I first got into zines because I could not properly design and write a book.

Both books and posts that got shared on Instagram seemed professional and out of reach. Worse, I had a good taste in authors and the luck to have many capable artists / designers as friends. Since I never thought of myself in those terms, I intuitively made quick zines to say certain things I wanted.

The first long zine I made was on the bus from Copenhagen to Stockholm, which I then sent to my professor.





DIY isn't a trend, it's community, anticapitalist, cheap, and requires zero skill. In June 2024, I made *FUSS* because I was upset by the lack of space to talk about injustice—like the genocide in Gaza—in my own circles. And because *neutrality* was mistaken as kindness!



Within a week, I transcribed dialogues, edited written sharing, and included actual prompts I worked through with friends.

ARCHIVE was made in a day or three, I think?!






The photo shows someone reading it at a zine fair in Saigon.


Once shared, all of the zines I know have gone on to have unexpected lives of their own.



These are NOT chosen because they are aesthetic! I just ran a random number generator to pick them lol.




In this gathering, we came to share about ourselves—not our jobs and lofty dreams but a kind of vulnerability and honesty we didn't think there was a space for. To me, that's the ancestral spirit of zines.

Not only for us, but zines have been a way for marginalised voices—often denied recognition, visibility, and social legitimacy—to create and speak on their own terms.


and when we speak we are afraid our words will not be heard nor welcomed but when we are silent we are still afraid

So it is better to speak remembering we were never meant to survive.


But zines have become a hip thing in certain places, promoted as a way to be "in-touch" while making money or a name... They are taught in art schools and design studios to dress in complicated bindings and printing techniques.




Echoing Holly Casio, I don't mind myself and others making money, or making art, or designing books, but I think we should NOT call those creations ZINES because this practice *excludes* newcomers, hobbyists, or zinesters from making zines.


