#### Where Do You Bank?

Where do you bank? This was the question that was raised as the theme for the Maritime Conference's Spiritual Emphasis Weekend (SEW) at Camp Pugwash in Nova Scotia. It was inspired by a team of the youngest pastors of the Maritime Conference, Noreen Geffrard, Adrian Jones, and Michael Hall. Their theme embraced the ideology of monetary banking and related it to the experience of mentoring and discipling those who are inside and outside of the church. They paralleled the three basic questions that are asked when one is banking to the steps that should be taken when the sharing the gospel with others. These questions are: What or who do we invest in? How do we invest? And, what happens if we don't invest?

Pastor Noreen Geffrard started off the series on Friday night. Her sermon was entitled, *Unasked Questions*. She focused on the story of the Good Samaritan found in Luke 10: 25-37. In this story, she says that a lawyer asked Jesus about what he needed to do to be saved. Jesus directed him to the scriptures, "...to love God and love your neighbor as yourself." Then, the lawyer asked Jesus the question "Who was my neighbor?" He didn't ask about who God was, she says, he asked about who his neighbor was.

Today, like the Levite and priest in the parable of the Good Samaritan, Christians tend to separate their relationship with God from their relationship with others. This is something that people often do, serving and sacrificing for God, but at the same time ignoring their neighbors. The good Samaritan, who was the unlikely character, shows us that even a rival person can be a good neighbor. In the end, the question of "Who is God?" was answered in the person of the good Samaritan. She pointed out in her sermon, that this parable was not only about how we ought to be as Christians, but it is also about how Jesus is with us. We are to invest in others as God takes care of and invests in us.

On Sabbath morning, Pastor Adrian Jones explored the question, *How does our identity impact how we invest in those around us?* His sermon was entitled, the Church Identity Crisis. He posed several questions; "Does our church identity make a difference in the community that we live in? Does it empower the next generation of young adults within our church?" Through the story of *the Woman at the Well*, he explored what investing in people looks like by using a Christo-centric example. Jesus made the necessary effort to meet the Woman at the Well where



she was. Pastor Adrian also pointed out that when we truly have a love for people in our hearts, we will truly make an effort to help them to be saved. He reminded us that ministry is not what we do, but it is who we are.

On Saturday evening, Pastor Micheal Hall spoke about what happens when we don't invest? He talked about the story of the Parable of the Talents. His sermon was entitled *Investment Banking* and the scripture reading came from Matthew 25:27, "So you ought to have deposited my money with the bankers, and at my coming I would have received back my own with interest." He reminded everyone that every person who accepts Jesus into their lives is called to ministry. We must do something. The Hebrews didn't

believe in taking interest from each other, this why he said that this bible verse was talking about investing in the gentiles. He told us that gentiles represented those who were outside of the faith, and we will not see the results that the Lord wants us to see if we don't make an effort to invest in them.

It was a wonderful weekend as members from all over the Conference attended SEW for fellowship as well as for a spiritual renewal. The Maritime Conference wishes to thank everyone for showing their support through their attendance as well as their participation. Without your help this weekend would not have been as great as it was. God bless you all!

It was a Sabbath morning when I was asked the question "Do you ever find it hard to be an Adventist?" It might not have been worded exactly in that way, but that was what I understood the question to be. I had never been asked that before, and I wasn't sure how to respond.

I had been brought up in an Adventist home. There were certain things we did and didn't do. It was just the way it was. I can't tell you I was the most obedient child. I'm fairly certain I received more spankings than my brother, and even though there were things I felt I missed out on because of Friday evenings and Saturdays. I don't remember thinking it was hard to be an Adventist. And I don't think it ever occurred to me to rebel and blatantly disobey my parents and try to sneak out of the house, to meet up with people I shouldn't have been sneaking out to meet, to do things I shouldn't be doing.

That was then. Now, (and I want to say we won't talk ages because that's not really important, but I believe it is important) at 51, I have a better understanding and appreciation for what I was taught as a child, and I think I can say it would be hard for me not to be an Adventist. And some Adventists might shudder at this suggestion, some might turn over in their graves (just to be clear, I know that's not possible), but I don't think the end goal is necessarily about being an Adventist. It is about being a follower of God.

Psalm 119:104 states "through thy precepts I get understanding: therefore I hate every false way." If our goal is to be an Adventist, I think we will fail more often than not. We will look at the checklist of things to cross off, having accomplished the task.

What amazed me most about that day, the Sabbath of the Spiritual Emphasis weekend at Camp Pugwash, is that the speaker for the worship service talked about motivation and priorities. It's not that we don't have time, it's more about what we spend our time doing. And what is our motivation for doing what we do? Are we doing just enough to get by?

I don't know if my answer to the question "Do you ever find it hard to be an Adventist?" was adequate. But if I can apply what I took away from the message that God gave Pastor Adrian for that Sabbath, I will have a better answer the next time. If my motivation for being an Adventist is to cross things off a list and be part of a group, it will be hard. We can't rely on others to define what our experience should be. We can't live someone else's convictions just because we think that is what is expected.

If we take time to get to know God, we will want to spend even more time with Him. And as the song says, "the things of earth will grow strangely dim in the light of His glory and grace". His wants for us will become our wants for ourselves and the checklist disappears. It won't be about being an Adventist, it will be about being an obedient child of God. And chances are you will discover you have lived up to God's definition of a good Adventist and be able to say, "that wasn't hard at all".


