Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 4. Four City Council seats are on the ballot. I encourage you to review each candidate's platform and to read the forthcoming statewide "Blue Book" mailed by El Paso County, which outlines pros and cons for ballot measures affecting Manitou Springs. [see Page 5]

Looking ahead, the City will sponsor a Recycle Day on Oct. 18, 10 a.m.–1 p.m. at Public Services, 101 Banks Place, hosted in partnership with Galvanize Recycling and Blue Star Recyclers. This resident-only service helps ensure materials are properly disposed of or recycled. [see Page 10]

City Stats:

- Planning: 230 property improvement permits approved. Many common projects require permits, including fences, retaining walls, grading, signs, exterior changes (siding, windows, doors), sheds, new construction, structural alterations, electrical/plumbing/mechanical work, decks, and roofing. Questions? Contact the Planning Department at 719-685-4398.
- Police: 6,191 calls for service, 415 arrests, and 18 homeless camps cleared.
- Public Works: 213 potholes repaired; 236 culverts/ditches cleaned; 7 detention ponds maintained; 29,400 feet of sewer mains cleaned; 101 fire hydrants flushed.
- Neighborhood Services: 479 cases managed; 432 inspections; 354 warnings issued.
- Parks & Recreation: 30 trees planted; 212 facility issues managed; 485 cemetery inquiries handled; 615 SeeClickFix items addressed; support for 95 public and 35 private events.

Department Updates:

- Aquatics Center: Roof and related repairs are underway; anticipated reopening the first week of January 2026.
- Parking & Mobility: Dillon public restrooms are open, and the Parking and Mobility Department has officially moved into the Dillon Mobility Hub at 130 Manitou Ave. Route 33 now serves Dillon with connections to the Cog Railway and Incline drop-off.
- Fire Department: 648 total calls year-to-date, including 404 EMS responses.
- Finance: Completing the annual audit and preparing a draft budget for Oct. 14 Council presentation. Per state law, Council must adopt the final 2025 City budget by Dec. 15, 2025.
- City Clerk: Leading a website refresh with ADA digital accessibility, supporting boards and commissions, and providing Sunshine Law and posting-requirements training.

We know the needs of any city can outpace what a single year's budget can accomplish. Still, steady progress adds up. As winter nears, teams are preparing for snow operations and extended hours to keep services running safely.

FIVE YEARS OF PROGRESS, ONE VISION AHEAD: INSIDE MANITOU SPRINGS' 2025 PAVING PROJECT

The City of Manitou Springs resumed its 2025 Paving Improvement Project on Monday, Sept. 22, continuing a major round of roadwork to enhance and modernize key streets throughout our community.

This project reflects the City's strong commitment to safety and mobility. With an estimated investment of nearly half a million dollars, funded entirely through the Pikes Peak Rural Transportation Authority (PPRTA) Maintenance Program, this work represents one of the most significant infrastructure priorities for 2025.

Pyramid Construction, Inc. is performing the work under the close oversight of the City's Public Services Department. Construction is expected to continue through mid-December, weather permitting.

The 2025 paving program builds on the momentum of last year's Road Improvement Project, which repaired nearly 10 miles of roadway, the largest single-year investment in Manitou Springs streets in recent memory. Together, these projects demonstrate the City's dedication to ensuring that residents, businesses, and visitors have safe, reliable, and accessible routes for years to come.

Commitment to the Community:

Investing in our roads is more than just construction, it is an investment in people. Safer, smoother streets mean children can walk to school with more confidence, residents can move through town more easily, and visitors can enjoy all that Manitou Springs has to offer without worry.

We understand that construction can bring temporary inconveniences, and we are deeply grateful for the community's cooperation and patience. Every improvement made is with the long-term goal of building a stronger, safer, and more connected Manitou Springs.

