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Standing down

Long serving Ōhāriu MP Greg O'Connor has decided to retire from politics.

The first indication that he was stepping down came when the Labour Party announced its line-up of list MPs on 8 June. Mr O'Connor's name was not on the list.

The 'Independent Herald' contacted Mr O'Connor and asked him what was happening and he confirmed that he had decided not to stand as a list MP.

"From the day Ōhāriu disappeared my political world changed," he says.

"I came to the realisation that when you are an electorate MP you are beholden to the people of the electorate.

"I was always beholden to the good people of Ōhāriu.

"The only people I owe is Ōhāriu people," adding that he has "gratitude for what they have done for me.

"Ōhāriu disappeared on me last year and I missed out on standing for Wellington North, which was already spoken for, as was Kenepehu, so the list was my only real option."

Earlier in the year Mr O'Connor indicated he would seek being a list MP and that if Labour became the government he would put his name forward to be Parliament's Speaker.

Then having thought it over, he came to the conclusion that "when you are a list MP you are beholden to the party, because you are only there because the party put you there.

"I came to the realisation that probably is not my gig."

As a result, he decided to retire from politics. "You have got to learn to recognise when the time has arrived, and this is the right time," he says.

"I will be sad to be leaving Ōhāriu, but that was already out of my hands.

"I'm already looking forward to my next gig," he says, adding that he does not yet know what that will be.

"I'm sure I will get an opportunity out there to use my skills."

In the meantime "any suggestions gratefully received," he says. People with suggestions can contact Mr O'Connor at Greg.OConnor@parliament.govt.nz.

With the changes in the electorate boundaries Mr O'Connor says he is hoping the people of Ōhāriu "continue to get good service."

He notes that the three suburbs "which make up the core of Ōhāriu, which are Newlands, Johnsonville and Khandallah, will now be on the periphery of three different electorates."

"Greg has been a fantastic local member," Wellington's Deputy Mayor and Takapū/Northern Ward Councillor Ben McNulty says.

"I think his super power has been the ability to bring people together to solve problems. "You see that in things like setting up the Johnsonville Business Group.

"He's laid the foundation for Newlands to do the same."

Mr O'Connor meets with Councillors and business leaders regularly to talk about issues, things like street safety or the "ongoing saga" of redeveloping Johnsonville, Cr McNulty says.

"All of these conversations don't just happen by themselves.

"You really do need someone who is there and making it happen.

"That has been Greg's legacy – getting things fixed quickly and getting the right people in the room talking to each other."

As a result of the work Mr O'Connor has done "the community is much better connected and able to respond and work with each other to solve problems as they come up," Cr McNulty says.

Mr O'Connor was elected to Parliament in 2017, and will have served as an MP for nine years when the election comes around.

After being selected as Labour's Ōhāriu candidate that year, he aimed to challenge long serving MP Peter Dunne. However Mr Dunne withdrew and Mr O'Connor won the seat ahead of National list MP Brett Hudson with a margin of 1,051 votes.

He then retained the seat in the 2020 election with a big margin of 11,961 votes.

At the last election in 2023 he defeated National's Deputy Leader Nicola Willis with a margin of 1,260 votes.

Mr O'Connor was in the Police for 41 years before being elected to Parliament, including being elected by the Police officers to be the President of the Police Association.

New Vice-Chancellor for Victoria University

Internationally-recognised scholar and national award-winning teacher Professor Bryony James has been appointed as the new Vice-Chancellor of Te Herenga Waka – Victoria University of Wellington.

Originally from Cornwall, Professor James has been studying, working and leading in the New Zealand tertiary sector for more than 30 years.

She is currently Te Herenga Waka's Provost, having previously held leadership roles as the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research) at the University of Waikato and Deputy Dean (Research) at the Faculty of Engineering, University of Auckland.

Professor James is a researcher in materials engineering, with her research interest having moved from traditional areas of the subject into the intersection of materials, food and nutrition.

Professor James says leading a university she loves, in a city she loves, is precisely the place she wants to be.

