The property, taking in the intersection of Mount Vernon Church Road and North Road, outside the City limits, in rural Abbeville County, according to Clary and the resolution.

The City has submitted a proposal for a BRIC grant through the South Carolina Emergency Division to help fund the project, the resolution continued.

The price of the property is \$71,600, and the BRIC grant amount being sought is \$600,000, City Manager Blake Stone told City Council Wednesday night.

The City has been negotiating over the past months to purchase the property, and time was precious for the City to purchase the property because there were other people interested in buying it, Stone said.

The meeting Wednesday was an "emergency" gathering because of the 17.9 acres, is located at time sensitive nature of the property purchase, said Clary Thursday.

A "tie in" is essentially a substation that, in this case, would tie into the Duke system.

The City expects to hear sometime this summer whether it has been awarded the grant, said Clary Thursday.

The grant is for the costs associated with constructing the tie in, he continued. City Attorney Tombo Hite, attending the meeting electronically, advised the Council to go ahead with the purchase.

City Council members Jason Edwards and John Sutherland were absent from the meeting, which lasted seven minutes.

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
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

Psalm 33:18 "Behold, the eye of the Lord is on those who fear Him, on those who

hope in His mercy." There was a Broadway production a few years ago entitled "1776." The production centers around John Adams as he attempts to get the Second Continental Congress in Philadelphia to act decisively and declare independence from England. The times call for change, but certain members of this congress are painfully slow to move. The representatives lack imagination or are even self-serving. Adams sees the issues clearly and struggles to gather support for what he believes in so strongly. Adams feels strongly that these men must seize the hour and vote for independence from England. One scene is particularly memorable. It's the night of July 3, 1776. The hall is empty save for John Adams, who reviews the facts as he sees them. South Carolina and Pennsylvania are opposed to the motion for independence. Delaware is undecided. New York's representatives are awaiting further instructions. It looks hopeless. Wrestling with a vision shared by only a few, Adams paces back and forth in the hall. One can feel the stress in Adams' body as he watches. Suddenly, Adams looks up and cries out dramatically into the void: "Is anybody there?

Does anybody care? Does

anybody see what I see?"

Have you ever felt like that? I am sure you have. I know that I have. When you feel that way, remember Psalm 33:18. The Lord sees and knows what is going on—not only in our world but in our individual lives. Three thoughts come to me

from this passage. First of all. God is aware of what is going on. The Psalmist reveals to us that God's eye is on those who fear Him. The word "fear" literally means reverence. God knows those who revere Him. God keeps track of His children—He knows where they are and what they are going through at any given time in their lives.

When you feel like no one knows what you are going through, take heart. God knows what you are going through. Maybe no one else knows, but take comfort in the fact that God knows where you are and

what you are going through. Second, God not only is aware of what is going on in your life, He actually cares about what is happening to you. I worked with a man at the Ben Hogan Golf factory in Ft. Worth, Texas while in seminary. If anyone came to him with a problem and wanted to share it with him his standard answer was, "Do you have a quarter? Go

call someone who cares." People may not care about what you are going through, but I assure you that God cares. 1 Peter 5:7 "Casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you." Did you catch that? Cast "all" your care upon Him, there is not a single care that you should hold back from casting on the Lord. There is no care too big or too small for Him to be concerned about. If something concerns you, then it concerns God. If something troubles you, then God not only knows about it, He wants to help you with it.

Third, not only is God aware and cares, He also shares. Notice the last part of verse 18—"on those who hope in His mercy." God is merciful to those who revere Him. Our hope is founded on the mercy of God-not our merit. Because we know God is merciful, we have hope.

This hope in the mercy of God undergirds us and strengthens us as we go about our daily lives. No matter what our situation is, we have hope because we know that God is aware of where we are and God cares about what is happening to us and He will help us through whatever it is we are facing.

We are not alone—God is with us. God knows and God cares and that is what gives us hope.





Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals. For school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information on the application: (1) A SNAP or TANF case number certifying the household is currently eligible for either of these assistance programs and an adult household member signature or (2) names of all household members, the name and last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member signing the application form, current income by source for each household member and a signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Foster children may also be eliqible for these benefits regardless of household income. If a household has foster children living with them and the household has not previously been notified by the School District that their foster children have been directly certified for free meals, the household should include and count the foster children (including personal income earned by the foster children) on the household application form with other non-foster children

Under the provisions of the policy (Connie S. Cunningham) will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the reviewing official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewer on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to (Superintendent Dr. Mason Gary) whose address is:400 Greenville Street, Abbeville SC 29620 (864-366-5427) for a hearing to appeal the decision. The hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if household size changes, the household should contact the school to file a meal application. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for free or reduced-price meals if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above. A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the District Superintendent where any interested party may review it.

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
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