Building on Past Progress:

Since 2020, the City has invested heavily in improving neighborhood streets. Over the past five years, dozens of roadways have been repaired or fully reconstructed, including:

• 2020: Rock Hill Road; section of Manitou Avenue

• 2021: Mountain View Road (Sutherland Rd South to Clarksley Rd and west Sutherland Rd)

- 2022: Duncan Ave; Mesa Ave; Michigan Ave; Uinta Rd; Via Chula Vista; Midland Ave (Roca/Shoshone/Midland intersection); Prospect Place; Shoshone Place
- 2023: Via Piedra; Lower Sutherland to Mountain View; Clarksley Rd; Deneta Dr; Deer Path Ave; High Street; Upper Sunshine Trail; Mohawk St;
 Prospect Place; Lower El Monte Pl; Bond St
- 2024: Via Chula; Via Loma; Poplar Pl; El Monte; Tyler St; Plainview Pl; Spur Rd; Modoc; Navajo Ave; Chipeta Rd; Tio Rd; Ojo Rd; Capitol Hill Dr; Rock Rd; Washington (Loop @ Barnes Rd); Washington St; Lovers Lane; High St; Shoshone; High Rd; Deer Path; Pawnee Ave; Santa Fe Pl; Oak Pl; Old Crystal Park Rd; Kris Rd; Serpentine–Rainbow Falls

Together, these improvements represent the foundation that the 2025 paving program continues to build upon.

Current Phased Construction Schedule:

The following streets are scheduled for repair in the anticipated sequence:

• Phase 1 (In progress): Sutherland Road and Clarksley Road; Terrace Place; Oak Ridge; Floral Path

Phase 2: Oak Place; Grandview Place; Lafayette Road

Phase 3: Bond Street; Manitou Avenue/Crystal Park Road (intersection area)

Why These Roads Were Chosen:

In 2023, the City conducted a full evaluation of its streets using the Pavement Quality Index (PQI) a scientific rating (out of 100) based on structural stability, surface condition, cracks, potholes, deformation, ride quality, and overall wear. Streets selected for the 2025 paving project each had a PQI score below 50, indicating they were in "poor" or "failing" condition and required reconstruction.

These roads were also incorporated into the City's 2025–2030 Capital Improvement Plan and prioritized based on:

Community feedback

Traffic volume

Coordination with underground utility work

- Drainage needs (e.g., replacing curbs, gutters, and crossbars)
- Overall urgency due to wear or safety concerns

Resident Impacts and Notifications:

- Work hours will run Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m., with occasional Saturday work as needed to keep the project on schedule.
- Residents and businesses along affected streets will receive advance notice before work begins in their area. Door hanger notices will provide scheduling information and also serve as temporary parking passes. These should be displayed on dashboards or rearview mirrors to assist parking enforcement.
- On-street parking in work zones will be prohibited, and vehicles left in those areas may be towed at the owner's expense, if necessary. Streets requiring full closures will be posted in advance, and surrounding neighborhoods may see increased parking demand during active construction.

The City encourages anyone with accessibility needs or concerns to contact Public Services. Crews will coordinate with residents and businesses on a case-by-case basis to maintain access and provide reasonable accommodations.

The City of Manitou Springs extends its sincere thanks to our residents, businesses, visitors, and dedicated staff for their cooperation and support during this project. Your patience and partnership are essential in helping us deliver these improvements that will benefit the entire community for years to come.

YOUR RECAP OF CITY PROJECTS

PROJECT: 2025 PAVING

UPDATE: The City's 2025 Paving Project is underway and currently progressing through Phase 1. Crews are actively working to improve roadway surfaces and extend the life of local streets in multiple neighborhoods.

Phase 1 – In Progress:

- Sutherland Road and Clarksley Road
- Terrace Place
- Oak Ridge
- Floral Path

Work in these areas includes milling, paving, and related improvements to provide smoother, safer, and more reliable roadways for residents and visitors.

The paving project will continue in phases throughout the year, with additional streets scheduled once Phase 1 is complete.

