Hi everyone,

The big news for the year is our new [State Championships format](#). Our Events Committee and others have worked tirelessly to deliver this new format over the past six months. The new format sees players compete

to represent their clubs at Regional Championships and then State Finals in Open, Under Grand, and Under National categories. The aim is to offer our regional and developing players an equal opportunity to be crowned state champs. We cannot wait.

Back due to popular demand, our free [Online Supervised Play sessions](#) start again on Sunday 8 February. Clubs, please let your newer players know about them, particularly if your club is not in a position to offer supervised sessions. They really are beneficial to newer players and increase the likelihood of newer players returning to their clubs to play regularly.

At the start of the year, our Clubs and Community Committee also launched a webinar program for the year, with all webinars being provided for free. The topics have been selected with the aim of supporting clubs on the most pressing matters. You can view the [schedule here](#).

Our NSW team qualifying events are set to begin later this month with the [Open Interstate Team Selection \(ITS\) event](#). The Women's takes place at the [end of March](#). Participants compete to make the NSW team, with NSW set to take on other states at the Australian National Congress in Canberra in the middle of the year. Competition is always tough at our ITS events. Best of luck to all involved.

And finally, some sad news. We lost two people in our community over the holiday period: Stephen Burgess to sudden illness, and Marika Pogany in the Bondi massacre. Our NSW bridge community is an open, inviting and warm place. We are even family, and it's losses like these that remind us of that.

Peter Gill on Interstate Team Selection (ITS) events



What's your experience with NSW teams?

I've been a captain of the Open, Women's and Youth NSW teams. The Open team I captained in 2010 won the interstate. With that team, I let the players decide the playing order. I also captained a Women's and a Youth team to the grand finals but we lost both. I stuffed up with the wrong lineups in both. I have learned to do what the players tell me to do. In between, I had a great time winning the Interstate Open Teams for NSW twice as a player with Martin Bloom and Nye Griffiths.

Are Interstate Team Selection (ITS) events a way to improve your game?

Bridge is a weird game where it is difficult to get better. One of the most interesting things about bridge is that if less experienced players play against the top players, like in ITS, they get better. One of the problems at the moment is that less experienced players don't play against the

top players. The way you get better is to play the top players and lose to them, and gradually you realise that what they're doing is slightly different from what the restricted and intermediate players do.

Can you provide an example?

Restricted and intermediate players think competitive bidding is about high card points. All of the top players know it isn't high card points, it's all about shape. If you have a 6-5 or 6-6 shape, you can make a ridiculously high number of tricks on low point counts. Kate McCallum in her column in the Bridge NSW newsletter said to get into the auction early and often, and not to punish your partner by going too high or bidding your hand again the second time around. Give the opponents all the problems. If you've got a smaller point count, then the opponents are more likely to make their contract, therefore you should bid more. It makes opponents' bidding decisions a lot harder.

Any other differences between the top players and developing ones?

The top players are aware of when to do low encourage and when to do suit preference. Suit preference has more uses. Top players are always thinking how can I possibly get five tricks to get 3NT down, and they go for every little chance. That doesn't happen at lower level of play.

Any example of a pair that have improved as a result of ITS?

Two guys from Springwood Bridge Club, Lionel Murray and John Apthorp, played in the 2025 NSW Seniors ITS and came last. But since then, they've been doing well and won

an online championship event. I played them the other day and they beat me and my partner. They played very well against us.

The ITS Open qualifying is online. Good idea?

Yes. It means anybody in NSW can play the top players. And you can look at the hands later and see where you scored badly because your opponents knew what to do.

How does an ITS event differ from a congress?

ITS is a stronger event. Most national players don't play congresses because there are so many national events in Australia these days. Around 30 to 40 years ago, congresses featured the very best players. Now, they feature tier two players and maybe a handful of tier one players.

Any advice for players considering the ITS?

Go for it. You get double the number of red masterpoints that you get for congresses. Sure, you might not make the team, but if you want to get better, play the top players. Review your hands after on RealBridge and see where you dropped your IMPs or where you did something you consider normal but the bulk of the field did something different. Not during the event, because you'll be exhausted. If you happen to qualify, the finals are face to face, but you can still play the qualifying round and write "non-contending" down for the final. Also, with IMPs scoring at the ITS events, you can get a lucky run.

