**COMPOUNDING** is the joining of two or more words into a new one. Compounds are usually written as one word (raincoat), but also as two, hyphenated words (eye-opening). Compounding is by far the most common and productive type of word formation in English as well as in other languages.




In English	Cannot (can+not) Baseball (base+ball) Fireworks (fire+works)

In Ancient Greek	φιλόσοφος philosopher φίλος phílos (friend) + σοφία sophíā (wisdom)
In Italian	pomodoro pomo d'oro = apple of Gold = tomato
In German	The number 728,349 is siebenhundertachtundzwanzig- tausenddreihundertneunundvierzig


