dealing with disadvantaged students will not be cut have been proven wrong by the recent cutbacks. On the 12th September the minister for finance cut 6 million from the School Retention Initiative, 3.8 million from the Back to Education Initiative, 5 million from the Access Programme and 2 million from the second-level building Programme. These cuts directly hit programmes designed to counteract educational disadvantage.

Further suggestions by UL Ogra Fianna Fail that money saved from re-introducing college fees would be

put back into the system to aid disadvantage is non-sense. Fianna Fail has had nearly six years during our country's most prosperous period, to adjust the inequalities with in the education system and to tackle the real causes of lack of access, namely poverty and educational disadvantage, but have failed miserably. For example, this summer the Minister gave students just EUR3 per week increase in the grant while on the other hand took EUR9 per week back via the registration fees. Students were hit with this 70% hike in registration fees, despite the fact that Higher Education Authority only sought an increase of 7%.

Access to education, at all levels is a right, which the state should provide for all its citizens with the aid of the tax system and not a privilege for those with money, who will make sure that their children will get the best possible education. No Christmas cheer for education in budget

The budget presented by Minister McCreevy did not offer much to cheer about for the education sector. No extra funding was provided for Primary schools despite the accomodation crisis in the sector. In fact the governments solution seems to be to devolop public private partnerships in the provision of Schools. The implications of this are startling. Remember the flagship PPP in Ireland is the Westlink tolled

Moterway around Dublin. The private partner takes all the revenue at the toll booth. Where will the private partenr that builds a school get their revenue?

The recruitment freeze in the public sector also has stark implications for education. Fine Gael spokesperson on education, Olwyn Enright TD, said that this Minister is presiding over a crisis in the education system: many of our schools are in an appalling state of repair; huge numbers of children are being taught by

unqualified people; and he is unable to retain teachers in disadvantaged areas. This crisis is of Government making. Yet the Minister has the audacity to try to spin his way out of it and to make disadvantaged children feel like he is doing them a favour. Jan O' Sullivan Labour spokesperson said that this means no delivery, as promised, on special needs teachers, education welfare guidance counsellors. speech therapists. educational psychologists.

Does the government have any choice? Joe Higgins of the Socialis Party thinks they do. He says that last year the minister reduced corporation tax from 20% to 16%, at an annual cost of €329 million. He also reduced employer's pay related social insurance contributions by €340 million in a year. The combination of these two figures amounted to €676 million last year. The further reduction in corporation tax announced in the budget means that an additional €305 million will be taken from the tax net and given to

the corporations. With the changes announced last year this means that every year from here on, just under €1 billion will be taken from the social fund, which should be allocated to services and to fund the needs of the majority.

The governments philosophy is certainly being influenced by the Independant estimates review committee they set up earlier in the year. The three wise men charged with this have proposed the reintroduction of third level fees with an initial registration fee of €1000.

They have also proposed other revenus spinners such as water charges.

And lastly what of the grant. A campaign that hasn't raised its head because of concentration on the fees question. Again no provision for an increase in the maintenence grant has been announced in this budget. Th problems with this are endless. For a start the level of unemployment assistence at €140 a week is calculated as the minumum needed to live on. Thuis with a grant of €80 euros a week students receiving the

grant will invariably need loans or plenty of part time work to put themselves through college. This fact as much as any other shows how much the Minister is actually going to do do for access to third level education.

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Exam Stress, Hints and Tips

Its exam time again, for most college students. This can be a particularly stressful time. It is the fear of failure, the nervous anticipation and the self-doubt rather than the test itself that is stressful.

Fear of failure can lead to two reactions self doubt, thoughts of inadequacy, or the will to succeed. The trick is to use your nervous energy to motivate yourself rather than let it eat away at your self-confidence and self-esteem.

The other key strategy is to prepare or develop a plan that will enable you to learn all you need to know and keep your stress levels in check.

Some people can actually feel really sick before exams they may be trying to live up to unrealistic expectations of their parents, peers, teachers, or siblings.

