Winchelsea Primary School to receive maintenance money

Students and teachers at Winchelsea Primary School will benefit when works get underway as part of another maintenance blitz.

Labor Member for Western Victoria, Gayle Tierney said the blitz – which includes repairing day to day wear and tear, fixing roofs and windows, repainting walls, resurfacing floors and replacing windows, pathways and stairs – will soon take place as part of the Planned Maintenance Program.

The program will see 80 schools across the state share in \$4.51 million of funding for the works, which will ensure the schools are safe, modern and properly upheld.

Winchelsea Primary School has been allocated over \$135,000 to address high priority maintenance tasks.

"We know students get the most out of their education when they have safe, modern classrooms to learn in, and first-rate facilities the school community can feel proud of." said Ms Tierney.

Course to support excellent responsible horse ownership

RSPCA Victoria is inviting new and future horse owners to attend a new course in February to promote excellent horse care and responsible ownership. The course will teach the essential skills every horse owner needs to provide appropriate care for horses.

"We are delighted so many Victorians are interested in taking care of larger animals and, in this case, being responsible horse owners," said Education & Training Manager at RSPCA Victoria Belinda Marchbank. Equine Excellence takes place onsite at RSPCA Burwood on Saturday, 18th February.

'Feed Me Surf Coast' founder Brooke Murphy Surf Coast Shire Local Legend

Brooke Murphy made a pact with the universe when her eldest daughter made it home to Australia from India 45 minutes before international airspace closed in the shadow of the pandemic.

She knew her daughter would have been OK with lifelong family friends in India if she didn't make it.

"But I wanted her home with us safely," Brooke said.

"And the thoughts of the hundreds of thousands of other young people stranded in many parts of the world, unable to make it home to their families never left my thoughts."

Brooke was at Melbourne Airport when the last plane touched down with returning passengers.

"And in that moment, I simultaneously thanked the universe for getting my daughter back home to me, and vowed I would do anything in my ability to assist any person stranded in our community who didn't make it home," Brooke said.

Inadvertently the big-hearted charity Feed Me Surf Coast was born.

"I'm a big believer in the universe always having a plan, as long as you are prepared to listen and follow the signs," Brooke said.

"The universe did deliver a sign, and shortly after I was introduced to Lana Purcell, the founder of Feed Me Bellarine.

"I had been working at a homeless drop-in centre in Geelong that was closed down as a result of COVID-19 and it really affected me. I was at a loss wondering how the most vulnerable in our community would be supported during this unprecedented time.

"Feed Me Bellarine was already responding to the rolling disastrous effects as COVID-19 hit our shores, and many families on the Surf Coast were experiencing incredibly difficult times through job loss, children at home and uncertain future.

"Feed Me Surf Coast was quickly established as the second location to the already established 'Feed Me' charity."

Brooke became its co-ordinator and remains its mainstay, and her leadership and devotion to its altruistic mission has qualified her as Surf Coast Shire's latest Local Legend, recognising her positive impact on the lives of others.

Feed Me Surf Coast rescues food fit for consumption which would otherwise end up in landfills, and helps deliver it to people in need.

Volunteers collect from 10 supermarkets every day – more than 3000kg a week – as well as restaurants, cafes, bakeries, wholesalers, growers and farmers.

"We have 117 volunteer 'Feedsters' as we call ourselves, plus Torquay Lions, Surf Coast Secondary College and Bellbrae Primary School students, along with young adults with disabilities and their carers," Brooke said.

"We load, unload, unpack, pack down, stack, reload and unload 600 to 700 crates a week.

"Put simply, we rescue gigantic amounts

of food that would otherwise end up in landfill. We feed hundreds upon hundreds of families, we cover our expenses and we are not funded by anyone."

Brooke said their feed me efforts were initially focused on 210 international seasonal workers stranded on the Surf Coast without employment, housing or support, and 270 international students who had arrived just a few weeks before the international lockdown.

"We also quickly felt the burdens that everyday Australians in our community were experiencing – hardships that were not planned or expected but unimaginable by our middle-class standards, Brooke said.

"A small and committed group of community members spent day and night quietly responding to the needs of those who required support.

And Brooke says the by-product of 'all this back-breaking work' is fairly extraordinary.

"We have created a community within a community of multi-generational and multi-skilled, compassionate, intelligent, funny, sensitive, politically correct and terribly wayward, vibrant and shy, loud and quiet, flexible and firm, carefree and stern gang of ridiculous misfits doing amazing work," she said.

