

Old South Gaylord will celebrate Memorial Day, downtown's Civic Center will welcome the 4th of July with many bangs, there will be Farmers Markets across the city and footraces galore in Washington Park and throughout the town.

New for this year, the recently passed bill that limits where gas stations can now be built in the Mile High City will make available thousands of acres of land for more community serving uses like housing, child care etc. My thanks to Councilwomen Diana Romero-Campbell (District 4) and Amanda Sawyer (District 5) and all our hardworking aides, for their partnership in this important effort.

After a few years of very challenging construction on the 16th Street Mall, the majority of work there will be completed by summer's end, and downtown will be more formally open - and welcoming - for visitors once again. Look for news of festival style events in that space as time rolls on.

Back here in the cozy confines of D6, look for our 2nd Annual Academy In The Community, on April 16, 5:30-7:30 p.m. at Cook Park Recreation **Center**, where we will gather nearly 3 dozen city agencies and partner non-profits to ease your way behind the curtain of the bureaucracy.

Talk to city planners face-to-face about particular projects or general policies. Let the good folks at Denver's Police, Sheriff, and Fire Departments know of your public safety concerns, plead your case for a dog park in your neighborhood to representatives of Parks and Rec, and let our Department of Transportation and Infrastructure - DOTI (pronounced Dottie) - know where you think a stop sign or new traffic light would make it less terrifying for you to get safely around your neighborhood.



We hope you have a great first few weeks of spring and look forward to seeing you out and about.

Wynken, Blynken & Nod Artist: Mabel Landrum Torrey S. Franklin & Exposition

This statue honors Wynken, Blynken and Nod, a memorial to Denver poet Eugene Field who on March 9, 1889, wrote "Dutch Lullaby" depicting three children who "one night sailed off in a wooden shoe of crystal light." Not too far from the statue is a small white-frame cottage which was the home of Field during his residence in Denver, 1881-1883. The house was purchased for the city by Mrs. J.J. Brown and moved to Washington Park.



It is now the home of The Parks People, a non-profit organization. This prize-winning sculpture by Mabel Landrum Torry was commissioned in 1918 by Denver Mayor Robert W. Speer. The sculpture originally sat in the middle of a fountain in Washington Park. The Park People (www.theparkpeople.com) restored the sculpture and relocated it next to The Park People's offices at the Eugene Field House in Washington Park.

Spring into Action: Exciting Updates from FANS of Washington Park

Friends and Neighbors (FANS) of Washington Park was established in 2006 as a non-profit, 501c3, whose mission is to "Preserve and enhance the character and safety of Washington Park through advocacy, education and investment".

To learn about activities sponsored by FANS visit **fanswashingtonpark.org**, which directs you to the most recent newsletters and to the sign-up page to receive future newsletters and emails.

Previous events sponsored by FANS this year have included a tour of South High School, including the Bell Tower, a discussion of native plants, guided bird watching and counting by Denver Audubon, attracting hummingbirds with native plants by Jane Lee, and a presentation by Greenwood Wildlife Rehabilitation Center.

Some future events include a tour of Denver's Greenhouse in City Park, a presentation by Denver Urban Gardens on avoiding food waste/composting, garden tours and a Boathouse tour featuring a new collection of 21 historical photos of Washington Park.

FANS investments include the bike repair stand and pump, playground table, new trees, an updated electronic tree guide, new bushes and extensive mulch applications.

FANS is working closely with Denver Parks and Rec. (DPR) to fund two new bike parking racks and considering options to improve Loop Road safety.

FANS, along with DPR horticulturists Jane Packard and Skylar Smith, have developed two beautiful gardens as active pollinator habitats. FANS is also working with People and Pollinators, Plant Oasis, Summer Home Garden, WPENA and WWPNA to support and expand a pollinator corridor throughout East and West Washington Park.







The Oasis Project Transforms Wash Park with Native Gardens

Having a garden filled with plants native to the American West is like having nature right outside your door.

