




Distinguished Alumnus of 2021...

Dr. Jennine Huet Serves Her Patients, Her Country and the World

The time: 1985. Jennine Huet was mustering out of active duty in the US Army with a nice bonus that many of her peers were putting toward continuing their education. Jennine bought a motorcycle.

Jennine never planned go to college and thanks to the training she got in the military, she had the skills to get a good job. When she signed up in 1983 to, as she says, "make enough money to pay her bills," Jennine passed on the clerical training. (She says she still can't type.) Instead, she signed up to train as a dental lab technician. She could not at that moment have known how that one decision would



ultimately change her life, leading her to the ends of the earth and her selection as the UTSD Alumni Association's Distinguished Alumnus for 2021.

Back in 1985, Jennine was happy to take her motorcycle to her new job as an assistant in a dental clinic. She was good at her job. Dentists noticed the talented young woman and began to convince her to raise her sights. Her mentors, prime among them Dr. Billy Ray Clitheroe, made sure she believed in herself and encour-

aged her to continue her education and ultimately go to UTSD for her DDS.

Jennine became Dr. Huet in 1993. She credits the "structure, discipline and professionalism" she learned in the Army and her deep faith with helping her achieve her degree and her successful career. She says, "God has a strong hand in everything I do."

> The native Californian now operates her own dental clinic in The Woodlands, teaches as a volunteer at her alma mater, has racked up a long list of honors, and served on the Alumni Foundation Board in 2019-2020. She also was recalled to active military service in 1991 (Gulf War) and 1996 (Operation Joint Endeavor).

> Today, Dr. Huet doesn't limit herself to her students and private patients, as important as they are. She is an active member of the Christian Dental Society and has traveled the world with that organization to provide dental services to people who may have never seen a dentist.

One of her most memorable trips was in 2019 to Tarawa, a desperately poor island in the Pacific Ocean. Most houses there are best described as huts with no proper walls and no bathrooms. The people are vegetarians because the plentiful fish, which could sustain them, are contaminated by human waste. Dr. Huet and her colleagues brought their own equipment, set up outdoor clinics, and provided dental care for the islanders.

Dr. Huet tries to make at least one CDS mission trip each year. She is scheduled to go to Guatemala in April. This trip will be special because her daughter Annie, herself a dentist, and her son Marc, an IT specialist, will be going with her.

Dr. Huet also serves closer to home. She participates in Texas Missions of Mercy. The Texas Dental Association outreach program sponsors pop-up dental clinics throughout Texas. Each pop-up can served as many as 800 patients in a week. Dr. Huet says she tries to limit her involvement in this project to locations within easy driving distance from her home in suburban Houston. Of course, she considers "easy driving distance" to be four to five hours on the road.

In all she does, your 2021 Distinguished Alumnus, Dr. Jennine Huet, has proven that she puts few limits on herself or on her dedication to her profession and those she serves.

Annual White Coat Ceremony Will Honor Second-Year Students on Saturday, February 5

The White Coat Ceremony, a rite of passage for UTSD students, will be a bit different this year. Normally, the ceremony honors first-year students, but since the ceremony had to be cancelled last year due to Covid, second-year students will receive their prized white coats on Februay 5th.

Dr. Ken Horwitz, DDS, will speak on ethics and professionalism and lead the students in the dental oath.

Developed in 1998 by Les Fullerton, DDS, MSD, then Associate Dean of Continuing Education and Alumni Affairs, and UTSD Alumni Association members, the event honors students with fanfare and primes them for their career training and dental careers..

Approximately 100 students will receive the white coats featuring orange stitched monograms. Generously provided by the alumni association, the coats symbolize inclusion in a specialized network of professionals dedicated to honest and fair practice.

"When students wear these coats, they feel differently, behave differently," comments Dr. Fullerton. "This piece of clothing represents not only the individual but the entire collective of those committed to dental service."

The White Coat Ceremony was the first of its kind in the state of Texas when it began 23 years ago and was one of the first in the country. It is considered a model for similar programs around the country.

Giant Megalodon Tooth

The largest verifiable megalodon tooth measures in at a whopping 7.48" long. Discovered in Ocucaje, Peru, the antiquity resides in a private South American collection.

80,000 Toothbrushes

"Fastminar," a 40-foot tooth sculpture made of 80,000 toothbrushes is now noted in the Guinness World Records. The art piece, created by students attending Terna Dental College in Navi Mumbai, India, is the largest known representation of a body part.