Are you playing any ITS events this year?

Yes, I'm playing the Open ITS with Jane Dawson and the Seniors ITS with Martin Bloom.

Vale Stephen Burgess

My first meeting with Stephen was in 1974, when he was still a teenager. The Australian Open Team was touring New Zealand and our first match was against South Island, and after 30 of the 60 boards we were 60 IMPs ahead. My partner, Andrew Markovics, and I played Stephen in the last set and he played like a tiger to win them the match 119-112.

Stephen moved to Australia in the early 1980s working for the Australian Taxation Office and then branched out into options trading. He formed a very successful bridge partnership with Paul Marston, in fact they swept all before them. They played the Forcing Pass System, Pass=13+, opening bids were 8-12 and 1S was any 0-7. Relay bids were an integral part of the system. Later Stephen and Paul played MOSCITO, featuring Strong Club.

Stephen represented Australia in (at least) six world championships, four zonal championships and has won many, many

national titles. He also played for New Zealand in at least two world championships. A huge result was 3rd with Paul Marston in the World Open Pairs in 1986.

From 1989, when Australia narrowly lost the semi final of the World Championships to the USA, Stephen was regarded for many years as one of the world's best bridge players. In the play, he virtually made no errors.

He had a couple of pet conventions, open 2H or 2S with a 5-card suit and 8 to 11 points, and open game on 11 cards in two suits, 7-4 or 8-3 shape. The first convention continues to grow in popularity.

Stephen always wanted to play in the Open Team Selection Playoffs but Robert Krochmalik and I had the pleasure of being he and Gabi Lorentz's teammates in Senior events over the last ten years, which featured four overseas trips as the Australian Seniors Team.

Stephen leaves Denise Gobes, and 4 children and 6 grand-children from earlier partners, and many friends and admirers.

New State Championships format in 2026

We're reshaping the NSW State Pairs and Teams Championships in 2026.

The new format replaces the State Open Pairs and State Open Teams. It is designed to encourage all players across the state to compete to represent their club to become **Regional Champions** in three different categories (**Open, Under Grand, Under National**) in Pairs and Teams. Regional Champions will represent their region at the **State Finals**.

The new format is expected to increase regional participation by players of all levels, and strengthen the event playing community across the state.

What's new in 2026?

From 2026, we are introducing **Regional Championships** where players represent their clubs to become Regional Champions. Pairs and teams are chosen to represent their clubs in **Club Selection Events**. Regional winners compete at the **State Finals**.



Clubs can conduct up to three **Club Selection Events** in times regularly allocated to club sessions, provided each is targeted at a different player audience (e.g. different days/nights, F2F/online). Each **CSE** must consist of no more than four (4) sessions and a club is limited to a total of nine (9) sessions.

Regional Championships will be played in categories (Open, Under Grand, Under National) where possible. They will be held **in ten country regions** and **metropolitan Sydney** (the same as the GNOT regions). Pairs and teams can also register directly for the Regional Championships.

At the **State Finals**, the three player categories (Open, Under Grand, Under National) will be played as separate fields. Each will feature Regional Champions, including Metropolitan Champions as well as the next three qualifiers from the Metropolitan finals. The State Finals **will be online**, to make it easier for players across the state to participate.

All events attract red masterpoints at **double the rate** of club red point sessions.

The **three player categories** are according to players' masterpoint rank as at **1 January 2026**. Full **Supplementary Regulations** are on the [State Pairs and Teams page](#).

Benefits of the change

The new format offers a number of benefits.

- **Broader participation.** The new player categories encourage greater participation at the club and regional

levels. Players can also benefit from red masterpoints without having to play Open State Finals.

- **Regional focus.** Players compete to play in Regional Championships and to become Regional Champions. This is expected to foster greater local and regional engagement, as well as stronger competition at club and regional levels.
- **Greater access.** All Regional Champions will have better access to State Finals, as the State Finals will be online.

The new format is expected to help grow the event playing community and provide another type of event for player development at all skill levels.

Key 2026 dates

Club Selection Events

Clubs can hold events when and how it suits them, provided they are completed before **31 August 2026**.

Regional Championships

Regional Championships will be held in-person at 11 host clubs across the state on or around the following proposed dates:

- **Saturday 26 September:** [Region name] Pairs
- **Sunday 27 September:** [Region name] Teams.