PROJECT: SANDRA LANE CULVERT

UPDATE: Crews continue to make progress on the Sandra Lane culvert replacement, though recent work has presented some unique challenges and adjustments to the construction plan:

- Excavation Delays: A large chunk of buried concrete significantly slowed excavation efforts, requiring careful removal.
 Utility Protection: Teams have been excavating cautiously around both a waterline and an electric line to ensure the utilities are safely exposed before work proceeds.
- Project Approach: Instead of beginning diversion immediately, crews decided to fully excavate the site first. This allows for safer handling of utilities and more efficient work when the diversion begins.
- Current Work: Excavation for the diversion is underway, with utilities over the culvert now being exposed and preparations made to remove the existing culvert.

This deliberate approach prioritizes safety while setting the stage for the successful installation of the new culvert structure.

PROJECT: CREEK WALK TRAIL PHASE 4

UPDATE: Work continues this week on several important elements of the Creek Walk Trail Phase 4 project:

- Inlet Work: Crews are continuing modifications to the stormwater inlet.
- Pedestrian Access: Construction of the new pedestrian stair structure is underway, improving connectivity and safety for trail users.
- Lighting Foundations: Foundations for light standards are being installed, preparing for new trail lighting.
- Curb & Gutter and Sidewalk: Crews poured curb & gutter yesterday and with sidewalk installation to follow immediately after.
- Accessibility Improvements: A new concrete curb ramp is being built to ensure ADA accessibility.
- Utility Work: Electrical runs are continuing, supporting both lighting and other trail infrastructure.
- Irrigation: Irrigation systems are being installed to support landscaping and long-term maintenance of the trail environment.

These improvements mark key milestones toward creating a safer, more accessible, and better-connected Creek Walk Trail for residents and visitors alike.

Political Signs in Residential Zones

With the upcoming election scheduled for Tuesday, November 4, 2025 residents in Manitou Springs are reminded of specific limitations on the placement and duration of political yard signs, as governed by the city's municipal code.

The City of Manitou Springs does not require permits for temporary signs, including political yard signs, but does enforce restrictions regarding their size, number, location, and duration in residential zones and across the city.

According to Section 18.03.12.5.B.3 of the city's code, residents are permitted up to two freestanding temporary signs per parcel in any zone. These signs may not exceed six square feet per side and must not obstruct or impair the safety of pedestrian or vehicular traffic. Signs may only be placed on private property, which typically starts behind the sidewalk. Any signs placed in the public right of way or on public property will be removed and brought to city hall for the candidate to retrieve.

The display of these two temporary signs is restricted to a maximum of 30 days.

Residents are encouraged to schedule a pre-application meeting with the Planning Department to purchase a sign permit for signs that exceed the standards outlined above.

Prohibited Signage:

The municipal code explicitly prohibits several types of signage that could be used for political messaging:

• Any temporary, freestanding signs placed in the public right-of-way. Signs must be on private property and outside of this public access area.

• Signs mounted, attached, or painted on motor vehicles, trailers or boats are banned.

• Signs designed or allowed to wave, flap, or rotate with the wind are prohibited. This generally includes most types of flags or banners that are not static.

• Signs painted or affixed to benches, fences, vegetation, retaining walls, rocks, or natural features.

The regulations aim to balance the free expression of residents with the preservation of the city's unique aesthetic and the safety of its streets and sidewalks.

USE WILDLIFE-RESISTANT WASTE CONTAINERS!

As per Ordinance 3817, Code 7.10.030, any person utilizing waste collection bins shall utilize wildlife-resistant waste containers, or be securely stored within a house, garage or wildlife-resistant enclosure.

Collection bins shall be placed at the curb, alley or public right-of-way at or after 6:00 a.m. on the morning of scheduled pickup. After pick-up, all collection bins shall be removed from the curb, alley or public right-of-way by 8:00 p.m. on the same day.

Regular Elections:

Held on the first Tuesday in November of odd-numbered years and are coordinated and administered by El Paso County. Regular elections include candidates for City Council and ballot questions or issues referred to the ballot by City Council or by citizens through a petition process.

