Message from the Superintendent





Superintendent

As a school district, we are grateful and humbled by the strong support shown by the Wynford community with the November 5, 2024 renewal levy. The voters passed the 6.9 mill renewal levy by a margin of nearly 60% to 40%, which will provide \$1.113 million in continued operating money. We greatly appreciate the community's past support of both renewal levies and the community's caring for students and their futures. Thank you, Wynford community.

It's now time to focus on the current state of Wynford Local Schools. Your past support helps the district, but it is not enough to alleviate significant financial concerns throughout the entire boardapproved 5-year forecast. To that end, on November 18, 2024, the Wynford Local Schools Board of Education voted to move \$1.5 million from the capital improvements fund to the general fund for the operations of your schools. With the passing of the 6.9 mills, \$1.113 million renewal levy and the transfer of \$1.5 million from the capital improvements fund to the general fund, Wynford will be in the black through FY2026. However, in FY 2027 the district moves into the red with a projected (\$1,460,000) deficit. This negative deficit is projected to compound to (\$4,440,000) in FY 2028 and further to (\$7,900,000) in FY 2029. In short, the district's annual operating budget is \$15.5 million, and there is no way to cut ourselves out of this situation and still provide the education, opportunities, and services to students that you expect as a community and are accustomed to having.

This winter, we will be hosting a few community forum meetings to explain the current state of Wynford Local Schools. Please keep an eye out for scheduled meetings that will be released soon. These meetings will be opportunities for the school board, Leesa, and me to listen to stakeholder feedback as we look at the financial outlook for the district over the next 5 years. Some key stakeholder questions we'd like you to keep in mind and hear from you on include:

- 1. What is most valuable or important to you educationally at
- 2. Where do you want the district to go in the future?
 - Facilities?
 - Staffing?
 - Programming for Students?
- What do you want for the district in the future in terms of the following?
 - Make reductions?
 - Maintain what we have?
 - Move forward with a sustainable future?

We plan to listen to the community for answers to these questions as well as cover all the factual information on the financial state of Wynford at the upcoming community forums.

We're looking forward to a great second semester of the 2024-2025 school year, and we hope you are as well! Have a great start to 2025!

Kindergarten Screening





Wynford residents who have a child that NDERGARTEN will be 5 years old on or before August 1, 2025, must attend kindergarten

screening. The Wynford Local School policy states that there will be no admittance for students entering kindergarten if their birthday occurs after August 1, 2025. Kindergarten screening will be held on April 28 and 29, 2025, from 8:45 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. for Wynford resident students. Please register your child for kindergarten screening by scanning the QR Code below. We can't wait to meet the Wynford Class of 2038!

Requirements for kindergarten are as follows:

- Immunizations: 5 doses DPT; 4 doses polio; 2 doses -MMR; 3 doses hepatitis B; and 2 doses - chickenpox. All required immunizations must be on file before the first day of
- Government Issued Birth Certificate (not a mother's certificate or hospital certificate)
- **Custody Papers** (if applicable)
- **Proof of Residency** Current utility bill

Immunizations



Students entering 7th grade for the 2025-2026 school year are required to have a Tetanus booster (Tdap) and Meningococcal vaccine before school starts in August.

Students entering 12th grade for the 2025-2026 school year are required to have a Meningococcal vaccine before school starts in August. You must be over the age of 16 in order for this to count as your senior required immunization.

All required immunizations or an exemption form must be on file with our nurse before the first day of school. Teacher Boot Camp



Teacher Boot Camp Participants Receive 3D Printers From IST

Over the summer, educators from districts in Crawford County, Morrow County, and Richland County had the opportunity to participate in the Mid-Ohio ESC Business Advisory Council's Teacher Business & Manufacturing Boot Camps in the region. Participants gained firsthand experience with cutting-edge ways technology is used in the workplace and learned more about the rewarding careers available in manufacturing and the skills students need to obtain and retain these local positions. In addition, Integrated Systems Technologies (IST) in Richland County sponsored a free 3D printer for three Crawford County Boot Camp Teacher participants who designed a lesson, unit, or project that best exemplified the use of 3D printing in a manufacturing setting.

