Dear Friends,

Thank you for your continued partnership and generosity. Your commitment to the Central Wyoming College Foundation is the engine that drives our mission: to empower the work of Central Wyoming College. This year, as we share our annual endowment report and celebrate our endowment growing to more than \$33 million, we want to especially thank you for believing in the power of education to transform lives and strengthen our communities.

Your gifts directly supported students and programs in profound ways. As you'll see in the pie charts included in this report, the endowment distribution for 2024-25 was primarily allocated to scholarships (77.5%). This means the majority of your support went directly into the hands of students, helping them afford their education. The remaining funds were thoughtfully distributed to support vital programs (17.5%) and provide unrestricted support for the college (5.0%), ensuring CWC has the flexibility to meet its most pressing needs.

Your generosity makes a profound difference in the lives of our students. More than half of our students are the first in their families to attend college (53% first-generation), with an average age of 24.4, reflecting their determination to pursue their education at any stage of life. With 71.15% of our students attending part-time, they are often juggling work, family, and other commitments while striving to build a better future.

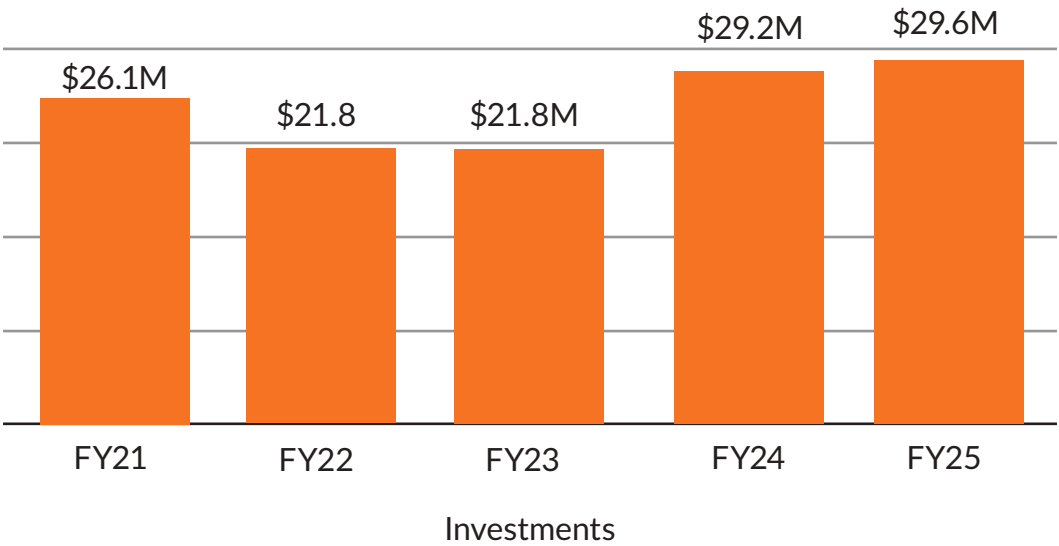

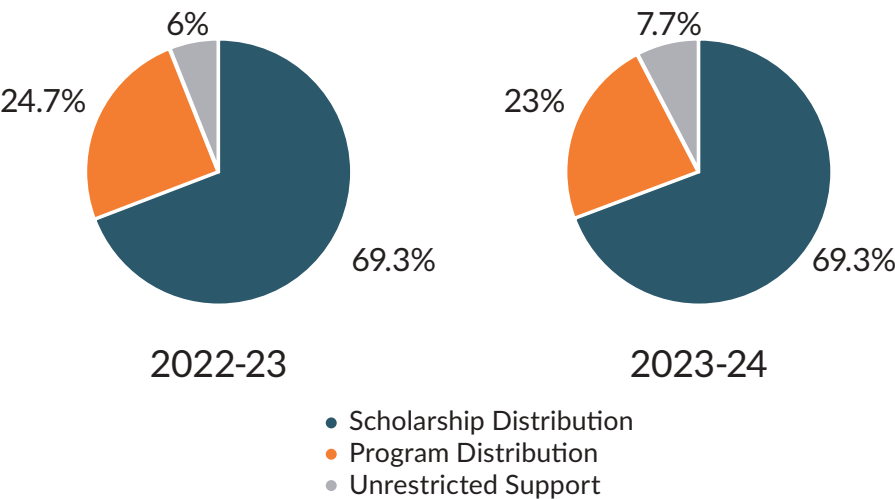

ENDOWMENT DISTRIBUTION TO CWC



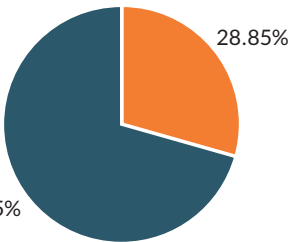
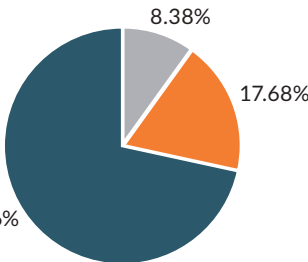