"We relieve hundreds of families from the daily burden of increased living costs."

An invaluable program: Council's COVID-19 Business Support

Community members and visitors are encouraged to support local businesses this summer as they continue their COVID-19 recovery.

An \$870,000 Surf Coast Shire Councildelivered support package - courtesy of three Victorian Government grants - has underpinned the Surf Coast business community's navigation through the pandemic. Mayor Liz Pattison said it's a journey that is expected to take several more years, as visitor data trends show that it might take until 2025 for visitor numbers to return to pre-COVID levels.

"As a Council we want to see our existing businesses succeeding, and we

They both contribute to job creation and enable more residents to work closer to home," she said. "After a couple of pandemic-interrupted summers we hope the start of 2023 provides local traders with a much-needed boost. Supporting local wherever possible is one way we can help."

Council's COVID-19 Business Support program was wide-ranging, headlined by the Inspired by Surf Coast buy local campaign which supported more than 1,000 businesses; the installation of six Big Belly solar-powered compacting bins in dining precincts, and a pedestrian crossing at Bristol Road in Torquay town centre.

Other key outdoor projects were street furniture renewal in commercial centres in Aireys Inlet, Jan Juc, Lorne and Winchelsea, and an Inspired Performers street performer event which showcased local musicians and created the first Surf Coast musician directory.

Council received a total of \$870,000 from three Victorian Government grants, consisting of Outdoor Activation Fund (\$500,000), Business Concierge (\$120,000) and Outdoor Eating and Entertainment (\$250,000)

Uplifting the voices of Victoria's rural women

Rural women across the state can now apply for the 2023 Rural Women's Network Leadership and Mentoring Programs.

Both programs will encourage and empower participants to have an active voice and role in the agriculture sector.

The 2023 Leadership Program will provide women with support to participate in training and study that accelerates their development as leaders. Participants will also work closely as a group to explore issues impacting rural women, learn from subject matter experts, and connect with other rural women from across Victoria.

The 2023 Mentoring Program will pair rural women together for a peer-to-peer exchange of skills and experience.



Dog Trials return to Deans Marsh this coming weekend

After a forced COVID hiatus, the popular Dog Pro Deans Marsh Dog Trials are back on Friday 20th, Saturday 21st & Sunday 22nd January at the Deans Marsh Memorial Reserve, from 8am – 5pm each day.

Since early settlement, working dogs have aided farmers in managing flocks of sheep across our great Country. Now a well-loved Australian icon, Dog Trials give these dogs, and their handlers an opportunity to showcase their skills, training and bond in a competition working through a series of obstacles.

There are 200 members in the Victorian Working Sheep Dog Association and typically 30 trials held across the state annually. The Deans Marsh Dog Trials is a well-loved and well-attended event, attracting some of the best trainers and dogs in the country.

Founders and event organisers for over 13 years, Jill Stewart and Mark Fagan are excited to be going ahead with this year's trials after a year off.

"Everyone loves the trials in Deans Marsh. It brings such great energy to the town. Stock men and women from across the country come for the weekend to share in their love of working dogs. All salt of the earth people, enjoying the challenge of working with our dogs and the sheep through the obstacles." said Fagan.

Mark Fagan and dog Faith have been working together for 5 years in Sheep Dog Trials, attending over 10 competitions a year across Victoria. Mark is also the commentator for the Deans Marsh Sheep Dog Trials.

Mark's favorite obstacle is the pen. "If you pen the sheep, you get 20 points and are in with the chance of being in the finals. It's always very nerve racking. It takes patience, but when it all comes together. It's such a great high" he said.

Top competitors at this year's event will be Jimmy Dodge (Ballarat), current Australian Champion, and his dog "Cooper" and the number 1 dog in Australia. John Tuddenham (Ballarat) and dog "Michael". "He's young and winning everything." said Fagan. Michael Deppler (Western Victoria), with dog "Molly", who has just won equal first top dog in Victoria. "So, the best of the best will be on display over the weekend."

And this Trial is not just for the seasoned. Friday Night local farmers and dog handlers, who are new to the sport can enter to have a go in a Learner's event. They will be partnered with an experienced dog trainer to walk the course and mentor them for their first experience.

Along with the entertainment of the trials, food, and Deans Marsh Cricket Club bar will be available each day with the action heating up on the Sunday.

