Christian Schools for the last 13 years, teaching 3rd, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th grade in the Spanish Immersion (SI) program. For the last six years, she has been the SI Program Coordinator and Instructional Coach.

For Sebastiani, seeing the SI program grow has been very rewarding. "We started with a group of 25 students and now we have more than 300 students K-8 in the SI program. Also, seeing our first group, now sophomores in college, using their Spanish skills in many capacities is very rewarding, and I love that I have been part of this journey."


She recognizes the support of the community, parents, staff and colleagues on a professional and on a personal level, saying, "My relationship with the Lord is stronger as I see the testimony of the groups that I have been connected to in different ways, and also when I taught Bible. I have learned to love God and others even more than I did before!"

On her first 5th grade Science Camp trip, Sebastiani remembers the support of her students and the parents around when she went zip lining at the age of 56.

She also treasures the 8th grade Blessing Ceremony where the staff speaks a special blessing over the students.

One of the changes Sebastiani saw throughout her time here was the growth of the school. She said, "Growth brings challenges, but God has given us vision and solutions—with a few tears in between—to adjust to this growth."

The next step in Sabastiani takes her and her husband to Florida for their children and grandchildren. With this move, God has continued Sebastiani's teaching journey. She has accepted a position at Calvary Christian Academy, in Ft. Lauderdale, FL, where she will be teaching Spanish in their bilingual track in the high school.

## LEADING BY SERVICE AT KALAMAZOO CHRISTIAN HIGH SCHOOL

Interim is a week-long opportunity in the spring for Kalamazoo Christian High School students to engage with the world in ways that are not ordinarily presented in a traditional classroom setting. Some students attend career sessions or college visits, where they can plan for their future. Some students learn a new skill or trade.

This past spring, High School Bible Teacher and Director of Spiritual Life, Joey DeKoekkoek, led a mission trip to Kentucky during Interim.

Also on the team were Kalamazoo Christian staff members, Carla Dirksen and Don Wubben, and students, Regan DeVries (10), Alaina Klooster (12), Kara Kerwin (12), Landon Keorner (12), Ariana Kuiper (12), Lilly Locker (10), Gus Laaksonen (10), and Willem DeVisser (9). The Kalamazoo Christian team, joined by a group from Arkansas, partnered with TEAMeffort Youth Mission Trips to serve the community of LaCenter, KY.

Several of these students, including Regan DeVries are part of DeKoekkoek's Youth Group and have been on mission trips led by him before. She said, "I knew I wanted to go and serve more, and also spend more time with some of the group members that went with me."

DeVries has attended Kalamazoo Christian Schools since Young 5's. She is on the Kalamazoo Christian High School basketball and softball teams, and is a member of 412 and National Honor Society. She enjoys Bible classes, specifically Biblical history and Biology.

Day one of the trip, the group did a demo of the front deck and removed the back deck of a house. They dug trenches in the front to lay the foundation for a new front deck. They also tore down and rebuilt a fence in the side yard.

"The deck ended up looking really good after lots of hammering, and a few minor injuries," DeVries said. "One of them being Kara getting hit in the head with some old wood by Alaina...but they're still best friends."

From this mission trip, DeVries said she learned the practical skills and process of building a deck and the patience and perseverance to keep going on the work set before her.

One of the roadblocks the group faced were digging trenches that were deeper than originally estimated. DeVries said, "We dug trenches that were about five inches deep, and two inches wide, every foot and a half along the length of the deck. This was not only time consuming and strenuous, but we then had to fill 80% of them in due to the deck sitting lower than we first believed it would."

DeVries noted the time she spent with her own team, the other group and leaders along the way. She shared, "I had conversations with another leader named Jared about my faith and what I personally believe, although we had somewhat similar beliefs. These conversations taught me understanding of other people and how to share my beliefs with those around me in day to day life."

TEAMeffort has coordinated over 200,000 students and leaders in missions since 1993. The Kalamazoo Christian team returned to Michigan after the Interim week was over with a new set of skills and a lifelong impact of service.





# CREATIVITY POURS INTO COMMUNITY INITIATIVE LED BY 8TH GRADE WRITING CLUB

How often does one think about the batteries they have on hand? For the characters in the anthology, "Why Do We Never Have Any Batteries," it would appear, not very often.

The 2023-2024 KCMS 7th Grade ASP+ class was prompted by their teacher, Christine Webb, to start a writing club during their 2024-2025 8th Grade school year. Many of the students rose to the challenge and created a club for informal writing and community.

