


# USE HOP



## REACHING OUT TO THE POOR AND NEEDY IN PERAK





In 2023, the Lighthouse Hope Society celebrated 17 years of dedicated service to the needy and underprivileged, including individuals from the urban poor, homeless, Orang Asli communities, and migrant poor. Your support, collaboration, encouragement, and prayers have been instrumental in making this mission possible.

When the global COVID-19 pandemic struck, Lighthouse had to increase its support to our needy clients, many of whom are daily-wage earners, part-time workers and freelancers who lost their jobs.

At that time, we had lines of people queuing up to receive food parcels and rations everyday.

Kitchen resumed its operations on Malaysia Day 2022.

Since then, there has been a revitalizing change, providing our clients with the opportunity to enjoy sit-down meals restaurant-style setting.

We were able to recommence the operation of medical clinics, offer complimentary haircuts, and provide access to shower facilities on our premises.

The introduction of sit-down meals has not only allowed us to reestablish connections but also provided a platform for counseling individuals struggling substance abuse, guiding them towards the path of drug rehabilitation.

## URBANPOOR, B40 AND THE HOMELESS





Meet "Uncle Tailor" now in his 70s, who has spent most of his life running a thriving tailoring business in town. Today he barely earns enough for his daily expenses. Competition from inexpensive imported clothing and the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have resulted in a gradual decline in the number of his customers.

Widowed not so long ago and with a daughter who has mental health illness, he is very grateful for the monthly food basket we send him, and for having someone to share his concerns with.

"Uncle Tailor" is just one example of the many families and individuals Lighthouse Hope reaches out to.



**Refugees** are among the most vulnerable groups we visit. Because Malaysia is not party to the 1951 Refugee Convention or its Protocol, there is currently no legislative or administrative framework for dealing with refugees. Refugees have to pay for their own healthcare and education, relying on their own resources or working with NGOs to provide schooling for their children.

Lighthouse Hope provides aid to this Chin refugee school and home, which cares for 15 children and 4 families. Other refugee families we assist are from the Rohingya and Sri Lankan diaspora.

## ORANG ASLI





In 2023, we started making regular visits to an Orang Asli community of about 30 households in Sungai Siput, Perak. The village is in the interior, about 2.5 hours drive from Ipoh.

Logging companies encroach on customary land, muddying rivers and taking away the land used to cultivate crops, rear livestock, beekeeping and fishing. This in turn impacts their source of income. are continually Villagers being cheated of their livelihoods, never adequately compensated for loss of income.

Their families need access to healthcare and education. There is much work to to extend assistance and government support to those in need.

By the grace of God, after prayerful exploration of various avenues and endless negotiations, we discovered an access route. Plans are underway to develop what we now refer to as Ladang Lighthouse and to educate and equip the Orang Asli community through agricultural and skills training. Generous support is crucial for our upcoming initiatives.

We earnestly seek contributions, whether in cash or kind, to fuel the development of Ladang Lighthouse. Together, in unity, we can create a meaningful impact in the lives of those in need and initiate positive change!

In operation since 2008 at No 4, Jalan Koo Chong Kong, the centre has been recently repaired and refurbished, enabling us to expand our services.


Our **Soup Kitchen** serves hot meals, Mondays through Fridays, to an average of 70 to 80 people from the homeless, urban poor and Orang Asli populations in Ipoh.

There are **free haircuts, clothing and medical clinics**. The centre is a refuge, a place to rest or reflect, enjoy a hot meal and connect with others.

One of our regulars delighted us with a few tunes on his "Erhu," a traditional Chinese violin. Major festivals are celebrated with special meals and giveaways. At our recent Christmas celebration, dedicated volunteers sang carols in Mandarin bringing joy and blessings to all.

#### TAX EXEMPTION STATUS
