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


Depending on your property, you might have a variety of locations to choose from. Let's find the perfect space!

- Drainage: Take the time to consider any standing water issues you have when it rains. If frequent rain fall or flooding is an issue, ensure you choose a flat spot at the highest level of your property.
- Functionality: You'll also want to consider the functionality of the round pen. If you're planning to use it primarily as a turnout, close to the barn might be your prime consideration. On the other hand, longer training sessions might not require that.
- Clearing/Prep: What are the clearing needs of your desired location? Will you need to do substantial work to remove large stones, trees, and debris? More extensive prep needs to be factored into your budget.

At first glance, it might seem like size is an obvious choice. Smaller means more economical and bigger means better, right?

Not necessarily. Bigger does mean you have more flexibility in how you can use your round pen. But, you'll also have more prep, footing, and upkeep.

Instead, you'll want to understand the limitations and primary use of each size. Then, choose the one that is ideal for your needs. And yes, budget is a significant factor.

However, it's essential to choose a round pen that fully meets your needs and those of your horse to ensure an excellent fit long-term.

Pro Tip:

If your ideal size isn't within your financial or space budget yet, panels make it easy to start smaller and expand to a larger size over time.

Pros:


- Small Footprint Utilizes space effectively. Ideal for smaller properties or limited areas.
- Cost-Effective Generally lower price point due to fewer materials.
- More Control Allows for closer work with the horse. Can be favorable when training young or inexperienced horses.

Cons:

- Limited Space May not provide space for horses to comfortably canter, which could be restrictive during certain exercises.
- Restricted Movement Larger or more active horses might feel confined, potentially leading to stress or undesirable behaviors.




Pros:

- Balanced Size A good compromise between space and manageability; suitable for a variety of training exercises.
- Versatile Generally lower price point due to fewer materials.
- Space and Budget Balance Provides a reasonable trade-off between the cost of a larger pen and the space constraints of smaller properties.

Cons:

- Intermediate Space May still be restrictive for some high-energy horses or larger horses during more vigorous training sessions.
- Cost Higher initial investment when compared to a 40 ft pen, due to additional panels.



✓ 15 - Panels✓ 1 - 4' 9" Bow Gate✓ 32 - Panel Clamps







Pros:


- Ample Space Best for advanced training exercises such as cantering and jumping, allowing the horse to move naturally and comfortably.
- Versatile for Professionals Ideal for professional trainers who need space for diverse training techniques.
- Less Restrictive Provides a spacious, low-stress training environment, which can be more comfortable for the horse.

Cons:

- Requires More Space Not suitable for smaller properties or confined areas; requires a significant amount of space to set up.
- Higher Investment Requires more materials, making it the most expensive option.
- Potentially Less Control Increased space can make it challenging to work with more sensitive or inexperienced horses.

Initial Assessment Worksheet

Use these questions to guide your decision-making and help you identify your priorities.				
WHAT TYPES OF HORSES WILL I BE WORKING WITH? Will you primarily be working with young colts, seasoned horses, mustangs, etc.?				
WHAT TYPES OF TRAINING OR ACTIVITIES AM I PLANNING? Are you working with young horses on their groundwork and lunging, or a more experienced horse and will be riding in the round pen frequently?				
WHAT TYPES OF WEATHER WILL THE THE PEN NEED TO WITHSTAND? Will your round pen need to endure harsh environmental conditions? You'll want to factor that in when considering the build materials.				

WHAT BUDGET AM I WORKING WITH?
Budget is often a significant factor in your choice. Ensure that you're factoring in any site prep and footing needs.
DOES MY PROPERTY HAVE SPACE CONSTRAINTS?
Consider both space limitations and factors such as drainage.
WHAT SIZE GATE WILL I NEED?
Will you need space to bring a tractor in for maintenance, or will it just need to accommodate you and your horse?
WILL I NEED HEAVY-DUTY RAILS?
Will you be primarily working with larger, more energetic horses, mustangs, or younger horses you're starting under saddle?


For some, a standard size may not be enough. Here are a few scenarios where going bigger with a custom kit makes sense:

- Inexperienced Riders: If you're training novice riders to ride, a larger pen provides extra space for safety and smoother transitions during lessons.
- Advanced Training Needs:
 Professional trainers or owners
 working on more advanced
 techniques and skills might need a
 larger round pen.
- Property-Specific Considerations:
 Customers with ample space and no major restrictions often see value in maximizing their property's utility with a larger pen.

- Shared Use: Families or small equestrian facilities may want larger pens to accommodate a variety of training needs.
- Future-Proofing: If you anticipate expanding your training programs, a larger pen can save you the cost and hassle of upgrades later.
- Dual Purpose: A bigger pen can serve as both a training area and a temporary turnout space for energetic or younger horses who need extra room to move.


Pro Tip:

Check your location in a rain storm to see if there are specific drainage issues that need to be addressed.

A Note on Leveling & Clearing

While it does impact your overall budget, using a local contractor to clear and level your property can save you time and money in the long-run.

Look for reviews from your local equine community to find someone who understands the drainage, leveling, and usage needs of a well-designed round pen.





Working in tandem with your preparation is the footing you choose. It will affect everything, from performance to safety.

- Native Soil/Grass: Budget-friendly, but carries significant maintenance issues, such as mud, ruts, mowing, and more.
- Sand: One of the most popular options, sand offers great traction and drainage. It's also easy to drag smooth. Does break down over time, and can cause dust and water retention depending on your location.
- Crushed Gravel: Popular and economical. Ensure you avoid larger pieces that can cause bruising. Larger rocks as a base or mid-layer is a great choice.
- Additives: Depending on performance needs, higher traffic round pens might benefit from additives to control dust or manage water-retention.

The Best Footing Will Vary by Location

Decide on Your Best Footing

Ideal footing is going to vary by location, climate, availability, and budget. Consider respiratory restrictions for you and your horse, along with training level and personal preference.

Local sand & gravel companies and area horse groups can often provide you with a list of the most common options for your area.

Footing Type	Pros	Cons	Cost
Sand	Excellent traction, good drainage, easy to level.	Can break down over time, causing dust and potential water retention.	\$\$
Crushed Gravel	Stable, durable, great drainage, minimizes hoof stress when layered. May be hard on hooves without probase, some types can migrate.		\$\$
Rubber Additives	Superior cushioning, reduces dust, pairs well with sand for balance.	Higher upfront cost, may require regular mixing with other materials.	\$\$\$
Eco-Friendly Rubber	Sustainable, durable, excellent dust control, reduces environmental impact.	Requires mixing with sand for optimal drainage, newer technology might increase costs.	\$\$\$
Wood Chips	Affordable, soft, offers some cushioning. Decomposes quickly, requires replenishment, can become dutime.		\$
Fiber Additives	Enhances traction and stability, eco-friendly options available.	Higher maintenance needs, some types may contribute to microplastic pollution.	\$\$\$

You're almost ready to build. But first, consider the materials and build quality. Here's why we choose and sell steel panels:

- Strong Welds and Durable Panels:
 Heavy-Duty steel provides increased structural integrity and longevity vs wood posts.
- Smooth Edges: Beware of panels that have sharp edges, especially those not made specifically for equines.
- Sturdy Clamps: Be mindful of the chains and clamps used to attach rails. Chains, j-hooks, and drop pins can be unstable and create entrapment concerns.
- Proper Rail Spacing: Proper spacing helps protect from entrapment.