Gabe McCready, President of Operations at IST, said, "In today's rapidly evolving technological landscape, having access to tools that foster creativity and innovation is essential. A 3D printer can serve as a powerful resource for students, allowing them to bring their ideas to life and engage in hands-on learning. Whether in

design, engineering, or art classes, the opportunities for interdisciplinary projects are endless. IST is excited to see each school and program leverage the newly donated 3D printers." McCready continued by expressing his enthusiasm for the boot camp: "We appreciate each teacher taking the time to participate in the teacher boot camp and learning more about the great careers that exist for students locally in manufacturing and engineering."

Linsey Phillips, a school psychologist at Colonel Crawford Local Schools, won the 3D Printer from IST for her district. "The Manufacturing Boot Camp for Educators revealed not only the pride that exists in our local industries but also the important role the workers have in driving innovation. Industry is alive and well in Crawford County," said Phillips. "As we toured these workplaces, it was clear that with commitment and skill, the path to career growth is as vibrant as the communities we serve. We are grateful to IST for donating a 3D printer to our district. By creating hands-on opportunities for our students, we will help them develop skills to equip them for tomorrow's jobs."

April Bond, Principal of Colonel Crawford Local Schools, said, "We feel so blessed to be the recipients of this award. Colonel Crawford is working hard to develop and grow a STEM program that will continue to keep students growing with our ever-changing technology while also helping to prepare students for whatever path they choose in life. The Teacher Boot Camp this summer was eye-opening as it highlighted not only the many awesome career opportunities in Crawford County but it showed us, as educators, how we can support students and businesses by helping to prepare students to hit the ground running toward a successful future."

Lesley Hayman, an elementary teacher at Wynford Local Schools, is excited about the opportunities the 3D printer donation will bring to elementary students. She said, "We ask even our youngest children, 'What do you want to be when you grow up?' It's incredibly important to introduce young children to careers where they can create, design and manufacture." Hayman continued, "Introducing a 3D printer to elementary students will get them excited at a very young age about careers that use hands-on skills to create, putting emphasis and value on manufacturing careers. This is a very unique and exciting opportunity for the elementary students at Wynford."

David Mason, business teacher at Wynford, also received a 3D Printer because of the career exploration lesson he created because of Teacher Boot Camp. Mason said, "I would like to thank IST for the generous donation of the two 3D printers to Wynford Local Schools. Technology is impacting industries everywhere, including Crawford County, and it is important that our students are up-to-date with new technologies in the workplace. The 3D printers will be used by all students grades K-12 throughout the Wynford district."

"Teacher Boot Camps are a valuable way for educators to gain the experience of understanding the occupations available in their communities and to integrate this knowledge into instruction in meaningful ways, helping students understand the skills needed to succeed locally," said Amy Wood, Director of Grants & Special Projects, who leads the Business Advisory Council. "We are grateful to IST for their sponsorship of our Business Advisory Council and the donation of 3D printers for this important program."

The Teacher Boot Camp is a college course worth three graduate-level credit hours taught by Amy Wood each summer. The coursework consists of readings, discussion board posts, and tours of local companies supported by local workforce development partners, which complement the course material. The cost is \$125, which may be reimbursed if teachers meet certain criteria. 



Wynford was ranked in the Associated Press top 10 five times during Sheldon's career, and he coached 12 different players who earned All-Ohio honors a total of 16 times. Sheldon was once named Class A Coach of the Year and was repeatedly voted Crawford County and District 6 Coach of the Year. After stepping down following the 2002-2003 season, Rob finished his career with an impressive 401-156 record, a milestone many thought would never be surpassed!

