

The paintings and the drawings represents all the naked movement, the worked bodies of the boxers, the hugs of sweat, the expressions of pain. All in black and white. The common thread that gives unity to the corpus is the human figure, the boxer and his movements, pure realism. The boxer, the dancer eats, is his body and completely identifies with it.











It is possible to enter the world of boxing, not only through its pictorial representation. The fight becomes reality in the ring itself. The spectator goes up to the ring and through a play of lights and incidental music, they can live the experience of dance-boxing. The ring, made only of ropes, reproduces the scene of the fight, the ropes mark the limit (inside the fight is with rules, outside it is not).