"I'm going to be taking up this role at a time of change in the tertiary sector, but with the privilege of leading a fully comprehensive, established and excellent university, right here among the halls of government, in the capital city."

She notes that as the current Provost, she brings continuity, but also "very purposeful evolution."

"I want to lead the university community forward with a strategy that is deliberately connected into Wellington, into the country and the world.

"To be able to do that with our community of passionate staff, students and alumni is

a wonderful position to be in."

Te Herenga Waka Chancellor Mr Alan Judge says that, following an extensive global search, the university's Council was delighted to have been able to appoint someone of Professor James's calibre from within the university itself.

"Her initiative, clarity of thinking, and strong connections built on trust, which are evident throughout the university and into the capital city beyond, led us to choose Professor James from a strong set of candidates.

"The Council is confident that she has the energy, drive and values we need to lead our staff, students and community into the coming years."

Professor James will take up her appointment on 12 June.

Current Vice-Chancellor Professor Nic Smith has been appointed as Vice-Chancellor of the University of Auckland.

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Plane Sense loses flight path case

Plane Sense Wellington's judicial review of the DMAPS flight path changes has been dismissed by the High Court.

The Court's judgment was issued on 5 June. Plane Sense says it is disappointed by the judgment and believes the outcome highlights the need for a broader conversation about how communities are considered when major aviation decisions affect where people live.

It is now reviewing the judgment and its implications.

"We are disappointed that New Zealand's current framework appears able to accommodate significant impacts on communities without requiring those communities to be consulted or considered before those impacts occur," a Plane Sense Wellington spokesperson says.

"The Court acknowledged evidence that residents have experienced significant disruption to their lives, including sleep disturbance and impacts on health and wellbeing.

"This judgment does not end the suffering of affected residents, nor does it change the reality faced by thousands of people living beneath the flight path every day.

"While the Court has determined the legal issues, Plane Sense believes the outcome highlights a gap between what may be legally permissible and what many New Zealanders would consider fair and ethical decision-making.

"Throughout this campaign, Plane Sense has been contacted by communities from around New Zealand facing similar concerns about aircraft noise, flight path changes and a lack of meaningful involvement in decisions made by airports, Airways NZ and aviation authorities that affect their homes, health, wellbeing and quality of life.

"Most New Zealanders would expect consultation and consideration if a major transport corridor or highway was proposed through their community.

"Similar principles of transparency, accountability and community participation should apply when flight paths are introduced over established residential neighbourhoods."

Plane Sense notes that Australia is pursuing reforms to strengthen aviation noise oversight and provide communities with independent avenues to raise concerns about aircraft noise and flight path changes.

Plane Sense says it believes New Zealand should be looking closely at these reforms

to ensure it does not fall behind emerging international approaches to community protection, independent oversight and aviation accountability.

"The issues raised by this case are not unique to our community, or to Wellington," the Plane Sense spokesperson says.

"The outcome highlights the need for a broader discussion about whether communities have sufficient protections and meaningful opportunities for input when significant aviation decisions affect where they live, and their health and wellbeing."

"The outcome also highlights the need for a wider conversation about aviation law reform, stronger independent scrutiny of aircraft noise impacts, community involvement in flight path decisions, transparent and proper process, and measures that may reduce impacts on affected residents, including stronger noise protections, tighter aircraft curfew settings and other practical measures that better balance aviation operations with community wellbeing."

The group thanked residents, supporters, donors, experts and legal advisers who helped bring the case before the Court.

"This community has shown extraordinary commitment, resilience and courage," the spokesperson says.

"We are deeply grateful to everyone who helped ensure the voices of affected residents were heard and believed strongly in our cause.

"Our thoughts are with those in our community who we know will be hit hardest by this result."

The decision has, however, been welcomed by both Wellington Airport and Airways.