The **host clubs** will be determined by an expression of interest process.

State Finals

It is proposed that the State Finals are held online with RealBridge on:

- **Saturday 5 and Sunday 6 December:** State Teams
- **Monday 7 and Monday 14 December (evenings):** State Pairs.

Seeking Regional Organisers

Bridge NSW is seeking Expressions of Interest for Regional Organisers to implement the new Championships. The RO's role is to encourage clubs in their region to hold Club Selection Events and, in conjunction with a host club (which may be their own), organise the Regional Final and provide required information to the Tournament Organiser. Following the success of the two trials at the end of last year, Bridge NSW is once again hosting **FREE** Online Supervised Play sessions for newer bridge players on **Sundays 4pm–5:30pm from 8 February**.

The two trials averaged around 8–9 tables every Sunday, demonstrating how popular these sessions are, particularly for newer players whose clubs are not in a position to offer supervised sessions.

Online Supervised Play is designed to **help beginners transition to sessions at their clubs**. Ideally, supervised sessions are best attended face-to-face. But for some players that isn't an option, which is where the online supervised sessions can help. You can read more about [online supervised sessions here](#).

- It's good to teach in pairs

- Clubs can help teachers prepare for lessons with planning and practice to get timing right (e.g. dummy audience, look to avoid too much content, KISS)
- Clubs can help with lesson debrief / reflection so teachers improve (eg a third party who sits in on lessons)
- Encourage teachers to spend time reviewing/recapping the previous lesson.

2026 GNOT format confirmed

The Australian Bridge Federation has confirmed the 2026 Grand National Open Teams format, following endorsement by the ABF Board. The updated structure is designed to strengthen the face-to-face National Final, improve the overall player experience, and support the long term financial sustainability of the event.

- **Phase 1** club and state qualifying will continue under existing arrangements.
- **Phase 2** will be an online National Qualifying Final held from Friday 18 to Sunday 20 September 2026. The event will feature 64 teams over 2.5 days, with eight Open teams and 12 Non-Metro teams qualifying for the face-to-face National Final, an increase on previous years.
- **Phase 3**, the face-to-face National Final will be held from Friday 27 to Sunday 29 November 2026 at the

Queensland Contract Bridge Club in Brisbane, with Kim and Ray Ellaway appointed as Tournament Organisers. The Open Final will run as quarter finals, semi finals and a final with a playoff for third place, while the Non-Metro Final will feature 12 teams playing a round robin followed by positional playoffs.

New Open Teams event

A new Grand National Open Teams Plate will run alongside the National Final on Saturday 28 and Sunday 29 November. This open entry gold point teams event will consist of eight 14 board matches, with an entry fee of \$100 per player. Teams eliminated in the National Final quarter finals will be required to play in the Plate at no additional charge.

Fees

Entry fees for 2026 will increase to \$14 per team for club qualifying and \$400 per team for the National Final, while pairs-based qualifying events remain \$7 per pair.

Further details and supplementary regulations will be circulated in due course, with additional information to appear on the Australian Bridge Federation website and in the February newsletter.

Profile: Great Lakes Bridge Club

Great Lakes Bridge Club (GLBC) in Forster NSW will **host their 42nd Congress on 28 February to 1 March**. Entries for this event last year filled up fast. Competitors will arrive from Canberra and the Gold Coast, and many clubs in-between. Friendly rivalry from supportive regional club members in Taree and Port Macquarie is also expected.



For many bridge players, the popularity of country face-to-face congresses remains despite the post-2020 hiatus that witnessed a boom in online congresses. Who doesn't want to visit a beautiful seaside town, eat home-baked goodies and play bridge all at the same time?



The Great Lakes district is renowned for its tourism appeal. Its proximity to Sydney and other major cities means the journey is pleasantly short. And Forster's fine range of accommodation and the country friendliness of the locals see many visitors regularly returning to club events.

Another factor in the club's success and congress's popularity is a recent upsurge in new members. In recent years, a drive to introduce more people to the delights (and tribulations) of bridge has proved very effective.