If you feel that you are under severe stress please talk to someone about this, never feel that you are alone. There are many organisations out there, which can help you. There are college counsellors that you can go and see. They can sit down and work out a revision timetable with you.

Stress is a physical strain on your body. It puts your body in a constant state of anxiety, which makes you nervous, edgy, and drains your energy reserves. You can help your body by

1) Eating the right kind of food

Some foods are simply more calming than others. Milk contains naturally occurring morphine- like substances, which help to calm you down. Mashed potato is a well-known comfort food and so are bread and baked beans. Lettuce and other raw vegetables are helpful to eat as a calmer. Chocolate has also a calming effect. It contains Theo bromine, which is a calming agent.

Some foods just wind you up. Sugar is the main culprit, it may give you an instant energy hit but that is at the cost of making you more edgy than you were before. Artificial sugar can contribute to stress and depression levels also so it is best to stick to natural foods as much as you can.

2) Allowing your body to get rid of its nervous energy

When we are suffering from stress our body acts as if it is under threat. It starts getting lots of energy to your muscles so that you can fight off the threat or run away. What happens then is the body stores up this energy, this is not healthy if it is not used up it will be stored as nervous energy. Your body wants to get rid of all this nervous energy so give your body what it wants and use up some of that energy in demanding physical exercise. Exercise will calm you down and it also increases the

blood flow around the body to your brain. This will help you think more clearly and to learn better. So even if you don't exercise in the normal run of things, when you are revising exercise is exactly what you need.

3) Avoiding making yourself worse

There are lots of ways you can make stress worse physically. If you are not eating or are fasting, this can stimulate a particularly active state in the body. It's an age-old survival mechanism, which is there to make you actively go out and seek food. This will help take away your concentration and make you feel more agitated. So it is best to east regularly during exam time.

Caffeine acts directly on the nervous system and heightens emotional arousal. It is an extremely bad idea to fill your system up with this as you have enough arousal already with the thought of the exam. Try to drink less coffee and tea, in the period before and during exam. Try to drink milk, or camomile tea as both of these have a calming effect.

It is best to avoid alcohol until exams are over. This does have the effect of making you feel relaxed and making you forget about problems however that is exactly what you do not want to do when studying for an exam. You want to retain as much info as you can, so leave the alcohol for celebrations when the exams are over.


4) Helping your body to relax properly when you have finished studying

One of the effects of stress is that you never really relax. You are always worrying about the exam and feeling guilty for what you should be studying. So it is worth taking some positive steps to try to relax.

Aromatherapy involves using essential oils from plants. Try a couple of drops of lavender oil at night before you go to sleep to help

you relax. Or put a few drops of lavender or geranium oil into your bath

Go out into the fresh air, lots of people find just by being outside this has a calming effect. Half an hour outside can make a difference to how you sleep, and to how you feel generally.

If you live in the city you can try going swimming, or to the sauna or steam room they all have a relaxing effect on your body.

Please take time out for yourself self care is very important, by just doing any of these activities it will improve your concentration and your ability to study. It will leave you feeling much more relaxed.

Exam Tips

- Preparation- make sure you have read all the paper, and that you are familiar with the layout and each section. Make sure you answer questions out of each section.
- 2) Stay calm- when exams start you should always read the question paper thoroughly before starting to answer. If there is any wording that you do not understand or if you feel that there is something missing please ask the invigilator for clarification as soon as possible.
- 3) Look at the distribution of marks- within a given section the marks for the questions may vary. Even if a question has parts that you cannot answer well, it might be worth attempting if the proportion of the marks associated with these parts is small, the marks you gain from the other parts may still allow you to do well. Use the marks scheme as a guide as to how long you need to spend at each question. Remember for any question there is always a short and long version for the answer.

4) Read all of the questionread all parts of the question before you start to answer it, later parts may provide, directly or indirectly, helpful info that can effect how you approach earlier parts and you are less likely to repeat. Read any supporting info that the question provides as this is often a clue as to how to approach the question. Always answer the right number of parts of a question.

