

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How Much Alcohol DO YOU NEED?

BEER

For beer, it is safe to assume that the typical beer drinker will have at least four beers! So multiply the number of beer drinkers by four to decide how many cups, bottles, or cans you will need.

LIQUOR

For liquor, the recommended amount is three 750ml bottles of each spirit per 50 people.

WINE

For wine, you can get about four glasses from each bottle so the recommended amount is four bottles of red wine per 50 people and six bottles of white wine per 50 people.

IT IS RECOMMENDED TO HAVE 100LBS OF ICE PER 50 GUESTS!



Budget Planning WAYS TO SAVE

DECIDE WHAT IS MOST IMPORTANT

Pick your top three priorities and allocate a little extra money for them (like your gown, catering, and band). Next, pick the three things that come lowest on your priority list and budget accordingly.

CENTERPIECES

Think of favors for your guests that can double as a centerpiece. This way, you have multiple uses out of them and guests can take them home and off your hands when the reception is over. Potted flowers, flowers in glass cubes, picture frames, candles, wine bottles and glasses with fruits are some examples. Use what you are given at your facilities and enhance it. Also, think about renting your centerpieces from your local rental company.

PICK A DIFFERENT DATE

Saturdays are the prime time for most weddings. Try to have your wedding on a Friday night or Sunday afternoon. Also, consider having your wedding on a holiday weekend. Some venues give discounts when you have your event on a Sunday before a holiday on Monday. Also consider having your wedding during off months (Nov-April).

BORROW

Friends and family come in very handy for this. Jewelry, shoes, decorations, candles/candle holders are just some examples of things you can ask to borrow and will cut down on your spending.

EXTEND YOUR ENGAGEMENT

Give yourself more time to save money by extending your engagement. You will also have more time to plan & compare pricing.

B.Y.O.B.

Book a facility that allows you to bring your own alcohol.

GET CRAFTY

Buy your own fabric and make your own overlays or runners to add a touch of elegance.

KEEP IT SIMPLE WITH FLOWERS

Instead of a large bouquet, consider one or two large blooms, like tulips or sunflowers. This will cut down your flower budget and still allow you to have beautiful flowers on your wedding day. You can also re-purpose your flowers from ceremony and use for reception. Consider tossing one of your bridesmaid's bouquets instead of ordering one.

PASSED HORS D'OEUVRES

Have your hors d'oeuvres passed instead of doing food stations. Guests will eat less and you save more this way. Keep the fruit, cheese and veggie trays to a minimum. Most guests just nibble on these and a lot goes to waste.

CUT THE GUEST LIST

We know it's tough, but one of the fastest and most effective ways to lower your wedding cost is to cut down the number of guests. Get out that red pen! At \$100 a head, taking 10 guests off the guest list saves \$1,000! Also consider the size of your wedding party, gifts and transportation are cheaper for 4 verses 12.


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Buffet vs. Plated WHICH IS BETTER?

What is the one thing people remember about a wedding? THE FOOD! Eating a delectable meal is one of the main attractions that guests look forward to at a wedding reception. A typical meal will include a salad, dinner roll, protein (such as chicken or steak), starch (such as pasta or potatoes), and a vegetable.

Choosing the actual menu is one task, but what is the best way to serve that food? There are two options for serving dinner at your wedding reception – Buffet or Plated. Let's explore the pros and cons of each!

BUFFET

On a buffet, the food is served in warm chafing dishes on two to three long banquet tables. Your guests are released, by table, by the DJ or catering captain. In addition to the food selections, additional sauces and other toppings are present on the buffet. Depending on where you get the food, you may or may not have an attendant at the buffet serving guests, and refilling the food as guests consume it. (If you get it from a restaurant, they may provide an attendant for an extra fee.) With a caterer, you can get a partial service (where they send two attendants to only serve the food), or a full-service caterer, which also takes care of not only serving the food, but cleaning up after guests, busing tables, and taking out the trash. (If you don't have a full-service caterer, you or a designated guest will need to take care of doing that less than pleasant garbage task!)

