#### MAYOR OF THE WEST MIDLANDS TOASTS NEW DRINKS ACADEMY

In the first week of our term, our new drinks dispense academy at the Paget Road campus welcomed a VIP guest when Andy Street, Mayor of the West Midlands, dropped in to visit.



The Mayor met drinks dispense technician apprentices from across the UK who attend block placements at the academy as part of their 18-month

training programme, as well as representatives from major brewing groups, soft drinks companies and equipment providers.

The academy is equipped with a range of industry-standard equipment - including a working cellar, beer pulls and pumps, drinks coolers and soft drinks equipment – and is used by employers in the beverage industry to train staff to install and maintain dispensing equipment in pubs, clubs, cafés, theatres and sports stadia.

# COLLEGE'S SECOND RAIL TRAINING CENTRE GETS ON TRACK

Courses to give people the skills needed to build a career in the rail and infrastructure sectors are set to be expanded with the opening of an additional training site in Dudley.

The college and its infrastructure training partner, National Infrastructure Solutions (NIS), have taken over space at the Black Country Innovative Manufacturing Organisation (BCIMO)'s Very Light Rail National Innovation Centre in Zoological Drive, enabling it to train more local people



to meet the demand for skilled operatives to work on the construction and maintenance of train lines, tram routes and stations across the region.

The site boasts more than 2000 metres of conventional rail track, including two split-level platforms, an 870m tunnel and signalling components to give students hands-on training in multiple disciplines across the industry and enhance their learning experience by working with the same equipment as used in rail construction sites.

Courses are available for newcomers to the sector, as well as those already working in the industry who want to upskill and develop their knowledge further, and include a free six-week sector-based work academy programme for people who are registered as unemployed.

# STEELS ERECTED FOR NEW ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY AND AUTOMOTIVE CENTRE

Work has begun to erect steel framework for the new £8.1 million Advanced Technology and Automotive Centre at the Wellington Road campus in Bilston.



The centre – due to open in July 2024 – will be equipped with facilities for new electric, hybrid and traditional vehicles, as well as fabrication, manufacturing, welding, CAD and robotics and enables the relocation of the existing automotive and engineering workshops from the Paget Road campus.

To mark the milestone, construction students, college staff and representatives from the

design and construction companies were joined by Councillor Stephen Simkins, Leader of City of Wolverhampton Council for a symbolic 'signing of the steel' ceremony.

# **COLLEGE INVITES EMPLOYERS TO HELP DEVELOP THE FUTURE WORKFORCE**

In October, we welcomed around 50 local employers to a business breakfast to give them the opportunity to help develop training programmes for the workforce of the future.

Guests were able to talk to staff from different curriculum areas about skills gaps affecting their particular industry, with feedback enabling tutors to adapt learning programmes to ensure students gain the skills and knowledge required by employers in the chosen sector.



#### **COLLEGE APPRENTICES MAKE HISTORY!**

Two brothers from Eastbourne who completed their drinks dispense technician apprenticeships at the college have made history by being the first candidates in the UK to do so!

Aaron and Brad Santos, who work for LWC Drinks Ltd - the UK's largest independent drinks wholesaler - at its Eastbourne depot, combined working for the company with attending block release placements at the college's specialist drinks dispense training academy during the 18-month training programme.



The pair, who are employed as technical beer and soft drinks engineers, gained skills in plumbing, electrics, refrigeration, gas pressure systems and pipework, as well as fault finding, problem solving, customer service, training, product quality, time and workload management, health and safety and industry codes of practice.

During the programme they attended five two-week training blocks at the college and, when returning to their field job, used their newly-gained skills to install drinks dispense equipment and provide a breakdown cover service in a wide range of venues in the south-east.

# **APPRENTICESHIPS**

Rail apprentices from McGinley Support Services who are learning their skills at our rail training site at the Wellington Road campus were interviewed by reporter Joan Cummins, from BBC Midlands Today, about HS2 and working in the rail industry.

At the start of the term, an appeal went out to employers in the automotive, brickwork, carpentry and engineering sectors to help meet the growing demand from young people wanting to pursue apprenticeships in these areas.

The college has a talent pool of enthusiastic, work-ready candidates keen to start working in the sectors, but needs employers to take them on as apprentices and support them through their training.



# **HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE**


New health and social care students got handson with practical activities, learning the basics of first aid and creating 3D cells.






# **HIGHER EDUCATION**

Once courses were underway, they headed off to an employment day at West Midlands Police headquarters in Birmingham where they talked to serving officers about the wide range of roles available in the police force, took part in a Build a Barracks challenge with the Army, testing their creative and problem-solving skills and had a trip to Wolf Mountain for a day of rock climbing, bouldering and archery to challenge themselves and learn how to work as part of a team.







And, over the summer, cadets from 3WV police cadets - run by West Midlands Police Cadets in partnership with the college - many of whom were public service students, completed their training and were presented with certificates of achievements.