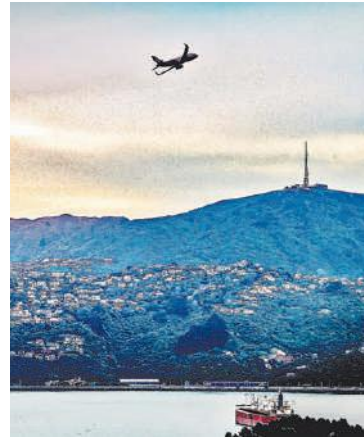
"We support DMAPS because it's safer, more efficient and was the most popular option from the public consultation we carried out in 2024," Wellington Airport's Chief Executive Matt Clarke says.

"It has reduced delays, travel times and costs, lowered emissions, and affects the fewest number of people with noise.

"Of the four options we publicly consulted on in 2024, the status quo was the most popular choice as first preference (49.78%), more than twice the level of other options.

"We understand this is disappointing for some people.

"However, the unavoidable challenge for a city like Wellington with an airport relatively close to the CBD is that aircraft must fly over residential areas at times, no matter which flightpath option is preferred," Mr Clarke says.

"Airways welcomes the decision to dismiss the judicial review brought by Plane Sense against Airways, the Director of Civil Aviation and Wellington International Airport," says Jamie Gray, Airways General Manager People and Partnerships.

"The Court has found no legal errors in decisions to implement the Divergent Missed Approach System (DMAPS) at Wellington Airport.

"Airways is responsible for providing safe and efficient air navigation services across New Zealand.

"DMAPS was designed to increase safety at Wellington Airport and was implemented after a number of incidents related to missed approaches (which occur when an arrival aircraft is unable to complete its landing).

"It has resulted in residents in some suburbs experiencing more noise, and residents in others experiencing less.

"DMAPS was developed in accordance with the Civil Aviation Rules, and applicable ICAO standards.

"It ensures that flight paths followed by departure aircraft diverge from the flight path followed by missed approach aircraft, separating both aircraft by default.

"Since the introduction of DMAPS at Wellington Airport in 2022, the number of missed approach safety reports at Wellington Airport has reduced significantly, from 27 in 2019 to only five in total over the last three years.

"DMAPS is and always has been safe."

Grants available

Newlands Community Centre reopening

The Newlands Community Centre will officially reopen at 10am today, 11 June.

The community had to close after the roof was lifted during the storm that hit Wellington on 16 February.

As well as having to repair the roof, the community centre discovered black mould in the walls of the centre, and this also had to be repaired.

As a result, the work has taken longer than originally expected, resulting in the temporary closure needing to be extended.

Located at 9 Batchelor Street, the community centre was opened in November 2009 with a blessing from a kaumātua from Ngā Hau e Whā o Paparāangi.

Initially a community initiative, Council designers worked with representatives of several local groups to come up with a concept for the centre. The drop-in lounge is open for the community to share a cup of tea or coffee, use the free internet computers, read the newspaper, or just relax and chat with others.

Activists, Allies & Beyond: 40 Years Since Homosexual Law Reform will be held on Sunday 14 June from 2pm to 3pm at Te Matapihi ki te Ao Nui Central Library, Ngā Pou Ruahine (Level 2).

This is a free event celebrating the 40th anniversary of the Homosexual Law Reform Act 1986.

Trevor Mallard, Linda Evans, Bill Logan, Onjei Bond, and host Gareth Watkins will participate in a panel discussion exploring the social and political climate, and the long history of community activism that contributed to the landmark 1986 reform passing through Parliament.

The panel will discuss the political processes behind the bill and the opposing community campaigns that emerged during a deeply divisive period in New Zealand's history.

People attending will hear about the personal impacts this had on members of the rainbow community, the resulting legacies of the reform, and the ways it continues to shape the lives and rights of queer people in Aotearoa today.

Sir Trevor Mallard was an MP for 35 years and served as a Minister and Speaker. More recently he was New Zealand's Ambassador to Ireland.

He is now retired and spends his time gardening, walking his dog and helping with grandchildren.