PLATED

A plated dinner is when a full-service staff of servers, headed by a catering captain, will serve the food directly to your guests at their tables. The servers will bring a plate of food to each guest, refill wine, pour a champagne toast, and clear the tables when guests have finished eating. They can also serve the wedding cake directly to each guest's place setting or cut the cake and place it on plates on a long banquet table for guests to take.

A dinner buffet isn't necessarily less expensive because the cost is based on the price of food, the cost of staffing, tax, and service fees. There may also be an additional fee if you decide to have real china, real flatware, and glasses instead of upscale disposable plates, plastic flatware and plastic cups, regardless of whether you choose a buffet or plated. What it really comes down to is what ambience you are looking for throughout the event.



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
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


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


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


Alterations to the Altar WEDDING DRESS TIMELINE

You found THE dress – now it is time to make it fit perfectly! This is where your seamstress comes into play. Your wedding dress is the most custom garment you will ever wear in your lifetime. A wedding dress, unless purchased off the rack, typically takes six to nine months to arrive. Once it comes to the dress shop, you will need to schedule your first fitting. The dress shop can provide you with recommendations of people that can take care of your alterations for you.

Bring your wedding dress, shoes, and undergarments that you plan to wear on the wedding day to your first fitting. This will ensure that your dress is altered properly. Your seamstress will make sure that the dress hits the floor perfectly. If you plan to wear flip flops at the reception, but heels during the ceremony, know that your dress may drag a bit on the floor as you dance. At this appointment, your seamstress may also add a bustle into your dress. There are two types of bustles – a French bustle, which ties underneath the dress; or, an American bustle, which uses hooks or buttons on the outside of the dress near the waistline. Once completed, you should schedule a second appointment one to three months prior to the wedding.

At the next fitting, your seamstress will be fine tuning your dress, so it is important to try and maintain your figure as best you can from this point forward to ensure that the gown fits you properly on the wedding day. The week of your wedding, your seamstress may take care of steaming your dress for you before you pick it up. Check and make sure that this is being done for you prior to the wedding day, as steaming a wedding dress takes a good 1-2 hours. At the final fitting, the dress should fit like a glove. Take someone with you to practice the bustle and take a photo of what it looks like when it is done. Store the dress in the bag until the day of the wedding and allow the dress to hang freely while you are getting your hair and makeup done prior to the ceremony.





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Tuxedos RENT OR BUY

The decision to rent or buy attire for the men in your bridal party can be a difficult decision. Here are some points to consider:

When you rent a suit or tuxedo, the store will help you select attire for the groom and the groomsmen. If you choose a local family-owned shop, your groomsmen can have their measurements taken at any other men's shop throughout the country, and then call them into the store you are working with. If you are working with a national chain, any location



Renting is less expensive than purchasing attire, but also tends to have more issues. Mismeasurements are typically discovered once the rented suit arrives to you, locally, around 24-48 hours before the big day. Attire will have to be picked up just before the event, and often returned the very next day. This can be problematic depending on the timeline and travel plans of your groomsmen.

Buying, on the other hand, is typically more expensive but generally more reliable. A custom suit or tuxedo is an investment, and many men take advantage of this and wear their wedding wear to future black-tie events, holiday parties and work functions. Purchased attire tends to fit better, especially if you've elected for professional alterations. You also don't have to worry about making time on the busy wedding weekend to pick up or return the attire.

Whether you rent or buy attire for the men in your bridal party, make sure you're prepared before you go to look at the options for attire. Make sure that the shirts you select are the same shade as your gown, whether that's ivory or white. Think about what colors you want your groom and groomsmen to wear. Do you want long ties or bow ties? Pocket squares? Vests? Will everyone be wearing the same thing, or will each person have slightly different looks? Thinking about these factors before you head out will save you time and make the process smoother for everyone involved!

TIP: If you're getting married around prom season, make sure that your groomsmen all make their reservations well in advance or they may not be able to get what they need!

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
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
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

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Cake Walk CHOOSING YOUR WEDDING CAKE

The wedding cake is the centerpiece of the wedding reception. Today, wedding cakes can be a traditional white or ivory to match the bride's dress, or customized to match a unique wedding theme. Regardless, nothing tastes better than a piece of delicious cake. Here are things to consider when choosing a bakery:

ARE YOU SAVING THE TOP LAYER? Will you be preserving your top layer, or would you prefer a fresh top layer on your anniversary? If you are serving the top layer to your guests, that can count toward your total number of needed servings. If you plan to save it, take that into account when choosing the design of the cake and the number of slices.