- 5) Answer the full number of questions -Always answer the full number of questions requested, as one omission can lead to substantial loss of marks.
- 6) If you get stuck, move on It is much easier to get the first 50 percent than the next 50 percent on any question. So do not waste time pondering, go on to the next question and if you have time at the end go back and finish the ones you were stuck on. It is more likely that your memory may be jogged, by answering other question
- 7) Answering tips- To get the best marks for an answer you should try to
- a) cover all the key points relating to the topic of the question,
- b) be accurate,
- c) explain the logic behind your use of facts,
- d) include examples,
- e) try making use of any reading you have done on the topic,
- f) make it clear that you understand the significance of the topic and its practical consequences, and
- g) organise your answer logically and effectively. Get straight to the point and to the key facts and observations do not answer start with long intros.

University Bookshop: An Investigation

Recently many complaints have been made concerning the high price of books in the University Bookshop, as compared to elsewhere. An Focal has decided to undertake an independent investigation to examine these complaints.

The prices of a large selection of books have been compared between the University Bookshop, O'Mahonys Bookshop, Eason Bookshop and online bookseller amazon.co.uk. Although they do not usually stock university books, Eason's will order in any books and they are also available to order on their website, www.eason.ie.

It should be pointed out that the prices on Amazon are in sterling and so have been converted to €euro.

It must also be noted that both O'Mahonys and the University Bookshop are run by the same company.

The books selected for examination cover all colleges within the university. The books cover a price range between €22.10 (a business book) to €103.01 (a law book).

On investigating the prices, An Focal can confirm that in the majority of cases the University Bookshop/O'Mahonys Bookshop are in fact more expensive then their competitors.

In general the price difference between Eason's and the University Bookshop is around $\mathfrak{e}1$ - $\mathfrak{e}2$, but there a few price extremes. The price difference between Amazon and these two establishments is slightly more erratic, but one must take location into account. As Amazon is based in the United Kingdom they can offer cheaper prices on English books but may not be as cheap in providing Irish books.

Ms. Marian O'Brien, Manager of the University Bookshop, stated that she believes that the shop offer a fair service to all its customers. She stated that the shop is a price taker and not a price maker, meaning that they have no choice but to accept the recommended retail price offered by the distributors. She said that the area of academic books is quite different to that of general books, in that the same discounts are not available within the academic market. She claimed that discounts offered to the Bookshop are passed onto students wherever possible. She cited an example of a 5% discount given by Pearsons, one of their largest suppliers, last year that was passed onto students.

Ms. O'Brien stated that another reason for price differences is the effect of sterling. Obviously this has a huge effect on books bought in from the UK. Therefore books bought on

different dates, may have different prices due to fluctuating exchange rates. She pointed out that in the Bookshop they would always put the cheapest copies to the front. While this is not an ideal situation, it's all that can be done.

Ms. O'Brien claimed that varying prices between the shops are mainly due to different delivery dates, again as a result of the effect of Sterling. She claimed that large price differences were probably mistakes, as she said neither themselves nor their competitors were out to fleece customers.

With regard to academic books, the more books a shop sells the better base they have for negotiating discounts with their suppliers,

explained Ms. O'Brien. However she pointed out that as distributors become larger and larger it is becoming increasing difficult to achieve this.

In general, according to Ms. O'Brien, book sales in the University Bookshop are up this year. She points out a few trends for this. Firstly there are more students on campus. These students seem to be buying more books. Finally she said that students seem to be buying books earlier in the semester, rather then at exam time.

Stationary prices are extremely competitive in the bookshop, Ms. O'Brien believes. She said that one company provides all four O'Mahonys shops with their stationary. As a result of this they have huge buying power in order to negotiate discounts.

Ms. O'Brien believes that the University Bookshop provides the students with a good facility. While they don't have the leeway to offer cheaper book prices, they try to make up for it by offering other services, such as free postage on books, and by making international phone calls to locate books. She stated that if anyone has any problems with prices, she has catalogues that can support them.