Sir Trevor acted as 'whip' for the Homosexual Law Reform Bill. His role was to keep a day-by-day count to help ensure the numbers were there to make sure it became law.

Linda Evans has been an activist in lesbian, feminist and gay politics in Wellington since the 1970s.

She was involved in the ongoing campaigns for homosexual law reform and anti-discrimination laws in the 1970s and 1980s.

Linda is a trustee and voluntary curator for Kawe Mahara Queer Archives Aotearoa.

In 1985 Bill Logan was a radical Wellington bookseller and involved in the Gay Switchboard and the response to the AIDS pandemic.

He became one of the organisers of the Homosexual Law Reform campaign to decriminalise sex between men. He remains engaged in socialist and community activism, and now works as a counsellor and marriage and funeral celebrant.

Onjei Bond is a recent Master's graduate in Museum and Heritage studies, interested in the queer history of Aotearoa.

He has recently finished a six-month research project focused on documenting and preserving the queer history of the Taranaki region, in collaboration with Pride Taranaki and Puke Ariki.

Gareth Watkins founded the non-profit community website PrideNZ.com in 2009. It has become the largest online audio repository of local Takatāpui LGBTQIA+ Rainbow histories.

In 2017, Gareth and his husband Roger Smith also founded Walktours NZ – a volunteer group that has run over 100 free, accessible, inclusive and community-focused walking tours exploring the city's rich queer heritage.

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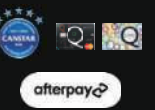

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Tighter controls on nitrous oxide come into force

Tighter controls on nitrous oxide have come into force, aimed at reducing the risk of serious harm from recreational inhalation.

From 5 June, importers must have approval from the Director-General of Health to bring nitrous oxide into New Zealand. The new permit system supports legitimate medical, catering, and industrial uses, while helping prevent diversion for recreational use.

Medsafe will assess permit applications on behalf of the Director-General. Approval will be conditional on Medsafe having confidence the imported product is intended for a lawful purpose and appropriate steps are in place to prevent misuse.

Medsafe has already been engaging with importers and has begun assessing early applications, with priority given to importers with imminent shipments.

In addition, nitrous oxide canisters over 10 grams sold as cream chargers will automatically be classified as psychoactive substances under the

Psychoactive Substances Act 2013. Canisters used for legitimate medical and industrial purposes are excluded.

The law says anyone who sells or supplies nitrous oxide to someone for the primary purpose of inducing a psychoactive effect is liable on conviction (to a term of up to two years' imprisonment or a \$500,000 fine). Someone possessing nitrous oxide for that purpose is liable to a \$500 infringement fine. The new regulations give Police strengthened ability to act against those supplying it for recreational misuse.

Dr Joe Bourne, Chief Medical Officer, Ministry of Health, says nitrous oxide misuse carries real and preventable risks. "Short-term effects include dizziness, impaired judgement, and blackouts, which can be especially dangerous if someone is driving. With heavy or repeated use, we are seeing cases of serious neurological harm, including nerve damage that can affect movement and coordination.

"These changes are about reducing

access to higher-risk products and supporting safer behaviour."

New Zealand Police says the changes will support enforcement and improve road safety.

"We've seen incidents where nitrous oxide use has contributed to dangerous driving and, in some cases, serious and fatal crashes," says Tusha Penny, Police Assistant Commissioner for Road Policing and District Support.

"Stronger controls on supply make it harder to access for misuse and give us clearer tools to act where it is being sold or used unlawfully."

Customs Group Manager Border Operations, Craig Chitty says Customs will play a critical role in enforcing these new controls at the border while working closely with the Ministry of Health, and Police as part of a coordinated, whole-of-system response.

Nitrous oxide misuse can have serious health impacts. Alongside immediate effects such as dizziness and blackouts, frequent use can lead to long-term neurological damage, including weakness, numbness, and difficulty walking.

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Train crash in Khandallah

A Matangi train crashed into a concrete barrier near Khandallah Station at around 7:20pm on 6 June.

Two passengers, the train driver and a staff member were injured in the crash.

