From the President Walt Byers



Each year your Bay View Board of Trustees and staff participate in a midwinter meeting to discuss and learn about topics and issues relevant to Bay View's future.

The 2025 midwinter meeting produced a number of helpful outcomes.

This year, for the first time, an outside consultant, Johnson Center for Philanthropy at Grand Valley State University, led a "back to basics" training session intended to help the Board become more efficient both as individual members and as a policy board as a whole. One valuable takeaway from the training was the need to adopt meeting norms for

all meetings. These norms include:

- Raising a hand to be recognized to speak
- Respecting the person who has the floor, no side conversations
- Listening to what the speaker says
- Respecting time i.e. know when to step in and when to step out of the discussion
- Using cell phones in a meaningful way as related to the meeting

These norms were put into practice at the February 15 mid-winter Board meeting where all Trustees reported positive results. These same norms will be used at Bay View staff meetings, and Committee meetings. Bay View members will be expected to use the norms when dealing with staff, committees or attending Board meetings.

Another outcome of the workshop is a revised member comment procedure to be used at Board meetings. The new procedure will be formalized at the March 24th Board meeting and publicized soon after. To summarize, the new procedure should help make comments on specific agenda items more meaningful.

Robin Caldwell and Eric Breisach will not seek Board re-election. The entire Board and the staff expressed gratitude to both for their dedicated service and leadership on the Bay View Board of Trustees. We encourage members with a passion for Bay View and an interest in helping shape the future to consider running for the Board. Week 1 -Bishop David Alan Bard: June 15 – 19

As presiding bishop of the Michigan Conference of the United Methodist Church, we welcome Bishop David Alan Bard to open Bay View's 150th Season.

Week 2 – Rev. Brian D. McLaren: June 22 – 26

A thought leader in "a new kind of Christianity," Brian McLaren is passionate about rethinking faith for a changing world and calling us to live out a love-centered, justice-driven spirituality.

Week 3 – Rev. Dr. Mary Luti: June 29 – July 3

Mary Luti taught the history of Christianity, Christian worship, and preaching at the former Andover Newton Theological School (now Andover Newton Seminary at Yale). Dr. Luti also served First Church in Cambridge, Massachusetts; the first woman to occupy that historic pulpit.

Week 4 – BIG SUNDAY – Rev. Dr. Trygve Johnson: July 6

Trygve Johnson is the CEO of The PreachFor Foundation, an organization working to identify and empower a new generation of talented young leaders through experience, education, and mentorship, to help churches reach their full potential, and make a positive impact in their communities.

Week 5 – Marilyn McEntyre: July 13 – 17

Marilyn McEntyre taught writing at the UCB-UCSF Medical School and now coaches writers and teaches in programs at New College Berkeley, Western Seminary, and the Oblate School of Theology. Marilyn is here to share her unique blend of writing, spirituality, and souldeep reflection—an experience designed for anyone who loves language, is writing their own story, or wantstoconnectmoredeeplytotheworld.

Week 6 – The Rev. William H. Lamar IV: July 20

Bill Lamar is pastor of Metropolitan African Methodist Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C., where he seeks daily to extend the cathedral of African Methodism's nearly two centuries-long legacy of bearing witness to and ushering into this world the reign of the living God.

Will Willimon is Professor of the Practice of Christian Ministry at the Divinity School, Duke University and a retired Bishop of the United Methodist Church. Baylor University named him one of the Twelve Most Effective Preachers in the English-speaking world.

Week 8 – Ann Voskamp: August 3 (Preaching) & August 4 (Q & A)

Ann Voskamp is the author of four NY Times bestsellers, and was named by Christianity Today as one of 50 women

Week 9 – Rev. Dr. Luke A. Powery: August 10

Luke Powery is the Dean of Duke University Chapel, Professor of Homiletics and African American Studies, and is a national leader in the theological study of the art of preaching.