Voters can view their precinct-specific sample ballot and registration at www.govotecolorado.gov

Ballot mailing by El Paso County, begins Friday, October 10th; most voters should receive ballots shortly after.

Return options: Secure 24/7 drop boxes, by mail (USPS recommends mailing at least 7 days before Election Day), or at a Voter Service & Polling Center (VSPC). A full list of VSPC locations, hours, and drop boxes will be posted on the Clerk & Recorder website and are included in the voter instructions being mailed with the ballot.



MANITOU SPRINGS FIRE DEPT

Weekly Stats: This week the Manitou Springs Fire Department responded to 29 Incident Responses.

There were 14 medical related incidents and 15 fire/hazmat/other related incidents.

There were 2 incidents at the Incline/Barr Trail.

The Fire Department conducted 2 hours of training this week, that equated to 16 personnel hours.

Final Week to Apply: \$500 Match for Home Wildfire Mitigation Ends Oct. 10

The deadline is here. The Manitou Springs Fire Department (MSFD) reminds residents that applications for the Resident Wildfire Mitigation Grant Match Program will close on Friday, Oct. 10 at 5:00 p.m. For the 2025 season, this program provides a dollar-for-dollar match up to \$500 per household to support removal of hazardous vegetation in the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI). Funding is first-come, first-served, and no late applications will be accepted.

This initiative, made possible in part by a \$12,000 donation from the Manitou Springs Community Foundation, reflects the City's commitment to wildfire resilience and public safety.

Creating defensible space around your home not only reduces fire risk but also gives firefighters room to protect properties. Even small improvements in vegetation management can have a significant impact.

How to Apply Before the Deadline

- 1. Schedule a free wildfire site assessment with MSFD: https://bit.ly/WildfireMitigationAssessmentApp
- 2. Select a licensed, insured tree contractor (minimum \$1M liability and \$100K workers' comp).
- 3. Property walkthrough with homeowner, contractor, and MSFD.
- 4. Sign agreements (Stewardship and Cost-Share).
- 5. Complete the approved work.
- 6. Split invoicing: Contractor bills both homeowner and MSFD. (Do not pay in full upfront, doing so forfeits reimbursement eligibility.)

TRUTH SPRINGS




STRAIGHT FROM THE SOURCE: CLEAR, HONEST, AND REFRESHING.

According to Indigenous tradition, the sacred waters of Manitou Springs hold deep cultural and spiritual significance. These waters are described as receiving their carbonation from the breath of the Great Spirit, a gift for those seeking healing. For generations, they have been understood as medicinal, with teachings that emphasize a universal truth: water is life.

Customary practices included making an offering to the water and asking the Creator for healing before drinking. Stories also share that the springs were so special that families would travel great distances so their children could be born here, blessed by the Great Spirit's medicine at birth and receiving their first taste of water from the sacred springs.

Indigenous history is an inseparable part of Manitou Springs' identity. The City recognizes this and seeks to honor it through Truth Springs, a platform designed to provide clarity and transparency while paying respect to the cultural heritage that continues to shape our community. By drawing inspiration from the springs themselves, Truth Springs acknowledges the enduring importance of water as a symbol of truth, renewal, and shared connection.

The information shared through Truth Springs is gathered directly from City departments, project managers, public safety officials, and regional partners, as well as through emails, social media, media requests, and word-of-mouth within the community. By drawing on these varied but reliable channels, the City ensures that responses are accurate, timely, and reflective of community dialogue. We believe it is important to tell our story in this way because transparency builds trust, strengthens engagement, and ensures residents and visitors alike have clear access to the truth, straight from the source.



On the Truth Springs webpage, the state of the water will reflect the flow of information. When the spring is running, it signals that a new article has been released to address questions, clear up rumors, or provide important updates to the community.

When the spring is calm, it means there are no active concerns at the moment and things are at peace, yet the City remains attentive and ready to share new information as needed.