In brainstorming, they decided to give purpose to their club beyond doing the art they enjoy. With a call to give back to the community through writing, it was decided to write and sell an anthology to sponsor and create a Little Free Library at Tree of Life School in Kalamazoo, MI.

Each member of the club, along with Mrs. Webb and a few other students, wrote a short prose or poem to be added to the anthology: "Why Do We Never Have Any Batteries?"

The works varied in style, genre, theme and setting. The only criteria was to incorporate the question "Why do we never have any batteries?" into the piece.

Contents of the anthology were managed by the students in the club. They set submission due dates, edited each other's work and designed the cover.

Addie Ancrile, one of the writers, said, "We all like to brainstorm together, so we're all just bouncing crazy ideas off of each other."

Some of the stories are inspired by true events such as the story by Elizabeth Cho, retelling her









great-grandfather's role as a train conductor during the Korean War and Reagan Motson's story of a tornado hitting town, inspired by the recent spout of tornadoes in Kalamazoo.

"I would say that a lot of my inspiration comes from not reading the mainstream books, like I find this random dystopian novel from some random 'nobody' author at a book sale or at a garage sale for \$0.50," Eliee Stob, writer, said. "I just like reading the peculiar and obscure."

To raise money for the Little Free Library, the girls had to sell about seven anthologies each. They hung up posters around school and wrote fundraising emails. They designed the structure of the Little Free Library, and, with the help of their teacher and her family, built and painted the structure.

The girls said having clubs in middle school, especially at a smaller school like Kalamazoo Christian, is a great opportunity to connect, share creativity and grow in their passions.

When the Free Little Library was finished, the girls filled it with books, notes of encouragement and Bible verses for Tree of Life School and the community to enjoy.

As these girls enter high school, they have tentative plans to continue writing together even if it's not a formal club.

### ENGINEERING PROJECT TAKES COMMITMENT FROM KALAMAZOO CHRISTIAN MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

With the organization of their teacher, Kim Meyer, 5th Graders, Olivia Huizinga, Julian Laubenthal, Noah Maring, Silas Reames, Sophia Steensma, Landon Sytsma and Owen VanderKooy put their minds together to create a wind turbine for the Michigan Kidwind competition.

The team started the process by creating pinwheels and sailboats, experimenting with different designs and their reaction to wind. They used a box fan and DIY supplies to create a general basis for how wind works.

They found that the best designs usually sported an airplane-wing shape, which could easily catch wind. Using 3D printing and rocks to stabilize the base, a wind turbine was created. Prototyping the wind turbine on the 3D printing design program was a new step for many of these young learners, but they were able to get the blades designed and constructed.

The team named themselves "Christian Power," and designed the logo that accompanied them at the Michigan Kidwind competition (see shirt design on right).

Christian Power presented their model and poster to a panel of college professor judges for review. They won the poster and presentation portion of the competition, and placed second in testing their wind turbine model.

Owen described the competition as "fun, but intense."

Also at the competition, they were able to compete in an Instant STEM Challenge, using what they had learned to "make something wind powered."

Teams were encouraged to choose from a variety of everyday objects to complete this task. Christian Power used a simple design of a plastic bag and straws, which won them this mini challenge too.

Along with learning basic math and science skills, these young scholars dug deeper into the world of wind power, learning about wind turbine function, blade angles and measuring wind impact.

Owen said, "I learned a lot about how the angle actually matters for some things because, just having them [the blades] on randomly does not work as well for getting it [the wind turbine] to work."

Each member of Christian power had a strength, some being more involved in creating the poster


and presentation, others being more involved in wind turbine design and others being involved in construction.

Silas said, "I think we learned that sometimes it's good to work by ourselves, but we also need to work together."

Meyer had positive things to say about Christian Power's performance at Kidwind and their collaboration throughout the process. She said, "I liked how you guys were very scattered at the beginning and doing kind of your own thing, but, especially when it came closer to the contest, you really worked together. You were working independently pretty much and all working towards a common goal, and you handled that really well."

These students pushed themselves to learn and create something new, giving up many "free" hours of recess time; however, their efforts were rewarded when they accumulated enough points to win the overall score in the Elementary division at the Michigan Kidwind competition.