Public Transport to and from Colac, Birregurra & Lorne is available to line up with the Trials, giving great access to come and enjoy a day.

Managing Victoria's bushfire risk during wetter seasons and beyond

An open letter from Chris Hardman, Chief Fire Officer, Forest Fire Management Victoria

This year, many Victorians have experienced extreme weather with heavy rain and flooding. Our changing climate means these events are becoming more frequent and extreme.

The recent State of the Climate report by the Bureau of Meteorology and CSIRO confirms that changes to weather and climate extremes are happening at an increased pace across Australia. In coming decades, we will see an increase in the number of dangerous fire weather days and a longer fire season for southern and eastern Australia.

Even though conditions have been wetter through most of the state this year, Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) has continued to take action to manage bushfire risk. Victoria is Australia's most bushfire prone state. By investing in prevention, we aim to protect people, property and the environment by reducing the risk and impact of major bushfires.

We look for opportunities year-round to conduct planned burns that will protect people, and our environment – including forests, their wildlife and biodiversity – from bushfires this summer and in the drier years to come. We burn to the conditions, not the calendar. Some burns that were planned for spring may take place this summer if conditions are right and it's safe. Others could take place in autumn next year. Although we don't expect many long-running or large forest fires this summer, areas across the north and west of the state may see increasing fire potential from mid-summer, especially in areas of high grass growth.

Drier forests, woodlands and heathlands are also at risk of fires with the onset of hot and dry weather conditions.

Going forward, we will prioritise planned burns in places with increased risk.

The wetter weather has presented opportunities for different types of burning. In some areas, the higher levels of moisture in the soil and natural gullies have allowed our crews to conduct lower-intensity burns. The gullies act as natural boundaries for the fire, which is not always possible during drier conditions.

Past events show us that planned burning can reduce the loss and destruction caused by bushfires.

As a world leader in bushfire risk management, we have many different tools in our toolbox.Planned burning is not the only way we manage bushfire risk and reduce fuel like grass, leaf litter, twigs, bark and vegetation. We've increased our use of mowing, slashing and mulching this year. We've also expanded our network of strategic fuel breaks to better protect against bushfires. These strips of land are in the highest priority locations – close to towns, water catchments and sensitive environments. We have also upgraded our infrastructure, including forest roads, fire dams and fire lookout towers.

In addition to our bushfire risk management program, FFMVic, together with Country Fire Authority (CFA), is continuing to support Traditional Owners to use cultural fire on Country. Over 200 cultural burns are planned over the next three years.

We work with CFA, Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV), local government and communities to deliver the best local approaches to bushfire risk management in Victoria.

While FFMVic does a vital job managing bushfire risk, I encourage all Victorians to ensure they have the right information, tools and actions to prepare for fires.

This means familiarising yourself with the new Australian Fire Danger Rating System. This system is the same across Australia, so you can assess risk and take action if needed, wherever you are.

If you live on or near land that is at bushfire risk, make sure to follow the Fire Ready Kit from CFA.



Workshops to help locals upskill and secure creative grants



"We understand the grant writing process can feel daunting," Cr Allen said. "That's why we are doing everything we can to remove some of the barriers that prevent bold ideas from being born into the Surf Coast community."

"We want to see your great ideas and these workshops have been designed as another step towards helping creative people in our community come out into the open and start making the art they are dreaming of."

Winchelsea Leisure Time Centre repair works complete

Surf Coast Shire community members will soon be playing sport and enjoying events in the Winchelsea Leisure Time Centre now that repair works to the building are complete.

Surf Coast Shire Councillor Adrian Schonfelder said Council had been liaising with the Victorian School **Building Authority and Winchelsea** Primary School to resolve ongoing problems with the floor.

"I am pleased to advise the Victorian School Building Authority has completed rectification works on the Winchelsea Leisure Time Centre," Cr Schonfelder

said. "The building has now been handed back to the Winchelsea Primary School and I can't wait to see the Winchelsea community making use of this important multi-purpose space in January 2023."

Works included under flooring ventilation, a concrete apron and improved drainage around the facility, improved guttering and works to the roof as well as repairs to the timber flooring.

The Leisure Time Centre building itself and surrounding land is owned by the Department of Education, but Surf Coast Shire Council is responsible for

maintenance and upkeep of the facility while the school handles bookings.

The agreement splits the costs for maintenance of the facility between the school (70 per cent) and Council (30 per cent) to reflect its primary use as a school facility.