While this is all well and good, the fact remains that there are cheaper places to get the books. So shop around before you buy your college books, while it might be more hassle you'd be surprised what savings you might make.

Price Comparison on Local Shops

Many questions have cropped up about the Students' Union shop this year regarding a range of things. One particular was question that has been given a lot of attention is the price of goods. This was raised (I'm sure not for the first time) at the Class Representatives Council a few

In light of this question An Focal has conducted a survey of food prices around the campus, taking items from the basic student food groups such as the pizza group and the deodorant group (Ask no questions, receive no lies), from Superquinn, The Hurlers Esso shop, Spar and The Students' Union shop.

As you can see from the above table Superquinn are the cheapest of the four shops by a considerable amount, which is to be expected, as it is a supermarket. Superquinn manager, Niall Brougham, said, "I was delighted to hear that (we were cheaper), obviously we are in a very competitive market in Castletroy and price is a huge concern of ours. 

Review: Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets

Before I even start this review there are a few things you should know. Firstly I'm a huge fan of the Harry Potter books. I wasn't overly impressed with the first film, The Philosophers Stone, it was a good film but it did the book no justice. Finally with regard to the books, The Chamber of Secrets is the weakest of all four books so far. Given all this I wasn't expecting that much from this film. Now that I've gotten that out of the way.......

For everyone whose been hiding under a rock for the last few years, Harry Potter is a wizard. The evil Lord Voldemort killed his parents when he was a baby, however he survived. He's grown up with his muggle (non-magic) relations. Harry's spent one year at Hogwarts School for Witches and Wizards. In that time he has, along with his sidekicks Ron and Hermione, saved the world from the evil Dark Lord, became the star player on the Gryfindor quidditch team, and just caused lots of trouble in general.

Now Harry faces into his second year at Hogwarts. He has been warned by a mysterious house-elf, Dobby, not to return as he faces grave danger. However thanks to Ron and his flying Ford Anglia he eventually gets back,

despite a few setbacks along the way. All the usual faces are at Hogwarts when he returns, including groundskeeper Hagrid, Professors Snape and Dumbledore, and Harry's archenemy Draco Malfoy. Harry isn't the only celebrity at the school this year, as the new 'Defence Against the Dark Arts' teacher is famous author Gilderoy Lockharte, whom all the girls love despite the fact that he seems completely hopeless at his job.

The film revolves around the fact that the Chamber of Secrets has been opened. This secret chamber was put in place by one of the schools founders (Slytherin) in order to purge the school of all those who are not from pureblood wizard families. The heir of Slytherin can only open the chamber. Mudbloods (people with muggle parents) are no longer safe at Hogwarts, and the future of the school is thrown into doubt. It's up to Harry, Ron and Hermione to find out who the heir and ensure the Chamber of Secrets is closed forever.

So is the film any good???

Rupert Grint who plays Ron is by far and away the star of the show. He provides a brilliant comic influence on what is otherwise quite a dark film. Emma Watson (Hermione) is also good, but her chance to shine will be in the next film with an increased

role. Daniel Radcliffe, who plays Harry, puts in a good performance but doesn't shine on screen in the same way that Grint does.

Of the adults Alan Rickman, Maggie Smith and Robbie Coltrane all, yet again, put in their respective roles. Kenneth Branagh is brilliant as Lockharte. The film is also the last made by the late Limerick actor Richard Harris, who is excellent in the role of school principal Albus Dumbledore.

Harry Potter and the Chamber of

Secrets is much darker than the first instalment in of the series, and if you're scared of spiders you should think about giving this a miss. It is also much quicker and more exciting than the first. The quidditch match is excellent yet again, and the scene of Harry and Ron in the Ford Anglia is absolutely amazing.

Overall I was very impressed with the film. It was as good if not better than the book, and a much better movie than the Philosophers Stone. At 160 minutes it could be said that the film is too long, but you don't really notice. With the next installment in the series, the brilliant Prisoner of Azkaban, not due until the summer of 2004, the Chamber of Secrets has a lot of time to out-gross the first film. This will be some achievement as the Philosophers Stone has currently grossed \$965 million, and is the second highest grossing film of all time after Titanic.

