Vaccinations offered for District employees

Green The Abbeville Area Medical Center collaborated with the Abbeville County School District recently and provided the first dose of COVID vaccine for District employees who wanted to receive it, according to Kathy Bernard, director of special services with the Abbeville County School District.

The vaccinations took place the week of March

8-12, at various sites throughout the District. Second shots in the vaccination process are scheduled for March 31 and April

1. The opportunity to receive the vaccine was open for any District employee.

"Anybody who wanted it who works for us could get it," she said.

They may also visit with unvaccinated people from a single household who are at low risk for severe COVID 19 disease indoors without wearing masks or practicing person gatherings. How do you define "fully vaccinated?"

According to the CDC, people are considered fully vaccinated at least two weeks after receiving the second dose in a two dose series or at least two weeks after receiving a single dose vaccine.

Senator pays virtual visit to Abbeville County

By Henry E. Green U.S. Sen. Tim Scott visited Abbeville County last week--virtually--as part of a 46 county virtual tour of the state, according to a news release from the Senator's office.

Scott spoke with a number of community leaders, including Abbeville First CEO Andy Timmerman, Talk of the Town Eatery and Catering owner Penny Richey, Flexible Technology general manager Jay Schlageter, and Abbeville County Development Director Stephen Taylor.

"Their conversation centered on the overall economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Abbeville County, the importance of protecting both small banks and businesses, and the harmful impact of a \$15 minimum wage on small businesses across South Carolina," Senator Scott's office reported.

Timmerman recalled Thursday how the Senator asked about the pandemic's effect on the bank.

"He asked how the bank was doing during the Pan-

demic – I told him the Bank has done well," Timmerman said. "We have been able to adapt quickly to the constant changing situation. There was hardly any interruption in service to our customers and we were able to add customers throughout the year as many were having trouble accessing their bank.

"He asked how the SBA PPP (Payroll Protection Program) was going – I told him the bank also adapted quickly to this situation. We were able to create our program so that we were processing applications from day one during the first round of the program last spring. The criteria for small business for this second round that started in January was significantly tweaked to allow smaller, mostly Sole Proprietors, qualify. A good example of how the changes helped very small businesses is that, in the first round our average loan size was around \$77,000. So far this second round we are averaging about \$21,000."

"It was a great discussion with our U.S. Senator in regards to the payroll protection program, and the concerns of the possibility of raising the minimum wage to \$15," said Taylor.

"We appreciate him taking the time to discuss those matters with us."

According to Scott's office, the County's economy has rebounded well from the economic pain caused by the pandemic.

"Abbeville County experienced a dramatic decrease in unemployment from 13.9% in May of 2020 to 4.8% in February of 2021," according to the news release." The strides made by the local economy illustrate the capacity for a strong strategic response to the economic effects of the pandemic."

The Senator's office also released a video in conjunction with the "visit", a video which included scenes of Abbeville's Court Square, and the tone was one of optimism in the face of adversity.

"You all are very resilient," Scott told the community leaders.



County jobless rate about five percent

Abbeville County's unemployment rate rose to 4.8 percent in December of 2020, an increase of six tenths of one percent from the month before, according to data from the South Carolina Department of Employment and Workforce.


The figure provided something of a contrast with the

one from December, 2019, when the rate was 2.9 percent.

In a ranking of the county unemployment rates for December, 2020, Allendale had the highest rate in the state, with 8.6 percent, while Lexington, with 3.5 percent, had the lowest.

Among Abbeville's neighboring counties, McCormick had 5.5 percent, while Greenwood had 5.1 percent, Laurens 4.8 percent, and Anderson with 4.1 percent.

The unemployment rate in Abbeville County has declined in recent months, according to U.S. Tim Scott's office, from 13.9 percent in May of 2020 to 4.8 percent as recently as February.

I saw the light Rate of vaccinations accelerating throughout United States

More and more these days, one is hearing the phrase "light at the end of the tunnel" with regard to the pandemic, as vaccinations ramp up across the county, across the state, and across the nation.

A vaccination clinic was held at the First Baptist Church of Abbeville Christian Life Center Thursday and Friday and Monday.

AAMC and First Baptist collaborated to present the clinic.

Representatives of the Democratic Party in Abbeville County presented the medical personnel with pizzas in honor of their efforts. Abbeville County School District personnel were also offered the vaccine, as AAMC personnel visited

the schools and the District deaths. office to offer the vaccine to

District employees. Meanwhile, according to South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control, Abbeville County as of Monday afternoon had a total of 1,957 positive cases and 29 deaths.

Among Abbeville's neighboring counties, Anderson County had a total of 18,810 positive cases and a total of 446 confirmed coronavirus-related deaths.

Greenwood County had 6,864 cases and 144 deaths, and Laurens County 5,905 cases, and 142 deaths, while McCormick County had 760 cases and 18 deaths.

In the state as a whole, there were a total of 455,088 positive cases and 7,850

As of March 1, Abbeville County had a total number of 1,919 confirmed positive cases and 29 coronavirus-related deaths, according to DHEC.

As of Feb. 21, Abbeville County had a total of 1,881 positive cases and 28 coronavirus related deaths.

The pace of vaccinations has accelerated nationally, and some people say that the end of the pandemic is in sight, but health care officials are issuing a warning against relaxing restrictions too soon.

