It's a great day to be a Bronco!






A message from our Admissions Director, DENYS WATSON








A message from our Junior High Principal,

When I was fourteen, my grandfather was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. This hit hard. because he was like a father to me. When my parents divorced, he took on an important role in my life. So much so that I chose his name, Vol, to be my son's middle name. In my last summer with him, I could tell he began to try to teach me things that a father passes on to a son. He showed me how to change the oil and belts in our car. He took me to the breaker box and explained how breakers work and what to check when the power goes out. My favorite bit of knowledge received, however, was given to me during one of our walks together. Before I begin, please understand that my grandfather was Irish. Very Irish. When he was younger, he had black hair with a reddish tint beard. His last name was Bailey. Most important to the story. though, is that he had what some would call an Irish temper. As kind and loving as he was, my grandfather's temper could sometimes flash in a moment's time. I say this fondly, because watching football or baseball with him could be comical. He would be quite irritated with Boston Red Sox manager, Terry Francona, for leaving in Pedro Martinez too long. He would let out frustrations with NFL players for dropping a pass or making a terrible throw. I proudly attribute

my pessimism as a sports fan to him. But back to my point, he could speak quickly out of anger, bringing about the need for an apology on his part. This was the lesson he tried to teach me. He brought it up in the middle of our walk. "Son, you always want to be careful before you speak and lose your temper," he began. I quickly answered with a "Yessir, I know." He responded thoughtfully, "No, I really mean it. Because if you do, you will have to apologize. And you really don't want to have to go through that." I laugh at that to this day, because I understand it now. It's not that he was resentful and didn't want to apologize. It was the fact that he had to apologize due to behavior that was embarrassing to him. I have tried, successfully and woefully unsuccessfully, to remember his advice and apply it to my life. James sums it up perfectly in this month's verse. We must not let our desire to be right or our anger cause us to open our mouths and spew poison. We must listen, mull, pray, and then answer. Because if we don't, in the words of my grandfather, we will have to apologize!

On the first day, our speaker led an activity where students came forward to write on a note card and then returned to their seats. What happened next filled me with pride. 

Listening is an important skill in all of life, but it is especially important in music ensembles. God gave us two ears and one mouth, and listening is probably one of the most underrated skills musicians and individuals can develop. In an ensemble, active listening is not just about playing or singing your part well; it's about how you interact with everyone else. In ensembles, the goal is often to create a unified sound rather than a collection of individual voices or sounds. Listening to others helps you adjust your volume, tone, and articulation so that you're contributing to the overall balance. With groups, it's easy for things to get off track rhythmically if you're not listening carefully to the others. Listening well ensures you're

staying in sync with your fellow musicians, especially when the rhythm is shifting or when there are complex time signatures or difficult passages. Listening also allows you to be a supportive player and helps create an environment where every musician can contribute to the collective musical ensemble experience. Musicians in an develop a deep sense of trust and understanding through listening, being aware of each other's part, and responding to the conductor's cues and instructions. In the same way, when we learn to listen to others in other areas of life, it allows us to respond to their needs and helps build trusting, supportive relationships, which brings glory and honor to God.





Dear BACS Families, let's focus on James 1:19 (ESV): "Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger." This verse is both convicting and challenging because it sets forth attributes, quick to hear, slow to speak, and slow to anger, that are unconditionally applied to all believers. Clearly, this represents an impossibly tall task none of us are able to accomplish on our own merit. And our attention to this is significant, because James 1:20 reveals that failing in these attributes prevents us from producing the righteousness of God.

Thankfully, Scripture teaches in 2 Corinthians 5:21 that the righteousness of God is available to us through faith in Jesus Christ. So, the key to communication practices that bring glory to God by honoring and respecting others is available through faith in Jesus and active obedience to this verse (James 1:19). These acts are initiated not by altering our words, but rather allowing our hearts to be transformed by Christ.

With that in mind, here are three practical ideas to help us be "quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger." First, each day, read the Bible, inviting the Holy Spirit to guide you and cultivate a heart toward loving others. Second, manage emotional responses by waiting just a few seconds before responding to someone, giving yourself a moment to process and ensure your words reflect grace. Third, develop a habit of self-reflection, asking God to reveal impatience or anger, then surrender these feelings to Him in prayer.

By putting these simple steps into practice, we remind ourselves daily that respectful listening and measured speech honor Jesus' example. We benefit as a school community when each person seeks to build others up with attentive listening and patient words.

We are called to represent Christ to a watching world, and our habits of communication can powerfully testify to His transforming love. As we align our hearts with His righteousness, we are enabled to follow James 1:19 in a way that honors God and strengthens our relationships.


