

Message from the Minister

Welcome to the 2025 Christmas/Winter newsletter!

I recently went on my annual retreat to the Borders, the rain and damp being wonderfully contrasted by the vibrant autumnal colours of the trees littering the road and byways.

The purpose of the retreat is to seek the counsel of God; in prayer, in Scriptures and in contemplation, asking God for His direction both for myself and for our church in the coming year. What preaching series will we delve into in 2026? What, if anything, has naturally run its season and what new thing is God asking His people to do? How do we grow in faith as the family of God?

One thing I am certain of, God's people are challenged to grow in faith both as individuals and as a community of Christ.

At the retreat centre in Hawick, I read an article in 'Idea', the magazine of the Evangelical Alliance, about 'recovering the church as an authentic family'. The article suggested community was part of God's intention for the church, that community is transformational when relationships are real and intentional. It's not specific programmes or outreach from our church that make relationships work but rather it is about being vulnerable. It's where we invite people into the community of faith and participate in one another's joys and pains as we all try to follow Jesus, struggling along the way.

Community participation is not easy. It demands openness, forgiveness, patience and self-giving. These qualities are hugely attractive to those who want to come and see what's on offer in the Christian life, for following the Lord Jesus should offer something unique. The Biblical perspective of the Church and its contrast to the outside worldview is, what I believe, makes this so attractive.

We live in a world where, let's face it since COVID, things have become much more of a struggle. The statistics regarding ill health, mental health and unemployment reflect just how much folk are struggling with life. The Collins dictionary word of the year in 2022 was permacrisis, the idea of an extended period of instability and insecurity - the 24-hour news cycle of global and local issues around security, health, provision, injustice and inequality feed that sense of permacrisis and the breakdown of community.

So how do we as Christians speak into this context?

In the first instance we recognise that we don't live in this permacrisis by ourselves. We walk through life in the world with Jesus by our side and together, in community, say to those who will listen "come and find community with us, in Christ!"

How do we do that?

We need to be truly friendly; purposefully approachable, welcoming and sociable with community going further than Sunday worship and weekly church activities.

Community goes even further than Sundays and weekly church activities.

Whilst Gathering on Sunday to worship the Lord should be a weekly priority for all God's people, so too should be the nurturing of deeper, healthy relationships in our with our church family too.

In a recent meeting, I discussed what a healthy growing church looked like. My mentor, David, and I agreed it was one that depended upon the word of God and could be expressed in four steps:



- 1. The first step is coming to faith -knowing Jesus through his word, by reading and hearing the Bible and responding by faith.
- 2. The second step is growing in faith like a newborn being weaned from milk to solids in order to grow and thrive, so too does the Christian need to be nurtured by the Word of God to grow and thrive in their faith.
- 3. Step three is the studying and sharing of God's word together. We should be discussing Sunday's sermon, or something that you've read in your weekly and daily devotions. Speaking to one another about the Bible as you chat and meet with your Christian friends should feel natural. We come to church on a Sunday so that we come under God's word and teaching... why would we not engage with it and nurture each other
- 4. The final step of growing in faith together is to share our faith. The command to go and make disciples of all nations is done when we share God's word.

My sincere hope and prayer is that our church family will continue to grow together, sharpening one another by His word and sharing God's word outside of church.

May you have blessed Christmas and wonderful 2026, as we grow deeper in faith with the Lord together.

- Thanks to the congregation's generous giving and recent Gift Aid reclaims, we are now in a better position to meet our total monthly commitments and maintain our remaining reserves (c£17,000).
- However, we know our energy costs will increase during winter months, so your continued financial help would be very welcome. If you have any fun fund raising ideas, let us know so that we can advertise it and support you!
- We are now starting to build up funds again to support our other various projects, with the balance currently just short of £32,000. This includes money raised through the 'Night at the Musicals' event and Pauline and Brian's epic marathon walk across the Forth Road Bridge! It means we can start to think about how we address our other priorities, like sorting the back hall floor and the Manse roof.

Equipping for the Future

I am delighted to announce that the Kirk Session application to the Church of Scotland's Seeds for Growth fund was successful, securing £1,000 towards the costs of creating a children's play area in our Open House Café and the updating of the creche facilities in the main church. The remaining monies will be used for Messy Church.

There was also an additional cost incurred in the replacement of the hot water boiler and dishwasher totalling £3,443. This was partially offset by a grant from Fife Council and the sale of the disused bain-marie

The boiler was installed for free by a family member and the person that bought the bain-maire worked for Morris & Spottiswood, Glasgow. As part of the company's charitable work, they fitted new carpet tiles to one of the rooms in the Gillespie Centre allowing us to now offer a quiet room in the café.

Thank God for His faithful provision!

So what next? Why has the money been spent on these particular items when there are few families and children at church? The simple answer is that we need to be prepared for them when they do come! I'm sure if you have been at GMC for many years you will have seen many new faces amongst our church family, and you'll also have noticed the absence of families. The church is a place for all the people of God, from all backgrounds and ages, and we should all be praying that the Lord would bless us, His church, with growth across all ages.

So, what do I ask of you? Please visit the Gillespie Centre during café hours, invite families with young children, and share news of our Messy Church. Your support and word-of-mouth invitations are vital as we seek to welcome all to GMC, for this is YOUR church.