As one expert put it, the United States should refrain from spiking the ball at the five yard line and wait until we are firmly in the end zone.

PTC planning in-person semester this fall

Piedmont Technical College is planning for a return to in-person classes for the upcoming Fall 2021 semester. While the college will continue to offer hybrid and online classes for those who prefer the flexibility these options provide, students will have a wide variety of face-to-face options across all programs. Fall registration will open on April 1.

"This is really good news, especially for students who prefer face-to-face classes," said PTC President Dr. Hope E. Rivers. "As we continue to monitor the Covid-19 pandemic, the trend lines are encouraging, and we are expecting to see vaccines become widely available as this year progresses. We expect to be in a much more 'normal' situation this Fall, as experts continue to indicate."

Dr. Keli Fewox, PTC vice president for academic affairs, noted that the expedited changes in course format that were prompted during the crisis came with valuable lessons for the college, primary among them the importance of continuing to maximize flexibility for students in any range of circumstances.

"While we are getting back to more widely available face-to-face instruction, we learned a lot about being nimble in our course delivery," she said. "At Piedmont Tech, it has always been a priority to schedule our courses to make attendance possible for students with busy schedules so they can fit a college education in between jobs, parenting and other life responsibilities." In an abundance of cau-

tion, the college will continue to implement its existing Centers for Disease Control (CDC) safety guidelines, including the requirement that everyone on any PTC campus properly wear face coverings and maintain social distancing wherever possible.

"With the increasing availability of vaccinations, we anticipate a lowering of infection risk throughout the summer," Dr. Rivers said. "But we also recognize the need to closely monitor any additional spread of the COVID-19 virus and its variants. This is certainly no time for complacency. If we are to truly prevail over this pandemic, everyone must do their part by getting vaccinated when eligible and protecting those around them by continuing to wear a mask."

The Power of a Name

Psalm 124:8 "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth."

Joyce E.A. Russell is the Vice Dean and Director of the Executive Coaching and Leadership Development Program at the University of Maryland Robert H. Smith School of Business. In an article written in January 12, 2014 she shared this incident. A friend of hers was in rehab and he was not getting good personal attention. His wife reminded him that he had not been nice to the people attending to him. She told him, "You don't even know their names." He grumpily replied, "Why should I know their names?" She gave him some tips on how to remember the names of people and encouraged him to call the staff by their names. He took her up on her advice and his personal attention increased dramatically. Joyce points out how important it is to know people's names and call them by their name. If that is true of people, how much more important to know and call upon the name of the Lord? Our text declares that the name of God is our help. I would like to dwell on that thought for a few moments.

The name of the Lord reveals His character. In

the model prayer, Matthew 6:9-13, Jesus taught us to begin our prayers with: "Our Father which art in heaven, hallowed be thy name ... " the word hallowed means holy or reverent. The name of God should be reverenced. We should not take the name of God lightly or irreverently. God will not take it lightly if we take His name lightly. Exodus 20:7 "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain."

The name of the Lord is powerful. Psalm 124:8 reminds us that the Lord created the heaven and the earth. That describes power, and His name gives us power. It was in the name of the Lord that David defeated the mighty giant Goliath. 1 Samuel 17:45 David said to Goliath: "... thou comest to me with a sword, and with a spear, and with a shield: but I come to thee in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, who thou hast defied." David had all the power of the name of God behind him as he faced the giant and defeated him. Moses asked the name

of God at the burning bush when God met him and called him to deliver the Israelites from Egyptian bondage. God told him, "I am that I am" meaning the eternal I am, the always existing one, the all powerful one. It was in the name of God that Moses defeated Pharaoh, the most powerful king on the face of the earth at that time.

The name of the Lord is powerful enough to save sinners. Romans 10:13 "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." Acts 4:12 "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved."

The name of God is not only powerful, but it is precious. The name of the Lord is our help in times of stress or times of fear. The name of God calms our fears and emboldens us to face the terrors of life. We can breathe that holy name in prayer any hour of the day or night.

What a precious privilege it is to be able to call upon the Lord at any time.



District planning eLearning Day in April

The Abbeville County School District is planning to have an eLearning Day on April 1, providing continuity to instruction even when school buildings are closed, said Brandi Sears, Director of Instruction and Accountability with the District.

"Our district received approval for eLearning from the SC Education Oversight Committee earlier this year," she said.

ELearning allows the district to provide or continue instruction via the use of technology resources during times of inclement weather, local disasters or interruptions in basic

services such as power or water and so forth.

"On these days, teachers provide instructional activities and resources through the digital Learning Management System. Students access and complete the assignments from home using their district-issued devices. All teachers and students participate in eLearning days.

"The chromebooks and instructional programs have been integrated into the regular curriculum and are used at school as well. The district held a Digital Homework Practice on December 9th in which all students were asked to submit electronic

homework assignments.

This allowed students and parents to determine their Internet accessibility from home and troubleshoot any issues.

ACSD conducted its first eLearning on the make-up day scheduled for February 22, 2021, and the second eLearning day will occur April 1, 2021.

ELearning provides significant benefits for students, Sears indicated.

"It allows the learning to continue even when the buildings are closed," she said. "As a result, students don't have to 'make-up' those days."