"We understand how much the Leisure Time Centre means to the Winchelsea community and it's good to be able to celebrate this space once again with community gatherings, basketball games and school concerts," Cr Schonfelder said.

Victorians urged to be on high alert for illegal pet businesses

As the new year approaches many Victorians are preparing to bring a new pet into their lives and RSPCA Victoria is urging the public to be vigilant when purchasing a pet and to be aware that it is illegal to buy or sell animals in public places such as parks, roadsides, and car parks.

Illegal breeders or sellers often operate covertly, provide misleading information, and may request to meet in a public place to illegally complete the sale of an animal. RSPCA Victoria's Inspectorate is currently actively investigating a number of these illegal businesses and regularly prosecutes offenders in the courts.

In early December, RSPCA Victoria's Major Investigations Team executed multiple Domestic Animals Act warrants across two linked properties in Ballarat in relation to the alleged illegal sale of kittens from an unregistered domestic animal business. As a result, Inspectors seized six Burmese kittens due to non-compliance with the mandatory Code of Practice and RSPCA is currently investigating multiple suspects.

RSPCA Victoria's Inspectorate Team Leader - Major Investigations, Lisa Calleja, said it is important to research before purchasing a pet.

"If you cannot find a suitable pet to adopt and instead choose to purchase, it is important to make sure you are purchasing from a registered breeder operating a legal breeding facility.

"A responsible breeder will answer all your questions, provide accurate information, and will allow you to visit the location where the animal lives to ensure the standard of care and living conditions are appropriate and that it has been bred for a temperament suited to being a pet. Many people unknowingly purchase animals from illegal businesses that sell animals from public places to hide the location of their operations."

"The subjects of RSPCA Victoria investigations are often sophisticated networks that use covert methods, so our Inspectorate team relies on the public for information that may assist with investigations. Significant investigations and successful prosecutions do eventuate as a direct result of tip offs from the public, so we encourage anyone with information to make a report. All details, no matter how insignificant they may seem, are welcome and all tip offs are reviewed," stated Ms Calleja.

RSPCA Victoria recommends people looking to become a dog or cat owner read the RSPCA Smart Puppy and Dog Buyer's Guide or the RSPCA Smart Kitten and Cat Buyers Guide, which provide useful guidelines and tips for finding a reputable breeder. These include:

- visiting the place where the puppy or kitten was born.
- meeting the mother dog or cat (and father if possible) and make sure they are happy and healthy.
- and checking the breeder provides a high standard of care and living conditions for all their animals.

The Domestic Animals Act 1994 specifies that dogs and cats must be sold from either a registered domestic animal business, from a private residence or sold at a place where an animal sale permit is in place.

Penalties can apply for individuals or body corporates who sell dogs and cats from a public place. Individuals could face a maximum penalty in court of \$5,547.60, while body corporates could face a maximum penalty of \$27,438.




There were 7,908 COVID-19 cases reported in Victoria this week

Friends of the Barwon welcome stronger Victorian planning policies and landscape controls for the Rivers of the Barwon

are delighted that stronger Victorian planning policies and landscape controls will now apply to the Rivers of the Barwon. Planning Scheme Amendment VC201 aims to provide greater protection for the Barwon River and all its tributaries from inappropriate and potentially harmful development. Significant Landscape Overlays, (SLO), now include all rivers of the Barwon and cover waterways, lakes, wetlands and billabongs.

Friends of the Barwon (FOTB)

FOTB Chair, Trevor Hodson noted that "for the past four years, since our inception, FOTB have advocated for much stronger planning controls to ensure inappropriate development did not adversely affect the rivers of the Barwon. Through our involvement with the Concerned Waterways Alliance (CWA) and the Barwon River Ministerial Advisory Committee (MAC), FOTB have played a significant role in bringing this amendment to fruition.

Our engagement with candidates in the recent State election to recommend that the Rivers of the Barwon were included in the new Planning Scheme amendment was pivotal in achieving this important outcome.

In summary, the amended Planning Policy Framework, introduces two new regional policies and a series of new SLO's to recognise, protect and improve waterway health, amenity, access and community values. The Rivers of the Barwon SLO controls apply in the Ballarat, Colac Otway, Golden Plains, Greater Geelong, Moorabool and Surf Coast planning schemes, focused on the following waterway corridors:

- Barwon (Parwan)
- Moorabool River (Mooroobull)
- Leigh River (Waywatcurtan)
- Yarrowee River (Yarowee)

To ensure that significant landscape and environmental values of waterways are protected, the SLO controls address:

- the siting and design of buildings and fences
- the removal of vegetation
- the undertaking of earthworks.

