

FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS AT CATHOLIC COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES



The purpose of these principles is to provide a framework for student affairs professionals at Catholic colleges and universities in their reflection and coversation, staff development, and planning and assessment. These principles are born out of our Catholic tradition and shared across our many and diverse institutions.

Principle 1

Embraces all students as valued members of an inclusive and diverse community that embodies God's love for all.

Principle 2

Equips student affairs professionals with knowledge and perspectives to contribute to the Catholic mission of the institution. Grounds practice in the living tradition of the Church, as the people of God on a journey to the truth.

Principle 3

Accompanies students on their search for truth, meaning, and integration through curricular and co-curricular learning.

Principle 4

Inspires and equips students to live solidarity and commit to the dignity of all people, embracing the goals of diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice in a community of love.

Principle 5

Calls and challenges students to personal integrity, reverence, and care for self, one another, and the community.

Principle 6

Invites and accompanies all students to develop an active and meaningful relationship with God.

Principle 7

Facilitates relationship building, dialogue, and the pursuit of common ground among individuals and communities with differing world view, contributing in the work for a more just world.

Principle 8

Assists students in discerning and developing their vocational directions and guides students in reflecting on how their gifts and talents connect with the world's needs.

Principle 9

Intentionally develops the profession of student affairs at Catholic colleges and universities as a vital component of Catholic higher education.

The Future of Catholic Higher Education KEYNOTE PANEL: THURSDAY, JUNE 29

Rev. Dennis Holtschneider, C.M., is an esteemed leader in Catholic higher education and current president of the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities. His insights on how Catholic colleges and universities have adapted to changing times while continuing to value their Catholic identity will be invaluable.

Dr. Brian Bruess, President, College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University, will moderate a panel of vice presidents from Catholic colleges and universities responding to Rev. Holtschneider's keynote. This panel will provide an opportunity for professionals in our field to gain insight and inspiration from the experience and knowledge of these leaders.



Dr. Montserrat Fuentes

President and Professor of Mathematics St. Edward's University

Dr. Montserrat "Montse" Fuentes began her tenure as the 24th President of St. Edward's University on July 1, 2021, serving as the first Hispanic and second female president. Dr. Fuentes also holds an appointment as Professor of Mathematics. Before this appointment, she served as executive vice president and provost and professor of Statistics and Actuarial Science at the University of Iowa. President Fuentes has a rich history of academic and administrative leadership in higher education. She is a first-generation college student and received a dual bachelor's degree in mathematics and music (piano performance) from the University of Valladolid in Spain and a Ph.D. in statistics from the University of Chicago.

Dr. Fuentes has authored more than 100 scientific publications and served as principal or coprincipal investigator on more than 20 research grants, with total funding of more than \$28 million. Since 2019, she has been a principal investigator of a \$3M NSF ADVANCE award to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion. In 2008, Fuentes was named an American Statistical Association Fellow and in 2012, she received the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Scientific and Technological Achievement Award. President Fuentes is actively involved in the greater Austin community, serving as a member of the Austin Community Foundation Board of Governors, Austin Area Research Organization (AARO), Austin Diocesan School Advisory Board, Ballet Austin Board of Directors, Austin Symphony Advisory Council, National Association of Independent Colleges and University Financial Aid Committee, Frost Bank Board of Directors, and the Assumption Cemetery board of directors.



Dr. Julie Sullivan

President Santa Clara University

Julie Sullivan was appointed the 30th president and first lay president of Santa Clara University in 2022. Prior to joining Santa Clara, President Sullivan served as the president of the University of St. Thomas in Minnesota (2013-2022), executive vice president and provost at the University of San Diego (2005-2013), and professor of business and accounting at the University of California-San Diego (2003-2005) and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (1987-2003). She currently holds appointments on the boards of Loyola University Chicago and the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities. In addition to extensive non-profit board work, President Sullivan has nearly two decades of cumulative service on public and private company boards, spanning a number of industries. A native of Florida, President Sullivan is a first-generation college graduate with a bachelor's degree in accounting, a master's degree in taxation, and a Ph.D. in business from the University of Florida.



Dr. Rob Kelly

President University of Portland

Robert D. Kelly, Ph.D. is the 21st President of the University of Portland. Dr. Kelly has spent his entire professional career in higher education - as an administrator, a professor, and now as the leader of the University of Portland. As President, Dr. Kelly is the University's chief executive officer, with responsibility for leading the institution and its mission of teaching and learning, faith and formation, and service and leadership. Prior to this position, he served as University Vice President at Loyola University Maryland, where he oversaw diverse areas across the University such as mission and identity, intercollegiate athletics, external affairs, and the division for student development. Dr. Kelly served in executive leadership roles such as the Chief of Staff at Union College, and Vice President for Student Development at both Loyola University Chicago and Seattle University.

In addition to a bachelor's degree in political science, Dr. Kelly earned a master's degree from the University of Vermont, and a Ph.D. from the University of Maryland. He is a past member of the Board of Trustees at Loyola University Maryland and he attended Harvard University's Institute for Educational Management.



Rev. Dennis Holtschneider, C.M.

President Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities

Rev. Dennis Holtschneider, C.M. is president of the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities (ACCU) and chancellor of DePaul University, which he led as president from 2004-2017. He has served as board chair and then COO of Ascension, the nation's largest non-profit health system; executive vice president of his alma mater, Niagara University; clinical associate professor of higher education at SUNY Buffalo; and associate dean and assistant professor of higher education policy at St. John's University, NY.