We offer a range of Hi-Lo (mixed skill level) and mentored club events that provide realistic bridge game opportunities for beginners. The newbies jump in the deep end to play in tough and unnerving pairs and teams competitions, but by partnering with more experienced players, their

confidence and skills improve exponentially. The clubs are lucky to have supportive bands of stronger players who are happy to share their expertise and provide encouragement—the key to a positive future for the clubs and for bridge in general.



With newer players in mind, the 2026 GLBC Congress will award prizes for Novice/Restricted winners, as well as the Open section, with the pairs event (maximum 68 pairs) filled mid-December 2025, and the teams' event registrations not far behind.

At over 45 years old, GLBC has a long history of dedicated volunteers. Following a series of successful lessons conducted in August 1980, the new club amassed 43 foundation members, drawn from the then-tiny twin towns of Forster and Tuncurry (1980 population ~3,000 is now 21,000+).

Its Inaugural Congress in 1982 saw silent bidding pads introduced (!) and by 1984, the club's Congress attracted over 175 entries. Space was a continual problem for the quickly thriving club who set up in various clubs and halls around the district.

By 1998 a record number of 78 players attended regular sessions—new premises were sought urgently. And yes, the clubhouse was built by bridge-loving volunteers.



By early 2000, GLBC began play in its current clubhouse on Lake St, Forster.



As with many other small rural bridge clubs, GLBC faces challenges. Since games are generally held during the day and most members are older adults, attracting younger players remains an issue.

Further, online bridge's recent upsurge results in a smaller pool of on-hand volunteers and thereby, volunteer fatigue. The consequent reduction in the clubs' revenue affects resources. And physical

bridge clubhouses require ongoing maintenance, regardless of member numbers. Luckily, loyal locals who also enjoy online games have retained their commitment to the club. And GLBC's recent membership boost of intrepid beginners allays some of these challenges.

Mindful of the club's motto, which includes the word 'fun', GLBC recently reintroduced monthly dinner-and-bridge evenings. Many of its members live alone and while the game is ever the priority, the relaxed social atmosphere and camaraderie found among like-minded members is encouraged and supported.

GLBC is committed to supporting its community. Though a thriving bridge club, it remains a welcoming, relaxed and friendly environment.

Beginner lessons success at Belling/Camp Creative

Six months ago, the Chairman of Belling-based Camp Creative asked if I would consider running an Introduction to Bridge Course in their 2026 program. This was a surprise as Camp Creative is respected for its artist, designer and musician workshops. As bridge is a great game with mental challenges and social interactions, I suggested it could be included.

So, not one to dodge a challenge, I agreed to run a five half-day course on 12-16 January 2026 from 9am – 12pm each day.

I worked with Camp Creative to produce a professional web presence. I asked Bridge

NSW to help, and they produced posters promoting the course and graduation certificates. I enlisted volunteers to place the posters in libraries, art galleries and shops. My regular bridge partner, Lyndall, agreed to help and she has been instrumental in making sure I dotted the I's and crossed the T's.



I also approached local bridge clubs for support. Coffs Harbour provided two scholarships (\$275 each) and made their course notes and pre-dealt boards available. Nambucca Valley provided playing cards and bidding slips and Urunga came up with tables and tablecloths.

Twenty people enrolled in the course, with 17 local and 1 each from Perth, Brisbane and Sydney.



The results were fantastic but managing five tables is challenging because people had varying degrees of knowledge from zero to refresher.



The Coffs Harbour and Urunga Presidents and Lyndall attended every session and each was allocated a table to work with as players grappled with applying the skills I taught them by playing the hands presented. I looked after the other tables with a late volunteer to my support group.



Over the five days, a lot of boards were played and we had lots of laughs and misfortunes along the way! It was great to hear the excitement as people bid correctly or made the contracts they had bid. And

there's nothing quite like the Aha factor, is there?

We covered a lot of ground. The good news is no one dropped out. We made sure attendees knew where supervised sessions are held and how to access Bridge NSW's Online Supervised Play sessions.

Will I do it again? Watch this space! But I think you know the answer.

Player Development

Kate's Way #6

Bidding style is consistently aggressive

"Moderation is a virtue I admire in my friends. May it never visit itself upon my head." – Victor Mollo

When faced with a decision of whether or not to bid, we lean towards the aggressive choice as opposed to the conservative at all times.