The train was on the double track that runs through the Khandallah Station.

"Rather than going onto the single track, it carried on on the double track and hit the concrete block," Wellington City Councillor Diane Calvert says.

It was good that it hit the concrete block, she says, "because it saved it from going down the bank, which would have been catastrophic."

"People [on the train] would have been severely impacted and the train would have landed on a house or two."

Cr Calvert, who lives close to Khandallah Station, heard the crash.

"There was a massive boom. I've never heard a sound like that before," she says.

"At first I thought earthquake but there was no shaking and then I thought thunder but there was no thunder and lightning, so I really didn't know what was going on."

"Then we heard the fire engines and police sirens and realised it was the train."

"Locals right next to where it hit went round to help until rescue services arrived," Cr Calvert says.

Now that it has been a few days since

the crash, "people are saying have we got enough safety measures in place to prevent such an accident happening in the future," she adds.

The crash "is a very heartwrenching situation for all involved," Wellington Regional Councillor Simon Woolf says.

"Thankfully from what I understand the protections for this type of event worked," he says, referring to the concrete block to stop trains that have continued running down the double track, rather than diverting onto the single track.

It was yet to be confirmed, but the accident was possibly the result of the train running a red signal light, Cr Woolf says.

Continuing down the double track and hitting the concrete block "is what the train would have done if it had run a red signal."

The cause of the crash is being investigated.

Investigations are under way by the Transport Accident Investigation Commission, TransDev, Metlink and KiwiRail.

Investigators from the Transport Accident Investigation Commission were on site from late on the evening of 6 June.

The train was still on the track when the 'Independent Herald' went to print.

It was due to be lifted off the track by a crane some time in the next few days.

In the meantime buses are replacing trains on the Johnsonville line, and will be until further notice.

North Wellington Football Club in Johnsonville was granted \$21,000 for a contractor.

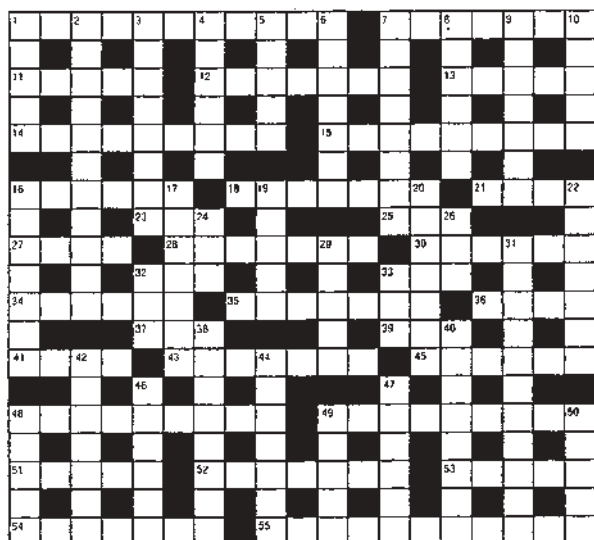
Victoria University of Wellington Association Football Club was granted \$4,000 for contractors.

They have lived in Tawa for more than 15 years.

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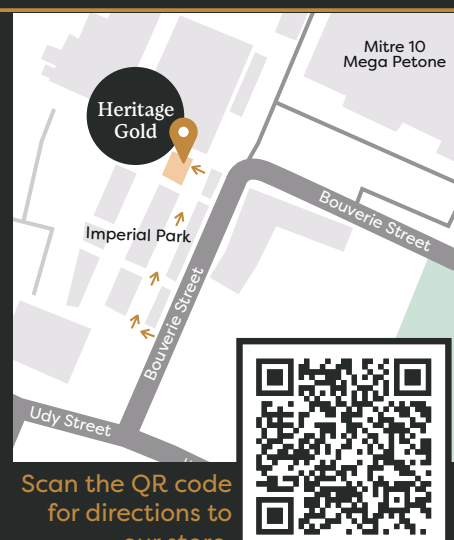
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