HOW ARE YOU SERVING THE CAKE?

Having the cake on a buffet can save you money because you can order 10% less cake. Not all guests will take a piece of cake for dessert. Should you opt to serve cake to each individual guest, you will need to make sure that you have a least one slice of cake per guest.

FLAVORS AND FILLINGS

Schedule a tasting with a few bakers and select what flavors and fillings you would like to try. Popular flavors include white, yellow, raspberry, strawberry, lemon, spice, and chocolate. During your appointment, mix and match the flavors to see what combination you like best.

DESIGN

Cakes can be tiered or stacked. A tiered cake has space between each layer, while a stacked cake is when the layers are directly on top of one another. Cakes also come in different shapes (circle, square, or hexagon), and heights as well. The taller the cake, the more servings you will have. You also have a choice of buttercream frosting, or fondant, a chewy frosting that is used for intricately designed cakes. Have inspiration photos so your wedding consultant can make a recommendation about which frosting type is best for you.

COST PER SLICE

The cost per slice will vary from \$3 to \$10 a slice in Ohio, and that is based on the complexity of the design and the ingredients used. You will want to order 90% of what you need if you plan to serve the cake on a buffet where guests go and get their own pieces. If you have it served, you will need to order one slice per guest.

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

This is the first party you as a couple throw for your guests!

COCKTAILS & HORS D'OEUVRES

Be creative and trendy with your foods. Passing hors d'oeuvres is a classy great way to save money. Fewer hors d'oeuvres are needed, as guests are less inclined to take more from a person than a station. Special touch: Have someone greet your guests with a glass of champagne, or wine, and show them where they can place their gifts. Some fun ideas during cocktail hour include a photo booth, flip book, polaroid stations, caricature artists, henna body art, or yard games if you have an outdoor space.

SALADS

Pre-setting salads is best done with buffets, to ensure the last table released to the buffet is not waiting too long to eat. It is also great if guests are coming from a different location for cocktail hour. Keep in mind dressing should be served on the side if salads are pre-set.

WELCOMES GUESTS / BLESSINGS

Traditionally, the father of the bride is given the opportunity to thank your guests for joining you on this special day and also giving a small toast to the happy couple. This can also be done by any family member or even the couple themselves! You can ask your officiant or a wedding party member to offer a blessing before the meal. If you dare to be different, you can open the dance floor at this time.

GUESTS ARE INVITED TO TAKE THEIR SEATS

If you have several guests with assigned tables, a round table for your escort cards is easy for guests to maneuver. Make sure your writing on the place cards is clear, not too small, and alphabetized by last name. Special touch: Have someone escort guests to their table.

TOASTS



A common substitute for champagne is a wine pour during dinner. Another option is for guests to toast with what beverage they already have in hand. Special touch: You can have your best man tell the guests to lift their glasses and toast, so it is not missed.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

If you want your wedding party announced make it fun with songs, dances, and excitement! This is the beginning of your party, get your guests excited for what is to come! If it is just the couple, you can go right into the first dance. This is also a great time to first recognize parents, before the couple or wedding party enter. Special touch: Have a family member do the announcing, instead of the DJ, to make it more personal!



DINNER

Plated - Consider a plate with two or three meats in smaller portions instead of just one on the same plate, this will save you from having to do entrée indicators for different meals. If you have a choice, remember to provide entrée indicators on your place cards that are easy for the servers to see. Some ideas include place cards with different colored borders, writing, or stickers that go along with your theme.

Buffet - No entrée indicators are needed for a buffet. Make sure guests can go down both sides of the buffet so it moves faster. Also, if you have more than 200 guests, ask your caterer for two

buffets. Count is typically one buffet per 100 guests.

Dessert - Consider adding a chocolate covered strawberry, edible decoration, or caramel/chocolate swirls around the cake plates or on your cake slices. Special touch: Fun dessert trucks, doughnut walls, ice cream cups, and dessert stations are a great way to add to the fun of your event!

LATE NIGHT BITES

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
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