Believe all the hype about this film. It's well worth going to see whether you've read the books or seen the first film. The quality of Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets can't be faulted, and for now at least the magic is still working.

Today vast numbers of young people go to college and the competition is intense, the crowded library laying testimony to the fact that increased college pressure renders huge

participation in any non-compulsory evident too much to ask for. Who knows why we are the way we are, either way it is unlikely that we will ever see the day that 100% of U.L students march up to the B1 canteen with their I.D cards and vote in an election, or busy themselves within a society.

This article is not however, the epitaph for the college society. As a wise drunken man once said behind the town hall disco on a Friday night, "it's not the size; it's how you use it". The great thing about U.L clubs and societies is that they tend to kick ass in intervarsities no matter how small they are. U.L student union activity is characterised by quality not quantity. Take the Debating Union for example, who's increasing array of victories places increasing strain on the already groaning trophy cabinet. Their presence in tough intervarsities such as those at Oxford and Cambridge are marked both by

excellent performances and complete disregard for formal attire. YFG National Conference 2002



The University of Limerick Branch of Young Fine Gael reached the undisputed high point of the semester recently when we dug out our old 'blueshirts', dusted them down and donned them for the YFG National Conference, this year celebrating the 25th Anniversary of the foundation of YFG, held in the lavish surrounds of the Burlington Hotel, Dublin on Saturday November 16th last.

Many of the large group of UL members who attended were nursing serious hangovers following the 21st birthday revel of last year's Chairman John O' Grady which had been held the previous night, not least the man himself!! Therefore, a 7am start did not appeal to many. Nonetheless, those loyal to the Blue were up, bright-eyed and bushy-tailed, and ready for a long day of tough political wrangling and debate on the future of Young Fine Gael.

Ably led by our two representatives on the YFG National Executive, David Garrahy and Jarlath Munnelly, as well as Branch Chairman Robbie Carroll, we arrived at the Conference Centre in the Burlington early in the morning. We were greeted by the President of Young Fine Gael Gerry O' Connell. Gerry had visited UL just a week before the Conference, and was delighted to see such a large turnout from the UL Branch.

We got straight down to business, and got involved immediately in the debate of the various motions that were put to the Conference, chaired by one of our young new Senators, John Paul Phelan. Topics varied from Education to Finance, from Agriculture to Law and Order, and from Transport to Terrorism. Many of the motions proved highly

controversial, particularly those concerning Northern Ireland, and many sharp words were exchanged for and against each of them. The UL branch played a huge role in this debate, with Jarlath Munnelly proposing motions on Western Development and reform of the Capitation Grant system to fee-paying secondary schools, and David garrahy proposing motions on investment in the railways and the possibility of making the Presidency of YFG a full-time paid position. James Hoare also spoke well, (and somewhat controversially!) on Northern Ireland and Installation Aid Northern Ireland and Installation Ald to young farmers. The arguments put forward by the UL branch were radical and forward thinking, and contributed greatly to the overall success of the debate.

James, along with Kevin Cashman also took part in the workshop on Finance. Kevin later addressed the Conference on this topic.

Great anticipation preceded the highlight of the afternoon which were the speeches of YFG President Gerry O' Connell, and Fine Gael

Leader Enda Kenny, which began at 3pm. Gerry gave a rousing speech, and his oratory skills would have invigourated even the most meek of the delegates present. He was hugely convincing on his belief that Fine Gael was now united and strong, and that the party, with a lot of hard work, will again be the towering political force that it once was. He contrasted Young Fine Gael sharply with other youth wings by lambasting the pathetic crèches that are Ogra Fianna Fáil, Labour Youth and the PD Youth as "the runt and hind-tit" of their shambolic senior parties. His speech was an inspiring call-to-arms, and was indicative of the optimistic mood of the Conference as a whole


back was excluded for 20 seconds for a major foul on one of the Grads subs, Grads took full advantage of the extra man and scored.