#### **2025 ALUMNI AWARDS**

Each year, the Kalamazoo Christian School Association recognizes two alumni who exhibit(ed) a lifestyle that mirrors the mission and vision of Kalamazoo Christian Schools.

The Impact Award is awarded to a graduate of five years or more that is actively impacting their community, while the Legacy Award honors an alum of over 40 years who dedicated their life in service to Christ.

In 4th Grade at Kalamazoo Christian Elementary School, Kelly (Kuipers) Solano wrote her first poem about wanting to become a missionary. In high school she participated in mission trips to Rock Valley, IA and Cary, Mississippi. She graduated Kalamazoo Christian High School in 1995, going on to attend Dordt University. It was there that Solano pursued her passion for missions, joining a trip to Nicaragua that changed the course of her life.

She said, "I wouldn't be here, or doing what I'm doing without my heritage of faith, which I'm so, so thankful for."

Upon graduating, Solano returned to Nicaragua to teach at Nicaragua Christian Academy. Now she works with the Special Education program at that school. She met her husband who shares in her passion for showing God's love.

Solano also volunteers at Tesoros de Dios (which means "God's Treasures"), a school for children with special needs. Her husband and her spend many of their weekends in Mombachito, a small, rural mountain community. While many people there have heard of God, few have experienced His love and grace in a tangible way. Solano supports mission groups that come to the area and pours into the women of the community, encouraging and empowering them to believe they have a God-given purpose. She also reads with children at the library there.

Solano said, "My years at KCHS helped instill a love for the Lord and for service. I remember teachers who brought Jesus into every classroom, chapels and worship songs, and friendships which encouraged me in my walk with God. Each year we would complete service hours which got us out into the community and exposed us to people from different walks of life. I also appreciate my Bible teachers who took us to visit various churches, cathedrals, and temples—we had many faith-forming discussions after those visits."

The 2025 Legacy Award recipient is Roger (Rod) Linders, graduate of Kalamazoo Christian High School, Class of 1943. Linders' children, grandchildren and great grandchildren have also been impacted by Kalamazoo Christian Schools.

Linders was a faithful volunteer at Kalamazoo Gospel Mission, Second Impressions Thrift Store, Park Village Pines, Comstock Community Center and Comstock Christian Reformed Church. As a WWII veteran, key founder of the Calvinist Cadet Corps and member of a five-generational Kalamazoo Christian family, he has truly walked, talked and lived as the hands and feet of Jesus.

Ann Triemstra, Rod's eldest daughter, shared about growing up with Rod that "definitely church came first." Their family would do daily devotions together, which came before activities. "If there was a need, he did it," Kathy Hoeksema, Rod's middle daughter, said. "People knew him by his service."

He was welcomed into eternal fellowship with Jesus on November 22, 2024, leaving behind a legacy of faithful service and discipleship. One of his favorite Bible passages was Psalm 23, "The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pasture, he leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul. He guides me along the right paths for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

Linder's daughters, Ann Triemstra, Kathy Hoeksema and Nancy Earles, and supporting family attended the 2025 Kalamazoo Christian High School Commencement where Ann received the Legacy Award on Linders' behalf.



#### A MESSAGE FROM 2ND IMPRESSIONS BY GENERAL MANAGER, PATTY GRUIZINGA


With prices rising on everyday items, family budgets are tight. Many people are turning to alternate options for shopping. The popularity of thrift shopping is rising!

The 2nd Impressions Upscale Thrift organization has been around for over 22 years. Lead by a volunteer Board of Directors, a daily team of volunteer day managers, cashiers, sales floor staff, furniture pickup and delivery, backroom workers, sorting, pricing and merchandising donations, 2nd Impressions needs a large volunteer force. On Saturday, the store has the volunteer crew of parents, grandparents and students.

Volunteers help raise money for tuition grants at Kalamazoo Christian Schools. Families have the option at registration to receive \$500 per student, depending on what grade their child is in. The store has given away \$600,000 during the 2024-2025 school year, as well as pledging the same amount for next year.

2nd Impression was started by a group of concerned grandparents and KCSA staff as a way to help more families afford the rising cost of Christian school tuition. Many of the original volunteers are still dedicated to store's operations. There are a minimum of 165 volunteer slots to fill each week and it is critical to have our constituents' involvement to insure the future fundraising success.

Most volunteers work one or two day per week, shifts are three hours each, 10a.m.-1p.m., 1-4p.m. and 4-7p.m, with various roles to choose from.