I play a Strong Club system which affects ranges. The opening bid range is 10–15, which is something that's assumed throughout my System Notes, and General Principles, of course.

Open light, overcall light, respond light, invite light and accept light. This is particularly true in game-bidding at IMPs, because of the game bonus.

Light initial action

We want to be "involved" in their auctions, creating situations which do not exist at the other table, taking away the opponents' bidding space and gathering distributional information if we end up defending. Therefore...

Opening bids with any shape are based on trick-taking power, and strategy – not High Card Points (HCPs). (But, balanced-hand openings are based primarily on HCPs.) All references to HCPs are in light of essential

upgrading and downgrading. HCPs are a guide, but not the primary one.

Non Vul: We open all balanced 10's. (INT 10–12). Occasionally open INT with a balanced 9 in 1st seat favourable, when legal (not in the ACBL).

Open all 11's at any vulnerability.* We may open 10's at any vulnerability with a little shape and good suits. We may even open lighter in HCP with extra shape or good suits and low loser-count.

* In theory, we open all balanced 11's at any vulnerability, but it's acceptable to pass Vul 11's if you downgrade a really bad hand. That said, standards are not high. (Vul INT rebid is defined as 11–13.)

Super-Light Openings (less than 10 HCP): We may open lighter than 10 when unbalanced (based on loser-count and trick-taking potential). A 7-loser hand is an optional opening bid (pre-empting may be acceptable). A 6-loser hand is a mandatory opening bid (not a pre-empt, except at unfavourable vulnerability).

Non-Vul, an 8-loser super-light hand with a 6-cd suit is a problem – it doesn't fall into any category (weak-two's are 5-cd suits). It may be opened at the three-level, in preference to a weak-2 with a good 6-card suit, or at the one-level if it has the equivalent of an Ace and a King. (But follow applicable regulations regarding 8-HCP openings.) If nothing else fits, we may choose the weak-2 anyway, despite the 6-card suit.

We don't open super-light hands Vul unless they fall into the 6-loser category with good suits (possibly 7 losers if it looks good). Overcalls are similarly aggressive, and may be quite light at the one-level (depending upon position and vulnerability). A good suit is expected at 2-level or higher (EXCEPTION made for 2H over 1S with weakish 5-card heart suit and decent hand). In general: "When in doubt, bid."

Vul initial actions are far more sound than Non-Vul, in all situations. Unfavourable openings and overcalls (particularly pre-empts) are generally sound.

Responder forces to game on all 13's Vul, and nearly all 13's when we're NV (14 facing 10-12 notrump). Advancer needs 18+ for a GF. Opener accepts an invitation with any 13 at any vulnerability (including upgrades, as always).INT opening:

Non-Vul: 10-12 in 1&2; 10-bad 15 in 3&4
Vul: 14-15 in 1&2; 15 in 3; 10-13 in 4th

Some examples of "Consistently Aggressive" from recent play

In the Open KO in Canberra, we drew the strong Dalley Team in the 6th match. They bid 3 very thin games and an aggressive slam against us, and made them all. One could have been beaten but it's nearly impossible to find. We lost by 31 and all we'd done was sit in the wings and watch! They played the game the way it should be played. Consistently Aggressive!

Earlier, in the Seniors KO in Canberra we faced a strong team in Match 5. The player holding my cards at the other table was one

of the best and known to be conservative. A perfect opportunity for my kind of swings. At favourable Vulnerability I held a very weak hand:

My RHO opened 1D in 1st seat and, true to my beliefs "Get in and Get Out," and "Aggressive at All Times," I overcalled 1S. I doubted that it would be duplicated at the other table, and it wasn't.

This led quickly to 4SX, one off: -100 against their Vul 4H and 11 IMPs for us.

I opened 1S in 2nd seat and partner raised to 2S. In keeping with "Consistently Aggressive," instead of dismissing it as "only 14," I had a good look at my hand. Upgradeable to about 16 because of the long spade and the good club suit. Good trick taking potential - 6 losers, but closer to 5½. A simple raise is usually 9 losers, maybe one too many. But if it fits well, we could have a lot of tricks. I made a game try with 3D and Axel accepted. With 3-2 trumps I didn't even need the club finesse. At the other table, East passed 2S and scored +170. 6 IMPs for aggressive bridge.