Amy Taylor-Sheldon, Rob Sheldon's daughter-in-law, achieved her 400th career win on Saturday, December 21, 2024. She has since added more victories to surpass Rob's remarkable 401 career wins. There is no doubt that Amy will continue to make Wynford proud with her coaching accomplishments in the years to come. Congratulations, Amy!




CLEVELAND CAVALIERS BASKETBALL GAME



JTI (JUNIOR TEEN INSTITUTE)


Marion-Crawford Prevention Programs (MCPP) is an Ohio certified non-profit organization funded in part by the Crawford-Marion ADAMH Board. MCPP is a primary prevention agency that provides prevention programming to Marion and Crawford counties. Our foremost target audience for programming is middle school and high school-aged youth.

JTI (Junior Teen Institute) is a group of students who were nominated as great leaders for the school and community. The program is designed for eighth-grade students. The students attended a weekend leadership conference to learn skills to become better drug-free leaders in their schools. The students then bring back the things they learned and provide preventative awareness about making positive choices to their peers as well as opportunities to have drug-free fun.



One of the most recent events included is a skit targeted for first and second-grade students, where the eighth-grade JTI members provide drug-free education and skits to teach the youth about the dangers of drug and alcohol use. This event is called Hands on Museum and is an annual event, supported and funded through the MCPP. Wynford's JTI conducted its Hands-On Museum event on November 17, 2024.







CLASSROOM GUIDANCE LESSONS GRADES 6-8

Healthy vs. Unhealthy Friendships

Students in grades six through eight all received two classroom lessons on Healthy and Unhealthy Friendships and Relationships. Part one focused on how to define what a good boundary is and how these boundaries help us stay in control of our own lives, create positive relationships, and create a sense of balance. In part two, the students learned how a person may use invalidation, blame, or distraction to minimize the problem within an unhealthy friendship or relationship. Lastly, we discussed how to handle someone who may be negatively affecting us in an appropriate manner.

Below are some of the key takeaways from each lesson that could help you open up a conversation with your son or daughter when these issues may arise.

Part 1 Recap:

- Healthy relationships are **balanced**. Both people are equal and benefit. Unhealthy relationships are imbalanced, with one person having more control.
- Healthy relationships have **boundaries**. These boundaries protect you and keep you in control of your life. Unhealthy relationships don't have boundaries and can make you feel powerless.
- Healthy relationships are **stable** and predictable. In unhealthy relationships, you never know what to expect from the other person.
- Healthy relationships are **accepting** and nonjudgmental. Unhealthy relationships make you feel insecure and like you have to change to win the other person's approval.
- If a relationship is very unhealthy, you might need to distance yourself from someone.

Part 2 Recap:

• Setting boundaries can help unhealthy relationships improve. You can set boundaries by explaining what you're okay with and what will happen if someone breaks that boundary.

























- If a friend isn't able to respect boundaries or accept responsibilities, you may need to distance yourself from them to protect your self-respect.
- When you set boundaries, unhelpful reactions like invalidation, distraction, and blame keep people from acknowledging, apologizing, and changing. This means an unhealthy relationship will stay unhealthy.
- Excusing someone's bad behavior hurts both of you. Setting an example of what healthy boundaries and self-respect look like will help both of you.
- Emotional distance can protect you from people you see often. To do this, limit the information you share with them to things that are light and impersonal. Avoid discussing emotional or personal things.

OHIO MEANS JOBS



Chio The eighth graders are scheduled for a three-day classroom lesson through Pioneer Career Center on Ohio Means Jobs in January 2025. Here are a few things your eighth-grade child will be doing during this three-day lesson:

Ohio Means Jobs is Ohio's free, online career counseling center that connects businesses to job seekers and provides career services. As a child under the age of 18, the students are guided to create a profile and take a career interest survey, which then produces an abundance of information for them in regard to career clusters, educational opportunities and research, and potential outlooks for each career. This three-day event is guided by one of the employers through Pioneer Career Center and is used throughout their high school career as a guiding system for their future.