A national expert on university sponsorship and governance, Fr. Holtschneider holds degrees in mathematics and theology, as well as a doctorate in higher education policy from Harvard University where he lectures on governance and strategy in higher education and has twice been in residence as a visiting scholar. He is a frequent writer and speaker on the purposes of faith-based education in the contemporary world.

Fr. Holtschneider is a member of the ACE and NAICU boards of directors and presently chairs the NAICU Secretariat. He is past chair of the Institute for Advanced Catholic Studies at the University of Southern California; and currently chairs the National Pastoral Migratoria which provides services to recently arrived immigrants in various U.S. cities, and the Institute for Global Homelessness, addressing international street homelessness in partnership with the United Nations.

Kathleen J. Byrnes, JD, is Vice President for Student Life at Villanova University. In this role, she provides comprehensive leadership, management, and direction to the University's Division of Student Life, overseeing various studentrelated areas on campus. Known for her genuine care and concern for students, Kathleen's contributions to Villanova go beyond student life. Before joining Villanova, she practiced corporate litigation with firms in Washington, DC, and Philadelphia. She returned to Villanova in 1989 as an instructor at Villanova Law School and later joined the Office for Student Life.



Charlotte Johnson, J.D.

Charlotte Johnson, J.D. is Vice President for Student Affairs at the University of San Diego. She served as the Vice President and Dean of Students at Scripps College in Claremont, California. Before joining Scripps in 2014, she was the Chief Student Affairs Officer at Dartmouth College and Colgate University. Charlotte also served on the senior leadership team at the University of Michigan Law School. A practicing Catholic, Charlotte was drawn to USD due to its mission and vision as an engaged, contemporary Catholic university.

Linda McMurdock, Ph.D., is the Vice President for Student Affairs at Mount Saint Mary's University in Los Angeles. She brings a wealth of experience in higher education settings to her role. Prior to her position at Mount Saint Mary's, Linda served as the Vice President of Student Affairs at Marymount University in Virginia, where she spearheaded various institutional programs, including those focused on the prevention of gender-based violence and discrimination, the promotion of inclusive excellence, and the enhancement of career and professional development services.

Advocacy & Leadership: Transforming a Student Government Association into a Leadership Laboratory for Change and Action

Whether your university has a thriving Student Government or just needing a little recharge, this workshop will be centered on the advising, uplifting, and development within a student government team. Through a cocurricular leadership laboratory for change and advocacy, attendees will leave being able to advise their student governments to better serve the campus community and self-development while interacting with their local, state, and national platforms. Attendees will also be able to share their student government teams for over 10 years at the California State University and private school levels.

Partner Pop-ups: Building Community Through Intentional Interdepartmental Programming Tess Munshower, Resident Director, College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University

This presentation shares the lessons learned from the College of Saint Benedict's (CSB) Partner Pop-Up programs implemented in the First-Year Area this year. Through interdepartmental programming, first-year students at the CSB are not only attending diverse programs but learning to care for and participate in the wider campus community. Participants will leave the program having a better understanding of why interdepartmental programming is beneficial, and having ideas on how to partner on their own campuses.

Animating Faith Development: The Experience of Student Affairs Professionals at U.S. **Catholic Colleges & Universities**

Research indicates that over the last 50 years, education regarding faith was removed from many student affairs graduate programs, especially at non-religiously affiliated institutions. However, student affairs professionals in Catholic higher education are expected to integrate faith into their work. This presentation will explore the findings of a recent qualitative research study identifying the shared characteristics of personal faith development for student affairs professionals in Catholic higher education and the influence of those insights on their work supporting faith development.

How Did We Decide to Do That? Decision-Making During Covid-19

Michael Connolly, Senior Student Affairs Officer and Dean of Students, College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University

Learn how a sampling of US Catholic College and University Senior Student Affairs Officers approached non-academic decision-making during the Covid-19 pandemic. Results from this qualitative research study will be presented. The Covid-19 virus impacted all institutions of higher education, and while most campuses have crisis response plans to guide decision-making, most institutions did not have decision-making guidelines to address a sustained pandemic. This research study may contribute to the student affairs profession by understanding the factors influencing non-academic decision-making and experiences during the Covid-19 pandemic and integrating those factors into future campus crisis management plans.

The INSPIRE Leadership certificate program goes beyond preparing students for their future careers and academic success. It also aims to develop skills and aptitudes that will help them set goals, find purpose, and commit to serving their community. The curriculum includes activities that identify and strengthen habits and attitudes crucial for personal leadership development. Students will also learn about the relationship between leadership and community involvement, exploring concepts such as philanthropy, volunteerism, civic responsibility, and social change. The program comprises four courses, all geared towards nurturing students' leadership potential.

Incorporating a Climate Justice Perspective into Student Affairs: Programming, Leadership, Transformation, & Retention

According to the NCHA, the top 7 out of 10 reasons for student distress within higher education are mental health related. Hickman et al., in 2021, surveyed youth globally and found that concerning the Climate Crisis, youth overwhelmingly feel the future is frightening and betrayed by previous generations. This program will overview the mental health impacts of climate change research and discuss with attendees how this information could be applied to Student Affairs.

What's Faith Got to Do with It? A Crash Course in Supporting College Student Faith Development

Faith development is integral to Catholic identity and holistic student support. However, during the recent revision process of the Principles of Good Practice, student affairs professionals at Catholic colleges and universities self-reported low levels of responsibility and understanding in applying faith in their work. This presentation will provide an overview of faith development including its connection to creating a sense of belonging and its ability to serve as a resiliency tool. Participants will leave the session with strategies that may be used to integrate faith into their work.

Living Our Mission Through the Curricular Approach
