

#### YEAR 1B

1B have been very busy enjoying their new IPC topic 'It's Shocking', the budding scientists have been developing their knowledge of electrical circuits and using their practical skills to build circuits of their own. The children worked collaboratively with their classmates to build a light bulb circuit which included a press switch.

In Maths, we have been working on developing our number knowledge from 0-20 using a variety of maths methods including Numicon and dienes. The class have been reciting their numbers to 20 and estimating where different numbers should go on number lines by identifying which numbers are greater than or less than.

In English, 1B have been learning all about questions from one of our favourite Christmas helpers, The Little Red Elf! The children enjoyed reading the story and worked hard to find all of the different questions asked by the characters. They then created their own questions for their favourite character working hard to use capital letters and question marks correctly!











#### YEAR 3 EXIT POINT

Towards the end of our Vanishing Rainforests unit, the students discussed which learning they wanted to share with their parents and how they were going to do this.

As the Exit Point began, students excitedly ushered their parents into the classroom. Having already prepared their own healthy rainforest drinks, students encouraged their parents to try the different flavours and choose which was their favourite. Parents were also sent on an animal hunt around the classroom.

Whilst students were sharing their learning in Science, Art, ICT and Geography their confidence shone through. Many students were able to discuss different tasks in English and their home language. The students displayed their Effective Communicator skills while proudly sharing their Academic Success in IPC.







#### YEAR 5 EXIT POINT

Year 5 students recently showcased their learning in the Exit Point for the IPC unit, Weather and Climate. This event celebrated weeks of exploration into weather systems, global climates, and their impact on daily life. Students impressed with their creativity, collaboration, and deep understanding of the subject through interactive presentations, engaging posters, and guided tours.
