SUNDAY MORNINGS AT 9:00 AM STARTING SEPTEMBER 21

Psalm 145:4 "One generation shall commend your works to another and shall declare your mighty acts." "Relationships are the oxygen of human development." - Dr. Peter Benson

Besides family gatherings, where do you find people of all generations interacting with one another? Not sitting NEXT to each other at sports events, concerts, or even at church. But where do people have the opportunity to really interact with each other, learning their stories, their hopes, and their dreams?

Generational Discipleship, the passing of faith from one generation to another, is modeled for us all through the Bible. Notice that the Psalmist doesn't say the OLDER generation shall commend your works to the YOUNGER generation. Trinity Together is about being in Christian community, learning with and from people of ALL ages.

Together we will explore spiritual practices such as Prayer and Holy Communion (helping Nina L. prepare for her first communion.) We will engage in hands-on activities and service projects. We will hear about adventures: Our Youth Summer Mission/Service Trip, ELCA Triennial Churchwide Assembly, and Synodical Journeys to Germany and Argentina.

Trinity Together provides an opportunity for us to get to know the people who sit on the other side of the sanctuary, or those in the balcony. This is a place where all ages and abilities are welcome.

A BLESSING FROM THE BARD HOUSE: THERE ARE WHITE LUTHERANS?!



Growing up, the busiest day of the church year wasn't Christmas or Easter. No, it was an unassuming Saturday in October when the country church we attended would host its annual Norwegian Supper. The men spent weeks prior to the event peeling potatoes, the ladies would wear folkloric costumes and serve at table, and the youth would wash one thousand diners' plates and glasses in the commercial Hobart dishwasher. Our donations of food and labor—and the community's support—meant that we were able to pay around half of the pastor's salary through this one huge event.

At this saturnalia of Scandinavianness, it seemed self-evident to me that being Lutheran meant being Nordic, if not strictly Norwegian—my proud Swedish father loved to remind my Norwegian mother that both countries were ruled from Stockholm until 1905. I was surrounded by things that reinforced this youthful opinion, and precious few that disproved it.

If you were raised in Berks County, you might have a similar memory about being German and Lutheran. After all, our home is the true epicenter of Pennsylvania Dutch culture, at least as far as the "Church Dutch" (Lutherans and Reformed) are concerned. Trinity's metropolitan nature has long drawn a diverse mix of congregants and clergy to the Word and the Sacraments–I'm not even the first Scandinavian to lead this congregation (that would be Pastor Knudsen). But venture out into the countryside and you'll find pig stomach dinners initiating youth and adults alike into the assumption that Lutheran equals German.

A friend of mine pastored a nascent Lutheran church on the South Side of Chicago. Since he had been a teacher and a social worker prior to entering the ministry, he knew exactly what his neighborhood needed in terms of youth ministry and programming, and within a few years his congregation had a large and growing youth group along with many bible studies, worship services and fellowship events. This church was thriving!

One year, the congregation decided to raise funds and make the journey to the triennial ELCA Youth Gathering, with tens of thousands of high-school-aged Lutherans from across the country gathered together for speakers, worship, music, and service. Upon arriving at the Gathering and mingling with the throngs, one of his youth exclaimed to Pastor Yehiel with confusion: There are white Lutherans?!

This isn't just a story about the narrow-mindedness of youth-whether me, or you, or this young person from Chicago. Instead it's a story of how all of us universalize our own experiences. It is hard for us to get into the mind and experiences of the Other because we have only experienced the world through our own lenses.

Yet being a Christian can reset our anchoredness in the Self and push us towards God and the neighbor—two beings that we can't know through unmediated experience, but that we can come to know through the mediation of the Holy Spirit. We come to know God through the Word and the Sacraments—learning from the experiences of our ancestors in faith and by taking God's own body and blood into our own bodies, making Jesus no longer the Other but an integral and living part of ourselves.

The incredible thing is that, by becoming a part of Christ's body in Baptism and by receiving Him in the Eucharist, we also come to a deeper understanding of our neighbors, especially those who share our faith in Christ. Although our experiences might be wildly different, we recognize that God dwells in each of us, and this shared identity can become the disarming connection that leads us to inquire about our differences openly. Through this sharing, we learn how to love our neighbor as ourselves—even if our neighbor has hopes and needs that we don't share or even fully understand.

Oh, and my friend from Chicago? After leading Shekinah Chapel in Riverdale, he was elected Bishop of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod. And, on July 30th, he was elected Presiding Bishop of the ELCA. While many people will focus on this historic moment—the first Black Presiding Bishop—I think that Bishop Curry's greatest gift will be his testimony about the transformative power of Jesus Christ, that same power that turns each of us inside out so that we can know God and Neighbor.

We've never had a Presiding Bishop who took a small group of believers in a challenging situation and turned them into a thriving, growing congregation that was effective in making disciples. We've never had a Presiding Bishop who was called to the Holy Ministry after serving long and well in another career. And I don't think we've ever had a Presiding Bishop who got to explain to his inquiring youth that being Lutheran isn't about race or ethnic origin—but rather about experiencing the transformative power of God through Word and Sacrament.