For land effected by the overlay, a planning permit may be required for some buildings and works. Click on these links for further

explanation about the application of Amendment V201 or to access the full amendment and associated maps.

Unfortunately, this amendment is only an interim measure until 31 December 2026. "We cannot rest on our laurels. Friends of the Barwon will ask for the Amendment to be continued, and also argue for it to be strengthened after the current limit date of 2026" says Mr. Hodson.

The aim of Friends of the Barwon is 'To be an independent knowledge-based community leader and educator for the protection and improvement of the ecosystem of the Barwon catchment'. A healthy, flowing and life sustaining Barwon River system is both our goal and our obligation to the generations to come.

Recycled Water Release to Barwon River in Winchelsea

On December 16th last year I received a call from Barwon Water to update Winchelsea Land and Rivercare on treated water discharge to the Barwon at Winchelsea. It was explained to me that there had been much increased inflow to the storage ponds in October and November and no demand for irrigation water so a release was necessary to maintain safe storage levels.

The Barwon Water press release below arrived in mid December, too late for the last copy of the Star before Christmas.

We are continuing to release Class C recycled water to the Barwon River to safely manage recycled water storage levels in response to the high winter and spring rainfall and ongoing wet conditions.

To date we have released 17.3 megalitres of recycled water at Winchelsea and 11.5 megalitres of recycled water at Birregurra. This has helped to reduce storage levels at our water reclamation plants however releases will need to continue over the coming three months or until sustainable irrigation using the recycled water can take place.

We are monitoring water quality of the Barwon River upstream and downstream of the release points and to date have not detected any adverse impacts as a result of the release of the Class C recycled water.

As the wet conditions and weather forecasts continue to fluctuate, so too are flows in the Barwon River, meaning we need to adjust how we release the recycled water to ensure appropriate dilution and mixing of the recycled water as it makes it way down the Barwon River.


Maintaining a good dilution rate between the treated Class C recycled water and river water will mean the treated Class C water being released is unlikely to have adverse impacts on the river's water quality.

At the moment we are achieving a dilution rate of 1:85 in Winchelsea and 1:95 in Birregurra, meaning for every 1litre of recycled water there is 85 and 95 litres of river water at Winchelsea and Birregurra respectively.

Our strong monitoring program will be continuing and we will continue to make any necessary adjustments to our release to ensure there are no adverse impacts to local landowners, environment and the river. We are working with key agencies and sharing our monitoring results with the EPA, Corangamite Catchment Management Authority and local councils.

Checking the figures from the river gauge at Winchelsea show that peak flow in November was 4000 ML per day on 24th dropping to 100 ML on December 7th and then 65ML per day by Dec 16.

I was told that the monitoring for E.coli showed no difference between upstream and downstream of the release points but there had been fluctuations of E.coli in the river following runoff events after rainfall.

The wet spring created the perfect breeding conditions for the pest, which is most active now through to May.

Agriculture Victoria Statewide Fruit Fly Coordinator Cathy Mansfield said QFF are attracted to ripening fruit and vegetables.

"Maintaining good biosecurity practices starts in your home garden – and it's vital to limit fruit fly population growth and halt its spread to neighbours, nearby orchards or farms," Ms Mansfield said.

"The best way to protect your fruit and vegetables is to use insect-proof netting during the growing season." Continuously flowering vegetable and berry crops should be covered when developing fruit are very small.

If you're unable to net your trees, monitor for fruit fly and use other preventative methods such as baiting, and insecticides, traps and remove any unwanted ripe or dropped fruit. QFF attacks a wide range of fruit and vegetables including tomatoes, apricots, figs, peaches, nectarines, cherries, and berries.

Home gardeners can keep watch for fruit fly sting marks on developing fruit and vegetables – they're only tiny and easily missed but affected produce can rot from the inside.

Fruit fly maggots are often found in the centre of produce, ranging in size from, 5-10mm long and creamy-white in colour.

If you do find active fruit fly, it's important to let neighbouring properties know and encourage people to check their own produce for damage.

"Leave your homegrown produce behind if you're going away this summer to ensure you're not accidentally bringing QFF into other regions," Ms Mansfield said.

"Some states have will not allow fruit or vegetables to be taken across state borders so check before you travel."