Every day, you can step outside and find something new to admire. Right now, in my garden, Fringed Sage (Artemisia frigida) is beginning to wake up. Tiny seedlings are sprouting from the countless seeds that the purple Aromatic Aster (Symphyotrichum laeve) produced last fall. Fresh ground-level growth is appearing in the Drummond's Catchfly (Silene drummondii). Stepping outside has become a daily joy—like taking a quick trip to the mountains without leaving home.

My garden, along with dozens of others around Wash Park, is the result of a volunteer project we launched in 2022. One of our neighbors, Deb Lebow—whom I consider the Plant Mayor of Wash Park—spends much of her time tending to her garden. As people walk by, many tell her they'd love to do something similar with their yards: replacing unused Kentucky bluegrass with vibrant native plant gardens that delight the eye and support biodiversity.





And so, the Oasis Project (plantanoasis.org) was born—a volunteer effort to help neighbors replace unused grass with native plants that attract pollinators and birds.

We received so many requests that we assembled a professional crew of Afghan refugees, newly resettled in the U.S. after years of supporting the American military in Afghanistan.

What I find most remarkable about these transformations is how an underutilized patch of land can become a thriving, dynamic space. After a long day, there's nothing quite as satisfying as pouring a drink, leaving your phone inside, and stepping out to see what's new. Dusk in Denver is a magical time, and a garden of native plants offers the perfect reason to get outside, unplug, and soak it all in.

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Demolition planned

Wash Park church sells for \$4M



In February, Mile High Building & Development bought the Washington Park United Church of Christ building on.43 acre at 400-420 S. Williams St for \$4mm.

"We don't know what our plans are just yet. ...
We're going to have a company meeting and figure out what
we're going to do," Mile High owner Ryan Yoffe told
BusinessDen. Yoffe does know one thing for sure, though —
the existing church will be demolished, he said"

The deal works out to about \$213 a square foot for the land. "We buy a lot of stuff in Wash Park and it was a pretty big lot," Yoffe said. "The church actually approached us. They engaged a broker and their broker engaged a broker that knew us, and that's how the deal came together."

Yoffe has had his hand in a number of commercial and residential projects around the metro area. His website shows a portfolio of new-build custom homes from the Highlands to Cherry Creek.

Tom Luehrs, who serves on the leadership council of Washington Park United Church of Christ, said the nearly 100-year-old congregation is leasing roughly 5,000 square feet in an old bookstore on the former Johnson & Wales University campus in South Park Hill.

"There were tears, there's been tears all along. And yet, in many ways, ... all the work it's taken to make this happen has kindled some very good friendships," The deal works out to about \$213 a square foot for the land.





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New homes under construction in our neighborhood aren't subject to routine city inspections, leaving enforcement up to us.

To help protect public spaces and neighboring properties, residents are encouraged to report violations—such as construction trash, blocked alleys, or encroachments, potholes—using Denver's "Report an Issue" online tool.

Reports can be submitted anonymously, and photos can be uploaded as evidence. Your input helps hold developers accountable and improve enforcement city-wide.

The City of Denver has regulations that builders/contractors are supposed to follow to protect public and private properties adjacent to construction projects. Those include:

Noise Compliance: Finished projects must follow Denver's Noise Ordinance; HVAC units, generators, and loading docks are common sources of violations.

Dust Control: Contractors must prevent dust and particles from leaving the site, even during inactivity.

Debris Management: Streets, alleys, sidewalks, and city dumpsters must remain clear of dirt and debris. Permits Visible: Building permits must be posted and visible from the street.

Runoff & Erosion: Contractors must control water runoff and protect adjacent properties (e.g., foundations, fences, landscaping).

Worker Facilities: Each site must have a port-o-let or other sanitary facility.

Safe Storage: Equipment and materials must be stored securely to protect workers, the public, and neighboring properties.

Excavation Safety: Open sites (e.g., basement digs) must have a 6-foot fence to prevent unauthorized access.

ROW Permits Required: A permit from DOTI is needed before placing dumpsters or blocking streets/alleys.


