Creating the Right Climate for Student Growth

As educators, we are gardeners of potential — planting seeds of knowledge, compassion, and curiosity in our students. Servant leadership reminds us that our greatest impact comes not from authority, but from service. When we focus on meeting students' needs first, we create the climate where every seed can grow strong. Here are a few ways to nurture growth using a servant leadership mindset:

PREPARE THE SOIL: BUILD TRUST

Healthy plants thrive in rich soil; students thrive in safe, trusting environments. Learn names quickly, follow through on promises, and show genuine interest in who they are.

WATER REGULARLY: PROVIDE ENCOURAGEMENT

Just as plants need consistent watering, students need ongoing encouragement. Notice small successes, give specific praise, and remind them they are capable — even when growth is slow or hidden.

PROVIDE LIGHT: SHARE KNOWLEDGE GENEROUSLY

Light fuels growth. Be intentional in making learning accessible, relevant, and inspiring. Offer multiple ways for students to connect with concepts and encourage them to shine in their own way.

PULL WEEDS: REMOVE BARRIERS TO LEARNING

Weeds show where nutrients are missing. Address distractions, inequities, or unmet needs early so students can focus their energy on growth, not survival.

PRUNE FOR STRENGTH: OFFER LOVING CHALLENGE

A good gardener prunes to help the plant grow stronger. Provide constructive feedback and stretch opportunities, paired with the support they need to meet those challenges.

ROTATE THE CROPS: ADAPT YOUR APPROACH

Not all plant types grow the same way. Adjust your teaching to suit the needs, learning styles, and strengths of each student. Flexibility keeps the learning climate healthy and productive.

CELEBRATE THE HARVEST: RECOGNIZE GROWTH IN ALL FORMS

Celebrate academic gains, social-emotional progress, acts of kindness, and moments of perseverance. The harvest is not just the final product — it's every step of the journey.

GUIDING STUDENTS IN RESPONSIBLE CELL PHONE USE

With cell phones out of student hands at school, they will be looking to us more than ever for mentorship in how to use them properly. As educators, we have a unique opportunity to model responsible and effective phone habits during the work day.

- Demonstrate appropriate phone etiquette: Show students how to use technology professionally.
- Minimize distractions: Silence your device or set to airplane mode for focus.
- Stay focused: Keep social media, texting, and calls off-limits during class.
- Don't text & walk: Make eye contact and greet students and guests as you're moving through and around the building.

By demonstrating mindful and intentional phone use, we help students develop the skills to navigate technology responsibly—not just in school, but in life.



EXPLORING ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

As adults and kids start learning more about artificial intelligence, important conversations around the use of this technology in schools are starting. We want to eliminate the gray areas around what's appropriate and what's not for both staff and students.

During the 2025-26 school year, the District will begin to discuss and explore AI for the purpose of identifying and developing best practice guidelines for AI use in our classrooms. A committee of teachers, administrators, parents, and community members will be spearheading these efforts.

DO YOU KNOW YOUR ROLE IN SCHOOL SAFETY?

September is emergency preparedness month. Be sure to review all necessary safety materials and ensure you are fully aware of the ins and outs of how to act/react when it comes to the various safety situations we may face in a school. Be sure you know your role in any given situation. Unsure? Be sure to ask a building administrator for additional guidance, training, or resources.

A few safety reminders:

- Know your roles in any given situation. If you are unsure, ask.
- Wear an ID badge. Law enforcement and visitors should be able to ID you as an AW employee.
- Ensure all building entrances are secure and never prop doors.
- If someone looks unfamiliar or lost in a building, engage with them and help them find their way to the office if they have not checked in.
- Keep important documents such as student rosters and medical information ready to grab and go if needed.
- Keep your lockdown key on you at all times.
- If assigned a radio, conduct radio checks and practice using it.
- During drills, discuss the importance of remaining calm and model this for students, as they will follow your lead.

The safety and security of our district relies on a comprehensive approach and a team working together. Together, we are safer, especially when we all know our roles.

Setting the Foundation

SCHOOL FOUNDATIONS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

A school foundation raises and manages private donations, builds community awareness and advocacy, and reconnects alumni to support programs and opportunities beyond what limited public funding allows.

IMPACT AREAS

The District has identified three primary areas in which a foundation could have the largest impact on Anthony Wayne Local Schools students: Academics, Arts, and Athletics.

STRUCTURE

Generals for Generations is being established as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization independent of the District and the Board of Education. It will be led by a Board of Directors composed of volunteers who are passionate about providing a strong educational foundation for AWLS students.

TIMELINE

Thanks to a generous donation, the District has contracted to work with Jenny Perin of Shift Consulting to establish the Foundation's framework. This month, networking events will begin to connect community supporters to opportunities for volunteerism, philanthropy, and guidance. The goal is to have the Board of Directors and legal structure in place by early 2026.