Post-Season Week 1 – Rev. Aaron Tredway: August 17

Aaron Tredway is lead pastor of Fellowship City Church and vice presi-

dent of Ambassadors Football International. He was founder and executive director of the Cleveland City Stars, a professional soccer team, and has mentored thousands of athletes and coaches around the world.

Post-Season Week 2 – Julie Greyerbiehl: August 24

Julie Greyerbiehl is the pastor of Petoskey United Methodist Church.

I am pleased to report that Bay View remains in a strong financial position as we begin 2025. Our recent independent financial audit, conducted by Plante Moran, was completed on schedule and within budget. We were awarded a clean audit opinion, reaffirming our commitment to sound financial management and transparency. The auditor's report is available for review on the member side of the website. Additionally, our investment portfolio saw an impressive 12.43% growth last year thanks to the guidance of the Investment Advisory Committee.

A key initiative introduced by Executive Director, Megan DeWindt, and Finance Director, Matt Gawenda, was the ONE BAY VIEW BILL. which members first saw reflected in the December 2024 invoice. This streamlined billing system consolidates multiple fees into a single, easy-to-understand invoice with clear due dates. While it does not include real estate taxes or water bills, ONE BAY VIEW BILL provides members with a predictable financial scenario, allowing ample time for budgeting. In addition to serving members more effectively, this new process enhances operational efficiency across the Association.

In line with our ongoing efforts to enhance transparency and align with best practices, the Finance Team has introduced a new financial reporting format. Beginning this year, we will provide quarterly financial updates to the Finance Committee and Board, ensuring consistent oversight and communication. We will also work to update and refine our Finance Committee Charter and internal financial policies and procedures.

I would like to extend my sincere appreciation to Finance Director Matt Gawenda and the Audit Committee, for their exemplary work on the recent external audit. Matt was instrumental in ensuring that all internal deadlines were met. The Audit Committee performed numerous internal audits which were leveraged bν the external auditors. The many hours contributed by Audit Committee members helped to keep the fee for the external audit as low as possible. Both staff and these volunteer auditors assist us with maintaining the highest financial standards while also controlling costs.



Updates from the Board of Assessors by

Keith Hearit



Be on the lookout for two important communications in the coming months from the

Board of Assessors (BoA). First, in early May you will receive your annual Notice of Assessment. This is a little later than we've done in the past. The change is so that I can be more prompt in responding to you, as the later date won't conflict with my work obligations.

As you know, this document will detail the market value of your leasehold. It is not your 2025 tax bill but rather it articulates the market value on which your 2025 taxes will be calculated.

Should you have questions about your market value, the Board of Assessors, along with Assessment Advisor Ed Vander Vries, will be available to discuss in May and June. Should you disagree with the value on your Notice of Assessment, you can appeal it directly at the annual Board of Review session on June 27.

Second, also in May, watch for our annual Letter to the Membership. We've now done these for four years. The letter will summarize our recent work and share how it will evolve going forward.

As always, our goal in distributing our single tax bill from Bear Creek Township is to follow the Summer Resort Act of 1889 which requires that the apportionment of taxes be "fair and equitable."



Historical Museum by Sophie McGee

The Bay View Historical Museum's exhibit for the 2025 Sesquicentennial Celebration will be "Celebrating the Early Years" with focuses on each of the Chautauqua pillars, and what is more appropriate for the placement of the displays than in our earliest buildings, Museum Building #1 (1876) and Building #2 (1881).

Last season (2024), the Museum received the gift of John M. Hall's honorary cane donated to the Museum by David W. Bieber, great grandson of John M. Hall, who remembers the cane displayed in his grandmother's cottage.

"It was always in the cottage", remembers David. "I just never asked about it".

It appears that the cane was made in honor of Mr. Hall's philanthropic endeavors and contributions to both Bay View and his hometown city of Flint, Michigan where he practiced law. The handle of the cane is a well-polished magnificent Petoskey stone, and the wood appears to be black walnut all of which will be proudly displayed in the Museum's summer exhibit. All of the items featured in the 2025 celebration are from the Museum's collection.