ROX PROGRAMMING

I will kick off our annual ROX group starting January 2025. ROX is a 20 week girls' group program that is perfect for any girl in grades 4-12


What is ROX?

ROX works to address barriers and perceived limitations that impact girls while enhancing girls' confidence and competence by equipping them with the knowledge and skills necessary to live healthy, independent, and violence-free lives.



Nearly all girls who responded to the 2023 Girls' Index reported that they use social media, including 95% of 5th grade girls. Median reported social media use is between 4 and 6 hours per day. Additionally, 69% of high school girls and 54% of middle school girls reported that most students their age send sexually suggestive photos/videos to one another.







Thank you, Wynford community, for your public support of our schools, staff, and students this fall. We are so grateful for the families and friends, who both in word and deed, encourage our growth and advancement in every area of our development in the fifth grade and all the way down to preschool. As Wynford Elementary School looks forward to a great second semester in 2025, we celebrate with you our success from the fall of 2024.

With the changes in the science of reading, our teachers all learned and trained with an additional initiative to help all of our eager Using a combination of tried-and-tested phonics and reading strategies with a greater emphasis on writing, vocabulary, and background knowledge, our teachers introduced a new English Language Arts series. The challenges were many for staff and students, but all persevered to open a whole new world to many of our elementary friends. Our kindergarteners discovered a fascination with the five senses and some familiar ideas on farm First grade ventured around the world to discover how international students learn the love of reading and had a visit from a biblioburro. In second grade, students researched more about weather and the seasons and headed across The Plains to discover more about settlers, Native Americans, and the buffalo. Along with their teachers, third graders dove into the depths of our oceans with sea life and science while fourth grade learned about what makes our physical and metaphorical hearts beat. Fifth grade is reading Thunder Rolling in the Mountains and Westward Expansion. All semester our students are also buckling down on their math skills to improve each time on our iReady testing as well.

Outside our core subjects, did you know that our specials teachers, physical education, art, and music, serve nearly six hundred students each week in our building? Each teacher crafts units for each appropriate age level and diversity based on the standards and artistic license. PE teachers Mrs. Groves and Mr. Powers challenge our older kids with hockey skills and younger students with breaking down throwing skills while competing to get the most "trash" aka yarn balls in the "trash can". Then, they finish the semester with holiday bowling, "ice skating", and the rock wall. Mr. Groth, Mrs. Spradlein, and Mr. Safford also share grade levels as students are exposed to instruments such as the recorder in third grade and band instruments in fifth grade. Students love when they get their turns on how to play something new. Our singers in all of the other grades performed for their programs as well at the second -grade tree lighting and fourth-grade Veterans' Day video. Finally, Mr. Striker has opened a new world to elementary art with his love of clay projects that get glazed and fired in our oven. From individually styled clay mugs to tiki masks and clay monsters, students express their own perspectives on their artwork.

Also, in other extensions, our learning continues beyond the classroom. Fifth grade had an onsite adventure with Camp NUHOP as their staff led the top grade at Wynford Elementary School with team building and leadership activities. Project MORE (Mentoring in Ohio for Reading Excellence) is an evidence-based mentoring intervention program that has demonstrated statistically significant reading results since 1999. The Wynford School District has implemented Project MORE since 2013. Project MORE is currently organized under the direction of Title I Reading Teachers Becky Prenger and Malorie Heinlen. We are fortunate to collaborate with both the high school and elementary school to provide students with meaningful mentoring opportunities. Currently, nine high school students are enrolled in the class and receiving credit for mentoring. The firstsemester mentors were Gracie Mason, Kolbie Allgyre, Kelsie Bogle, Alvah Thompson, Heather Wappelhorst, Mikaila Morrison, Isaiah Bender, Cooper Jury, and KJ Kotalik. In the second semester, there will be some returning mentors along with new mentors joining the program. This semester three of the mentors participated in Project MORE as elementary students. It was very exciting to see these high school students return as mentors in the program due to the positive experiences they had in the program as elementary students.
